LYING IN THE SOUTHEAST corner of Albuquerque, New Mexico, Kirtland Air Force Base is adjacent to Albuquerque International Sunport, the largest airport in the state. The military base and the international airport share the same runways, making the airport a joint civil-military facility. Albuquerque is the most populous city in New Mexico and almost in the center of the state at the crossroads of major Southwest highways and interstates. Interstate 40 bisects the city west and east; I-25 is the major north-south corridor. In driving terms, Albuquerque is 790 miles east of Los Angeles on I-40; 644 miles northwest of Dallas by way of I-40 and U.S. 287; 1,006 miles west of Memphis, Tennessee, on I-40; 1,335 miles southwest of Chicago on I-40 and I-44; and 541 miles west of Oklahoma City on I-40.

Kirtland Air Force Base and its mission partners employ more than 22,000 people, including active-duty, civilians, Air National Guard and Reserve personnel, among them nearly 1,902 active-duty military and civilians with the Air Force Global Strike Command. Sandia National Labs, a tenant organization at Kirtland, employs

about half the workers on base. The base supports nearly 14,000 military retirees who live in central and northern New Mexico.

The base covers 51,585 acres with 750 miles of roads, 772 buildings, five fire stations, eight installation entry gates and four runways.

Kirtland Air Force Base, which began as an Army Air Corps training field, became Kirtland Army Air Field in 1942. In 1971, Kirtland merged with Manzano and Sandia bases, its neighbors to the east, creating a sprawling military complex known as Kirtland Air Force Base - the thirdlargest installation in the Air Force Global Strike Command and the sixth-largest Air Force base.

Today, the base is home to the Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center, part of the Air Force Materiel Command, and the 377th Air Base Wing, Kirtland's host organization, which supports more than 30 major mission partners. The 377th Air Base Wing, which reports to Air Force Global Strike Command, works in conjunction with the 58th Special Operations Wing under the Air Education and Training Command, the 150th Special Operations Wing (New Mexico Air National Guard) under the Air Combat Command and the 351st Battlefield Airmen Training Squadron, a pararescue training unit to ensure readiness of airmen worldwide.

Kirtland also hosts the Air Force Research Laboratory's Space Vehicles and Directed Energy directorates, the Defense Threat Reduction Agency and the U.S. Department of Energy's Albuquerque Operations Office.

Economic Impact

The annual local economic impact of Kirtland AFB averages more than \$6.7 billion due to Department of Defense payroll, expenditures and job creation, according to its 2018 Economic Impact Statement, its most recent. About \$4.1 billion of the total economic impact is local. The base has an annual payroll of \$2.2 billion. Employment associated with Kirtland represents one of every 14 jobs in New Mexico.

HISTORY

Kirtland Air Force Base began as an Army Air Corps training field near Albuquerque. With Continued on page 6

- Never post confidential personal information such as your date of birth, address, Social Security number, or bank and credit card account numbers. Never provide this type of information when signing up for a social networking site. Most sites do not require it, and you should be wary of those that do.
- Don't invite people whom you do not know to be your "friend." You do not want strangers to know details about you or your family.
- Never share operational information, such as upcoming ports of call and military exercises. Such information can compromise operational security and the safety of our service members.

World War II on the horizon, construction of an Army Air Base began in January 1941, and by summer the first major occupants of the new base began to arrive.

First designated Albuquerque Army Air Base, the new base became Kirtland Army Air Field in 1942 in honor of pioneer Army aviator Col. Roy C. Kirtland, who was instrumental in the forming of the Army's aviation service. Kirtland died in May 1941 after his recall to active duty.

During World War II, personnel at Kirtland Field trained aircrew members for duty on the Army Air Forces' B-17, B-24 and B-29 bombers, which saw action in all theaters of the war. For most of World War II, the base's major training schools — including bombardier, multi-engine transition and combat crew training — operated at full capacity.

Kirtland Army Air Field was placed on standby basis after the war awaiting a new mission. In 1946, Army Air Forces leadership assigned the base to the Air Materiel Command.

The base's mission after World War II centered on flight test and support activities related to weapons development. Kirtland's role increased in 1947 as the Army Air Forces became the independent U.S. Air Force. Kirtland Army Air Field officially became Kirtland Air Force Base on Jan. 13, 1948. In 1949, Kirtland was named headquarters for a new Air Force major command, the Special Weapons Command. However, the major command status of the organization was short-lived as the Air Force evolved to face the realities of the Cold War.

The command became the Air Force Special Weapons Center in 1952.

During the 1950s and 1960s, Kirtland was also headquarters for regional air defense operations, which covered the southwestern United States. From a control center on Kirtland, Air Defense Command personnel could launch fighters stationed at Kirtland or other regional air bases.

