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
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### **FORT KNOX POST GUIDE**

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ort Knox is one of the most multifunctional installations in the Army. The units and organizations here run the gamut from U.S. Army Forces Command deployable units and reserve component training units to commands such as U.S. Army Cadet Command and U.S. Army Recruiting Command, which are responsible for identifying, educating and recruiting the Army's newest officers and Soldiers. The commander of Cadet Command also serves as the installation's commanding general. In addition, U.S. Army Human Resources Command manages all Soldiers' personnel actions, from initial enlistment through retirement and beyond.

Fort Knox is home to more than 30 units, commands and organizations with a daytime population of about 25,000 Soldiers, civilian employees and Family members. While each organization has a different mission, Fort Knox's motto, "Strength starts here," is reflective of the U.S. Army's Soldier recruitment, commissioning and career management missions all headquartered here.

As a newcomer to Fort Knox, you are part of the team of teams that is making the Army's vision a reality. Just outside Fort Knox's gates is a friendly, welcoming and supportive community. Fort Knox's organizations and the surrounding cities have strong partnerships, which foster open communication and a cooperative, mutually beneficial relationship.

The Garrison is committed to providing the best services, programs, support and facilities necessary for quality of life and organizational missions.

Some notable Fort Knox features include the Gen. George Patton Museum, Barr Memorial Library, Fort Knox Water Park and a youth sports complex.

The post also offers new and renovated family housing to Soldiers and their Families, military retirees, Department of Defense civilians, as well as non-military-affiliated civilians. These homes, managed by Knox Hills,

are situated within welcoming communities with community centers, attractive green spaces and one of the most extensive networks of active hiking and biking trails in the local area.

The Directorate of Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation provides a wide selection of recreation, fitness, sports and leisure activities. While all programs are open to military personnel and their Family members, many are also open to DOD civilian employees and their Family members.

Fort Knox also provides quality health care at Ireland Army Health Clinic. The clinic provides primary and specialty care providers for Soldiers and Family members and some special care for retirees.

There are four schools on post that are a part of the Fort Knox Community Schools system: two elementary schools, one intermediate school and a middle/high school. Based on standardized test outcomes, the Fort Knox Community Schools system is considered one of the best school districts in the nation.





replanning is essential for newcomers to Fort Knox, whether for a permanent change of station move, a temporary duty assignment or a school tour. Military OneSource provides information about a wide range of subjects, including relocation, child care, personal finances and emotional support during deployments. All the information you need to know to plan a successful move can be found using the tools on this page. Meanwhile, the Greater Fort Knox website provides good-to-know information on the surrounding communities.

There are a number of actions you should take as soon as you receive PCS orders — actions such as arranging for movement of your household goods, requesting on-post family housing if desired, arranging temporary quarters for when you are house hunting or enrolling your children in the on-post Child Development Center program, if appropriate.

Newcomers are encouraged to contact their local Personal Property Office as soon as possible after receiving orders to arrange shipment of household goods. Most of this process can now be accomplished online using the Defense Personal Property System at www.move.mil.

Single Soldiers E-5 and below must reside in single Soldier housing. Military Families can either apply to live in military family housing or reside in the local community. Information about military family housing, including application procedures and approximate wait times, is available on the Knox Hills website at www.knoxhills.com. Information about off-post housing is available through the Housing Services Office. Those planning to rent off post must report to Family Housing prior to entering into a lease agreement.

Military Families requiring on-post child care are encouraged to contact the Fort Knox Child Development Center at 502-624-6703,

8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Military Families moving to Fort Knox also may have their children's CDC information exported from the previous installation to Fort Knox Parent Central Services.

Before departing home, remember to hand carry important paperwork such as military service records, PCS orders, passports, leave and earning statements, proof of car registration and insurance, marriage certificates, immunization records of children, household goods inventory lists and military ID cards.

While traveling, be sure to document all travel expenses for reimbursement at Fort Knox.

Newcomer Orientation and Welcome is a presentation of installation programs and services pertinent to permanent duty assignment to Fort Knox. It is provided monthly and is mandatory for sergeants first class, chief warrant officers, captains and below. Newcomer Orientation and Welcome is open to all Soldiers, spouses and civilian employees. Spouses are highly encouraged to attend, and if needed Army Community Service will provide a voucher to the Child Development Center in Building 4249 on Bullion Boulevard. Children must be registered with Child and Youth Services prior to making reservations with CDC hourly care at 502-624-6708. Call ACS for date, time and location at 502-624-8391.

### **TRAVEL**

Fort Knox is 35 miles southwest of Louisville, just off Highway 31W, which can be reached from the north by taking Louisville's Gene Snyder Freeway (Kentucky Route 841) west off Interstate 65. If approaching from the south, take Kentucky Route 313, Exit 102, off Interstate 65. All three entry gates are located just north of Radcliff, Kentucky.

If you are traveling by plane you'll most likely arrive at Louisville International Airport. Assistance can be found for military personnel















and their Families in an Army Reception Center on the airport's second level. The center is open 8 a.m. until the last flight arrives on weekdays and 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Refreshments, games, cable TV, writing materials and phone lines are available.

No commercial bus transportation is available to Fort Knox, but some taxi companies provide group rates for military travelers. Details on discount taxi rates are available at the airport information desk. Some of the Reserve units offer a shuttle service from the airport to the installation. Incoming Reserve personnel should contact their sponsoring unit regarding transportation from the airport.

### **ARRIVAL**

Fort Knox has three entry gates — Wilson Gate, Brandenburg Station Road Gate and Chaffee (24-hour, main) Gate — all accessible from Highway 31W, just north of Radcliff. All military members, civil service employees, contractors and visitors need either a valid driver's license or DOD identification to enter the post. All personnel without a valid DOD identification cards (CAC, retired and dependent), who have not previously accessed Fort Knox will be required to stop at the Visitor Center at the Chaffee (Main) Gate, show proper identification to be vetted for access and be registered into the Automated Installation Entry system prior to entry. The Chaffee Gate far left lane(s) will be used for vetting personnel when the Visitor Center is closed. The Visitor Center is open 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily. Gate hours are available on the Fort Knox website at home.army.mil/knox/ index.php.

Individuals wishing to bring a firearm onto the installation must have the weapon or weapons registered with the Fort Knox Directorate of Emergency Services in advance. Weapon registration can be completed at the Visitor Center. The application will take up to seven days to process. All firearms must be declared upon entry to Fort Knox and the weapons registration permit verified when entering a gate. If you are declaring a firearm at the gate, all personnel will pull directly to the guard booth for processing. Privately owned firearms carried in a vehicle will be secured in the trunk. For vehicles without a trunk, firearms will be encased in a container to the rear of the vehicle. The weapon and ammunition must be stored separately. Carrying concealed firearms on Fort Knox is strictly prohibited. State concealed weapons permits are not recognized or honored on the installation. Requests for firearms registration permits can be dropped off at the Fort Knox Visitor Center at the Chaffee (main) Gate. Those personnel who are in transit to Fort Knox on military orders will be provided a seven-day temporary registration. Make sure to have all pertinent information ready but do not bring any weapons into the center. Firearms being stored on the installation must be registered with the Directorate of Emergency Services. IHG Army Hotels have more than 400 hotel rooms located in four facilities throughout the post. All hotel facilities on post are owned and operated by Rest Easy LLC/InterContinental Hotels Group. The main front desk check-in

location is at Holiday Inn Express, Newgarden Inn, Building 1327, 406 N. Knox St.

Hotel rooms are diverse in design, available to accommodate one to five persons. Rooms are equipped with one queen-sized bed or two full-sized beds, microwaves, refrigerators, cable TV, DVD players and free in-room wireless internet access. Guest services include breakfast, a fitness center, a conference room, a business center and a laundry facility.

Roll-away beds and portable cribs are available to guests on a first-come, first-served basis. They also have rooms that accommodate ADA persons. When calling or emailing your reservation, please inform the reservationist of any special needs. Reservations are recommended and are taken 180 days in advance.

To contact the hotel directly for reservations, please call 502-943-1000. Reservations are accepted 24/7 for all travelers. A credit card guarantee is required for all reservations. Reservations may also be made through the central reservation system at 877-711-8326 or www.ihg.com/armyhotels.

Room rates range from \$75 to \$189 for official travel and are based on the facility available. A copy of TDY or PCS orders or payment with a government travel card is required to receive the official travel rate. Please contact the hotel directly for retiree and leisure rates.

Pets are welcome at IHG Army Hotels. There is a \$75 nonrefundable pet cleaning fee and a daily charge of \$7 beginning the sixth night. Pet arrangements must be made at the time of reservation. Additional restrictions and fees may apply.

















### **IN-PROCESSING**

The first stop for all newly arriving personnel is the Process Control Station in Rockenbach Hall, Building 2020, 159 Black Horse Regiment Road. In-processing is conducted 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday. The facility is closed weekends, federal holidays and garrison training holidays. All personnel arriving prior to 3:30 p.m. will be in-processed at the time of arrival. Soldiers are required to have copies of reassignment orders, all amendments, and a completed DA Form 31, Request and Authority for Leave, signing them out of the last duty station. Soldiers who have an approved DA Form 31 for PTDY from the losing command are to report to Knox Hills/Family Housing in Building 1385, which is adjacent to White Hall, prior to reporting to the Process Control Station.

Soldiers will be given appointments to in-process finance and CIF on the date of arrival. Finance and accounting, transportation, retirement services, the Transition Center and the travel offices are at White Hall, Building 1384. Soldiers are to complete installation in-processing within five duty days of arrival. All in-processing must be done in military uniform. You may contact the Process Control Station at 502-626-0183.

Soldiers with units who do not have a staff duty desk and are arriving after duty hours can sign in at the MP desk, Building 298, on Gold Vault Road. The desk can be reached at 502-624-2111. The MP desk can assist with billeting by contacting garrison for single Soldiers in grades E-1 to E-6. All officers, senior NCOs and married Soldiers, upon signing in at the MP desk, will report to Newgarden Inn, 406 N. Knox St., Building 1327. Newgarden Inn can be reached at 502-943-1000.

### **RELOCATION SUPPORT SERVICES**

Army Community Service Relocation Support Services helps Soldiers and their Families settle in to Fort Knox as quickly and easily as possible. ACS has many programs and services to assist newcomers. These services include the Lending Closet, relocation counseling, pre-arrival information, mandatory overseas orientation, re-entry workshops, newcomer orientations, services to multicultural families, services to waiting families and sponsorship support.

All ACS activities are in Building 1477 on Eisenhower Avenue. Call 502-624-8391/6291.

The ACS Lending Closet is stocked with basic items needed upon arrival or before departure. Dishes, pots, pans, silverware, toasters, irons and ironing boards are just a few of the items available on loan. This program provides basic housekeeping items on temporary loan for 30

to 60 days to all incoming personnel. An extension is available if the household shipment has not arrived within the time period.

For outgoing families, items may be borrowed after the household shipment has been picked up. All items need to be returned prior to the departure date. It is best to bring your own linens because the Lending Closet does not provide them.

The Army established the Total Army Sponsorship Program to assist Soldiers, civilian employees and Family members during the relocation process. Program participants are provided with accurate and timely information and other support needed to minimize problems associated with relocating to a new duty station. The program is available to the active Army, the Army National Guard, the Army Reserve and civilian employees whose assignment to a position within the Department of the Army requires a PCS.

Interested in learning about how to become a sponsor? Have you been assigned official sponsorship duties? Log on to the CAC-enabled eSponsorship Application Training website at www.militaryonesource.mil.

You can never be too financially ready for your move. The government ships your household goods and gives you travel funds, but it may not be enough to cover all your expenses. While advance pay may seem like a great solution, remember that you must pay back this advance within 12 months. The temporary hardship of relocating may affect your Family for a long time. Moving expenses you can expect include: rent, advance rent, deposits, hookup fees, a license, tags, registration, car rental, transportation from the car shipping port if stateside, temporary lodging and food. Please call your ACS Relocation Services for assistance, and plan ahead.



### **SINGLE SOLDIER HOUSING**

Single Soldiers in grades E-1 through E-5 must reside in single Soldier housing. Service members must report to their units prior to being assigned barracks space. Soldiers reporting to the installation after duty hours will be provided temporary housing until the next duty day.

After reporting to their units, single Soldiers should report to the Soldier Housing Office in Building 2817 on 1st Infantry Division Road for a room assignment. The Soldier Housing Office is open 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. It is closed weekends and holidays.

All barracks are furnished and within reasonable distance to a dining facility. Free laundry facilities are in each building. Smoking is not allowed in the buildings. Smoking is allowed only in designated areas outside of each building. No overnight guests are allowed in the permanent party rooms. Pets of any kind are not authorized in the barracks.

### **FAMILY HOUSING**

Fort Knox is home to Knox Hills LLC, the family housing community on post. The homes are a mix of single-family and duplex homes in one- and two-story designs, each offering a spacious floor plan created for family togetherness.

Knox Hills' homes are situated within welcoming communities, highlighting pristine neighborhoods, community centers, attractive open green spaces, and hiking and biking trails that allow for resident interaction. Home sizes range from two to five bedrooms. Homes come equipped with major appliances, washer and dryer hookups, and central air conditioning.

The Knox Hills pet policy is available for review on its website. Pets must be registered with the Fort Knox Veterinary Center. Additional information about military family housing at Fort Knox can be obtained

by calling 502-799-6550 or visiting the Knox Hills website at www. knoxhills.com.

Information includes application procedures and floor plans, which are separated by rank. The Knox Hills Leasing Office is next to White Hall.

### **HOUSING SERVICES OFFICE**

All persons reporting for duty at Fort Knox must report to Family Housing prior to entering into a lease agreement off post. The Housing Services Office is in Building 1383 at 41 W. Chaffee Ave. HSO is available to serve military personnel, Family members, retirees and DOD civilian personnel seeking off-post housing. HSO is the first choice of detailed information when Soldiers and their Families are relocating to and from another duty station.

Single homes, apartments and town houses are available in the communities surrounding Fort Knox. Soldiers on permissive TDY must report to the HSO before signing in to start their PTDY. The HSO is open 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays. It is closed weekends and holidays. For more information, call 502-624-5824/6912.

The HSO provides a vast array of services for Fort Knox Families to include, but not limited to:

- Complete up-to-date listings of rental and sale property to include long-term, short-term and temporary lodging
- Home-buying and -selling support
- Information on lease agreements
- Transportation to obtain off-post rentals upon request
- Assistance, upon request, for Soldiers with move-in or move-out inspection requirements
- Information on landlord-tenant rights and responsibilities


















- Housing counseling on BAH, TLE and PTDY
- Housing inspections for adequacy
- Maps of surrounding communities
- Listing of off-limit areas and establishments, provided from the disciplinary control board
- Listing of shopping availability, relocation services and local churches

- Recreational and community information pamphlets

### **HOUSEHOLD GOODS SHIPMENT**

Individuals requiring information or assistance concerning property damage or loss of



household goods and hold baggage and other types of claims should contact the Legal Assistance Office 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays, except Thursday, when training delays opening until 1 p.m. Clients should submit claims in a timely manner, within two years of the date of

the loss, to avoid unnecessary delays and possible denial of the claims based on failure to file within the appropriate time frame. No appointment is necessary for claims assistance. You may send claims to usarmy.knox.hqda-otjag. mbx.cpcs@mail.mil or call 502-626-3000.





### **IRELAND ARMY HEALTH CLINIC**

Ireland Army Health Clinic, at Building 851, 289 Ireland Ave., provides managed health care for eligible beneficiaries living on Fort Knox and in the surrounding communities. Accredited by the Joint Commission (formerly known as the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations), the clinic operates five primary care clinics and a consolidated troop medical clinic, all of which are staffed by board-certified family practice physicians, flight surgeons, nurse practitioners and physician assistants.

Additional clinical services include, but are not limited to, pediatrics, optometry, dental, radiology, physical therapy, occupational therapy, the chiropractic clinic and the pharmacy. The post also hosts an Army Wellness Center that provides preventive health education and testing. IRAHC serves the Fort Knox community with primary and specialty

The mission of U.S. Army Medical Department Activity Fort Knox and IRAHC is to provide safe, high quality, timely and compassionate health care so it can enhance readiness, save lives and advance wellness to all patients entrusted to its care.

care providers for Soldiers and Family members.

In addition to Kentucky, IRAHC's area of responsibility, where it also provides quality health care and preventive services, includes Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin. Within this four-state area, the MEDDAC serves the active-duty population, many of whom are in isolated areas where they serve as recruiters and trainers.

Much of its beneficiary health care in all these areas is provided through the DOD's health care program, TRICARE. TRICARE is the military health plan that allows active-duty Soldiers, retirees and their Family members access to health services even though they are not near a military treatment facility.

### **EMERGENCY CARE**

If you have a medical emergency — life-threatening injuries or illnesses or something that endangers life, limb or vision — please dial 911 immediately or visit the closest emergency room.

Beneficiaries with nonemergency conditions should call the central appointment number, 800-493-9602, during the hours of 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday for an appointment with their primary care provider. If the situation can't wait, but it isn't an emergency, beneficiaries can call for a same-day appointment in the extended hours clinic.

Please note: Because many beneficiaries live outside of the Fort Knox and Elizabethtown area, visit https://www.iach.knox.amedd.army.mil to find the location of local emergency rooms that may be closer to you, general directions and web links. An Acute Care or Immediate Care Clinic is available for minor illnesses such as colds, the flu, ear infections, sore throats, fevers, rashes, minor cuts, burns and sprains. This link also contains the location, general directions and web links for many of those.

