Our Military

at Naval Base Kitsap

NAVAL BASE KITSAP TOOK its present name and form when installations at Bremerton, Bangor, Keyport, Manchester and Jackson Park in Kitsap County were consolidated into a single entity June 4, 2004. Located on the lush Kitsap Peninsula in Washington state, the base encompasses more than 10,000 acres, supporting nearly 70 tenant commands. It is the largest naval installation in the Northwest and is the third-largest in the United States. The base serves as the host command for the Navy's fleet throughout the Pacific Northwest, providing installation services, programs and facilities to meet the needs of its hosted war-fighting commands, tenant activities and personnel.

Flag commands at Naval Base Kitsap include Commander, Navy Region Northwest; Commander, Submarine Group 9; and the John C. Stennis Strike Group. Other large commands and organizations include the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard and Intermediate Maintenance Facility; Naval Undersea Warfare Center Division Keyport; Naval Facilities Engineering Command Northwest; Naval Supply Systems Command, Fleet Logistics Center Puget Sound; Naval Hospital Bremerton; Strategic Weapons Facility Pacific; and the Marine Corps Security Force Battalion. Two aircraft carriers are homeported at Naval Base Kitsap: USS John C. Stennis (CVN 74) and USS Nimitz (CVN 68).

Population

Approximately 27,000 military and civilian personnel (including contractors) make up the workforce at Naval Base Kitsap and its tenant commands.

HISTORY

Naval Base Kitsap was created in 2004 when the Navy consolidated Naval Station Bremerton and Naval Submarine Base Bangor into one base as part of its resource-optimizing Sea Enterprise Initiative, along with all their associated entities in Bremerton, Bangor, Keyport, Manchester, Jackson Park, Indian Island, the Nanoose Range off Canada's Vancouver Island, and Behm Canal near Ketchikan, Alaska. Though separated geographically, their common purpose is to support U.S. operations and the fleet.

Naval Base Kitsap - Bremerton

In 1891, the Navy bought its first land for a Pacific Northwest shipyard on the Bremerton waterfront from German immigrant and entrepreneur William Bremer along waters sheltered by the Sinclair and Dyes inlets. The area became the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard & Intermediate Maintenance Facility. Originally a repair operation, World War I brought it to the fore as a shipbuilder for vessels from submarines to small boats, and in 1933 it added one of the nation's tallest cranes, the 250-foot Hammerhead Crane No. 28, able to hoist 250 tons, which is still a skyline landmark.

World War II refocused the yard on repairs and upgrades, and in the war's wake, many ships that had seen fierce fighting were mothballed at Bremerton, including the USS Missouri, site of the formal Japanese surrender Sept. 2, 1945. Now a museum ship in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii,

that battleship was Bremerton's main tourist attraction from 1955 to its recommission in 1985. Its place has been taken by the retired destroyer USS Turner Joy, opened to the public in 1992.

Shipbuilding at the facility was discontinued in 1979, and these days the installation, one of four naval shipyards, handles dry dock, overhaul, maintenance and recycling services for nuclear-powered vessels as well as providing surface ship support. It is the Pacific Northwest's largest naval shore facility and one of Washington state's largest industrial installations. In 1998, the Navy made Bremerton a homeport, and today it homeports two aircraft carriers, the USS John C. Stennis and the USS Nimitz.

In 2002, the Navy launched Sea Enterprise (an initiative to establish principles that reward greater effectiveness while eliminating institutional hurdles to innovation), which ultimately led to Naval Base Kitsap's organizational structure as we know it.