To reduce the management costs of multiple bases near Albuquerque, DOD officials merged the adjacent Sandia and Manzano bases with Kirtland. The Air Force Special Weapons Center took charge of the vastly expanded Kirtland complex and oversaw the base until changes in national priorities led to the center's inactivation in 1976. The Air Force Contract Management Division of Air Force Systems Command, which had moved from Los Angeles, in 1972, became the Kirtland Air Force Base host for a brief period.

In 1977, to fill the void left at the base by inactivation of the Air Force Special Weapons Center, the 1606th Air Base Wing activated as the base host when Military Airlift Command took responsibility for operating Kirtland. Military Airlift Command leadership moved the 1550th Combat Crew Training Wing to Kirtland from Hill Air Force Base, Utah, to be the training center for the command's search and rescue personnel.

Through several reorganizations and reassignment to Air Education and Training Command, today's 58th Special Operations Wing continues the training of specialized combat aircrew members at Kirtland. The expanded Kirtland pararescue training campus continues to produce elite warriors whose skills ensure "that others may live."

After a major reorganization of the U.S. Air Force, the newly formed Air Force Materiel Command took over management of Kirtland AFB on Jan. 1, 1993. Air Force Materiel Command leadership reactivated the combat-decorated 377th Air Base Wing to serve as base host.

Soon thereafter, in summer 1993, the Air Force Inspection Agency and the Air Force



Safety Agency moved their operations to a new complex on Kirtland because their longtime home station, Norton Air Force Base, California, was scheduled to close.

Air Force leadership returned the heritage of the Air Force Special Weapons Center to Kirtland. In 2006, it activated the Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center and its subordinate 498th Nuclear Systems Wing to oversee the Air Force's nuclear acquisition and sustainment mission. The 377th Air Base Wing was reassigned to the Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center to remain the base host.

In December 2014, the Air Force announced plans to realign the 377th Air Base Wing under Air Force Global Strike Command and to restructure the Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center to improve the effectiveness of and support for the Air Force's Nuclear Enterprise.

ORGANIZATIONS 377TH AIR BASE WING

The mission of the 377th Air Base Wing, Kirtland's host organization, is to execute nuclear, readiness and support operations for American air power. Kirtland AFB is a center for research, development and testing of nonconventional weapons, space and missile technology and laser warfare. Some of the organizations involved include the Department of Energy, Sandia National Laboratories, the Air Force Research Laboratory, the Air Force Operational Test and Evaluation Center, the Space and Missile Systems Center, the Air Force Inspection Agency and the Air Force Safety Center.

In addition, the 377th ensures readiness and training of airmen for worldwide duty. It operates the airfield, prepares personnel to deploy worldwide on a moment's notice and keeps the base secure. Players in this mission include the 58th Special Operations Wing, the 150th Special Operations Wing (New Mexico Air National Guard) and the U.S. Air Force Pararescue School.

The 377th is made up of about 1,200 activeduty military, 591 federal civilians and 720 contractors assigned to the Medical Group, Mission Support Group, Security Forces Group, Maintenance Group and 13 wing staff agencies.

As the host organization, the 377th Air Base Wing is also responsible for providing support to base operations. It ensures that people living and working on Kirtland AFB have the necessary support to conduct their jobs and carry out missions. This includes such things as facility maintenance, personnel support, security, utilities and medical care.





AIR FORCE NUCLEAR WEAPONS CENTER

The Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center ensures that the nuclear weapons systems supporting the national command and the Air Force warfighter are safe, secure and reliable. Established in 2006, the Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center (AFNWC) is the Air Force Materiel Command's center of excellence for nuclear weapon systems. The AFNWC's responsibilities include acquisition, modernization and sustainment of nuclear system programs for both the Departments of Defense and Energy.

AIR FORCE RESEARCH LABORATORY

Directed Energy Directorate

The Air Force Research Laboratory (AFRL) Directed Energy Directorate is the Air Force's center of expertise for directed energy and optical technologies. The Directed Energy Directorate develops and transitions technologies in four core technical competencies: lasers systems, high power electromagnetics, weapons modeling and simulation, and directed energy and electro-optics for space superiority. The directorate is at Kirtland Air Force Base.

AFRL pioneered the first and only megawattclass airborne laser and is a world leader in ground-based space imaging, using adaptive optics with a 3.5-meter telescope in New Mexico and a 3.6-meter telescope in Hawaii. The directorate is transitioning game-changing counterelectronics weapon technologies through programs such as CHAMP (Counter-electronics High-powered Advanced Missile Project), which can disable electronic systems with minimum collateral damage.

Space Vehicles Directorate

The Space Vehicles Directorate serves as the Air Force's "Center of Excellence" for space technology research and development. The directorate develops and transitions space technologies to provide space-based capabilities. Primary mission areas include space-based intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance, space situational awareness, space communications, position navigation and timing, and defensive space control (protecting space assets from manmade and natural effects). The directorate also leverages commercial, civil and other government resources to stay one step ahead in space and to ensure America's advantage.