### **SCHEDULING APPOINTMENTS**

Appointment Line: The IRAHC central appointment line is open 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, except for federal holidays. To make an appointment, call 800-493-9602. In the event of severe weather conditions, you may want to contact the appointment center to confirm or reschedule your appointment before coming to IRAHC















TRICARE Online: TRICARE Prime beneficiaries can also schedule their appointments with their primary care provider using TRICARE Online's appointment feature at www.tricareonline.com. Appointments made online can be canceled, changed or confirmed on TOL.

TOL is the Military Health System Patient Portal. It is designed to provide online capabilities, tools and information for TRICARE beneficiaries.

Six good reasons to take advantage of using TOL:

You can book an appointment in the comfort of your own home. If a family member should get sick in the middle of the night or Sunday evening, you have that option to go online and book an appointment.

If you forget the date and time of your appointment, you can log on and verify that as well. Soldiers can print their own appointment slips to show to the commander if needed. You'll have the option to cancel booked appointments.

You can use TOL to get prescriptions refilled and check the status of your prescription. You can request prescription refills from TRICARE via mail pharmacy.

It allows you to have access to your personal health records. Those who have a common access card are allowed access to the TOL personal health record application during the first phase of this initiative. The TOL personal health record application allows you, the MHS beneficiary, to securely access your most current electronic health record data that is stored in the clinical data repository.

It allows you to transfer your account to other military treatment facilities.

It allows you to cancel an appointment from home, or while you are out and on a smart phone, so someone who needs that appointment can get scheduled.

## READINESS AND RESILIENT CAMPAIGN PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

The Fort Knox Command and community is engaged in the overall commitment and concept of the Ready and Resilient Campaign, known as R2C, which guides the Army's efforts in cultivating a holistic, multidisciplinary approach to health promotion and includes the efforts of the Army Health Promotion Program. R2C is a far-reaching and comprehensive campaign to enhance individual and collective resilience in order

to improve readiness across the Total Army: Soldiers (active, National Guard and Reserve), Army civilians and Family members. Fort Knox takes pride in integrating and synchronizing Army programs aimed at health promotion and the multiple Army-wide efforts designed to improve physical, psychological and emotional health to enhance individual performance and increase overall unit readiness. ### DEPARTMENT OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

The IRAHC Department of Behavioral Health is in Building 1480, off 12th Armored Division Avenue. It houses the Child and Family Behavioral Health System, the Family Advocacy Program, the Army Substance Abuse Program and the Behavioral Health Clinic.

The Army Substance Abuse Program front desk number is 502-626-6189. The Child and Family Behavioral Health System and Family Advocacy Program front desk number

















is 502-626-6170. The Department of Behavioral Health and Behavioral Health Clinic front desk numbers are 502-626-6188/6187.

The Department of Behavioral Health provides a variety of services, including, but not limited to, mental status exams, command-directed evaluations, intensive outpatient groups, anger management, stress management, marital and family counseling, and individual counseling, as well as coordination of emergency psychiatric services when needed.

Clinic hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. On federal holidays and weekends, please call 911 for emergencies. For a behavioral health emergency, you may also go directly to Lincoln Trail Behavioral Health in Radcliff (270-351-9444) or to the Brook Behavioral Health Hospital in Louisville (502-896-0495).

All services — the Child and Family Behavioral Health System, the Family Advocacy Program, the Army Substance Abuse Program and Behavioral Health — have daily walk-in hours. For clinic and program-specific hours and procedures, please contact that clinic's front desk.

For questions regarding your TRICARE health insurance, please call TRICARE East, Humana Military at 800-444-5445.

### **DENTAL CARE**

General dentistry care is provided for all active-duty military members. The dental staff also provides educational services about dental disease prevention programs to post schools and assists other organizations.

Services such as endodontics, oral surgery, periodontics and prosthetics are provided by

civilian providers via referrals from the dental clinic.

Fort Knox's Jordan Dental Clinic provides treatment to the military community and can be reached by calling 502-626-8301. Routine dental services are not available for Family members or retirees.

During normal duty hours, treatment is provided at the dental clinic serving your unit. After duty hours, Soldiers with dental emergencies should go to the nearest emergency room.

### **HEALTH AND WELLNESS CENTER**

The Health and Wellness Center provides comprehensive, multidisciplinary preventive health programs to active-duty personnel, retirees and their Family members, and Fort Knox civilian employees and contractors. Programs include tobacco cessation classes, weight control programs, and cholesterol and blood pressure screenings (by appointment only). Literature and video checkout services provide customers with the latest health-related information available.

### **ARMY WELLNESS CENTER**

The Fort Knox Army Wellness Center is a U.S. Army Medical Command initiative that supports the Army Ready and Resilient and Patient-Centered Medical Home initiatives. The AWC is managed by the U.S. Army Public Health Command, which oversees the operation of AWCs, sets standards for AWC programs and operations, trains AWC staff members, and assesses the consistency and quality of AWCs and their programs.

The Fort Knox AWC helps address participants' lifestyle issues and helps them develop a healthier way of living. It empowers

individuals to build, sustain and manage their own good health.

The center offers programs and services that help clients achieve lifestyle changes that might help prevent or mitigate chronic diseases like diabetes, heart disease and stroke. Those free programs include body composition analysis, metabolic analysis, exercise testing, stress management and sleep education. The center also offers classes covering topics such as healthy sleep habits, how to increase one's metabolism, introduction to biofeedback and general wellness education.

The AWC approach is holistic, incorporating body and mind as well as multiple disciplines such as fitness, nutrition, stress management, wellness, self-care, tobacco education and sleep hygiene.

The AWC serves members of the armed forces, their Family members, retirees, DOD civilians and contractors.

As the AMEDD transitions to a system of health, AWCs will provide the support for integrated wellness services as part of the medical provider's toolkit for comprehensive care. Every wellness center encounter is documented in the medical record. Medical providers give direction and oversight to the wellness center and follow patient progress through medical record documentation generated by wellness center health educators. The AWC links patient care in the patient-centered medical home model by providing health education resources. The center reduces primary care manager requirements for common health and wellness screenings such as blood pressure, body mass index and coronary artery disease risk factors.

### NUTRITION

The Nutrition Care Division of IRAHC strives to provide superior Soldier support and patient care through an expert group of nutrition professionals employing the full spectrum of nutrition science to optimize Soldier health, physical performance, and nutritional education and awareness, which shapes eating habits for a lifetime. Registered dietitians are available to provide medical nutrition therapy to active-duty Soldiers, retirees and Family members. Individual appointments are available by referral only. Once a referral is received from your primary care manager, you may schedule an appointment. Referrals are not required for classes, but since seating is limited, participants must call the Nutrition Clinic at 502-624-9713 for reservations.

### **ARMY SUBSTANCE ABUSE**

The mission of the Fort Knox Army Substance Abuse Program, known as ASAP, is to support and enhance readiness through deterrence of substance abuse and suicide and to coordinate resources for Fort Knox Soldiers, civilians, Family members and commanders to mitigate high risk behaviors. This is accomplished by providing innovative educational campaigns and prevention training and the military and civilian drug testing programs, encouraging a caring command climate, and making appropriate referrals to services that can meet identified needs.

Specific services provided by ASAP include the Employee Assistance Program, Prevention Coordination, Risk Reduction, Suicide Prevention, the Installation Biochemical Testing Program, and integration of the Commander's Ready and Resilient Council.

The Employee Assistance Program helps employees identify and resolve personal problems that may affect their job performance and well-being, assists management in addressing productivity issues, and promotes installation work, life and wellness programs.

Prevention Coordination services develop and may provide personal readiness training or specifically catered substance abuse training based on unit needs. Prevention Coordination services also conduct Prime for Life classes, coordinate the military unit prevention leader certification course, lead several substance abuse awareness campaigns throughout the year to raise awareness of the effects of alcohol and drugs and to inform of available resources, and create the annual ASAP prevention and marketing plan.

Risk Reduction services supports commanders by providing up-to-date risk data and historical trend analysis, as well as providing unit risk inventories and reintegration-unit risk inventories to Soldiers in their unit. This data allows the Risk Reduction Program to brief leaders on current high-risk behavior and recommend mitigations. The Risk Reduction Program provides training to commanders on the Commanders Risk Reduction Dashboard,

which affords a commander a real-time view of the unit's high risk areas.

Suicide Prevention services supports the Army's goal to minimize suicidal behavior by reducing the risk of suicide for Soldiers, Army civilians and Family members, stressing the importance of early identification of, and intervention with, problems that detract from personal and unit readiness.

The Installation Biochemical Testing Program supports the military and civilian drug testing programs and provides up-to-date guidance and recertification training to unit prevention leaders.

Under the direction of the Fort Knox senior commander, the Commander's Ready and Resilient Council, known as CR2C, identifies and sets priorities for installation community health promotion and well-being programs; directs the integration and synchronization of installation programs and services; and develops and implements strategies to identify gaps and overlaps in health and well-being services.

The CR2C is facilitated by the U.S. Army Garrison Directorate of Human Resources Community Readiness and Resiliency Integrator, which encourages cooperation, coordination and integration of medical, tactical and garrison assets as it relates to readiness and resiliency. The CR2C working groups (spiritual, emotional and social, physical and family readiness) identify the risk factors and community needs. The senior commander assigns responsibilities and directs action to resolve issues as they relate to readiness and resiliency.

The Fort Knox ASAP provides the Community Readiness and Resiliency Integrator (ASAP manager) and four key ASAP positions that provide support and guidance to the CR2C work groups and related CR2C processes.





hild and Youth Services includes the Child Development Center, Family Child Care, Parent and Outreach Services, the School Age Center, the school liaison officer and School Support Services, Youth Sports and Fitness (Including Instructional Programs), the Middle School and Teen Program and Kids On Site. Children and youth participants must be registered with CYS Parent Central Services. Registration is free; however, additional fees are charged for child care, sports, instructional classes, events and camps.

### **CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER**

The Child Development Center is nationally accredited through the National Association for the Education of Young Children and offers all the primary child care services for children 6 weeks through pre-kindergarten.

**Full-day Care**: This program provides developmental care for children 6 weeks to pre-kindergarten. Hours of operation are 5:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. weekdays. **Part-day Programs**: A part-day preschool for ages 3-5 years is available and operated in Bldg. 500. The three-day program is 9 a.m. to noon Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The two-day program is 9 a.m. to noon Tuesday and Thursday.

### **FAMILY CHILD CARE**

On-post, in-home care is available for children 4 weeks through fifth grade. Care is provided by an adult who is certified by the Family Child Care program. The FCC staff has certified the individual providing care and inspected and approved the home before children may be accepted for care. Extended care is available evenings and weekends. ### **OUTREACH SERVICES**

For customer convenience, Parent Central Services is opened late on Tuesdays from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The services are closed daily from 1230 - 1330. Registrations can be completed by walking in or at a scheduled appointment. Walk-ins are from 9 to 11:30 a.m. Monday through Friday, with the last registration being conducted at 11:30 a.m. Appointments can be scheduled between the hours of 22 to 4 p.m. Military Families that are moving to Fort Knox may have their children's CYS registration information exported from their previous installation to Fort Knox Parent Central Services. **Kids On Site:** Kids On Site is a CYS program that provides on-site hourly care for parents who need to attend arranged events or functions. After receiving approval from required inspections, KOS has the authority to provide child care in the same facility or building where

















parents are attending the arranged event or function. Units and special interest groups have the option to utilize KOS to provide child care on-site. ### **SCHOOL AGE CENTER**

The School Age Center is nationally accredited through the Council on Accreditation. Designed for children in kindergarten through fifth grade, the School Age Center program includes:

Full-day care 5:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. during school intercessions (SAC follows the Fort Knox and Hardin County School calendar) and school holidays.

Summer camps care 5:30 a.m. to 6 p.m.

A computer lab, homework center, intercession camps, summer camps and other special activities are an integral part of the fun-filled services provided through SAC. SAC is an affiliate member of the Boys & Girls Club of America and 4-H. Children and youth participants must be registered with CYS. ### **SCHOOL SUPPORT SERVICES**

School Support Services are designed to address the emotional needs of transitional





students and their families; promote military parents' involvement in education; develop and maintain partnerships between the installation, parents, youth, and on- and off-post schools; provide home school linkage; and provide access and referral to resources that enhance military youth education. Overarching services include: Partners in Education, Military Family Life consultants, parent education, academic enrichment programs, and staff and community training related to education. The name SKIES Unlimited combines the acronym for "Schools of Knowledge, Inspiration, Exploration and Skills" followed by "Unlimited" for the unlimited learning possibilities this initiative offers Army children and youth. SKIES Unlimited is part of CYS and encompasses instructional programs for children and youth from infancy to the teen years. SKIES Unlimited provides a four-school framework: the school of academic skills, mentoring and intervention; the school of arts, recreation and leisure; the school of life skills, citizenship and leadership; and the school of sports, fitness and health. ### YOUTH SPORTS AND FITNESS

Youth Sports and Fitness offers an extensive sports program for children age 3 through 12th grade. ### **MIDDLE SCHOOL** AND TEEN PROGRAM

Devers Middle School and Teen Center offers open recreation activities, an after-school program, special events, summer camps and field trips. Devers has a game room, a gymnasium, a homework center, a 15-station computer lab, a science room, an arts and crafts room, a high school room, an outdoor garden, an outdoor basketball area and an entertainment room. Open recreation is available for youth in sixth through 12th grades. Hours of operation are 2 to 7 p.m. Monday through Thursday. Friday 2 to 9 p.m. and Saturday 4pm to 9pm. When school is dismissed for intercession/summer or inclement weather, the facility opens at 1 pm Monday-Friday. Saturday hours during intercession/summer are 4pm to 9pm. The MST program is designed to provide youth enriching opportunities in the following five service areas: the arts; education support and career development; character and leadership development; sports, fitness and recreation; and health, wellness and life skills.

Opportunities also exist for youth to participate in one of the many 4-H and Boys & Girls Club after-school programs and clubs offered at Devers MST Center Monday through Friday. A free daily snack is provided to participants. Teens are strongly encouraged to express their programming ideas, concerns and issues during Teen Council meetings held monthly at Devers. ### **FORT KNOX COMMUNITY SCHOOLS**

More than 1,800 children of military Families attend the four schools that comprise Fort Knox Community Schools. Established in 1932, the school system provides a comprehensive program for children of military personnel stationed at Fort Knox. Fort Knox schools are a part of the Southeast District — Kentucky Community, one of two districts in the Department of Defense Education Activity Americas. DoDEA Americas is a division of the Department of Defense Education Activity, serving children of military Families around the globe. The mission of Fort Knox Community Schools is to educate, engage and empower each student to succeed in a dynamic world.

The school system consists of Van Voorhis and Kingsolver Elementary Schools with pre-K through fourth grade, Scott Intermediate School with fifth and sixth grades and Fort Knox Middle/High School with seventh through 12th grade.

AdvancED, an organization dedicated to "advancing excellence in education worldwide" accredited all the schools.

Fort Knox schools earned high ratings from DoDEA parents and students. Overall, 74 percent of parents and legal guardians and 72 percent of students are satisfied with DoDEA schools, according to a customer satisfaction survey. Parents and students are almost equally satisfied with their specific school, with 75 percent of parents and legal guardians and 72 percent of students rating their school with an

A or B. Nationally, 62 percent of parents rated their child's school with an A or B.

Fort Knox school personnel believe parent involvement increases the chances for academic success. In addition to a scheduled parent-teacher conference and open houses, parent-teacher conferences also may occur throughout the school year at the request of a parent or school

staff member. Communication between parents and teachers is highly encouraged.

Students in Fort Knox schools score significantly higher than the national norm on the National Assessment of Educational Progress, a standardized test in which approximately 45 states participate. Fort Knox students within the DoDEA system rank eighth overall, with minority students in the system ranking first overall.

Reports on all Fort Knox schools are available via the DoDEA website at www.dodea.edu/datacenter/research/reportCard.cfm.

The schools operate on a calendar with four quarters. Summer break is approximately nine weeks.

The system boasts per-pupil spending that far exceeds both the surrounding community and the U.S. average. Pupil-teacher ratios are approximately 18-to-1 for kindergarten through third grade, 23-to-1 for fourth and fifth grade, and approximately 20-to-1 for sixth through 12th grade. More than 90 percent of the teachers hold a master's degree.

Full-time specialists in art, education technology, media information and physical education are available. Guidance counselors and nursing services are available at all schools.

Fort Knox schools participate in the Interstate Compact on Education Opportunity for Military Children, which creates uniform standards of practice in various areas among participating states and helps make transfers for military children from school to school smoother.

Members of the advisory board of education are elected by and represent the parents and guardians of students enrolled in the Fort Knox schools. The five-member board advises the superintendent on matters ranging from curricular to extracurricular and from policies to programs. Monthly board meetings are open to the community, and public participation is encouraged.















#### **SPECIAL EDUCATION**

The schools provide an appropriate education for all students. Some students have special needs that cannot be met exclusively through the regular educational curriculum. All students ages 3 to 21 with special education needs are identified, evaluated and served through the school system. Related services such as speech, language, occupation therapy, physical therapy and special transportation are made available to special education students who require such assistance.


### **TECHNOLOGY**

All schools are fully supported by hardware, software and technology staff at both the district and school levels. Each school has a high-speed network that enables computer users to access programs and files on servers and to share devices, such as laser printers.