Naval Base Kitsap – Bangor

North of Bremerton on the Kitsap Peninsula's west side, fronting the Hood Canal, Naval Base Kitsap – Bangor began as an ammunition depot for munitions headed for World War II's Pacific theater. The Navy bought 7,676 acres there near the town of Bangor for the U.S. Naval Magazine, and the depot shipped conventional weaponry overseas in response to national needs from January 1945 to January 1973, the year naval officials decided to make Bangor the homeport for the first squadron of Trident nuclear-powered

submarines. This included plans for a submarine base; a missile processing facility (the Strategic Weapons Facility Pacific) to on-load, off-load, repair and care for submarines' missile systems; and Trident refit and personnel training facilities. Bangor's new naval submarine base activated Feb. 1, 1977. The Naval Intermediate Maintenance Facility, Pacific Northwest, was established four years later, in 1981, as the primary maintenance facility for the West Coast Trident submarine fleet, a year before the arrival of the USS Ohio, the first Trident based in the Pacific. Since then progressive consolidations with similar Navy operations in Everett and Bremerton, then the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard (2003), have confirmed its command status as the Intermediate Maintenance Facility portion of the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard and Intermediate Maintenance Facility. The IMF concentrates on hull, mechanical, electrical, electronics and weapons systems repairs for submarines.

Manchester Fuel Depot

In 1889, the U.S. War Department bought waterfront land in Manchester to bolster Puget Sound defenses, acreage that was used during World War I to test torpedoes and to stockpile fuel, such as coal and oil. The property was transferred to the Navy in 1919, and 20 years down the road, with World War II looming, the Navy developed it as a West Coast fuel depot, building a long pier for refueling ships (1940). Today, the Manchester Fuel Depot is the largest depot for military fuel in the continental U.S. It meets military and federal needs throughout Washington, Oregon, Idaho, British Columbia and the western

Pacific, though much of its capacity is devoted to fuel for Navy and aircraft carrier jets.

Naval Undersea Warfare Center Keyport

The Navy's only depot for maintaining and repairing torpedoes and undersea mobile targets, the Naval Undersea Warfare Center Keyport has other areas of involvement that include undersea warfare systems, mobile mines and unmanned underwater vehicles. In addition to its local ranges, it has several remote test and evaluation sites in Hawaii, Southern California, Nevada, British Columbia and Guam. The center is about 7 miles east of Naval Base Kitsap – Bangor on Liberty Bay, north of Port Orchard. The U.S. Naval Undersea Museum is next to the warfare center.

The torpedo center has been in Keyport since 1914, when the Navy determined it needed closer maintenance for its Pacific fleet torpedoes than Newport, Rhode Island, the Navy's only depot for torpedo testing and repairing at that time.

World War II shifted Keyport's testing and repairs into high speed, and during the war years, as many as 100 torpedoes were tested each day. The Cold War followed that war's end, and Keyport expanded its operations and technology to include the world's first 3D undersea tracking range. By 1966, Keyport was testing nearly every torpedo that the Navy used and extended its operations beyond the Pacific Northwest, even to the Arctic Ocean, where it helped carry out naval undersea tests.

Today, Naval Undersea Warfare Center Keyport's areas of operation embrace land and air as well as water for its array of services and products for the U.S. Navy, other military branches and allied militaries.

Nanoose Range (Canada)

The Naval Undersea Warfare Center Keyport under Naval Base Kitsap and the Canadian military jointly operate Canada's Nanoose Range off the east side of Vancouver Island, British Columbia. The area has been used to test torpedoes, sonar and other equipment for undersea warfare

Southeast Alaska Acoustic Measurement Facility (Ketchikan, Alaska)

Naval Base Kitsap has used its Southeast Alaska Acoustic Measurement Facility in the Behm Canal near Ketchikan since 1992 to determine how noisy its submarines are when they're submerged, both traveling and at rest. Tests determine the sources of any noise and try to reduce or eliminate it to reduce vulnerability and increase stealth. Though submarines are the principal subjects, any vessel can be evaluated. Alaska's Behm Canal was chosen for the operation because the remote fjord has little ambient noise or noise interference.