58TH SPECIAL OPERATIONS WING

The 58th Special Operations Wing is an Air Education and Training Command unit that trains mission-ready special operations, combat search and rescue, missile site support and UH-1 helicopter airlift crews. The 58th Special Operations Wing operates two types of helicopters, three specialized versions of the C-130 fourengine turboprop aircraft, and the tilt-rotor CV-22 Osprey aircraft.

The 150th Special Operations Wing of the New Mexico Air National Guard joined the 58th Special Operations Wing, an active Air Force unit, on Dec. 1, 2013, in an associate unit status.



150th Special Operations Wing

The 150th Special Operations Wing's mission is to train mission-ready special operations and combat search and rescue crews through a total force integration with the 58th Special Operations Wing. The wing also includes the 250th Intelligence Squadron, which provides precision Targeting and Geospatial Intelligence to Air Force and Joint Warfighters. The 150th is also responsible for training and equipping more than 900 wing personnel to support both state and federal missions.





Operationally Responsive Space

The mission of Operationally Responsive Space is to plan and prepare for the rapid development of highly responsive space capabilities that enable delivery of timely warfighting effects and, when directed, to develop and support deployment and operations of these capabilities to enhance and assure support to Joint Force Commanders' and other users' needs for on-demand space support, augmentation and reconstitution.

Air Force Safety Center

This agency's mission is to preserve and enhance combat capability through resource preservation for both airmen and equipment through mishap elimination.

Air Force Operational Test & Evaluation Center (AFOTEC)

This center is the Air Force's independent test agency responsible for testing, under operationally realistic conditions, new systems being developed for Air Force and multi-service use. AFOTEC employs more than 600 military and civilian personnel at its headquarters and five detachments, including Kirtland, and multiple operating locations across the country.

705th Combat Training Squadron

This squadron provides high-fidelity theater synthetic battle spaces and world-class exercise control to support joint distributed warfighter training, testing and experimentation across the operational and tactical levels of war.

351st Battlefield Airmen Training Squadron

On June 14, 2016, the Air Force activated the 351st Battlefield Airmen Training Squadron and

deactivated Det. 1, 342nd Training Squadron. The 351st is responsible for training, mentoring and developing battlefield airmen in land warfare and technical recovery skills. It is one of four new squadrons that will report directly to the Battlefield Airmen Training Group, which activated June 2 and trains the Air Force's tactical ground component in technical rescue.

This squadron provides the highest quality pararescuemen and combat rescue officer personnel capable of worldwide deployment for rescue and recovery operations.

Air Force pararescuemen, also known as PJs, are the only DOD specialty specifically trained and equipped to conduct conventional or unconventional rescue and recovery operations. PJs are the force of choice for assisted survivor recovery. A pararescueman's primary function is as a personnel recovery specialist, with emergency medical capabilities in humanitarian and combat environments. They deploy in any available manner, including air-land-sea tactics, into restricted environments to authenticate, extract, treat, stabilize and evacuate injured personnel while acting in an enemy-evading, recovery role. PJs participate in conventional or nonconventional recovery, combat search and rescue, recovery support for NASA and conduct other operations as appropriate.

Their motto, "That Others May Live," reaffirms the pararescueman's commitment to saving lives and self-sacrifice.

Defense Threat Reduction Agency

The agency's mission is to safeguard the United States and its allies from weapons of mass destruction (WMD) by providing capabilities to reduce, eliminate and counter any threat and mitigate its effects. Its focus is to keep such weapons out of the hands of terrorists and other enemies by locking down, monitoring and destroying the weapons and their related materials. It also helps combatant commanders with their plans and responses to WMD events and develops and delivers cutting-edge technologies to assist with all these endeavors.

Sandia National Laboratories

Sandia National Laboratories, covering nearly 3,000 acres on Kirtland Air Force Base, develops technologies to sustain, modernize and protect the country's nuclear arsenal, prevent the spread of weapons of mass destruction, defend against terrorism, protect our national infrastructures, ensure stable energy and water supplies, and provide new capabilities to our armed forces.

SPONSORSHIP

Contact your sponsor with your estimated arrival time and flight information, if applicable, prior to your arrival at Kirtland Air Force Base.

Sponsorship is vital to the relocation process. Don't PCS without talking to your sponsor before departing for Kirtland Air Force Base. Your sponsor will answer any questions you have about the base and the local area, make lodging/dorm arrangements and meet you upon arrival. Your sponsor will be there to help you and your family until you are settled into your new community.

If you have not been in touch with a sponsor and your departure is nearing, contact the commander of your new unit to have a sponsor assigned to you.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS

Cellphone use by the driver of a moving motor vehicle is prohibited on all Department of Defense installations, unless the cellphone is used with a hands-free device.