Every school has a computer lab, and the larger schools have two labs. The desktop computer-to-student ratio is 1-to-2. School computers have internet access. Every school has a digital network that brings Kentucky Educational Television programs into the classroom. All schools have closed-circuit and cable television programs. For instruction, every school has numerous TVs, VCRs, DVD players, Smart Boards and whiteboards,



and projectors. Wi-Fi is available to educate, engage and empower each student to succeed in a dynamic world. Media centers allow students to check out electronically the textbooks or any other books they need.



#### ATHI FTICS

Boys and girls at the high school level may participate in a full program of athletics: baseball, basketball, cheerleading, cross-country, football, golf, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track, volleyball and wrestling. Bowling is set to be added as a sport in the 2019-2020 school year. Seventh- and eighth-grade students may participate in the high school athletic programs of baseball, softball, girls' basketball, cross-country, freshman football, golf, JV soccer, swimming, tennis, track, volleyball and wrestling. Middle school students also have interscholastic athletic opportunities in basketball and cheerleading.

### **HIGH SCHOOL AND AFTER**

Fort Knox High School offers a comprehensive program through a wide variety of courses, including Advanced Placement, Career Technical Education, foreign languages (French and Spanish), fine arts and career practicum. Dual credit opportunities are available for eligible students. The high school, in partnership with Western Kentucky University and the Elizabethtown Community and Technical College, offers college-level courses for a discounted rate via online learning.

Approximately 25 percent of Fort Knox's high school students take JROTC — an award-winning program that has been named an honor unit with distinction for decades.

Fort Knox High School boasts a 98 percent graduation rate. Approximately 60 percent of graduates are bound for a four-year college; 20 percent are enrolling in a two-year college,















trade or technical school; less than 5 percent are going straight into the workforce; and 20 percent are joining the military. In school year 2017-2018, 17 of the 78 seniors received offers of scholarships totaling just under \$2.5 million. Seven seniors benefited from their parents' GI Bill for financial support totaling more than \$300.000.

### ARMY CONTINUING EDUCATION SYSTEM

The Army Continuing Education System is composed of the Army Education Center with five partner schools offering a variety of educational programs and services for Soldiers, Family members, employees and local civilians. The central phone number for ACES is 502-624-2427. ACES includes three facilities: the Army Education Center in Building 65 and

annex buildings 1174 and 1055. You may also like their Facebook page at Fort Knox Education Center.

### **PROGRAMS AND SERVICES**

Education Counseling Services are available to everyone and include academic planning and information on college course and program requirements, online degree options, financial aid, scholarships, the GI Bill and college programs throughout the country.

The Army Tuition Assistance (TA) program pays 100 percent of a Soldier's tuition cost up to the annual established DOD caps. Schools must be regionally or nationally accredited. TA pays for one associate degree, one bachelor's degree, one master's degree, and potentially multiple academic certificates. Soldiers must apply for benefits in advance through the GoArmyEd portal at www.goarmyed.com.

The Army Credentialing Assistance (CA) program allows Soldiers to earn credentials such as certifications and licenses. CA pays 100 percent of the training, fees, book, and exams up to the annual cap of \$4,000. Credentials must be listed on the Army COOL website to be eligible,

and training providers must be approved by the Army to be eligible.

The five ACES Partner Schools include Elizabethtown Community and Technical College, Western Kentucky University, University of Louisville, Sullivan University and Central Texas College. ACES maintains offices and staff at the Army Education Center in Building 65. College participation is open to everyone.

The Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support (DANTES) testing program provides many college credit exams free to Soldiers. Tests are administered through a National Testing Center at the University of Louisville office, and tests scores are available immediately. Also available are Pearson VUE certification exams. For more information, call 502-942-8060.

The Army Education Center manages the **Army Personnel Testing** program, offering AFCT, DLPT, DLAB and other military tests. The **Army Learning Center**, in Building 65, is an 18-classroom facility used for military and civilian training in the daytime and college classes at night. The Basic Skills Education Program (BSEP) assists Soldiers to raise GT score and college readiness.





### **AMERICAN RED CROSS**

The Fort Knox American Red Cross office is at 1131 Fifth Ave. It offers 24-hour communications to obtain health and welfare reports and the verification needed for emergency leave or extension purposes. New arrivals should let their Families know that the quickest and easiest way to reach them during an emergency is to contact the Fort Knox Red Cross office during duty hours at 502-624-2163 or after-duty hours at 877-272-7337. Families also need to know the military member's Social Security number, unit address and unit location.

The American Red Cross has a long history of supporting military members, veterans and their Families. Now, the Red Cross has launched a new, free Hero Care App to provide instant access to vital Red Cross services anywhere in the world. The app will guide you to valuable resources and services that can help alleviate stress and provide important information. Some of the important features of the app allow users to:

Request Red Cross emergency services, including emergency messages or assistance with emergency travel or emergency financial aid.

Access nonemergency Red Cross behavioral health assistance, including financial assistance and free local workshops for military kids and spouses.

Access local resources and information provided by trusted community partners like the Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS), Blue Star Families, Military Child Education Coalition, United Way, Goodwill, Easter Seals and others.

Locate information on key government resources such as Military One-Source, VA benefits and services, Department of Labor VETS, the VAQ Caregiver Support Program and SAMSHA community health support services.

Users can also connect with other Red Cross apps, including the emergency, first aid and blood apps. Information in the app is available in both

English and Spanish and a user can even use the app to share their own Red Cross stories and photos.

Hero Care App is free of charge and available for both iOS and Android devices. To download to your smartphone or tablet, search for "American Red Cross" in your app store, text GETHEROCARE to 90999 to receive a link to download the app or go to www.redcross.org/get-help/prepare-for-emergencies/mobile-apps.

Help can also be provided during times of financial distress and unexpected emergencies. Each case is judged individually, based on need. If the Red Cross is unable to help financially, assistance may include referrals to other agencies able to help solve the problem. The Red Cross also has a food pantry and a loan closet for emergencies.

The Red Cross has new programs and Resiliency workshops that help support the Soldier and military Families during and after training exercises /deployments. The pet therapy program supports Soldiers that have been diagnosed with PTSD or TBI. This program provides dogs and their masters with the Canine Good Citizen certification. Once the training is complete, the dogs are then selected for specific programs like Puppy Tales, a reading program that helps children to read. The Reconnection Workshop, Psychological First Aid and Coping with Deployments are workshops that focus on individuals and small groups. The workshops are designed to help Family members reconnect with their Soldier and for service members to be able to reintegrate with their Families and communities successfully.

A variety of health and safety programs are offered to promote individual well-being, life-saving and preventing or reducing human suffering. Skills taught during community first aid and CPR classes enable students to prepare for and cope with accidents. Young people, ages 11 to 15, can learn to care for siblings and other children by enrolling in baby-sitting courses. To enroll in classes call: 1-800-REDCROSS.

Volunteers and instructors who give their time and talents to support the needs of the community make the Red Cross programs and services possible. Requests for military funeral honors must be scheduled within 48 hours of the honors being rendered. All requests will consist of a DD Form 214, Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty before the scheduling process begins.

### **COMMISSARY**

The Fort Knox Commissary is at 933 Gold Vault Road, Building 121, which is adjacent to the exchange. The commissary includes a large deli, a bakery, a sushi bar and "private label" items. Special orders are readily accepted in grocery, meat and produce departments (allow 48-hour advance notice).

Store hours are 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday and 9 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday. The commissary also offers early-bird shopping if you are shopping for 40 items or fewer from 10 to 11 a.m. Sunday and 7 to 9 a.m. Tuesday through Saturday. The commissary is closed Monday; however, the commissary is open the Monday before Thanksgiving and Christmas each year.

### **CREDIT UNION**

Abound Credit Union is a not-for-profit financial cooperative owned by its members. Membership is open to active-duty military personnel, their Family members and federal employees who are permanently assigned to Fort Knox. Membership is also open to any employee of more than 500 select employer groups or if you live, work or worship in Boyle, Breckinridge, Grayson, Hart, La-Rue, Meade, Nelson or Taylor counties in Kentucky.

There are three branch locations and eight additional ATMs on post. Abound is the only financial institution with branches on and off post with 10 other locations in the surrounding communities. Abound Credit Union's on-post facilities are the Pershing Branch, the Knox Branch, near the commissary, and the newest branch located within Patriot Commons.

### **EMPLOYMENT INFORMATION**

Fort Knox employs civilians in federal nonappropriated and appropriated fund positions. All vacancies are online at www.usajobs.gov. Individuals interested in applying for federal vacancies can receive more information on how to apply using USA Jobs' resource center.

Applicants with questions regarding the application procedures may go to Building 5101, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

### **EXCHANGE**

The exchange, in Building 127, is a modern shopping facility that includes a large variety of retail goods including computers,



electronics, toys, outdoor living items, jewelry, clothing and much more. A major renovation was completed in this facility in May 2004, which resulted in an expanded stock assortment and more shopping convenience for the customers. You will find the mall filled with a barbershop, a beauty salon, a furniture store, a food court and concession operations. The hours of operation for the exchange are 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday. Hours are expanded for holiday and summer sales events.

The exchange also offers a furniture store in Building 126, open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Sunday.

The exchange mall offers many places to eat, including Qdoba, Anthony's Pizza, Subway, Charley's Grilled Subs and Popeye's. Other places to satisfy those taste buds on post include Burger King on Eisenhower Avenue; Taco Bell, Dunkin' and Baskin Robbins in the mini-mall on Eisenhower Avenue; Pizza Hut at the Express on Chaffee Avenue; Starbucks in the Dietz Community Center off Estrada Avenue; and Subway in the Wilson Express on Wilson Road.

The Waybur Theater, on Spearhead Division Avenue, shows first-run movies in addition to functioning as an auditorium for the various mission partners. In addition, the exchange service offers two gas stations: Wilson Express on Wilson Road, which is open 5 a.m. to 11 p.m. Monday through Friday and 6 a.m. to 11 p.m. Saturday and Sunday; and the Chaffee Avenue Express gas station in the Van Voorhis housing area, which is open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Sunday. The mini-mall Express on Eisenhower Avenue is open 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

The Military Clothing Sales store is adjacent to the exchange. It is open 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday.

The Class VI Store, behind the exchange and commissary complex, is open 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Saturday and noon to 5 p.m. Sunday.

Current movie schedules, job opportunities and upcoming events can be viewed 24/7 at www.shopmyexchange.com. This website also offers online shopping through the AAFES catalog, as well as various other vendors through Centric Mall, which can be accessed through the AAFES website.

### **LEGAL ASSISTANCE**

The military and civilian attorneys and support staff who comprise the Office of the Staff Judge Advocate provide a wide range of legal services to Soldiers on active duty, Family members and retirees drawing military retired pay. To verify their eligibility for services, clients must present a valid identification card. The office is in Pike Hall, Building 1310. The building is ADA-compliant with a ramp and elevator at the rear of the building.

The Fort Knox Legal Assistance Office is open 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Wednesday and Friday. So that Soldiers can participate in Sergeant's Time training, hours on Thursday are 1 to 4 p.m. Appointments to consult with an attorney can be made either in person at the office or by calling 502-624-2771. The fax number is 502-624-2772.

Powers of attorney and notary public services are available on a walk-in basis.

For income taxes, the Legal Assistance Office operates a separate tax center, which is at Pike Hall during tax season, from mid-January through April 17. The tax center provides free electronic filing for federal and state income tax returns.

Individuals requiring information or assistance concerning property damage or loss of household goods and hold baggage and other

















types of claims will be seen 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, except Thursday, when training delays opening until 1 p.m.

Clients should submit claims in a timely manner — within two years of the date of the loss — to avoid unnecessary delays and possible denial of the claims based on failure to file within the appropriate time-frame. No appointment is necessary for claims assistance. You may send claims to usarmy. knox.tradoc.mbx.sja-claims@mail.mil or call 502-624-0044.

Traffic tickets not requiring a court appearance may be paid by mailing a check or money order to P.O. Box 71363, Philadelphia, PA 19176 or online at www.cvb. uscourts.gov. Payments will not be accepted at the clerk's office in Pike Hall. Any offenses occurring on Fort Knox are tried in U.S. District Court in Building 1310, Pike Hall.

### **PUBLIC AFFAIRS OFFICE**

The Public Affairs Office serves Fort Knox and the surrounding communities as the primary source of information about the activities at Fort Knox through command information, community relations and media relations channels.

Fort Knox News, available online at www. army.mil/knox, features articles about events and people in the Fort Knox community as well as important information beneficial to those who live, work and play on post. To contact the Fort Knox News editor with questions or story ideas, call 502-624-1095. PAO also manages the installation's Facebook, Twitter, and Flickr pages (addresses located on the cover of this guidebook).

The community relations office works to strengthen the connection between Fort Knox and the local community. The office processes requests from organized groups to visit the installation. It also coordinates all requests for speakers, for displays of military equipment and for Soldier participation in community events. Provide at least 12 weeks notice for visit requests by calling 502-624-0151/4985.

The media relations office works with newspaper, radio, television, internet and magazine reporters as well as book authors to provide accurate and timely information to various audiences about the installation, its people and activities. Production companies wishing to film on Fort Knox should contact the media relations office at 502-624-3051 for coordination.

### **RELIGIOUS SUPPORT OFFICE**

The chaplains, chaplain assistants and director of religious education comprise the installation ministry team at Fort Knox and offer a varied and comprehensive religious program to assist Soldiers, DOD civilians and Family members in their spiritual growth.

Chapel services offer occasions for worship and sacramental ministries for many faith traditions that include collective Protestant traditional, contemporary, gospel, Roman Catholic and Samoan services.

Specialized chaplain family life ministry programs, training and counseling are offered through the family life chaplain in addition to a wide range of training options for couples and Families. Call 502-624-5225 for an appointment.

The Religious Education Center sponsors a complete program, including Protestant Sunday school for children and adults, religious education for Catholics, a Protestant youth group for middle and senior high school students, and various Bible studies. The center maintains a resource library, which contains several thousand volumes of books, DVDs, audio cassettes and other materials.

Other auxiliary programs include Protestant Women of the Chapel, Catholic Women of the Chapel and the Navigators.

Times for worship services and religious education are listed in the brochure titled "Religious Support Activities" included in the Army Community Service welcome packet. Call the office of the senior chaplain at 502-624-5255 for more information.

### SOLDIER FOR LIFE-TRANSITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The mission of the Soldier for Life - Transition Assistance Program is to assist Military Service Members (MSM), Veterans and their Family members and Department of Army Civilians, with the employment search process by providing the highest quality guidance, training, resources and support during their career transition. SFL-TAP provides VOW and CRS curriculum to all eligible MSM, and their Families during their military transition phase. Soldiers who start early, 24 months for retirees and 18 months for programmed losses, have shown a higher success rate in securing a new career or fulfilling their education requirements. All Soldiers with more than 180 days of continuous service are eligible and should contact the center at their earliest opportunity or notice of separation.

The SFL-TAP center is in Building 1378 (Graham Hall), Room 115, 70 Pershing Drive. Operating hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays. The center is closed on all federal holidays, but is open on training holidays. You can contact the SFL-TAP center by calling 502-624-5222 or emailing usarmy.knox. imcom.mbx.knox-sfl-tap@mail.mil.

The SFL-TAP process must be initiated early. Allowing Soldiers to start early provides units and the Soldier the flexibility needed to prevent a conflict between mission requirements and SFL-TAP services. It also ensures compliance with timeliness standards and promotes the program's effectiveness. As they prepare for transition, Soldiers need an average of 40 hours, spread over a 12-24 month period of time, to take advantage of SFL-TAP services. ### TRANSITION SERVICES BRANCH

The Transition Services Branch is in White Hall, Building 1384. Operating hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday. The facility is closed weekends, all federal holidays and garrison training holidays. You can contact the Retirement Services Office by calling 502-624-1765/7236/6419/4641/4315/3114 or by emailing usarmy.knox.rso@mail.mil. The Transition Services Branch provides transition support for all active and reserve















component Soldiers separating from the military. The services provided are designed to assist Soldiers and their Families in making the transition to retirement or separation from the military as effortless as possible and to inform them of their benefits and privileges after retirement or separation from the military. The Transition Services Branch coordinates, conducts and facilitates detailed separation, retirement and survivor benefit plan briefings. These offices provide information related to preretirement, such as retirement application processing, retirement orders, DD Form 214 processing and final out-processing procedures. Assistance is provided to survivors of retired Soldiers and Soldiers who die on active duty regarding their options, entitlements and the proper processing of the application. Information and assistance is also provided to retirees, Soldiers, spouses and former spouses regarding the Uniformed Services Former Spouse Protection Act.

The Retirement Services Office assists retirees and their Family members with:

- Defense Finance and Accounting System Cleveland issues and concerns, such as changing allotments.
- · Beneficiary information, bank information, tax filing and withholding status.
- Reissuing 1099-R for tax filing purposes and requesting copies of the retired account statement.
- · Understanding and applying for combatrelated special compensation and concurrent retirement disability payments.
- Obtaining copies of DD Form 214.
- Eligibility requirements to receive Soldier for Life — Transition Assistance Program

Pre-separation briefings are conducted at lp.m. on the third Wednesday of each month in Building 1384, White Hall, Room Bl. If Wednesday is a holiday, the briefing will be given the following business day. This briefing is mandatory for all Regular Army enlisted Soldiers reaching their expiration term of service.

Pre-retirement briefings are conducted at 1 p.m. the second Tuesday of every month in Building 1384, White Hall, Room B1.

Fort Knox has a Retiree Council that consists of 13 voting members, a chair and co-chair. Their mission is to represent the retired military community of all services and grades residing in Kentucky, Illinois, Ohio, West Virginia and Indiana.