Naval Magazine Indian Island

As one of the main U.S. Navy munitions handlers, Naval Magazine Indian Island, south of Port Townsend on Washington's Olympic Peninsula, occupies the whole 4.4-square-mile island. The depot supplies armaments to submarines, Military Sealift Command and naval combat ships, and joint and allied forces. The location's name, formerly Naval Weapons Station Seal Beach, Detachment Port Hadlock, was changed to Ammunition Depot Indian Island in April 2000 (later to Naval Magazine Indian Island), and its command was transferred to the Pacific Northwest from a series of commands in the Southwest. It began in 1941 as the Navy's Naval Magazine and Net Depot to store munitions and assemble mines and submarine nets. Today, it provides technical support of ordnance and ordnance-related equipment and processes and logistics management as the only active break-bulk and containerized ordnance transshipment port in support of the joint services of the Pacific Command.

Naval Hospital Bremerton

Bremerton has had a naval hospital almost from the beginning; the first on land began operating out of a small wood-frame building shortly after the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard opened in the 1890s. It soon moved into a brick hospital building on a hillside overlooking the shipyard, with multiple expansions over the years, until its transfer to a new facility in Jackson Park, about 5 miles north of Naval Base Kitsap Bremerton, in 1980. This accredited, community-based acute care and obstetrical hospital has 25 inpatient beds and several ambulatory, acute and specialty clinics, including branch clinics at Bangor, Everett and the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard. The hospital provides care to more than 60,000 eligible military families in the region.

ORGANIZATIONS COMMANDER, NAVY REGION NORTHWEST

Commander, Navy Region Northwest provides consolidated base operations support for Navy activities in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Alaska, Montana, Wyoming, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Minnesota and Iowa. The commander oversees the assigned shore organization and provides facilities and space management, exercise coordination, and support to homeported and transient ships, submarines, and aircraft as well as afloat and ashore tenants, military and family members.

COMMANDER, SUBMARINE GROUP 9

Subordinate to Commander, Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet, Submarine Group 9 has administrative control over assigned submarine commands and units in the Pacific Northwest. The group commander monitors shipboard training, personnel, supply and material readiness of ballistic missile submarines and their crews. The commander is also responsible for nuclear submarines undergoing conversion or overhaul at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton.

JOHN C. STENNIS STRIKE GROUP

The John C. Stennis Strike Group synchronizes the capabilities of multiple ships and squadrons to provide coordinated forward presence around the globe. Its forces, up to 10 ships and 70 aircraft, are mission flexible and ready to engage. From sustained air operations to maritime interdiction, the group projects American power.

USS John C. Stennis

USS John C. Stennis is 4.5 acres of sovereign U.S. territory capable of traveling to the furthest reaches of the globe. Stennis and its crew provide

forward presence and credible deterrence. They conduct sustained air operations, maritime interdiction, counter-piracy operations, humanitarian assistance and disaster relief.

As the John C. Stennis Strike Group flagship, Stennis hosts an embarked air wing and deploys with as many as six ships. The ship is named after Sen. Stennis, a 41-year statesman from Mississippi.

More than 3,000 people live and work aboard the ship.

PUGET SOUND NAVAL SHIPYARD AND INTERMEDIATE MAINTENANCE FACILITY

The mission of the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard and Intermediate Maintenance Facility is to maintain, modernize and retire the Navy's fleet. The Puget Sound Naval Shipyard and Intermediate Maintenance Facility provides the Navy with maintenance, modernization, recycling and support that helps assure U.S. dominance at sea. It has permanent sites in Bremerton, Bangor and Everett, Washington; in San Diego, California; and at Commander, Fleet Activities Yokosuka, Japan. The shipyard in Bremerton is the Pacific Northwest's largest naval shore facility and one of Washington state's largest industrial installations. The Intermediate Maintenance Facility is the largest command at Naval Base Kitsap – Bangor.