From Albuquerque International Sunport

If you drive from the airport, you can reach the base via Interstate 40 (east/west), Exit 164 South (Wyoming Boulevard) or via I-25 (north/south) at Exit 222 (Gibson Boulevard). Kirtland has two visitor control gates open 24/7: the Gibson Gate and the Truman Gate. The Wyoming Gate is open from 5:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. weekdays.

If you arrive at Kirtland AFB between 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. on normal duty days, report to your Command Support Section to begin inprocessing. After duty hours or on holidays, your first stop should be the lodging office, on the east side of the installation. Security Forces members at any visitor gate can direct you to the lodging office, which is open 24/7.


Your commander's support staff will schedule your inprocessing. You will need to take all

hand-carried records immediately to the Command Support Section so you can be scheduled for processing, which is conducted in the Consolidated Support Building. If you wish to take permissive temporary duty to hunt for housing after arriving, a leave form must be completed. Up to eight days permissive temporary duty may be approved by the gaining commander after signing in.

The Consolidated Support Building, in Building 20245 at 1451 Fourth St. SE, houses most of the offices you will need to visit upon arrival. The Military Personnel Flight, Financial Management, Travel Office, Pass and Identification, Family Support Center, Red Cross, Customer Service, Department of Motor Vehicles and Housing Office are all here for one-stop assistance.

Newcomers Orientation Event

Team Kirtland Newcomers' Welcome Orientation is conducted at the Mountain View Club. At orientation, you will be greeted by base leadership, meet community representatives and receive all mandatory inprocessing briefings, including medical. The event is required for military members, but spouses and new civilian employees are also encouraged to attend. Attendees must contact the Airman & Family Readiness Center to register by calling 505-846-0741/0751. Attendees will not be able to handle travel vouchers, TMO or 377th Medical Group inprocessing at orientation. For 377th Medical Group inprocessing, report to Public Health from 7 a.m. to noon Monday through Friday; for more information, call 505-846-3397. Before new personnel commit to housing on or off base, they must contact the Housing Management Office at 505-846-8217.

Kirtland Inn Lodging provides safe, comfortable and clean accommodations for students and active-duty military members and their families who are being assigned to Kirtland Air Force Base, as well as retired military personnel traveling in New Mexico. Check-in time is 2 p.m. Check-out time is 11 a.m. The inn accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard and USAF Services Proprietary Cards for payment. Space-available guests must pay in advance regardless of payment method. All lodging facilities are nonsmoking.

Temporary lodging facilities available to personnel on accompanied PCS status include two- or three-bedroom houses with washer/ dryer, cooking facilities, sofa sleeper and a crib and high-chair upon request. Pets are allowed, limited to two pets, for an additional fee. Pet shot records are required at check-in. Check the website for current room rates.

The 377th Medical Group provides primary health care to the 377th Air Base Wing, more

than 100 associate organizations, patients enrolled in TRICARE Prime and assigned to the Kirtland clinic, and temporary duty personnel. The clinic provides primary and specialty care on a space-available basis to other eligible beneficiaries. Its mission is to ensure a fit and medically ready force; to provide trained, current and extractable medics to meet local and global challenges; to build a healthier and safer community through preventive medicine; to provide responsive, costeffective care and service to patients; and to ensure a full spectrum of care with federal and civilian health care providers.

To that end, the wing provides a wealth of medical services, including dentistry, family health, flight medicine, immunizations, lab testing, mental health care, optometry, pediatrics, a pharmacy (including a robotic-assisted BX Satellite Pharmacy that opened in October 2015), physical therapy, radiology, women's health and more. All eligible beneficiaries can call between 6:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday for an appointment.

In January 2016, major construction began on upgrading and renovating about 81,000 square feet of the main clinic. The renovation, which provided updated exam rooms and equipment, was completed in 2018.

Dental services are available to active-duty military only. Family members of active-duty personnel are encouraged to use the TRICARE Dental Program. Welcome

to Bernallilo County

WELCOME TO NEW MEXICO, the Land of Enchantment! In the middle of New Mexico you will find Bernalillo County stretching from just east of the Sandia Mountains to the Volcano Cliffs on the west mesa. Bernalillo County has a population of 679,121 and is home to the city of Albuquerque, the county seat, and Kirtland Air Force Base.

The county offers many historical and cultural attractions, plus modern amenities. In addition to its wide-open landscapes, open skies and peaceful natural settings, there are archeological sites, museums and parks. Outdoor activities abound, including fishing, golfing, whitewater rafting and camping.

There are also shopping, dining and nightlife opportunities for residents to explore: Annual events and festivals celebrate everything from Native Americans to the hot air balloon fiesta that showcases the vibrancy of New Mexico.