Retiree Appreciation Day is conducted every year to keep retired Soldiers and their Families updated on changes in their retirement benefits and privileges and to foster a

good relationship between the retired and the active-duty community.

The Veterans Administration Office assists the Retirement Services Office by submitting applications for Pre-Discharge claims (BDD) and Vocation Rehabilitation for all branches of the military. Veterans Affairs is located in Building 1379 and can be reached at 502-287-5430.

### SAFETY PROGRAMS

The Fort Knox Safety Office implements and coordinates a comprehensive composite risk management program for all military members, Family members, civilian employees and visitors on post. Services offered include, but are not limited to, the following.

### **ACCIDENT AVOIDANCE CLASS**

All personnel required to drive Army motor vehicles, including General Services Administration vehicles, must complete an accident avoidance class every four years. Personnel who drive Army-owned or -leased buses, military police vehicles, ambulances, fire trucks, fueling vehicles, vehicles carrying hazardous cargo, crash and rescue vehicles or other emergency vehicles must attend an emergency vehicle training program prior to assuming operator duties and every two years thereafter. All other military personnel, Family members and civilian personnel are encouraged to complete the Accident Avoidance Class.

### **COLLATERAL DUTY SAFETY OFFICER NCO COURSE**

All unit safety officers and NCOs are required to attend the Collateral Duty Safety Officer NCO Course.

### HAZARD COMMUNICATION PROGRAM

The Hazard Communication Standard requires the Army to provide employees with information on the hazardous chemicals used in their workplace, including what the risks are, how to protect themselves when using these chemicals and the responsibility to use that knowledge to work safely with hazardous substances. Call to arrange training classes.

### **MOTORCYCLE SAFETY COURSE**

Military motorcycle operators must attend the Army Motorcycle Safety Course before operating a motorcycle on post. This requirement applies to military personnel riding off post as well.

### RESPIRATORY PROTECTION PROGRAM

The Respiratory Program is initiated when no feasible engineering controls would eliminate exposure to the job hazard (i.e., ventilation, isolation of processes or the purchase of less toxic substances). The Fort Knox Safety Office currently provides the required training and fit testing. Call to schedule training.

### **U.S. POSTAL SERVICE**

There are two post offices at Fort Knox. The main post office is at 120 N. Knox St. Business hours are 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. to noon Saturday. The phone number is 502-942-1244. The lobby is open 24/7 for P.O. box customers. A second post office is in the dining facility adjacent to the Lt. Gen. Timothy J. Maude Complex at 1556 Spearhead Division Ave. The hours of operation are 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The phone number is 502-942-4126.

Both facilities offer full mailing services, P.O. box rentals and passport acceptance. They also package products to accommodate customers' needs.

he Fort Knox Garrison provides the greater Fort Knox community with essential services, support and facilities necessary for quality of life and organizational missions.

### **DIRECTORATE OF EMERGENCY SERVICES**

The Directorate of Emergency Services supports those who support our nation by delivering first-class law enforcement, fire protection, physical security and access control operations for the Soldiers, Families and civilians of Fort Knox through education, prevention and efficient emergency service response.

The directorate consists of the Fire Division, Law Enforcement Division, Physical Security Section and 911 Communications Center. The 911 Center provides 24-hour assistance and central dispatching for all post emergency services — police, fire, ambulance and rescue.

The Fire Division's team is committed to providing exceptional fire protection to Fort Knox. It is responsible for providing fire and emergency protection for more than 108,000 acres, including the Bullion Depository. The fire department averages more than 1,200 runs per year. The division also provides a very successful fire prevention program.

The Law Enforcement Division's mission is to "assist, protect and defend." Soldiers and civilians provide law enforcement patrolling, traffic accident investigations, police investigations, fish and wildlife enforcement, police records, vehicle and weapons registration, and civil liaison services.

The division is supported by the 34th Military Police Detachment, which deploys military police assets throughout the world to conduct military police law and order operations, while simultaneously providing law enforcement and community assistance to the Soldiers, Families and visitors of Fort Knox.

The Physical Security Division's mission is to assist the installation commander and director of Emergency Services in all aspects of physical security for military members and their Families, federal employees, officials and visitors in a professional and cost-effective manner by deploying a highly trained and multidisciplined guard force and physical security inspection team.

### **DIRECTORATE OF HUMAN RESOURCES**

The mission of the Directorate of Human Resources is to provide Fort Knox with human resource support for military personnel as well as continuing education, substance abuse prevention, administrative services and workforce development. It ensures the personnel readiness of assigned units, takes care of Soldier's personal needs, and trains and develops the garrison civilian workforce.

### **DIRECTORATE OF PUBLIC WORKS**

The Directorate of Public Works administers all engineering activities for the installation, including environmental management, real property maintenance and management, housing management and municipal services. Specific activities included within DPW are maintenance of real property facilities, either through contracts or in-house workforce; operation and maintenance of utility plants and distribution systems; engineering and services; custodial services; nonhousing refuse pickup; grounds maintenance; energy management; environmental management; fish and wildlife management; master planning; space utilization; housing services to include the Residential Communities Initiative and the First Sergeants Barracks Program; and oversight of the installation major construction program.















### DIRECTORATE OF PLANS, TRAINING, MOBILIZATION AND SECURITY

The Directorate of Plans, Training, Mobilization and Security's responsibilities include managing contingency and mobilization planning operations, scheduling resident and nonresident training, managing the range complex, training areas and range modernization. It also provides aviation support, training aids and audiovisual support as well as coordinating force integration activities, conducting installation-level ceremonies and operating the installation operations center.

### **EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY OFFICE**

The Equal Employment Opportunity Office administers the discrimination complaint process for Department of the Army civilian employees at Fort Knox, along with the Affirmative Employment Program Plan, the Disability Program and Special Emphasis Program committees and is responsible for

educating the workforce in all aspects of equal employment opportunity.

### PLANS, ANALYSIS AND INTEGRATION OFFICE

The Plans, Analysis and Integration Office is responsible for assessing and integrating Army transformation initiatives to include the analysis of strategic-level data used by senior leadership in setting operational priorities and developing policy at the garrison, installation and Department of the Army levels. PAIO services and programs include stationing management, customer service excellence, strategic planning, integrating operations, organizational performance measurement, change management and organizational improvement.

### **RESOURCE MANAGEMENT OFFICE**

The Resource Management Office is composed of two sections: the Manpower and Agreements Division and the Budget Division.

The Manpower and Agreements Division maintains interservice support agreements, memorandums of agreement and memorandums of understanding, and the internal compliance program and management control program within the garrison. This section also updates the table of distribution and allowances for manpower and equipment for the garrison.

The annual Installation Management Command budget guidance is published each fall by the Budget Division. Detailed budget guidance is sent to garrison leadership upon receipt. In accordance with IMCOM guidance, funding supports: sustaining the war and all-volunteer force, synchronizing global positioning and restationing, stationing of modular forces, and adapting programs and services to support an expeditionary Army and the future Army community.





n all, Fort Knox has more than 30 units, commands and organizations and employs more than 20,000 Soldiers and civilian employees.

### **FIRST ARMY DIVISION EAST**

The First Army Division East was activated March 7, 2007, at Fort George G. Meade, Maryland, as a multicomponent-sourced training organization tasked with providing readiness oversight, training and mobilization operations to U.S. Army Reserve and Army National Guard units from across 36 states, territories and the District of Columbia. Comprised of four combined arms training brigades and one multifunctional training brigade, First Army Division East — as part of First Army — provides the trained and ready reserve component forces necessary to meet the needs of combatant commanders around the world.

The division and its subordinate units are uniquely staffed by active and reserve component Soldiers certified as observer coach/trainers, or OC/Ts, who assist, advise, coach, mentor, teach and provide collective training support to meet Department of the Army mandated training requirements. Training support is provided by all OC/Ts to all types of units including infantry, aviation, artillery, engineering, ordnance, logistics and supply, military police, medical support, military intelligence and air defense.

By way of the Army's Total Force Policy, the Associated Unit Program and the First Army Partnership Program, Division East's mission as a force multiplier is met by the sustained partnerships its subordinate units cultivate with reserve component partners at the brigade, battalion and company levels.

### **1ST THEATER SUSTAINMENT COMMAND**

The 1st Theater Sustainment Command provides mission command and operational-level sustainment support to Army, joint, interagency

and multinational forces; sets the theater; and conducts theater security cooperation within the U.S. Central Command area of responsibility in order to enable unified land operations in support of combatant commander directives.

### 4TH CAVALRY BRIGADE. FIRST ARMY DIVISION EAST

The 4th Cavalry Brigade, First Army Division East is a multicomponent training brigade. The brigade consists of the headquarters and two active component battalions at Fort Knox and two reserve component battalions at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, and Richmond, Virginia. The brigade is made up of Soldiers from the active component, the Army Reserve, the Army National Guard and the Operation Warrior Trainer Program, from redeploying Army National Guard and Army Reserve units. The four subordinate battalions include a cavalry squadron, an artillery battalion and two combat service support battalions. Almost all military occupation specialties are represented in the brigade.

Currently, the brigade trains provincial reconstruction teams deploying to Afghanistan. This mission is tremendously important for our nation. These teams are like no other unit in the DOD. They are led by an active-duty Navy or Air Force officer with an active Army sergeant major as the senior enlisted adviser. The staffs of the provincial reconstruction teams are made up of Navy or Air Force officers and NCOs and a U.S. Army Reserve civil affairs detachment. Each team also has a National Guard Security Force platoon attached to it to provide the capability to move around their province with organic security. The brigade conducts this mission while deployed to Camp Atterbury, Indiana, for four months at a time.

The Saber Brigade conducts numerous and diverse missions as a part of the provincial reconstruction teams trainings. The mission includes organizing and training on individual training tasks, lanes training,















collective unit lanes training, and observer and trainer mentor and unit mobilization assistor duties. Key individual training tasks include training and administering the warrior training tasks and theater-specific individual readiness training to ensure individual Soldier proficiency.

### 19TH ENGINEER BATTALION

The 19th Engineer Battalion was reactivated Oct. 16, 2005, at Fort Knox as a newly organized modular engineer battalion capable of commanding any type of engineer organization from Sappers to construction effects. The battalion has deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom (2006-2007) and Operation Enduring Freedom (2009-2010 and 2013-2014).

Currently, the 19th Engineer Battalion consists of a headquarters and headquarters company and an organic forward support company. Also assigned to the 19th Engineer Battalion at Fort Knox are the 15th Engineer Company (Horizontal), 42nd Engineer Company (Clearance), 502nd Multi Role Bridge Company and the 541st Engineer Company (Sapper).

The mission of the 19th Engineer Battalion is to increase the combat effectiveness of the support brigades or engineer brigades at corps and division level through mobility, countermobility, survivability and general engineering tasks. Additionally, the 19th performs combat missions in the role of infantry, when required, and participates in joint military operations.



With more than 1,000 Soldiers, the 19th Engineer Battalion is the largest engineer battalion in the Army.

### **HUMAN RESOURCES COMMAND**

The U.S. Army Human Resources Command executes distribution, strategic talent



management, personnel programs and services Army-wide in order to enable the Army to deploy, fight and win the Nation's wars. HRC manages Soldier schooling, promotions, awards, records, transfers, appointments, benefits, retirement — one agency managing Soldiers' entire careers from the day they enter basic training until retirement and beyond. HRC operates the Army Casualty and Mortuary Affairs Operations Division. HRC is a Direct Reporting Unit (DRU) to the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel and is the Army Gl's functional proponent for military personnel management and personnel systems, except for the judge advocate general and the chaplain branches. HRC also supports the director, Army National Guard and the chief, Army Reserve in their management of the Selected Reserve. The HRC commander is the commander of the Individual Ready Reserve, the Standby Reserve and the Retired Reserve. The Adjutant General of the U.S. Army also provides oversight of the U.S. Army Physical Disability Agency and the Military Postal Service Agency based in Arlington, Virginia.

### **RECRUITING COMMAND**

The U.S. Army Recruiting Command's mission is to recruit America's best volunteers to enable the Army to win in a complex world.

















USAREC does this by training and developing a disciplined and effective recruiting force and developing the capabilities and obtaining the necessary resources to sustain and enhance recruiting accomplishment, "providing the strength" for America's Army.

The command is responsible for manning both the U.S. Army and Army Reserve, ensuring security and readiness for our nation. Recruiting operations are conducted throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa and U.S. facilities in Europe and Asia. The USAREC headquarters provides command, control and staff support to the recruiting force.

The officers, enlisted members and civilian employees of USAREC headquarters work in diverse areas such as personnel, administration, resource management and safety. Many work in specialized fields, such as market research and analysis, advertising and public affairs, and recruiting operations. The command also has its own inspector general, staff judge advocate and headquarters company.

The command's subordinate structure consists of five recruiting brigades and the Medical Recruiting Brigade. The Medical Recruiting Brigade and the 3rd Recruiting Brigade are also based at Fort Knox. Each recruiting brigade commands and controls up to eight recruiting battalions, giving USAREC 38 recruiting battalions, five medical recruiting battalions and the Special Operations Recruiting Battalion based at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. Each recruiting battalion in turn commands the recruiting companies in its area, which provide support to the more than 1,300 recruiting stations in communities across America.

Six recruiting companies have responsibility for recruiting in Kentucky, operating 16

recruiting centers staffed with more than 100 regular Army and Army Reserve recruiters.

### U.S. ARMY RECRUITING AND RETENTION COLLEGE

The Army's Recruiting and Retention College is a multicomponent training directorate of the U.S. Army Recruiting Command. The school consists of the Retention Department, the Recruiting Department, Proponent (79), and Training and Doctrine responsible for teaching and training nine 79 career management field courses at Fort Knox. The directorate is made up of Soldiers from the active component, the Army Reserve, the Army National Guard, GS special support staff and the office of the command psychologist.

The mission is to "train and educate military and civilian leaders and develop complementary concepts, doctrine, organization, materiel and training across the spectrum of recruiting and retention to support requirements for America's force of decisive action."


Its vision is "well-trained, disciplined and values-based professionals collectively known as the Army's premiere training and learning institution that provides a 21st century, adaptive, collaborative and multi-echeloned education experience, and takes care of its personnel and Family members."

### **CADET COMMAND**

The U.S. Army Cadet Command's mission is to partner with universities to recruit, educate, develop, and inspire senior ROTC cadets in order to commission officers of character for the Total Army; and partner with high schools to conduct JROTC to develop citizens of character for a lifetime of commitment and service to our nation. In October 2010, Fort Knox became home to the U.S. Army Cadet Command headquarters, which oversees the U.S. Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps.

Army ROTC is available at about 1,000 colleges and universities, including 274 host programs, nationwide. There are Army ROTC programs in every state in the nation as well as in the District of Columbia, Guam and Puerto Rico. These programs are organized into eight brigades geographically dispersed throughout the nation. Total enrollment is more than 30,000. Army ROTC is responsible for producing about 70 percent of all officers entering the Army.





ROTC began when President Woodrow Wilson signed the National Defense Act of 1916. Since its inception, Army ROTC has commissioned more than 600,000 second lieutenants who join the active Army, the Army National Guard and the U.S. Army Reserve. It is the largest commissioning source in the American military. In fact, nearly half of the current active-duty Army general officers were commissioned through ROTC.


In addition to the senior ROTC programs offered at colleges and universities nationwide, USACC manages more than 1,700 Army Junior ROTC programs at high schools, with 316,000 cadets enrolled. Participation in these programs is voluntary, and their focus is to instill solid leadership and citizenship values in high school students. Curriculum and activities are centered on time management, study skills, financial stewardship and character development.

JROTC has an enormously positive effect on our youth, helping young people from across the socio-economic spectrum. Cadets graduate from high school at a higher rate, have higher GPAs and get in trouble less frequently than their classmates. Although JROTC is a citizenship program, not a recruiting tool, JROTC graduates do enter the armed forces at a much higher rate than their peers.

### **V CORPS**

V ("Fifth") Corps is comprised of about 660 Soldiers. Led by a 3-star general officer, V Corps was reactivated in 2020 to fulfill requirements of the National Defense Strategy. Its primary mission is to conduct operational planning, mission command, and oversight of rotational and other assigned forces. The command also provides additional capability in support of U.S. interests, allies and partners operating in Europe.

V Corps is located primarily in the Lt. Gen. Timothy J. Maude Complex, an 883, 180-square-foot facility built in 2010 that also houses U.S. Army Human Resources Command.



### U.S. ARMY MARKETING AND ENGAGEMENT BRIGADE

The U.S. Army Marketing and Engagement Brigade influences the American people to join the Army by enhancing recruiting and marketing operations through direct engagements and demonstrating elite Army skills and exhibits in order to achieve the Army's recruiting mission. On order, the brigade provides unique support to the operational and generating force. The brigade supports Army recruiters and ROTC programs at universities and in cities across the U.S. by generating high-quality leads, positive impressions and awareness of what it means to be a Soldier. In addition, the brigade enhances Army warfighting efforts through specialized training and research and development. The brigade serves as the higher headquarters for the U.S. Army Accessions Mission Support Battalion at Fort Knox, the U.S. Army Parachute Team, also known as the Golden Knights, at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, and the U.S. Army Marksmanship Unit at Fort Benning, Georgia. The USAMEB is assigned to TRADOC

and operationally aligned under U.S. Army Recruiting Command.

### LOGISTICS READINESS CENTER — KNOX

The Army Sustainment Command Logistics Readiness Center — Knox, also serving as the garrison S4, is the sole logistics activity supporting the garrison commander on all logistics matters for installation operations and supported customers and activities on post.