NAVAL UNDERSEA WARFARE CENTER DIVISION KEYPORT

The Naval Undersea Warfare Center at Keyport provides technical leadership, engineering expertise and unique facility complexes that serve to ensure sustainment of undersea warfare superiority for the United States. As one of two divisions of the Naval Undersea Warfare Center, Keyport's mission is focused on developing and applying advanced technical capabilities to test, evaluate, field, and maintain undersea warfare systems and related defense assets.

Keyport's primary site is on the Puget Sound, but in order to provide ready support to fleet operational forces at all major Navy homeports in the Pacific, Keyport also maintains detachments in Southern California and Hawaii, an operating site in Guam and an office in Japan.

Keyport's technical complexes are recognized national assets and include more than 2.3 million square feet of specialized technical facilities and nearly 2,000 square nautical miles of undersea ranges. The highly trained and diverse workforce of engineers, scientists, technicians and industrial craftsmen are developing, maintaining and providing technical solutions to meet fleet material and operational readiness needs.



NAVAL FACILITIES ENGINEERING COMMAND NORTHWEST

Naval Facilities Engineering Command Northwest is a complex, multimission, echelon four command reporting to Commander, NAVFAC Atlantic. NAVFAC Northwest has public works departments at Kitsap, Whidbey Island and Everett. The geographic area of responsibility covers 11 states: Washington, Alaska, Idaho, Iowa, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota and Wyoming.

NAVFAC Northwest's diversified programs support planning, design, contracting and construction (including the acquisition and disposal of real estate for the Navy) and assist client activities in the application of specialized programs such as energy, environment and base closures.

NAVAL SUPPLY SYSTEMS COMMAND, FLEET LOGISTICS CENTER PUGET SOUND

Located on the shores of Puget Sound at Naval Base Kitsap – Bremerton, Naval Supply Systems Command, Fleet Logistics Center Puget Sound provides a variety of logistics support services and products to fleet and shore commands of the U.S. Navy and other military commands and governmental agencies in the Pacific Rim. The Navy's regional broker for Commander, Navy Region Northwest, NAVSUP FLC Puget Sound is staffed with 68 Navy personnel and 322 civilian employees. The center delivers combat capability through logistics by teaming with regional partners and customers to provide supply chain management, procurement, contracting and transportation services, technical and customer support, defense fuel products and worldwide movement of personal property.

STRATEGIC WEAPONS FACILITY PACIFIC

Strategic Weapons Facility Pacific provides strategic missile and weapon system support to the fleet and other designated activities. The facility provides the capability of assembly, storage, checkout, onload and offload of missiles; ensures custody, accountability and control of strategic weapons and material; publishes and maintains START procedures and conducts START inspections; and provides technical engineering services for guidance, missile and launcher support equipment.

MARINE CORPS SECURITY FORCE BATTALION

Marine Corps Security Force Battalion Bangor secures strategic assets within the Strategic Weapons Facility Pacific area of responsibility to prevent unauthorized access or loss of control. Additionally, the battalion is prepared to conduct recapture or recovery operations to regain control of compromised strategic assets.

USS NIMITZ

The USS Nimitz is a supercarrier of the U.S. Navy. One of the largest warships in the world, it was laid down, launched and commissioned as CVAN 68 but was later redesignated CVN 68 (nuclear-powered, multimission aircraft carrier) on June 30, 1975, as part of the fleet realignment.

The Nimitz is now the oldest American aircraft carrier in active service. It is named after the great military leader Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz. The ship is part of Carrier Strike Group 11 at Naval Station Everett.

ARRIVAL

See the Getting To & Around Kitsap County chapter on Page 16 for information about local airports, train service and public transportation. The closest commercial flights land at Sea-Tac Airport in Seattle, about 55 miles from Bremerton. The base does not provide transportation, but there is a Bremerton-Kitsap Airporter shuttle serving Sea-Tac, Bremerton and Bangor.