HISTORY

Bernalillo County was one of seven partidos established during Mexican rule. In 1852, within

two years of the creation of the New Mexico Territory, Bernalillo became one of that territory's nine original counties. In 1876, it absorbed Santa Ana County. In 1906, years after the Land Revision Act of 1891 provided for the setting aside of forest reserves, the parts of Bernalillo County currently known as Cibola National Forest were established as reserves.

Albuquerque is the largest city in the state. Albuquerque was a farming community and strategically located military outpost along the Camino Real. The town was also the sheepherding center of the West. Spain established a presidio (military garrison) in Albuquerque in 1706. After 1821, Mexico also had a military garrison there.

After the American occupation of New Mexico, Albuquerque had a federal garrison and quartermaster depot, the Post of Albuquerque, from 1846 to 1867. During the Civil War, Albuquerque was occupied in February 1862 by Confederate troops under Gen. Henry Hopkins Sibley. During his retreat from Union troops into Texas, he made a stand on April 8, 1862, at Albuquerque and fought the Battle of Albuquerque against a detachment of Union soldiers commanded by Col. Edward R. S. Canby. This daylong engagement at long range led to few casualties.

When the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad arrived in 1880, it bypassed the plaza in Albuquerque, locating the passenger depot and rail yards about 2 miles east in what quickly became known as New Albuquerque or New Town. Many merchants, mountain men and settlers slowly filtered into Albuquerque creating a major mercantile commercial center which is now downtown Albuquerque. New Albuquerque was incorporated as a town in 1885, with Henry N. Jaffa its first mayor, and it was incorporated as a city in 1891. Old Town remained a separate community until the 1920s when it was absorbed by the city of Albuquerque.

Kirtland Air Force Base's beginnings stem from three private airfields and are similar to that of other installations choosing to adapt existing



runways and hangars for military use. In 1928, Frank G. Speakman and William L. Franklin, two Santa Fe Railroad employees, had inaugurated a private venture for an airport. Working with the town of Albuquerque, they graded two runways on the East Mesa: one approximately 5,300 feet long and the other just under 4,000 feet. Immediately following construction of the airport, other individuals and promoters became interested in Albuquerque as a crossroads location for southwestern air traffic. James G. Oxnard, a New York air transportation promoter, bought Franklin's interest in Albuquerque Airport, expanding the facility toward the end of 1928.

As the decade closed, two airlines initiated competitive passenger, mail and cargo service between the Midwest and California, positioning Albuquerque as an important transcontinental airfield. Shortly after beginning activities, one of the companies, Western Air Express, decided to build its own airport on the West Mesa. This airport became known as Albuquerque Airport while the former Albuquerque Airport on the East Mesa took on the name Oxnard Field, continuing as a private venture.

As of late 1939, Army and Navy pilots began using Oxnard Field for refueling and maintenance during a variety of military flights. Later that same year, the Army Air Corps leased 2,000 acres neighboring Albuquerque Airport, 4 miles west of Oxnard Field. The Army eventually bought the Oxnard Field property, and its subsequent transfer to the federal government restricted the runways to military use only.

Construction of Albuquerque Army Air Base began in January 1941 and was completed in August 1941. The following month, the base received its first military aircraft. On April 1, 1941, a lone B-18 bomber, piloted by Lt. Sid Young, landed on the north-south runway. With the assignment of five pilots to the aircraft, the day marked the official opening of Albuquerque Army Air Base.

The summer of 1941 saw the arrival of the first troop train, loaded with 500 base support personnel, as well as arrival of the 19th Bombardment Group (19th BG) under the command of Lt. Col. Eugene L. Eubank. Business on the new airfield really began to boom with the arrival of 2,195 pilots, bombardiers and navigator trainees for the new B-17 "Flying Fortress." The 19th BG moved out shortly thereafter for duty in the Philippines and South Pacific, where many crewmembers were decorated for bravery. Even in the absence of the 19th BG, activity at Albuquerque Army Air Base increased. Just a week after the attack on Pearl Harbor, the first class of bombardiers began with the establishment of the Army's first wartime advanced flying school.

In February 1942, Albuquerque Army Air Base was renamed Kirtland Army Air Field in honor of Col. Roy C. Kirtland, one of the Army's oldest pioneers in aviation. Col. Kirtland was one of the early Army pilots, receiving Certificate No. 46 from the Federation Aeronautique Internationale in 1941. He also held Expert Aviator License No. 11 from the Aero Club of America. From April to June 1911, he was in charge of the U.S. Aviation School at College Park, Maryland. Since the airfield originally opened, Kirtland's aircraft inventory had grown to 50 AT-11s and 28 B-18s.

The war years at Kirtland continued to be filled with distinguished records of training entire flight crews for the B-17 and B-24 bombers, and the base's three schools advanced flying, bombardier training and the multi-engine school — operated at full capacity. In February 1945, Kirtland Field also engaged in training combat crews for the B-29. This was the "Superfortress" which eventually brought an end to the hostilities with Japan by dropping atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

In February 1946, Kirtland was placed under the Air Materiel Command and its flying training

activities ceased. Its new job entailed flight test activities for the Manhattan Engineering District, the wartime organization that produced the atomic bomb. The new role for Kirtland was to develop proper aircraft modifications for weapons delivery and to determine ballistic characteristics for weapons of the future.