The center oversees mobilization, deployment, reconstitution and contingency planning in support of Army Force Generation to meet the training, sustainment and survivability needs of the Army.

All areas of logistics are supported, including supply planning and operations, ammunition supply, hazardous material, asset management, food service, central issue facility, transportation of personnel and equipment, fleet management, equipment and material maintenance, as well as representing the command for logistics-related actions, services and contracts.



### **ARMY RESERVE AVIATION COMMAND**

The Army Reserve Aviation Command, an Army Reserve unit at Fort Knox, provides air traffic services, airfield management, aeromedical evacuation, combat aviation brigade reinforcement, theater aviation support, and coordination of aviation staging and onward movement in order to support corps, Army or joint operations.

ARAC has two missions: It functions as both a warfighting headquarters and as a functional command. As a warfighting command, ARAC provides command, control, staff planning and supervision for two aviation brigades and one air traffic service brigade. As a functional command, ARAC provides command and control for all Army Reserve aviation.

### 83RD U.S. ARMY RESERVE READINESS TRAINING CENTER

The 83rd U.S. Army Reserve Readiness Training Center is the Army Reserve's primary schoolhouse for full-time support personnel and an accredited U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command "Institution of Excellence." The center trains approximately 8,000 students per year in either one- or two-week courses.

Courses at the center are for the Army Reserve's full-time staff, which includes dual-status military technicians, Department of Army Civilians, and Active Guard and Reserve Soldiers. These courses include the Unit Administrator Basic Course, Unit Pay Course and Army Reserve Civilian Entry Training Course.

Other center courses for Soldiers and civilians assigned to Reserve and National Guard units include mobilization planning, unit movement, the enhanced Standard Army Maintenance System, the enhanced Property Book Unit Supply System, physical security and the Military History Detachment Course. The center's Advance Distributive Learning Directorate develops and maintains distance learning courses for both Reserve and active-duty personnel.

Additionally, the center is the home of the Army Reserve Retention Course and the 79V Senior Leader Course. Soldiers graduated from these courses are the Army Reserves' key to maintain its end strength by providing units with well-trained retention NCOs.

### **84TH TRAINING COMMAND**

The 84th Training Command conducts and validates realistic Combat Support Collective Training, Leader Development, and Mission Command in a Decisive Action Training environment to prepare Soldiers and units for combat operations. We develop a Federal Reserve Force that provides lethal, agile, and ready Soldiers and units to meet the operational needs of the Army.

The 84th TC provides world–class all-domain collective training events in a Mission Command focused multi-component, joint, and multi-national

environment, building and sustaining the most capable, lethal, and combat ready Soldiers and units in the history of the Army Reserve.

The 84th TC is the executing agent for the Army Reserve's Combat Support Training Program, which ensures units from across the Army are trained and ready for deployment.

The CSTP is comprised of Warrior Exercises and Combat Support Training Exercises, which are large-scale collective training exercises designed to immerse units into tactical training environments that closely replicate what they might experience in operational deployments.


### **100TH TRAINING DIVISION**

The 100th Training Division is responsible for training Army Reserve, National Guard and active-component Soldiers in military intelligence, signal, civil affairs, psychological operations and health services specialties nationwide. The division includes nearly 2,000 Soldiers, with 70 assigned at the Fort Knox headquarters. The 100th Division also hosts the One Army School System, which brings 5,000-7,000 students to Fort Knox for training annually.

### **ARMY RESERVE CAREERS GROUP**

The primary mission of the Army Reserve Careers Group is to shape and sustain the strength of the Army Reserve through aggressive retention, transition and career management programs to support continuum of service. ARCG supports Army Reserve manning and readiness objectives by reenlisting Army Reserve Soldiers; transferring qualified Soldiers from the Individual Ready Reserve to the Selected Reserve; prospecting and submitting board packets for Soldiers for Army Reserve officer producing programs; providing TPU officer career management assistance; and assisting units in the recovery of unsatisfactory participants. The ARCG also provides command and control for more than 1,600 Soldiers assigned to 13 battalions that are located throughout the continental United States with detachments in Europe, Guam, Puerto Rico and all active theaters of operations.

Army Reserve Career Management Office career management officers manage an assigned Troop Program Unit population by rank and branch, providing person-to-person career management. Career management officers are responsible for providing career counseling, assisting with assignments and maximizing the number of educationally qualified Troop Program Unit officers. Career management officers manage second lieutenants through lieutenant colonels and warrant officers from warrant officer one through chief warrant officer four. The center of gravity focus for the Career Management Office is the "at-risk" officers lacking civilian or military education required for promotion.



vast amount of the U.S. gold reserves is stored in the vault of the United States Bullion Depository at Fort Knox. It is one of six facilities under the supervision of the director of the United States Mint, an official of the United States Department of the Treasury. Located 30 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky, adjacent to the Fort Knox military reservation, the depository is home to a large portion of the United States' gold bullion, with the balance stored in the Philadelphia Mint, Denver Mint, West Point Mint and San Francisco Mint.

Construction of the U.S. Bullion Depository at Fort Knox was completed in December 1936, at a cost of \$560,000. The gold was moved to the depository in 1937 by rail, through the United States Postal Service. This was the only method of providing insurance for the gold at the time.


Today, the facility is equipped with state-of-the-art security systems and the latest technological advancements. The depository is headed by an officer in charge who is responsible for ensuring the security of the bullion. The facility is protected by a group of federal police officers, who are hand-selected by the U.S. Mint Headquarters in Washington, D.C. These officers must complete a rigorous training program at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center in Glynco, Georgia, and pass a thorough background investigation.


The gold in the depository is in the form of standard U.S. Mint bars of almost pure gold or coin bars resulting from the melting of gold coins. The bars are similar in size to an ordinary brick, measuring 7 inches in length, 3 1/2 inches in width and 1 3/4 inches in thickness. These fine gold bars contain approximately 400 troy ounces of pure gold.

The depository, commonly referred to as the "gold vault," has undergone many changes during its 80-year history. The security of the depository has reached legendary status with its mystique and mythical folklore. The actual structure of and content in the facility is known

by only a few, and no one person knows all the procedures to open the vault.

No visitors are permitted into the facility. Perhaps the most advanced security system the depository has to offer is its secrecy. Cloaked in mystery, the United States Bullion Depository has established itself as the most secure facility in the world and earned the title "As secure as Fort Knox."





## WAR DEPARTMENT SEEKS KENTUCKY SITE FOR WORLD WAR I ARTILLERY TRAINING

America's involvement in World War I made it necessary to establish new military installations. In April 1918, the War Department looked to the area of West Point, Kentucky, to establish a permanent artillery camp. According to the Louisville Courier, "The West Point range would become the artillery training center of the Army."

On April 1, 1918, the first field artillery units arrived at West Point from Camp Zachary Taylor in Louisville, Kentucky. Additional units making up the field artillery brigade of the 84th Division arrived the following month.

With the number of troops arriving, it was not long before the Army began looking for additional space. That summer the Army leased 20,000 acres of property in the area of Stithton, Kentucky, a small farming community in Hardin County. Stithton was desired for its close proximity to the railroad and for its higher elevation. Under Maj. W.H. Radcliffe, constructing quartermaster at Camp Knox, construction of buildings began in August 1918. The "tented" camp at West Point would temporarily remain while permanent construction occurred in Stithton.

The land at Stithton was soon acquisitioned by the Army and more land was acquired from Bullitt and Meade counties. Many of the houses in the town of Stithton were used for the Army's purposes. Modest Victorian architecture once occupied by Stithton residents became homes used by Army officers and their Families.

St. Patrick's Catholic Church was utilized as a church and for other purposes (today, it is the main post chapel and the oldest building on post). Barracks and warehouses were built to accommodate and support the growing population of Soldiers arriving by train. Standardized plans were used to build most of these World War I mobilization buildings,

and identical buildings could be found on most other installations around the country. In this era and locality of the country, horse-drawn equipment was still regularly used along with automobiles.

Reflecting its relationship to artillery, the new post was named in honor of Gen. Henry Knox, chief of artillery in the Revolutionary War and first secretary of war. It was World War I and Camp Henry Knox had come into existence as a permanent post for the U.S. Army.

In September 1918, it was decided to permanently move the artillery camp in West Point to Stithton. The following month the Camp Knox News was founded as the post's first newspaper. That October, Camp Knox's Godman Field became the first airfield in Kentucky when it was built for the 29th Aero Squadron.

On Nov. 11, 1918, America celebrated the armistice that ended World War I and construction at Stithton slowed down dramatically. Later that month, the first troops were transferred from West Point. Near the end of December, most of the troops there had been moved to the permanent camp at Stithton, and the maximum number of troops on post reached a high of 9,000.

Troops returning from overseas were brought to Camp Knox to be discharged from the service over the next year. Much of their equipment was turned in and stored in the warehouses that still remain at Fort Knox.

The Army's force was reduced in the early 1920s, and it was deemed necessary to close the post as a permanent installation in 1922. Although closed as a permanent installation, Camp Knox remained an active training center for the Army. Camp Knox was used by the

5th Corps Area for Reserve officer training, the National Guard and Citizen's Military Training Camps. For a brief time, during 1925 to 1928, the area was designated as "Camp Henry Knox National Forest."

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## MECHANIZED CAVALRY HEADQUARTERED AT CAMP KNOX

In the following year, the War Department created the mechanized force. Upon the recommendation of Lt. Col. Adna R. Chaffee Jr. and Col. Daniel Van Voorhis, Camp Knox was chosen to be the new headquarters for the Mechanized Cavalry in 1931. The size and terrain of Camp Knox made this a suitable area for such training.

On Jan. 1, 1932, Camp Knox was made a permanent installation once again and from then on has been known as Fort Knox.

To support the newly Mechanized Cavalry, Fort Knox was required to construct housing and support facilities. Designed by the Quartermaster Corps, most of these buildings comprise today's Fort Knox Historic District.


As Fort Knox was constructed, Mechanized Cavalry established the early doctrine of armored warfare. Maneuvers were held that supported the importance of armored vehicles in modern combat. Other duties were also presented, and in 1937, they were called upon to guard gold moving into the Treasury Department's new depository and assisted during the great flood that ravaged the area.

During the 1930s, Fort Knox was an induction center for the Civilian Conservation Corps enrollees. Trainloads of young men were sent to Fort Knox from West Virginia, Indiana, Ohio and Kentucky. They spent about two

weeks at Fort Knox, where they received their shots and clothing and were trained. After this induction period was completed, the men were put on trains and sent to camps at various locations around the country.

A number of camps remained at Fort Knox. These camps were assigned such tasks as improving forests, constructing fire breaks, building roads, working in the stone quarry, soil conservation, pest control, cooking, cleaning and working in the motor pool as mechanics.

As Fort Knox grew as an installation, additional infrastructure was required to accommodate all the new personnel and equipment. Both the Civilian Conservation Corps and



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the Works Progress Administration, another work relief program, assisted Fort Knox in this development.

#### ARMORED FORCE HEADQUARTERED AT FORT KNOX FOR WORLD WAR II, RESPONSIBLE FOR ARMORED FORMATIONS, DOCTRINE AND TRAINING

With the outbreak of World War II in Europe, the American Army prepared with the creation of the Armored Force and headquartered it at Fort Knox in the summer of 1940. It was responsible for establishing armored formations, doctrine and training in the use of armored vehicles. Selective Service was implemented and thousands of citizen soldiers were ordered to Fort Knox and introduced to the tank. The post was required to undergo a massive building boom and acquisition of land to support these troops.

In October 1940, the Armored Force School and Armored Force Replacement Center were established, training Soldiers in specific areas such as armor tactics, tank gunnery, communications and maintenance. The United States was thrown into World War II on Dec. 7, 1941, and the Armored Force experienced their first battle casualty the following day. Pfc. Robert Brooks, 192nd Tank Battalion, would be honored with having the main parade ground named for him.

In April 1942, Fort Knox served as the location of an important testing location for the Navy. At that time, an all-wood mock-up of the landing ship tank well deck was duplicated

to allow naval architects to track airflow and test ventilation systems capable of removing poisonous gases created by running tanks and vehicles enclosed in the well deck.

A solution was found and the go-ahead was given for contractors to complete construction on actual landing ship tanks. In all, more than 1,050 such vessels were built during the war. Today, the building, at 1538 Eisenhower Ave., is used by the Gen. George Patton Museum for various purposes. It is one of the few World War II wooden structures remaining on Fort

Knox and is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

During World War II, armor made great advancements through the development of new tanks, organization and training. Equipment and Soldiers benefited from findings made by the Armored Board and Armored Medical Research Laboratory. In 1943, the Armored Force was redesignated the Armored Command and within a year was changed to the Armored Center.

In 1943, another renaming occurred; the Armored Force Replacement Training Center officially became the Armored Replacement Training Center. Here Soldiers received a 17-week course, which included instruction in various arms, big tank guns, tank driving and maintenance, chemical warfare and many other subjects. They were introduced to hills "Misery," "Agony" and "Heartbreak" before graduating and then sent to divisions, additional schooling or straight into the various theaters of war.

In May 1944, the 477th Bombardment Group, a black Army Air Force unit, was briefly stationed at Godman Army Airfield. They came from Selfridge Airfield near Detroit, where black officers were barred from using the officer's club. The Army moved them to Kentucky in an attempt to avoid further racial conflicts. While at Godman they were allowed to use the officer's club at the airfield but not on Fort Knox. The following March they were moved to Freeman Field in Indiana. Other World War II units included the 387th and 391st bombardment groups.



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# A LOOK BACK — FORT KNOX HISTORY



### WORLD WAR II PRISONER OF WAR CAMP ESTABLISHED AT FORT KNOX

Fort Knox was the site of a main POW camp between February 1944 and June 1946. The first prisoners of war to arrive were Italian. In May 1944, they received an opportunity to volunteer for special service units to aid the American Army. While still classified as POWs, they were on an honor system and given more opportunities.

German POWs arrived in June 1944 and had a routine camp life, which included work, rules and recreation. Outdoor and indoor work details were assigned, many times alongside civilian employees. Many civilians and prisoners got along well with one another and some became friends. The German POW camp at Fort Knox has since been demolished. It was located in the vicinity of Scott Middle School. The former camp soccer field is the only remaining feature of that camp and is now used for American football by students.

A number of Axis prisoners died while at Fort Knox and 18 are buried in the post cemetery. One tragic incident involved the accidental shooting of a number of prisoners in which two died, Ernst Schlotter and Frederich Wolf.

At the close of World War II, there were 16 combat-tested armored divisions and approximately 65 tank battalions. Armored units had participated in every major theater of operations that Americans had participated in. The Armored Center was deactivated in October 1945 but re-established over a year later.

In June 1946, Fort Knox Commanding General Maj. Gen. Hugh J. Gaffey was killed in a B-25 crash as it attempted to land at Godman Airfield. He is the highest ranking officer buried in the post cemetery.

In 1947, Army recruits from the Universal Military Training Experimental Unit arrived at Fort Knox to participate in a short-lived experimental program that offered extended basic training combined with civilian supervision and discipline. Also that year, the 3rd Armored Division was reactivated at Fort Knox and assumed command of the Armored Replacement Training Center, which was placed on an inactive status. They would train more than 300,000 Soldiers during their time at Fort Knox.

Under the Army Organization Act of 1950, armor and cavalry were combined to form the Armor Branch. In 1956, the 3rd Armored Division was shipped to Europe, and the Armored Replacement Training Center was activated to resume training. It was given the new name U.S. Army Training Center, Armor, and comprised approximately half of the population at Fort Knox. Soon after the armored center and armored school were officially designated the "Armor Center" and "Armor School." In 1957, it became the U.S. Army Armor Center.

The Cold War helped secure the Armor Branch's role in the Army, and the Armor Center continued to fulfill the role of producing capable and highly trained armor personnel. By the late 1960s, more than 1 million trainees had completed one or more training programs in the Fort Knox Training Center since its inception in 1940.

Combat operations in Korea and Vietnam presented new challenges for the branch that



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differed from those learned during World War II.

Thus, the Armor Center continued its role in the development and evolution of tactics and vehicles for armor and cavalry.

In 1981, the Armor Center contributed to the development of the Army's AirLand Battle doctrine, which took advantage of new weaponry to assume an offensive role in central Europe. Guidelines set forth in this doctrine were applied successfully during the Gulf War in the early 1990s. During this conflict, Fort Knox served as a mobilization center and provided combat-ready Soldiers.

With the approaching 21st century, digital technology dictated another transformation in how armor would conduct itself on the battle-field and the Future Combat System was developed. To assist in this endeavor, the Unit of Action Maneuver Battle Lab was established in 2002. It was during this time that the Stryker Interim Armored Vehicle went through extensive testing. Military operations in Afghanistan and Iraq prompted changes and termination of the program at Fort Knox. However, to support armor activities, a battle lab was retained.

## GEN. GEORGE PATTON MUSEUM AND CENTER OF LEADERSHIP

In 2013, the Gen. George Patton Museum and Center of Leadership reopened to the public after undergoing an extensive three-year, \$5 million renovation.

The museum's cavalry and armor exhibits were relocated to Fort Benning, Georgia, in

2010, but the entire Patton collection, including the iconic ivory handle pistols, remained at Fort Knox as the centerpiece of the new museum.

The museum's mission has evolved to tell the stories of Army leadership from 1775

to the present. Patton's personal legacy and accomplishments are now woven throughout the museum to teach these important lessons while showcasing his personal effects and memorabilia.