SPONSORSHIP

Sponsorship is vital to the relocation process. Don't PCS without talking to your sponsor before departing for Naval Base Kitsap. Your sponsor will answer any questions you have about the base and the local area, make lodging or dorm arrangements and meet you upon arrival.

If you have not been in touch with a sponsor and your departure is nearing, contact your gaining unit or call the Fleet & Family Support Center at 866-854-0638.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS

For drivers, Naval Base Kitsap is about an hour and a half away from the Sea-Tac Airport because motorists must loop first south, then north. Ferry boat service offers a more direct shot between Seattle, Bainbridge Island and Bremerton. However, ferry traffic is very heavy on summer weekends and holidays; travelers may have to wait for several ferries before being allowed to board. For more information on ferry schedules and fees, visit www.wsdot.wa.gov/ferries.

Cellphone use by the driver of a moving motor vehicle is prohibited on all Department of Defense installations unless the cellphone is used with a hands-free device.

Ferry Routes

The closest ferry to the airport is the Fauntleroy terminal, which can carry passengers and vehicles from Seattle to Southworth. To get to the Fauntleroy terminal from Interstate 5, take Exit 163 to the West Seattle Bridge. Head over the bridge to the community of West Seattle, and continue straight to Fauntleroy Way Southwest. Follow Fauntleroy Way Southwest for about 3 miles to the terminal, just past Lincoln Park. Ferry crossing time is approximately 40 minutes. Once you dock in Southworth, take state Route 16 west and then state Route 3 north. State Route 3 north will carry you to Bangor's Trigger Gate (take the Trigger Avenue exit) and Trident gate (take the exit toward Bangor), as well as Naval Base Kitsap's Keyport gate. To get to the Keyport gate, take state Route 3 north to state Route 308 east. Turn right on McKittrick Road. Make a slight left onto Dowell Road, then turn right on A Street.

The Seattle-Bremerton ferry carries passengers and vehicles from Seattle to Bremerton. To get to the Seattle ferry terminal from Interstate 5, take Exit 164B for Edgar Martinez Drive South. Turn right onto Edgar Martinez Drive





South. Turn right onto First Avenue South/Dave Niehaus Way South. Make a slight left onto Railroad Way South/state Route 519. Continue to follow state Route 519 (under the viaduct). Turn left on Jackson Street to access the terminal. The ferry crossing takes approximately an hour. The main gate to the Naval Base Kitsap - Bremerton/Puget Sound Naval Shipyard complex is on Callow Street, about 3 miles west of the ferry terminal off Burwell Street. The downtown gate for the shipyard is one block from the ferry terminal but is only accessible for official business with prior authorization.

The Seattle-Bainbridge Island ferry docks at Bainbridge Island, but from there you can take state Route 305 north, and then state Route 3 south toward Bremerton. Then take the state Route 308 east exit toward Bangor/Keyport/ Keyport/Naval Base Kitsap.

From Interstate 5

To get to Interstate 5 from Sea-Tac Airport, follow signs for WA-518 E/Interstate 5/Interstate 405.

To get to Naval Base Kitsap - Bremerton, take Interstate 5 (north or south) to Exit 132B to merge onto state Route 16 west (Bremerton). Merge onto state Route 3 north. Use the right two lanes to take Exit 36 onto state Route 304 east (Bremerton). To get to the Missouri Gate and Pass and ID, turn right on Charleston Beach Road West. To get to the Charleston Gate, turn right on Farragut Avenue. To get to the naval gate, continue on state Route 304 east/Charleston Boulevard. Use the far right lane to turn right on Burnwell Street. Then turn right on Naval Avenue.

To get to Naval Base Kitsap - Bangor or Keyport, take Interstate 5 (north or south) to Exit 132B to merge onto state Route 16 west (Bremerton). Merge onto state Route 3 north. To get to the Trigger Gate, take the Trigger Avenue exit. To get to the Trident gate, take the exit toward Bangor.