Kirtland's role in testing and evaluating these special weapons increased in 1947, as the U.S. Army Air Forces became the U.S. Air Force. At that time, Kirtland Army Air Field, with a population of 972 military and civilian personnel,



became Kirtland Air Force Base. Most of the weapon proving was conducted on a 46,000-acre tract in the Manzano Mountains, on the southern part of Kirtland AFB, including Forest Service lands withdrawn for testing purposes. Artillery emplacements were set up, observation stations were built, fragmentation areas were prepared and two 248-foot oak towers were erected near the present-day Starfire Optical Range. The establishment of such activities at Kirtland was considered ideal because of its proximity to Los Alamos Laboratory and to Sandia Base, where the Department of Defense had established the Armed Forces Special Weapons Command (AFSWC) to direct military employment of the new weapons to be built.

The story of Kirtland AFB is really the story of three bases, since the merger in 1971 of Kirtland, Manzano and Sandia bases that brought the three installations together under one command. Sandia Base was originally created in 1942 as Albuquerque Air Depot Training Station for aircraft maintenance personnel. By late 1943, however, Sandia was in a caretaker status. Less than two years later, the Manhattan Engineering District created the Armed Forces Special Weapons Project at Sandia Base to coordinate military special weapons activity.

AFSWC also constructed two operational sites. One was known as Site Able, located in the foothills of the Manzano Mountains, just east of Sandia Base. On Feb. 22, 1952, Site Able was renamed Manzano Base and came under operational control of the Air Force.

In December 1949, Kirtland AFB became headquarters for the newly created Special

Weapons Command. The nucleus of this organization was composed of pioneering Air Force agencies that had located here to determine future employment of special weapons. The command became the AFSWC on April 1, 1952, and was a unit of the Air Research and Development Command. The Special Weapons Center assumed management of Air Force Systems Command's test and evaluation facilities at Holloman AFB, near Alamogordo, New Mexico, during the summer of 1970. And, just one year later on July 1, 1971, Kirtland merged with Manzano and Sandia bases, its neighbors to the east, creating a sprawling military complex known as Kirtland Air Force Base - the third-largest installation in Air Force Materiel Command and the sixth-largest in the Air Force.

SAFETY

The Department of Public Safety's mission is to protect human life and property in New Mexico. The department includes the New Mexico State Police, the New Mexico Motor Transportation Police, the Law Enforcement Records Bureau, the Law Enforcement Academy and Special Investigations. This department is also the go-to source for information about and permits for carrying a concealed weapon.

Department of Homeland Security & Emergency Management



The purpose of the Department of Homeland Security & Emergency Management is to help New Mexico residents prepare for emergencies; to mitigate hazards and give help when needed; to prevent attacks; and to coordinate local, state and federal disaster response and recovery. This a primary source of guides for family emergency preparedness.

Bernalillo County

The Bernalillo County Office of Emergency Management/Homeland Security is responsible for protecting the lives and health of county citizens by planning and coordinating actions for disaster preparation, response and recovery. The office manages the Emergency Operations Center, plans and conducts emergency training and serves as a liaison with state and federal emergency agencies. WEATHER AND CLIMATE

Bernalillo County gets 12 inches of rain per year while the U.S. average is 37. The county averages about 17 inches of snowfall, slightly less than the national average of 25 inches of snow per year. The number of days with any measurable precipitation is 64. There are about 278 sunny days per year in Bernalillo County. The July high is around 90 degrees, and the January low is 22.

Local Hazards

Every second counts in a disaster so planning and preparation can be lifesavers.

The New Mexico Department of Homeland Security & Emergency Management provides residents, communities, public safety professionals, businesses and schools with invaluable information and resources for dealing with calamities, from floods to fires to earthquakes, hazardous waste and terrorism, to name just a few. Getting To & Around

Bernalillo County

MOST PEOPLE IN BERNALILLO County opt to drive, and for good reason: New Mexico is home to 25 magnificent scenic byways, totaling over 2,900 miles across a diverse landscape. Route 66 slices across the entire state — from border to border — and before a 1937 realignment, it made a loop to Santa Fe then rejoined the main highway at Albuquerque.

For those flying, there is a major airport right in Albuquerque with numerous air carriers. There is a municipal airport about an hour outside of Albuquerque in Santa Fe, New Mexico.

The county has a reliable public transportation system, and the area is served by Greyhound and Amtrak.



license from their home state, but in general, all New Mexico residents who want to drive must apply for a driver's license once residency is established.