Other exhibits examine examples of Army leadership. Examples include: Meuse-Argonne (1918), the Kasserine Pass (1943) and even the 9/11 attack on the Pentagon.

Through the use of a visitor's smartphone or Wi-Fi enabled device, exhibits come alive with the aid of the museum's augmented reality technology. By scanning a QR label found on most artifacts, the user will have access to audio, video and photos pertaining to the object. These features, coupled with the museum's new focus and design, make it the ideal tool to teach ROTC cadets training at Fort Knox important leadership lessons they will use throughout their careers in the U.S. Army.

Those wishing to visit the museum should enter through the Chaffee (Main) Gate and follow the directional signs. The museum is open 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Saturday. It is closed on federal holidays. The museum is free and open to the general public. Group tours are available with reservations.

Whether you are looking for a place to call home or for a weekend getaway or adventure, consider the Southern hospitality of Bullitt County and its county seat, Shepherdsville.

Bullitt County, which has a population of approximately 80,000, lies just south of Louisville and can be reached by Interstate 65.

Before European settlement, the region was a hub of game trails from the Beargrass, the Bluegrass, the Barren and the Falls of the Ohio made by bison, elk, deer and other game seeking the salt licks, later named Bullitt's Lick. Native Americans used the lands, and especially the salt lick area, to hunt game. Salt was an important meat preservative, and the first European settlers in the 1760s became salt workers. The salt industry at Bullitt's Lick became the first industry in Kentucky, where more than 1,000 people eventually worked.

Today, Bullitt County is the gateway to the Wine & Whiskey Trail, which has six stops within 9 miles of each other. Visit the Jim Beam American Still House, Four Roses Warehouse & Bottling and four award-winning local wineries: Brooks Hill, Forest Edge, MillaNova and Wight-Meyer. Pick up an official trail brochure at any of the six stops on the trail or request one from the Shepherdsville/Bullitt County Tourist & Convention Commission. Once your brochure is stamped at each location, visit the Bullitt County Visitor Center for a free souvenir glass.

Naturalists will find a sense of serenity and knowledge in Clermont in the 14,000-acre Bernheim Arboretum and Research Forest, of which 12,000 acres were donated to the people of Kentucky by distiller Isaac Bernheim. He bought the land in 1929 to restore it to its natural state after early industries took a heavy toll on the land. The forest includes more than 40 miles worth of hiking trails, an education center, a children's play garden and a canopy tree walk where visitors can walk among the tree branches. It is visited by more than 250,000 people each year.

Probably the most famous landmark in Clermont, however, is the Jim Beam American Still House. Jacob Beam, a local farmer and grain mill foreman, sealed and sold his first barrel of "Old Jake Beam's Sour Mash" locally in 1795 — a spirit that was highly praised by friends and family alike. The name of the bourbon changed in 1894, when ownership was passed to the great-great-grandson, James "call me Jim" Beam. Shortly after, prohibition struck the industry, and Beam retired to Florida until 1933, when prohibition was repealed. In 120 days, Beam (then 70) rebuilt the family distillery by hand; the distillery has since become a household name. In 1964, Congress declared bourbon to be the official native spirit of the United States. Guided tours of the distillery are available.

#### **SHEPHERDSVILLE**

#### www.shepherdsville.net

For the boot-scootin' crowd, Shepherdsville offers live country, rock 'n' roll and Southern gospel music at the Shepherdsville Country Music Show. The city also offers family-friendly entertainment at Kart Kountry Family Entertainment Center. Kart Kountry has the nation's longest go-kart track as well as a miniature golf course, batting cages, bumper boats and arcade games. Shepherdsville offers of host of shopping

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opportunities, including antiques, retail stores and an outlet store, as well. Shepherdsville's Awesome Flea Market is a big draw for locals and visitors alike. It's a giant, sprawling affair with a community fair atmosphere along with bargains and treasures.

#### **HARDIN COUNTY**

Hardin County is situated slightly west of central Kentucky and was formed in 1792. Hardin was the 15th Kentucky county in order of formation. The county was named for John Hardin, a Continental Army officer during the American Revolutionary War who was wounded at Saratoga and was killed by Shawnee in Ohio while delivering a message of peace from Secretary of War Henry Knox and President George Washington. A few notable historical figures lived in Hardin County, including President Abraham Lincoln, who was born there, and Gen. George Custer, who lived in Hardin County for two years as part of a military effort to suppress the Ku Klux Klan and carpetbaggers. The county currently encompasses almost 630 square miles and boasts a population of approximately 108,000. Its county seat is Elizabethtown.

#### **ELIZABETHTOWN**

#### www.touretown.com

Elizabethtown, with a population of 30,000, is south of Radcliff. It is central to some of the state's most stunning historic landmarks, as well as being a former home to a multitude of famous historic figures.

Thomas Lincoln owned a successful carpentry business while watching over his son — the 16th president of the United States, Abraham Lincoln. John Audubon was a shopkeeper in Elizabethtown long before his famed ornithology book was published.

Freeman Lake Park, a 170-acre lake with more than 90 acres of picnic space, features

several volleyball courts, playgrounds and 7 miles of walking trails. The park also has three historical learning structures: the Lincoln Heritage House, an 1890s one-room schoolhouse and the Sarah Bush Johnston Lincoln Memorial Cabin. The park holds the annual Founders' Day Celebration on the Fourth of July and Christmas in the Park from Thanksgiving eve through New Year's Day.

#### **RADCLIFF**

#### www.radclifftourism.org

Radcliff is conveniently located adjacent to Fort Knox in the "Heartland of Kentucky" a historic location known for its accessibility from almost every possible direction. With a population of approximately 23,000, Radcliff boasts the second-highest population in Hardin County. It is a haven for outdoor enthusiasts, as well as history buffs. Radcliff was once known as Mill Creek, an area that was scouted out by the Boon brothers, Daniel and Squire. In 1814, Coleman Lewis built the first section of Radcliff's oldest standing structure, the Haycraft Inn. The inn was used extensively during the era of stage coach transports. It is listed on the National Registry of Historical Structures and is off modern-day

Horace McCullum coined the name Radcliff during a lot auction in 1919. He named the new community after Maj. William Radcliffe, who was head of the Quartermaster Corps at Fort Knox. In the 1930s, Fort Knox expanded into Stithton and New Stithton, causing former residents, shopkeepers and innkeepers to relocate to Radcliff.

Radcliff is home to three city parks, a community center and a seasonal public pool. For the licensed outdoor enthusiast, fishing and hunting is plentiful.

Radcliff's Saunders Springs Nature Preserve is a heavily wooded, natural area on steep terrain with interesting historic features. The

preserve provides opportunities for nature study, hiking, picnicking and historic interpretation. The 26-acre nature preserve is owned and operated by the city of Radcliff and overseen by the Radcliff Forestry and Conservation Board. Adjacent to the nature preserve is a 73-acre tract called the Saunders Springs Annex, which the city leased from Fort Knox. There is no entrance fee to use the preserve and annex areas and they are open for recreational use from dawn to dusk year-round, weather permitting. There are three vintage cabins (from the 1800s), pavilions, picnic tables, barbecue grills and a scout camping area available for use.

#### **WEST POINT**

#### www.westpoint.ky.gov

Established in 1796, with a current population of approximately 870, this community is a history lover's paradise. The city is home to the Civil War-era Fort Duffield. The fort is one of the oldest, most well-preserved earthen structures in the state. It's not the traditional structure either. It's a horseshoe-shaped earthen dugout with walls that are 20 to 30 feet high, built on Pearman Hill. The Fort Duffield Memorial Cemetery pays tribute to the 61 Soldiers who died while in service at the fort and West Point. Visitors can also check out the fort's park, which offers 10 miles of hiking and biking trails, events and more.

The historic district's most famous structure is Young's Inn, built in 1797, and has served the likes of Andrew Jackson, Henry Clay and John Audubon, who even mentions the inn in his essay on carrier pigeons.

West Point is also home to a historic river walk and the riverside Veterans Memorial Park, which welcomes picnickers and anglers.

#### **MEADE COUNTY**

Meade County's northern border runs 56 miles along the Ohio River. Most of Meade's



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communities were founded in the late 1700s and early 1800s and still remain today. It is probably best known in the surrounding counties as the home of the Meade County Fair — an extravaganza of rides, horse and agriculture shows, live music and National Tractor Pullers Association events.

Meade County's Otter Creek Outdoor Recreation Area offers 2,200 acres of outdoor recreational opportunities and shares borders with Fort Knox. It is managed by the Kentucky Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources and offers activities and areas for hiking, running, horseback riding, mountain biking, camping, shooting (at the archery or rifle ranges), fishing and hunting. The park is one of the area's favorite family places to picnic and float the Otter Creek.

#### BRANDENBURG

#### www.brandenburg.ky.gov

As the seat of Meade County, Brandenburg is steeped in local history. The town was named for Samuel Brandenburg, the owner of Brandenburg's Landing and Ferry on the Ohio River.

After a brief rivalry with John Rush of Claysville, the county seat was relocated from Claysville to Brandenburg, since Claysville was deemed unsafe by an act of General Assembly. Once Brandenburg became the county seat, Samuel donated land and resources for a county courthouse, county square and tavern. Brandenburg's tavern later became a haven for such historical notables as Aaron Burr and James Audubon.

When the first railroad came to Kentucky, Brandenburg was completely ignored, and in protest, the townspeople built the first hardtop road to and from the station. In hindsight, this was a major factor in its longevity.

Today, Brandenburg's historic downtown is home to the scenic Riverfront Park, where you'll find the entrance to the Buttermilk Falls Trail. Riverfront Park features a playground, a chess area, picnic tables and a stunning view of the mighty Ohio River where you can watch the barges and towboats drift by. Brandenburg also has two golf courses, the 18-hole Doe Valley Golf Club and the nine-hole River Trace Golf Course. And, if you're visiting in late July, enjoy the award-winning Meade County Fair, which was voted the best county fair in Kentucky.

#### **MULDRAUGH**

#### www.muldraugh.ky.gov

Located on the outskirts of Fort Knox, Muldraugh is only 2 miles north of the fort's main gate on Bullion Boulevard. When traveling south into town, don't be alarmed — a retired military tank crouches at the bottom of Muldraugh Hill. The monument was built from the foundation stones of the historic Grahampton Grinding Mill that once stood where modern-day Fort Knox now sits.

#### **OTHER LOCAL AREAS OF INTEREST**

#### **BARDSTOWN**

In 1780, William Baird received a land grant of 1,000 acres from the Virginia General Assembly, in an area that was tentatively

named Salem. Baird used this land to create a town and crafted its buildings out of indigenous timber. When the first courthouse was built in 1785, the town officially took the moniker of "Bardstown," a derivative of William's family name.

One of the most significant Bardstown buildings — the Federal Hill mansion — was the muse for Stephen Foster when he wrote "My Old Kentucky Home." The mansion is also etched on the state quarter, released in 2001. Visitors to Federal Hill will find re-enactors in antebellum-era clothing hosting tours in the restored structure. There is also the J. Dan Talbott Amphitheatre on the grounds, which hosts "The Stephen Foster Story," an outdoor extravaganza that features 50 Foster songs and brightly colored interpretative dancers, swirling throughout the historic hillside.

The largest concentrations of historically significant structures in Kentucky reside in Bardstown, which is part of Nelson County. More than 300 of Bardstown's buildings appear on the National Historic Registry. Its success was due in part to a great concentration in lime deposits in the town's water supply, a prized blend sought by distillers. So it comes as no surprise that the town was the center of the early distilling industry, and many of these distilleries remain close to Bardstown today.

Since the end of prohibition, a staple of Bardstown has been Heaven Hill Distilleries. The company was founded from the ground up, producing and marketing without notable brands, available stores of whiskey or



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notoriety — and it was started during the Great Depression. Today, Heaven Hill is the biggest independent, family-owned and operated distilled spirits supplier in the U.S. Not only that, but the distillery also boasts one of the largest inventories of aging bourbon in the world — more than 1.5 million barrels.

#### **LORETTO**

Loretto is in Marion County. A city with a lot of "spirit," Loretto is probably most well-known as the home of the Maker's Mark distillery. Originally created in 1840 by T.W. Samuels, the secret family recipe was passed from generation to generation. A Samuels family business was formed soon after and prospered until 1943, when Bill Samuels Sr. left the T.W. Samuels distillery and burned the only copy of the bourbon recipe. He then crafted a new recipe, using maize and the notoriously mild winter wheat. The recipe was perfected in 1952, and the world-famous "wax seal" was created the same year. In 1958, the first bottle was sealed, dipped in wax and sold for \$7. The U.S. secretary of the interior officially declared the Maker's Mark distillery a National Historic Landmark in 1980.

#### LOUISVILLE

Founded in 1778 by George Rogers Clark, Louisville was named for King Louis XVI of France. It is part of Jefferson County. Perhaps Louisville's most well-known landmark is Churchill Downs, the home of the Kentucky Derby, the kickoff of the famous "Triple Crown" of racing, occurring annually the first weekend in May.

If you're interested in the history of the Kentucky Derby, visit the Derby Museum at Churchill Downs, a showcase that features clothing and racing equipment that has been used over the years. Right outside the museum is a stable with a resident thoroughbred and a companion pony.

For art lovers, Louisville is home to the Speed Art Museum, established in 1927. It is both the oldest and largest art museum in the state. The museum recently underwent a \$50 million expansion, which doubled the overall square footage and nearly tripled the gallery space from the existing wing. The expansion created new contemporary art galleries, an indoor and outdoor cafe, a family education welcome center, a museum shop, a pavilion for performances and an art park for sculptures.

Louisville is also home to several inventions that are staples of our daily life. In 1873, John Colgan invented "Taffy Julie," later known as bubblegum. Unfortunately, another inventor beat Colgan to the patent, though he is still credited with the invention. In 1884, Bud Hillerich invented the world's first Louisville Slugger in his father's woodshop. The first use of the term "Louisville Slugger" was in 1893, when the bat became a baseball staple. Thanks in turn to Bud and the Slugger, Louisville is

also home to the world's tallest bat, which leans against the Louisville Slugger Museum, in the heart of the historic West Main District.

Louisville is also famous for being the birthplace of the cheeseburger. In 1934, the first cheeseburger was ordered in Kaelin's Restaurant, when Margaret Kaelin's husband requested a slice of American cheese on his hamburger. The "special request" soon became a staple at Kaelin's and started the world-famous trend.


#### **MAMMOTH CAVE NATIONAL PARK**


Located roughly 95 miles southwest of Louisville, Mammoth Cave is the longest recorded cave system in the world, with more than

400 miles of explored underground terrain. There are a host of cave tours available with varying difficulties and durations. For first-time ventures, the historic tour is recommended, which spans 2 miles of cave and runs approximately two hours. The tour explains the cave's history as well as showcases the cave's largest spaces and oldest routes.

For those who prefer to stay above ground, the park offers miles of hiking trails and horseback riding. Enjoy the total experience, and check out campsites scattered throughout the park. Campsites must be reserved in advance. Please note, in order to camp in the backcountry, a backcountry use permit is required.



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### FIRST SETTLERS ARRIVE WHEN AMERICA IS DECLARING INDEPENDENCE

The initial Euro-American entry into the Fort Knox area is uncertain, but by the last quarter of the 18th century, numerous hunters, surveyors, explorers and fortune seekers had traversed that part of Kentucky. By that time, such well-known pioneers as Thomas Bullitt, Michael Stoner, and Daniel and Squire Boone had been active in the area.

The earliest known attempt to settle this area took place in July 1776, when a group known as Share, Sweeney and company, led by Samuel Pearman, traveled by flatboat to the mouth of the Salt River. Pearman and his companions laid claim to several thousand acres along the Ohio and Salt rivers. They built a small log cabin at the junction of the Salt and Rolling Fork rivers, but numerous Indian attacks forced them to retreat to Virginia. Settlement attempts were not abandoned, however, and the next few years saw continued efforts to establish permanent settlements.

Louisville was surveyed as early as 1773, but no settlement took place there until 1778, when an encampment was built on Corn Island in the Ohio River. By the following year, the salt licks to the south of Louisville were being exploited. The earliest and most important of these was Bullitt's Lick (also known as Saltsburg), which was near the northeastern boundary of Fort Knox.

In that same year, Brashear's Station (also known as Froman's Station and Salt River Garrison) was established just below the mouth of Floyd's Fork. Continued Indian raids forced the closing of the salt works. By 1780 it was once again in operation, this time defended by the Mud Garrison, constructed of a double row of piles filled with dirt and gravel, and located on the north bank of the Salt River about 1/2 mile above the mouth of Bullitt's Lick Run. This renewed attempt at

settlement was joined by the establishment of Dowdall's Station, on the north bank of Salt River at a pool just above the river's falls (near present-day Shepherdsville).

Meanwhile, efforts were being made further west to establish permanent settlements.

John Severns, a surveyor, had entered the country and established a homestead in an area later known as Severn's Valley. A large party of settlers including Jacob Van Meter, Samuel Haycraft and Capt. John Vertrees joined him later in that year. Although many of the settlers returned home to Pennsylvania following an extremely severe winter, Haycraft and Col. Andrew Haynes stayed to build stations in the valley. Capt. Thomas Helm, who also built a station, later joined them. These three stations or forts formed a triangle, the interior of which later became Elizabethtown.

A portion of the major road known as the Cumberland-Ohio Falls Trail developed between the Severn's Valley settlement (present-day Elizabethtown) and Louisville via Bullitt's Lick. An optional course north of Severn's Valley led to the mouth of the Salt River, following roughly the route of the present-day Dixie Highway. These roads, along with the Salt and Rolling Fork rivers, provided major avenues of transportation and helped open the area for further settlement. They also provided paths through the Muldraugh Escarpment, a previous deterrent to travel.