To get to the Keyport gate, take state Route 308 east (Keyport). Turn right on McKittrick Road. Make a slight left onto Dowell Road. Then turn right on A Street.

Welcome

to Kitsap County

WELCOME TO THE KITSAP Peninsula, home of Kitsap County. Named for Chief Kitsap of the Suquamish Tribe, the county was formed out from parts of Washington state's King and Jefferson counties in 1857. The region connects to the eastern shore of Puget Sound by Washington State Ferries, which run from Bremerton and Bainbridge Island to downtown Seattle. The Tacoma Narrows Bridge links the county to Tacoma to the south, and the Hood Canal Bridge connects the peninsula's northeastern shore to the larger Olympic Peninsula.

Kitsap County, with an estimated population of 269,805 in July 2018, is home to the city of Port Orchard, the county seat, population 13,945. Bremerton is the county's largest city, with a population of 41,235. Other cities in the county include Bainbridge Island, Poulsbo and Kingston and the census-designated place of Silverdale.

The U.S. Navy is the largest employer in the region, and Naval Base Kitsap, which is also home to Naval Hospital Bremerton, is the third-largest naval base in the United States.

The county is rich in cultural attractions as well as modern amenities. With more than 250 miles of saltwater shoreline, the region's network of waterfront nooks offers many peaceful, natural settings. Outdoor activities abound, among them fishing, golfing, camping, boating, cycling and more. The county is also home to many historic military sites, including museums and memorials.

There is also shopping, dining and nightlife opportunities to explore: Annual events and festivals celebrate everything from music by the bay to antique aircraft fly-ins to brew fests to lavender fields and waterways. Whatever the attractions, they showcase the beauty and vibrancy of Kitsap County.

HISTORY

The first residents of the Kitsap Peninsula were Suquamish, Native Americans named after their principal village, Suqua, opposite the north end of Bainbridge Island. They caught salmon, the centerpiece of their economy and culture from the spring to the fall as the fish swam upstream

to spawn. Dried salmon, deer, roots and berries provided food during the winter.

Contact with Europeans in the 1780s brought several epidemics that slashed the native populations from thousands to hundreds. British Capt. George Vancouver arrived at Puget Sound in 1792 during his survey of every inlet and outlet on the West Coast, all the way north to Alaska. It was Vancouver who named several features in Kitsap County, including Port Orchard, Port Gamble, Restoration Point and Hood Canal. In 1841, U.S. Navy Lt. Charles Wilkes and the U.S. Exploring Expedition performed a more detailed survey and left more names including Bainbridge Island, Port Blakely, Agate Point, Apple Tree Point and Port Madison.

The Donation Land Claim Act of 1850 granted 320 acres of land (640 acres to a married couple) to anyone for free if the land was improved and occupied for five years, drawing settlers to the region. In 1855, Washington Territorial Gov. Isaac Stevens persuaded the native tribes to sign the Point No Point and Point Elliott treaties, in which they ceded their lands to the U.S. in exchange

for reservations and fishing and hunting rights. The Suquamish's Port Madison Reservation was 7,811 acres. In 1886, the U.S. government allotted specific plots of land to individual tribal members. As the members sold their allotments to non-natives, more than half the reservation passed out of tribal hands.

When Washington Territory organized in 1853, the Kitsap Peninsula was a part of two counties, King to the east and Jefferson to the west. Of King County's 238 voters at that time, 139 were living on the Kitsap Peninsula, including Bainbridge Island. Local representatives introduced bills to create a new county named after Lt. William Slaughter. Slaughter County was born Jan. 16, 1857, but that same year, popular vote changed the name to Kitsap.

By the 1860s, timber was a big business, and Kitsap County was the richest county per capita in the United States with five of the largest sawmills in almost constant production. Logging was a profitable venture for many pioneers to the area. The waters of Puget Sound played a key role as timber and lumber shipped around the world. Puget Sound made it easy for timber to be felled and rolled downhill toward the water. However, financial hardship arose in the 1870s as the lumber industry faced a series of economic depressions, overabundance being a major cause.