Distracted Driving

The state of New Mexico does not prohibit drivers from making calls on handheld wireless telephones while operating a motor vehicle. However, because localities are allowed to enact their own cellphone laws, making or receiving calls without a hands-free device is illegal in some towns, including: Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Las Cruces, Gallup, Taos and Espanola.

Texting while driving is prohibited in all of New Mexico.

BERNALILLO COUNTY

Bernalillo County is more than 1,160 square miles in the heart of New Mexico. It is the thirdsmallest county in size but the largest in population.

The average elevation in the county is nearly 6,000 feet above sea level. There are about 278 sunny days per year in Bernalillo County, with about 64 days when there is measurable precipitation. Albuquerque

Albuquerque sits about 5 miles northwest of Kirtland Air Force Base. The city's 189.5 square miles are home to more than 560,218 residents, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

Albuquerque was founded in 1706 as the Spanish colonial outpost of Ranchos de Albuquerque. Albuquerque was a farming community and strategically located military outpost along the Camino Real. The town was also the sheep-herding center of the West. The establishment of Kirtland Air Force Base in 1939, Sandia Base in the early 1940s and Sandia National Laboratories in 1949 would make Albuquerque a key player of the Atomic Age. Meanwhile, the city continued to expand outward onto the West Mesa, reaching a population of 201,189 by 1960. In 1990, it was 384,736, and in 2007 it was 518,271. In June 2007, Albuquerque was listed as the sixth fastest-growing city in America by the U.S. Census.

Homes in the area range from well-established neighborhoods to brand-new housing developments. Median rent is \$855, and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,341. Mean travel time to work for those living in Albuquerque is 21.6 minutes.



Edgewood

Edgewood is a small town in Santa Fe County, New Mexico, and is the fastest-growing place in the state of New Mexico. Through annexations, its town boundaries now extend into Bernalillo and Torrance counties. Although in Santa Fe County, Edgewood is geographically closer to Albuquerque and in recent years has become a popular bedroom community for commuters. With a population of about 6,100, Edgewood is primarily made up of families. The town sits on 48.7 square miles and is approximately 30 miles east of Albuquerque and Kirtland Air Force Base.

Median rent in the town is \$1,080, and median monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,367.

Rio Rancho

Rio Rancho is the largest city and economic hub of Sandoval County in the state of New Mexico. A small portion of the city extends into northern Bernalillo County. The city is approximately 20 miles from Kirtland AFB.

The Rio Rancho area was originally part of the Alameda Grant, which was founded by the Spanish in 1710. By the early 20th century, much of the land grant had been sold to land investment companies. Amrep Corporation purchased 55,000 acres in 1961 and turned the land into a housing development called Rio Rancho Estates with the first families moving in the early 1960s. Most of these early residents were New Yorkers, as the developers advertised heavily in New York media. The population grew tenfold between 1970 and 1980, and the city of Rio Rancho was incorporated in 1981.

Today, Rio Rancho is the third-largest and also one of the fastest expanding cities in New Mexico. The U.S. Census estimated that in 2018, Rio Rancho had a population of 98,023. Mean travel time to work for residents of Rio Rancho is 28.4 minutes. Median rent is \$1,106, and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,356.

Tijeras

Tijeras is a village in New Mexico about 15 miles east of Kirtland AFB. In October 2014, Tijeras gained national notoriety for a nearby musical road, a two-lane stretch of Route 66 with grooves in the roadway arranged to cause the sounds of "America the Beautiful" to be heard when vehicles drive on it at 45 mph.

The village of 547 residents sits on 1.2 square miles and is at the junction of Tijeras Canyon, leading to the west, toward Albuquerque, and Cedro Canyon, leading to the south, toward the Manzano Mountains. The cost of living in Tijeras is slightly higher than the state's average, and rentals are scarce. Average rents are around \$1,203 and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,361.

PLANNING YOUR MOVE

BUYING VERSUS RENTING

The decision to buy or rent is the most important step in your relocation process. Purchasing a home entails a long-term financial and emotional commitment with various pluses and minuses. Advantages include the possibility of building equity and the freedom to design and decorate your property or landscape. And don't forget the tax benefits. Disadvantages include upkeep, property taxes and fluctuating property values.

Renting, on the other hand, makes moving easier and someone else maintains the property. Amenities such as laundry rooms, exercise rooms, swimming pools and tennis courts vary from one rental complex to another. The main disadvantage is a loss of control over the residence.

To determine your best choice, account for all of your needs, review your financial situation and research your options thoroughly.

FINDING AN APARTMENT

Be prepared when you meet with the leasing agent, property manager or owner. You will need to provide information and verification about your job, your income and your past rental history.