Squire Boone claimed title to the land around Doe Run in 1786. The community that sprang up in this area was known as Little York, Virginia, as Kentucky was still a county of Virginia. Little York became the county seat of Meade County for a short period.

Other settlements were established in Hill Grove, Stith's Valley and along Doe Run and Otter Creek around 1784. These settlements were small, fortified family establishments. By 1789, and into the 1790s,

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












Revolutionary War veterans with military land grants settled the West Point area. Among these early settlers were Thomas and Samuel Pearman, Henry Ditto, George Ball, Isaac Vertrees, Joseph Enlan, William Withers, John Hay, Thomas Barbour and John Campbell. Fort Knox now encompasses large portions of these original grants.

## LINCOLN FAMILY FARM ESTABLISHED IN RADCLIFF-FORT KNOX AREA

The Mill Creek and Cedar Creek valleys were also settled around this time. A Baptist church was erected in the Mill Creek area in 1783. It was here that President Abraham Lincoln's family carved out a home. In 1803, Thomas Lincoln (the president's father) purchased a 238-acre farm near the southern boundary of present-day Radcliff-Fort Knox on Battle Training Road. Thomas brought his mother, Bersheba (or Bathsheba), his sister and her husband to live there. Thomas moved away to present-day LaRue County, along Knob Creek, from 1807 to 1816 before departing to Indiana. Bersheba remained in the Mill Creek community until her death in 1833 and is buried in the old Mill Creek Cemetery (now the Lincoln Memorial Cemetery). She was the first of the family buried in that consecrated ground. Nancy Brumfield, aunt of the president, her husband, William Brumfield, and their daughter, Mary Crume, complete the three generations of Lincoln buried side-by-side.

### **EARLY SETTLEMENTS TAKE FORM IN 1790S**

By the 1790s, settlements began to take on more formal characteristics. In 1792, Kentucky became a state and Hardin County was formed from Nelson County.

The Salt River had become an extremely important means of transportation for flatboat trade; three inspection stations were established to check cargoes of tobacco, timber, flour, hemp and farm produce. These stations were at Taylorsville, Shepherdsville and a 1/2 mile below the mouth of Long Lick Creek, the latter very near or just within the present boundaries of Fort Knox. River commerce clearly played an important role in developing the early settlement pattern of the Fort Knox area, particularly in Bullitt and Hardin counties.

Most settlements before 1800 were located on major rivers or streams. Elizabethtown was officially incorporated and named in 1796. Garnettsville was established in 1792 on Otter Creek. Shepherdsville was officially incorporated in 1793. Sometime before 1794, a settlement known as Bealsburg apparently was established on Pitts Point at the junction of the Salt and Rolling Fork rivers. West Point was formally laid out in 1796.

### AGRICULTURE, TIMBER AND SALT — MAINSTAYS OF AREA ECONOMY

During early settlement, the major economic pursuits were agricultural production, timber cutting and salt making. The latter had a particularly interesting and colorful history, as well as being extremely important to the rest

of Kentucky. Salt (used mainly as a preservative for game, which was the principal source of food) was a necessary and valuable commodity during the early historical period.

The Revolutionary War with Great Britain cut off normal sources of salt and the mountains acted as a barrier to practical, cost-effective transport of salt into the frontier. When Bullitt's Lick was established in 1779, it was the first commercial salt works in Kentucky and the only one west of the Alleghenies during the remainder of the Revolution. After the war, Bullitt's Lick and other salt works in the area were the main suppliers of salt for many years.

Nowhere else was there such a concentration of wells and furnaces. The industry also provided an impetus for support services such as timber cutting, cooperage, carpentry and other necessary trades. Eventually, however, salt making became unprofitable, as steamboats brought cheap imported salt; by 1830, all the salt works had closed.

In the early part of the 19th century, Shepherdsville, Louisville, West Point, Graniteville and Elizabethtown figured prominently in the settlement pattern with nuclear family farmsteads being scattered around these points. As the Indian threats abated, it became safe for a wider dispersal of individual farmsteads, but the necessity remained for the maintenance of a tie to some larger town for specialized goods and services.

Not all settled areas identified strongly with a particular town. Some, such as Hill Creek, Cedar Creek, Smith's Valley, Doe Run and Otter Creek settlements, were concentrated



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within a particular valley. This was particularly true in the area that in 1823 became Meade County. It had very few incorporated towns in 1800 but numerous clustered settlements.

As the century wore on, however, more towns were established in response to population increase and a greater need arose for goods and services not produced on farms. Additionally, people occupying a particular area often referred to it informally by a specific name. These unofficial settlements usually centered on a store, church or a school.

In many cases, these "settlements" provided the day-to-day needs, and the larger towns provided more specialized professional services and merchandise. Examples of such settlements in the Fort Knox area included Pleasant View, Bloomington, Pine Tavern, Bartles, Shady Grove and Steel's Crossroads.

The average landowner in the Fort Knox area during the 19th century was a small-scale agriculturalist. Not as common but also present were larger-scale planters who occupied large floodplain areas mainly along the Salt, Rolling Fork and Ohio rivers. These operations were similar to the plantations of the Deep South and probably accounted for most of the slave population in the area.

Kentucky, as a whole, did not account for a large proportion of slaves in the Southern states. The percentage of slaves in Kentucky was only 24.73 percent in 1830 and declined to 19.5 percent by 1860. The average Kentuckian in 1860 did not own any slaves, and the average slaveholder owned less than 10.

Staple crops were corn and tobacco, but hay and wheat were also grown. Bullitt County also produced some barley.

The differences between the small farmer and the planter were not limited to the size of their farms. An important and early business was milling. Most of the successfully operated mills were located on Otter Creek, Doe Run and Hill Creek.

The Coleman or Doe Run Mill (now the site of Doe Run Inn) was built around 1800. Garnettsville also had a number of mills, including Overton's and Grable's mills. The Van Meter Mill was farther upstream. Overton apparently built the first flour mill on Otter Creek sometime before 1813, and a town known as Plain Dealing grew up around it. The Overton Mill in Garnettsville was a saw and gristmill. The record is not clear whether these mills were one and the same.

Grable's Mill was in existence as early as 1805. There was also a Crabb's Mill near Garnettsville as early as 1804. Samuel Sterrett in Garnettsville later built another mill. The foundations of two of the Garnettsville mills



are still visible and are presently within the Fort Knox reservation. David Brandenburg, the son of Solomon Brandenburg, for whom the Meade county seat is named, also built a mill in 1813 at what later became Grahamton.

Most of these early mills were gristmills, but probably the most famous and successful of all was the textile mill at Grahamton. The Grahamton Manufacturing Co., which built the mill in 1836 or 1837, was a Louisville-based firm, which was established in 1829. The mill was one of the earliest textile mills in Kentucky and the first one to be established west of the mountains.

The first dam and millrace were built of wood but replaced by stone in the early 1850s. At first, only a textile mill was built, but in 1865, a larger stone flour mill was erected. It operated for a few years, until the business declined, and it was converted to a warehouse. The mill produced a variety of goods, including cotton and wool yarns, linens, cottonades, jeans and a special cloth known as Otter Creek Stripe. During the Mexican War, the mill supplied canvas for Army tents. Cotton grain sacks were made from the 1860s up to the time the mill was taken over by the McCord Co. and converted exclusively to a spinning mill.

A town sprang up around the mill, and the townsfolk were longtime employees of the company. Also associated with Grahamton was Rock Haven, which acted as a wharf and shipping point on the Ohio River for the textile goods. Only ruins remain of the original

mills. Camp Carlson, an Army recreational area, is now located in the vicinity of this extinct community.

Construction of the Louisville and Nashville Turnpike began in 1837, and by 1849, the macadamized road reached the Kentucky state line 108 miles to the south. The turnpike was meant as a thoroughfare for farmers and businessmen from Louisville to the Kentucky-Tennessee state line. The turnpike became a popular stagecoach route and allowed travelers from Louisville to reach Nashville in three days.

#### HISTORIC BRIDGE TOURS AVAILABLE ON FORT KNOX

Famous travelers of the road include writer Bayard Taylor and Swedish singer Jenny Lind. Use of the road for products and goods traveling between Louisville and Nashville diminished after 1859, when the Louisville and Nashville Railroad (located east of Fort Knox) was constructed. Today, an asphalt surface covers the underlying limestone macadamized road, and the U.S. Army Garrison Fort Knox welcomes visitors to the "Bridges to the Past" walking tour along a preserved portion of the historic turnpike.

The trail is approximately 1 mile south of West Point, Kentucky, on U.S. Route 31W or 8 miles north of Fort Knox's main gate on U.S. Route 31W. Notable features on the walk include three limestone arch bridges that are more than 150 years old. These limestone

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bridges are among the oldest standing in Kentucky.

Small, rural settlements in the Fort Knox area were numerous. In addition to these small centers, a number of populated towns developed and flourished during the 19th and early 20th centuries. One of the earliest was established in 1831 and named Pittstown after the Pitts brothers, its founders. The name later changed to Pitts Point. The town was at the junction of the Salt and Rolling Fork rivers in Bullitt County. Its main function was as a docking point in the steamboat trade, as the Salt River was normally navigable only to a



point just beyond the town. It acted as a major distribution center for the area.

By 1860, the town had grown to a population of 300, including physicians, carpenters, hotel proprietors, bakers, saddle and harness makers, a fish dealer, a minister, a blacksmith, masons and builders, and schoolteachers. As the steamboat trade declined, particularly with the coming of the railroad in 1859, Pitts Point began to wane in importance, and by 1874, its population had dwindled to less than 100. The Army purchased it around 1947 and at that time, it was virtually a ghost town. Several cemeteries are the only remnants from that community.

Another established town was called Stithton. The Stith Family, for whom the town was named, moved into the area in 1859 presumably from Stith Valley, in Meade County. Prior to their entry, there was probably already a small settlement known as St. Patrick's. A Catholic church was built there in 1831. The church was later replaced by another structure built in 1899, which is now the post chapel.

Stithton was in Hardin County in what is now the southeastern portion of the Fort Knox cantonment area. It served as a major center for goods and services for all the small farming communities nearby, including Mill Creek, Easy Gap, Steel's Crossroads and probably some of the adjacent Meade County settlements. Stithton was a stagecoach stop in its early years and later was traversed by the L&N (Louisville and Nashville) Turnpike, which was built in 1829 to 1835 and connected the town of Elizabethtown and West Point. The

Louisville and Nashville Railroad also ran through the town.

Between Stithton and Tip Top, there was a large gooseberry farm. The Army purchased Stithton in 1918. A "New Stithton" sprang up nearby, but it too was purchased when the Army post was expanded in 1942. Documentary sources have chronicled the destruction of nearly all the buildings associated with Stithton to make way for Army construction in the area. The post chapel is the only recognizable building from the Stithton of 1918.

#### KENTUCKY SETTLERS JOIN BOTH NORTHERN AND CONFEDERATE FORCES

Most of the important settlements in the Fort Knox area were established before the Civil War. At the start of the war, the Kentucky legislature voted to remain neutral; the state supplied more than 90,000 men to the Union Army and more than 30,000 troops for the Confederate cause, although citizens in the Fort Knox area were nearly equally divided between Union and Confederate sympathies.

Throughout the war, Union forces controlled the area, occupying Fort Duffield above West Point at different times during the conflict. Fort Duffield was on what was known as Muldraugh or Pearman Hill on a strategic point overlooking the confluence of the Salt and Ohio rivers and the L&N Turnpike, the main road into Louisville. By November 1861, the 9th Michigan Infantry had begun constructing breastworks and fortifications atop the hill, while the 37th Indiana Infantry camped below the hill. Regular use of the fort ended in 1862, and it was used irregularly throughout the rest of the conflict.

In August 1862, the Confederate Army, under Gens. Braxton Bragg and Kirby Smith, led an offensive to Kentucky. Many thought they would attempt to take the city of Louisville and possibly drive into northern soil. Gen. Don Carlos Buell's Union forces, on the march from Tennessee and Alabama, hurried in the direction of Louisville for its defenses. The Union troops moved through the area along the L&N Turnpike, passing through present-day Fort Knox. Bragg's victory at Munfordville on Sept. 17, 1862, proved costly as it allowed Buell to gain ground on the Confederates. Bragg moved his Army in the direction of Bardstown, allowing Buell to arrive in Louisville ahead of the Confederates in late September. The two armies finally battled at Perryville, Kentucky, on Oct. 8.

In late December 1862, John Hunt Morgan and Confederate forces besieged two nearby Union garrisons guarding two railroad

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trestles on Muldraugh Hill. Both trestles were destroyed, and more than 600 federal troops were captured as a result of the raids. In this same raid, Morgan captured Elizabethtown after a brief battle. Morgan made a lightning-fast move across the area again in 1863. His route took him across the Rolling Fork River to an overnight camp at Garnetts-ville before moving on to Brandenburg. From there, he ferried his troops across the river and led them on an extended raid across southeast Indiana into Ohio.

During the war, guerilla warfare plagued the area. Under such guerilla leaders as Ben Wigginton, numerous attacks were made on area communities with citizens or businesses loyal to the Union. Other bands sought to represent the Northern cause, but in either case, most simply were bandits who preyed on the local populace.

## AREA PROSPERITY REACHES PEAK IN 1850S

The Fort Knox area population and economic diversity increased primarily during the first half of the 19th century. By the 1850s, the area had probably reached its peak in prosperity. Subsequent years saw the beginning of a decline, which was clearly evident by the late 19th century. For instance, by 1890, Hardin County was classed as a pauper county, because it spent more than \$9,000 more on services than it collected in revenues. Land also carried a low assessment and much of it was too exhausted for cultivation.

A number of factors contributed to this decline. At least part of the decline was probably due to the limitations the natural setting prescribed on economic activity. Much of the Bullitt County and some of the Hardin County portions of the post are characterized by a highly dissected topography with relatively little arable land. Virtually all of Meade County and most of the remaining Hardin County portions of the fort are of karstic topography, characterized by underground drainage, moderate to severe erosion hazard under cultivation and usually only moderate potential yield.

The best areas from an agricultural standpoint are in the broad floodplains of the Ohio, Salt and Rolling Fork rivers, along with the limited floodplain areas in some of the smaller stream valleys. These areas are small compared to the entire post.

Added to the limited agricultural potential is the lack of good mineral deposits or other resources suitable for industry. Thus, large numbers went west from 1855 to 1880 in pursuit of new opportunities.

The decline was also attributable to outside influences. For instance, it has been noted that the production of salt became unprofitable when steamboat transportation made the importation of salt less expensive. Pitts Point thrived until the railroad was built and precluded the need for river transport. Although the Civil War did not have a significant, direct impact on the area, the effect of the war and reconstruction did have a dramatic, albeit indirect, impact on the economy of the area and Kentucky in general. Additionally, a variety of factors encouraged the growth of Louisville and Elizabethtown at the expense of smaller towns.

By the time the Army began land acquisition in the early 20th century, only Stithton and West Point were moderately prosperous. Pitts Point declined to a rural hamlet; Garnetts-ville and Grahamton never grew out of the small-town phase; and development in Bullitt County was suppressed by the growth of Louisville. Vine Grove, which was established in 1850 and moved to its present location in 1865, was growing, but it leveled off into the small town it remains today.

### PROSPERITY RETURNS WITH MILITARY PRESENCE

In late September and early October 1903, a noteworthy event took place at West Point and the surrounding area.

Military troops came to the area to engage in mock battles. Large-scale military exercises at Fort Riley, Kansas, proved successful the previous year. The positive outcome paved the way for new military maneuvers at West Point. Army regulars from the Department of the Lakes and National Guard troops from Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Ohio, Michigan and Wisconsin numbered 13,000 strong and pitched their tent city in West Point.



Not since the Civil War had so many Soldiers been gathered at that place. They named their temporary home Camp Young. It was named after the Army's first chief of staff, Samuel Baldwin Marks Young, a Union veteran of the Civil War.

Soldiers present for the war games were divided into two opposing forces. A fictional conflict was scripted that pitted the Blue Army, stationed on the Ohio River at Louisville, against the Brown Army, based along the Tennessee River in Nashville, Tennessee. The scenario found the Brown Army near Louisville, where they had arrived after a successful campaign. Now, with the Blue Army recently reinforced and on the offensive, mock battles were carried out under the supervision of umpires. The success of the maneuvers prompted Army officials to consider making the location a permanent installation, but it would be another 15 years before that consideration became reality.

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#### WARNINGS

#### **OPERATIONS SECURITY**

Nonsecure communication/information exchange is extremely vulnerable to hostile exploitation through monitoring. Do not attempt to talk around a classified or sensitive subject. Accumulated bits of seemingly unimportant information collected through continued monitoring when analyzed can provide hostile intelligence services with vital national defense information. (AR 530-1)

#### **CONTROL OF TELEPHONE USAGE**

Unofficial use of DSN, NETWORX or any other DOD funded telephone system is prohibited. Personnel found fraudulently using DOD telephone systems are subject to be disciplined to the maximum extent possible. Individuals found placing unofficial toll calls will pay for incurred charges.

Third-party monitoring of a telephone conversation is prohibited unless all parties give consent (an exception is at Site R where OPSEC monitoring is authorized). This also applies to use of hands-free speaker telephones when more than one person is present at hands-free locations.

Do not process, store or transmit classified information on nonsecure telecommunications systems. Official DOD telecommunications systems including telephones, facsimile machines, computer networks and modems are subject to monitoring for telecommunications security purposes at all times. Use of official DOD telecommunications systems constitutes consent to telecommunications security monitoring.

DOD telecommunications systems, including telephones, facsimile machines, computer networks and modems, are provided for the transmission of official government information only and are subject to communications security monitoring at all times. Use of official DOD telecommunications systems constitutes consent to communications security monitoring in accordance with AR 380-53.

#### **PENALTIES**

It is unlawful to use telephones making an intrastate, interstate or foreign communication as a means of conveying obscene or indecent language or to telephone anonymously another person repeatedly for the purpose of annoying, molesting or harassing such person or his or her family.

The penal code of Kentucky provides that: Any person who willfully refuses to relinquish immediately a party line when informed that it is needed for an emergency call to a fire department, a police department or for medical aid or ambulance service is guilty of an offense and subject to a fine or imprisonment or both. The statute defines an emergency as a situation in which property or human life are in jeopardy and the prompt summoning of aid is essential. It is also made an offense subject to the use of a party line by falsely stating that it is needed for such an emergency.

Anyone with intent to defraud, who gives information to the operator or agent of any telephone company so that the charge therefore is made to the account of another without his authorization, shall be liable to a fine or imprisonment or both. (KRS 438.160 TO 180 and KRS 514.060)

Federal law provides that harassing interstate communications are a felony subject to imprisonment for up to two years. (47 USC223(a))

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

#### 1. DIALING PROCEDURES

- a. 1 (800) (Inward WATS, toll free) and 0+ (operator assist.) calls can be placed by dialing 99 and the service desired.
- b. Calls to military installations (DSN), dial 94 and the seven-digit number.

 c. All other calls dial 99, dial 1, dial the area code and seven-digit number.

#### 2. LOCAL SERVICE AREA

- a. For area code 270, the following local exchanges should be dialed with 99 and the 10-digit number: 219, 272, 319, 351, 352, 422, 496, 497, 503, 547, 668, 750, 801, 828, 863, 941, 945, 980 and 998.
- b. For area code 502, the following local exchanges should be dialed with 99 and the 10-digit number: 273, 335, 378, 622, 684, 799, 942 and 943.
- c. For the new 364 area code, please check your local directory for updates.

#### 3. CLASSIFICATION OF SERVICE

- All telephone service is authorized only for the transaction of official business and will not be used for personal calls.
- b. Class A1: Class A1 service has access to all phone systems serving the installation. These include DSN, NETWORX (long-distance service for all DOD activities) and the local calling area.
- c. Class C: Class C service has access to all Fort Knox and (502) 799/942/943 numbers. Exceptions to limitations are given for the transfer of data/facsimile or in special situations such as alerts, exercises or emergencies. Within these classifications, service can be configured to limit calling areas not mission essential. When requesting service, list areas and circuits to be accessed.

#### 4. REPAIRS AND COMPLAINTS

- a. Repairs on out-of-order phones may be obtained by submitting a "Telephone Trouble Call" Ticket via the web page https://tms.knox. army.mil or by calling Repair Service at 624-3338. Repairs on ADP equipment or copiers may be obtained by calling Repair Service at 624-6666. All repairs will be made during normal duty hours except those telephones on the Emergency Repair List (i.e., Guard, MP, Ambulance, etc.).
- b. Complaints concerning quality of service should be directed to the Administrative Telephone Services Branch, NEC, 624-6313/5555, or in writing to the Director, NEC.

#### 5. DIRECTORY SERVICE

- a. NEC maintains the information directory service for Fort Knox. This service and the telephone directory contain the phone number and location for each office and unit on Fort Knox that has NEC telephone service
- b. Changes or corrections to directory listings will be reported to NEC, Administrative Telephone Services Branch, by the Information Management Officer of the unit/office involved.

#### 6. REQUESTS FOR SERVICE:

Requests for installation, removal, moves or changes in class of service will be submitted by the organization/unit IMO/TCO via the post website URL of https://tms.knox.army.mil from a government provided/authorized PC and selecting the "TCO Telephone Service Requests" option. Procedures for

designating or appointing an IMO or a TCO for your organization or unit can be obtained by calling the NEC/ATS section at 624-7110/5555/6313.

Reporting troubles on existing official government telephone lines can be performed by accessing the post website URL of https://tms.knox.army.mil and selecting the "Telephone Trouble Calls" option.

#### 7. EQUIPMENT RESPONSIBILITY

- a. Individuals in whose area (shop, office, warehouse) telephones are installed are responsible for their proper use and care.
- Subscribers will not move, alter, paint, place attachments on, make additions to or change telephone equipment of the systems in any way.
- c. Subscribers who have a need to install special devices (answering/ fax machines, recorders, modems, etc.) to the system must request authorization by submitting a "TCO Telephone Service Request" to NEC outlining equipment to be installed and what telephone numbers are affected.
- d. Any damage to equipment other than fair wear and tear will be covered by a report of survey, statement of charges or cash collection voucher

#### 8. LONG-DISTANCE CALLING FACILITIES

Fort Knox is serviced by a mixture of long-distance services and nets engineered to provide efficient service as economically as possible. The services and nets by priority for use areas follows:

- a. DSN: The DSN circuits are first choice when calling another military installation or a facility that is in the DSN network.
- 800 (toll free) and 0 + (operator assist.) services are accessed by dialing 99.
- c. NETWORX: The NETWORX circuits are used to access government and commercial numbers that cannot be called by DSN and is the commercial long-distance carrier serving Fort Knox. NETWORX is authorized for official communications only. Use only in those instances when the calls are essential in the conduct of official business and timeliness does not allow alternate means, i.e., mail, email, etc. NETWORX is time-sensitive. Keep your conversation short and businesslike. Make notes before calling concerning topics, questions and points of concern. Please do not engage in casual pleasantries.

## 9. GOVERNMENT TRANSIENT QUARTERS OCCUPANTS TELEPHONE SERVICE

Current regulations permit official visiting personnel on a military installation to have access to official telephone facilities, to include locations other than duty sites, to conduct official mission-essential business. Visiting personnel are defined as VIPs, officers, senior NCOs and DA government employees on short-term TDY tours. Personnel on TDY to service schools, annual active-duty training (reserve components), etc., are not considered to be in this category. Visiting personnel may obtain service as follows:

- a. From any official telephone (502-799/942/943 number) dial "0" and/ or from an unofficial telephone (942/943 number) dial 624-1181.
- b. Upon response by the operator, advise that you are a visitor authorized official telephone service and desire to place a call.
- c. The telephone operator will request and must be provided with the following information:
  - 1. Name, grade and home organization.
  - 2. Quarters location, to include building and room numbers.
  - 3. Telephone number from which call is being placed.
  - 4. Place and number to be called.

d. When provided with the information at c, above, the operator will place the call. If the call can be made via official government circuits (DSN), it will be made toll free.

#### 10. MINIMIZE

Minimize is a procedure used during periods of crisis or other abnormal periods to reduce volume of record and long-distance voice traffic ordinarily transmitted electrically. When minimize is imposed, subscribers must ensure traffic meets the minimize test outlined in AR 25-1.

#### 11. UNOFFICIAL TELEPHONES

All unofficial telephone service on the installation, formerly Class B service, is provided by AT&T Telephone Company. AT&T questions and concerns should be directed to AT&T at (866) 620-6000.

#### **12. PUBLIC TELEPHONES:**

All public telephones on the installation are owned and operated by commercial telephone companies. Commanders/directors having questions concerning public telephone locations should direct their questions to AAFES, (502) 942-4218.

## INSTRUCTIONS FOR PREPARING DA FORM 3938

All telephone work other than trouble requires a TCO Telephone Service Request submission via URL https://tms.knox.army.mil. However, under Emergency conditions (Data Network Outage), a DA Form 3938 may be submitted for Emergency Requests. Use this outline to aid in filling out the form. Instruction numbers are keyed to blocks on attached form (SEE NEXT PAGE). Plan your needs and allow as much lead time as possible. *SEE REMARKS* 

- Send to: NEC, ATTN: ATZK-IMR-L. Forms may be procured through NEC publications or an automated form may be used. Forms may be typed or printed and forwarded in one copy.
- List name and phone number of person with exact knowledge of location and work requested.
- 3. Install: If request is for a new main line, put 1 in main line block. (Always 1 as there can be only one main line on any number.) If you want additional extensions of a new line, put the amount needed in the extension block (the two totaled should equal the total number of instruments you need). Need additional extensions of existing number? Put the number needed in the extension block and the telephone number in the lower block. If multiline phone, list all numbers to be installed on the instrument.
- 4. Remove: Means complete removal of a telephone line/instrument. Care should be taken to let us know if complete telephone number is to be taken out or just extension(s). A 1 by main line will result in removal of number completely, but a 1 by extension means just an extension will be removed. If you want to remove a number from a multiline instrument but leave the number in service elsewhere, indicate appearance after the 1. List telephone number you wish removed in lower block. If removing a multiline instrument, list all numbers on phone.
- Move: A move can be inside or outside of a building. Tell us if it's a main line or extension(s) you want moved. A move will cover removal and reinstallation of phone in this one column. If multiline phone, list all numbers.
- 6. Add any additional information or miscellaneous type of work that does not fit anywhere else. Examples: requests for special features, telephone intercoms, loud bells, change ringer, rewiring, etc. Also include in this column justification for new work, class of services (list

- areas to be accessed), and equipment and systems to be accessed if data request.
- Put building number, room number or location in building and street name. If new install, leave blank.
- Put organization, division, branch and section. If new install, leave blank.
- If new install or move from another building, put building number, location within building and street name. Attach a diagram of location within building.
- This block must be filled in with complete directory listing (major command, division, section, etc). Indicate whether this number is to be published in telephone directory and telephone information switchboard directory.
- 11. Fill in at all times. Three classes of service: A1, A2 and C. Within these classes of service are several configurations designed to meet your needs. List areas to be accessed in Block 7 and justification for all Class A service. (Exceptions: work not pertaining to a telephone line, i.e., bells, intercoms, wiring.)
- 12. Total number of main lines and instruments.
- 13. Date you submit work request.
- 14. Name of person requesting service.
- 15. Signature of information management officer (IMO) or alternate who has been designated on orders by commander/director of organization. Request will be returned if not signed by IMO or alternate.

#### **REMARKS**

Submit one DA Form 3938 for each telephone number to be installed, removed, or moved or each miscellaneous job (exception: if moving a multiline instrument within building, one work request will accomplish this if you list all the numbers on the instrument). If you are moving several phones within a building or to another building, attach a diagram of present and proposed locations. (Coordinate large moves with Administrative Telephone Branch. Every effort will be made to simplify paperwork.)

Requesting a new A or A2 line or an upgrade? Don't forget to justify and list areas to be accessed (Block 7).

A minimum of five duty days lead time is required; however, date service required will be subject to slippage depending on equipment availability and contractor workload.

Priorities will be determined on a case-by-case basis. Large moves, renovations, etc., require prior coordination with NEC, Communications Support Branch, and additional lead time.

Help is available for filling out DA Form 3938, using features available on the telephone switch or technical advice. Call NEC Administrative Telephone Services Branch at 624-2010/7110.

Please remember that the DA Form 3938 is to be used only in emergency situations such as the Data Network is off-line and you cannot access the https://tms.knox.army.mil URL.

### **DEFENSE SWITCHED NETWORK (DSN)**

#### 1. GENERAL

The Defense Switched Network is the principal long haul voice communications command network within the Defense Communications System, providing nonsecure direct-distance dialing service worldwide through a system of government-owned and-leased automatic switching facilities. The purpose of DSN is to handle essential command and control, operations, intelligence, logistical, diplomatic and administrative traffic.

#### 2. PRECEDENCE

The Joint Uniform Telephone Communications Precedence System is directed for use by all authorized users of voice communications facilities of the Department of Defense. Calls placed over the DSN system are subject to preemption due to the precedence system. Subscribers at Fort Knox are limited to routine calls (direct dial) or priority via operator handled.

#### 3. USE OF THE DSN

Authorized for official communications only.

- a. Restricted to:
- b. Only those official calls that are essential, requiring a timeliness that cannot be obtained by other means (mail, message) and would stand a scrutiny afforded a commercial toll call.
  - The minimum time required to accomplish the official business and will not normally exceed five minutes.
  - The use of precedence level in consonance with the subject matter of the call as established in the Joint Communications Precedence System.
  - Voice, data and graphics service transmitted via DSN will not exceed a continuous transmission time of 18 minutes, nor a total transmission time of one hour per day during normal business hours.
  - 4. DSN is not authorized for:
- c. Unofficial activities except as defined in AR 25-1.
  - 1. Calls within an area where other government provided service is adequate, i.e., within a PBX area.
  - 2. Unofficial or personal use.
  - Off-net extension of calls into the commercial system at a distant PBX/PAVX, except when such extension has been previously approved by the local authority controlling the distant switchboard.

#### 4. DSN USER CALLING INSTRUCTIONS

- a. Routine DSN calls:
- b. Verify the DSN number desired.
  - 1. Listen for dial tone.

#### **TELEPHONE USER GUIDE**

This listing is for activities and individuals located on the installation who receive their telephone service from the post telephone system. Any activity desiring additional information or training on system features should contact the Administrative Telephone Section at 624-2010/7110.

#### THE SOUNDS YOU HEAR

Here are a few of the sounds you will hear with this system:

**Single Ring and Pause:** This signals an incoming call from within the post telephone system.

**Double Ring and Pause:** This signals an incoming call from outside the post telephone system.

**Triple Ring and Pause:** This signals a system recall such as a camp-on recall.

**Flash Tone:** This is three short beeps followed by dial tone. You will hear this when you do a hook switch flash. (Hold down the hook switch for one second and release it.)

**Confirmation Tone:** This is two short beeps and signals that a feature has been accessed.

Long Steady Tone When Dialing Off-Post Numbers (Queue Tone): This is a signal that all trunks leaving post are busy.

**Error Tone:** This is a rapid busy tone. If you hear this, hang up and try again.

#### **SYSTEM FEATURES**

#### **Call Hold:**

- · Hook switch flash.
- · Listen for flash tone, dial 102.
- · Listen for flash tone.
- · Set handset on desk.

**Retrieve Call Hold:** Simply hang up. The switch will call you back with your held party-or-hook switch flash.

#### Call Park:

- · Listen for confirmation tone, hang up. Telephone can now be used normally.

Retrieve Call Park From Same Phone: Lift handset, dial 217.

**Speed Dialing:** The switch has the capability of storing up to 30 entries per telephone number, up to 18 digits. You must have Class A service and a touch-tone phone.

#### **Update Individual List:**

- Lift handset, dial in 2500.
- Dial in individual list entry number (2501 through 2530).
- Dial in new directory number, dial in number.
- · You must dial in 2500 for each entry.

#### Access Individual List:

- · Lift handset.
- Dial in entry number (2501 through 2530).

Last Number Redial: Lift handset, dial 105.

Save Number Dialed: During a call:

- · Hook switch flash.
- · Listen for flash tone, dial 106.
- · Listen for confirmation tone.
- Continue conversation.

Dial Number Saved: Lift handset, dial 107.

**Call Forwarding:** Call forwarding allows you three options: You can have all your calls forwarded, you can have them forwarded only if your phone is busy or you can have them forwarded only if they are not answered by the fourth ring. You do this by first telling the switch where you want your calls forwarded to using the update access code. Then you turn it on by using the activate access code. You can do both of these at the same time using the update/activate access code. You cancel call forwarding by using the cancel access code.

#### **TIMELY TELEPHONE TIPS**

#### When you receive a telephone call ...

1. Answer as promptly as possible.

Try to answer before the second ring.

2. Identify yourself when answering

"Mr. Brown's office, Miss Andrews." ... "Personnel, Mason."

3. Speak distinctly and pleasantly

Hold mouthpiece well up in front of lips.

4. Avoid trite or abrupt phrases

"Who's calling?" ... "Just a moment." ... "He's busy."
"He's in a conference." ... "He's tied up." ... "He isn't in."

5. Volunteer the "whereabouts and when abouts" of an absent person

"He can be reached in Mr. Jones' office ... extension 2-2270.

- "He is out of the building until 3 o'clock."
- "May I locate him and ask him to call you?"
- 6. Volunteer your own assistance

"Is there anything I could do?"
"Could I help you?" ... "or anyone else?"

- 7. Request identity of caller only when necessary and in a tactful manner "May I have your name?" ... "May I ask who this is, please?"
- 8. Explain off-the-line delays

"It's in the files ... Can you wait a moment?

9. Take a message willingly

Write essential details on a suitable message form; deliver promptly.

10. Transfer elsewhere only when you know definitely the correct person or number

Give caller facts before transferring.

#### When you make a telephone call ...

1. Plan an effective conversation

Get your thoughts in order before calling.

2. Place the call yourself, except in special circumstances

Make sure you are on the line ready to talk when the called person is reached.

3. Have the correct number (or extension) in mind

Consult your directory or personal number list.

- 4. Listen to the dial tone ... dial carefully
- 5. Identify yourself immediately to the first person answering the called telephone

"This is Mr. Johnson. May I speak to Mr. Hodges, please?"

6. Identify also, when helpful, your office and purpose in calling

"Mr. Brown, in Accounts, returning Mr. Green's call."

- 7. Ask whether called person has "time to talk now" if call is likely to be lengthy
- 8. Try to complete your business on one call by securing information or leaving a message
- 9. Volunteer your extension and the best time to reach you in case you request a callback
- 10. Keep your conversation brief and businesslike