Use a written checklist with the landlord to document the condition of the rental before you move in, and keep a copy of the completed checklist to use when you move out.

in Bernalillo County

THE MOST POPULOUS COUNTY in the state of New Mexico, Bernalillo County is teeming with business creation potential. The economic landscape in the county is filled with mom-andpop shops, small manufacturers, major institutions and large-scale corporations. Some of the county's major private employers include Sandia National Laboratories, Presbyterian Healthcare Services and Lovelace Sandia Health System, and the major public employers include Albuquerque Public Schools, University of New Mexico and Kirtland Air Force Base. The county is one of the state's fastest-growing counties, with 19 percent growth between 2000 and 2010.

New Mexico was primarily an agricultural state until the 1940s, when military activities assumed major economic importance. Currently, major industries include manufacturing, petroleum and food. Tourism also continues to flourish. New Mexico's economy has an unusually large public sector, accounting for nearly 20 percent of total state product in 2014, compared with the national state average of 12 percent. The

state was relatively unaffected by both the boom of the late 1990s and the bust of 2001.

Albuquerque, located at the crossroads of the state's travel routes, is the largest city in Bernalillo County and in the state of New Mexico. Clear, sunny, dry days; an attractive mountain landscape; and a mostly healthy economy attract new residents from across the country. Not only is the physical climate excellent, but the area also has a favorable tax climate, and the state's fiscal health is among the best in the country. The area is a center for the high-tech industry and especially researchoriented activities, centered on the giant Sandia Laboratories nuclear research facility south of town. There are over 100 mostly small- and medium-size tech-related companies, and the area has experienced some vulnerability to tech industry economic cycles. Bernalillo County has a cost of living that is slightly higher than the nation's average, but the low unemployment rate, shorter commutes and affordable housing make it an ideal place to live.

The state is home to the New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions, a site that contains a wealth of information about the state's workforce development services, employment and training resources, and unemployment insurance program. Kirtland Air Force Base

Kirtland Air Force Base, including its mission partners, is estimated to have an annual economic impact of \$7.6 billion on the local economy, according to the 2018 Kirtland Air Force Base Economic Impact Statement.

PETS

Moves are stressful for everyone — including the family pet. Pets can sense stress and a change in routine can be difficult for them. If possible, keep your pets in a quiet, secure area while movers pack up or unload your belongings. Movers will have your door open while they move boxes and furniture, and a pet may slip out the door undetected. Make sure you keep a collar with an ID tag on your pet at all times. Ensure the tag has your current phone number on it. It is also a good idea to microchip your pets. Remember to keep the microchip's contact information up-to-date. If your pet escapes during any part of your move, you want the animal shelter that scans the chip to be able to contact you.

Your pet may face new outside dangers, like venomous coral snakes and rattlesnakes. Coral snakes have red, yellow and black bands. They are often confused with the milk snake, which is not venomous. A simple rhyme about the two reptile's coloring can help you tell the difference: "If red touches yellow, it can kill a fellow, but if red touches black, venom it lacks." Rattlesnakes are generally 2.5 to 4.5 feet long, have triangular-shaped heads and rattle if they feel threatened. So, keep your dog on a short leash outside, and stick to walking in cleared areas.

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Education & Academics

in Bernalillo County

FOR THOSE MOVING TO a new location, it's important to know what educational options are available. This chapter outlines the public schools system in Bernalillo County, along with information about local libraries and higher education. There are private schools, charter schools and home schooling available to children in the county as well.

To be enrolled in a New Mexico school, a child must be at least 5 years old by Sept. 1 of the school year. Those wishing to register their child in school should bring the following to the school office: a birth certificate or other proof of the child's age, the child's previous school records and immunizations records. Check with the school for additional requirements. For details on New Mexico's minimum vaccine requirements for students in grades K-12, visit the New Mexico Department of Health's website at *http://nmhealth.org/about/phd/idb/imp/sreq.*

In 2010, New Mexico, along with 42 other states, the District of Columbia, Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, the U.S. Virgin Islands and the Department of Defense Education Activity adopted Common Core State Standards that provide a consistent set of educational expectations for students, regardless of ZIP code. When a family moves, a student's education is often disrupted because the student may be forced to repeat material or learn at a different level at the new school. With common standards across states, this disruption will be reduced — of particular interest to military families. At present, national Common Core State Standards exist only for English language arts and mathematics, with science and social studies in development, though New Mexico has state standards across the full curriculum. Choosing a School

Choosing the right school is very important, so be sure to research each one before deciding. Contact the school by phone or by visiting its website, which is a valuable source to learn about a school district's statistics and curriculum.

If the school shows promise, schedule a visit and bring a list of written questions about

student-teacher ratios, computer availability, extracurricular activities, sports programs, music programs, gifted programs and grading standards.

Discuss the potential school with your child: what they liked and what they didn't like. Your family's ability to readily adapt to a move and to find happiness in your new home may depend, in part, on how happy your children are in their new school.

CHARTER SCHOOLS

Charter schools are public schools of choice that are tuition-free, serve all students and have open enrollment.