In the 1880s, the United States government chose Port Orchard as the site of a repair facility to help support naval operations in the Pacific Ocean; this began a significant contribution to the county's permanent economy. The Puget Sound Naval Shipyard at Bremerton (1891) was followed by the torpedo-testing station at Keyport (1914), the refueling station at Manchester (1938), the large nuclear submarine base at Bangor (1977) on Hood Canal as well as many smaller supporting facilities.

Thousands of civilian and military personnel moved to the county, particularly during World War II. The Navy presence continued through the Korean and Vietnam conflicts and the Cold War, and in 2005 the shipyard became the county's largest employer, accounting for 54 percent of the economy.

Until World War II, Kitsap County was largely agricultural except for the shipyard and related military activities. Hotels and summer homes served vacationers from Seattle and Tacoma. The Mosquito Fleet of steamers serviced Puget Sound communities and tied Kitsap County to the rest of the state from the 1850s to the 1930s. In the 1930s automobile-carrying diesel ships from San Francisco replaced them, until 1951 when the state of Washington bought the commercial Black Ball Line and took over operation of the ferry system.

In 1942, the U.S. government ordered the removal of persons of Japanese descent, including American citizens, from the U.S. West Coast including 278 residents of Bainbridge Island, most of whom were agricultural workers. After the war, most of the internees returned to the island.

As the economy of Western Washington expanded in the second half of the 20th century, Bainbridge Island became a bedroom community for greater Seattle. Fast and dependable ferry service from Winslow and the Agate Pass bridge made the strawberry farms and second-growth forest prime real estate.

Today, 10 percent of the island population works off island and island residents bring home median incomes half again higher than the rest of the county. In the Bremerton area, the construction of a call center by Nextel Communications in 2001 brought 500 private-sector jobs. It was a feather in the cap of the Kitsap Economic Regional Development Council, which seeks to diversify the local economy.

Kitsap County enjoys warm, dry summers and wet semi-mild winters. In Bremerton, the warmest month is August, with an average high of 75 degrees and an average low of 53 degrees. The coldest month is December, with an average high of 45 degrees and an average low of 35 degrees. Precipitation is heavy in the Mediterranean climate. Most precipitation falls in the winter months, and average yearly rainfall is about 52 inches.

THE SMALL COUNTY OF Kitsap connects to the eastern shore of Puget Sound by Washington State Ferries routes, including the Seattle-Bremerton Ferry, Southworth to West Seattle via Vashon Island, Bainbridge Island to Downtown Seattle, and from Kingston to Edmonds, Washington.

DRIVING AND COMMUTING

Kitsap County is largely surrounded by water, making it accessible almost exclusively via ferries and bridges. The county connects to nearby Jefferson County and the Olympic Peninsula by the Hood Canal Bridge. Once in the area, several highways will take you to the naval base and other parts of the county, including state routes 3, 16 and 104. To reach Kitsap County from Seattle or Edmonds, just hop aboard one of four Washington state ferries or travel across the Tacoma Narrows Bridge located a short distance from the Seattle-Tacoma International Airport.

KITSAP COUNTY

Kitsap County's population is almost 270,000, and it has one of the most temperate climates on the globe. Average temperatures are 73 degrees in the summer and 42 degrees in the winter. Winters are mild, and significant snowfall is rare.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the county has a total area of 566 square miles, of which 395 square miles is land and 171 square miles is water. It is the fourth-smallest county in Washington by land area and third-smallest by total area. Kitsap County boasts the distinction of having the most saltwater coastline of any county in the U.S. with over 250 miles.

Communities in Kitsap County near Naval Base Kitsap include Bainbridge Island, Bremerton, Kingston, Port Orchard, Poulsbo and Silverdale.

Bainbridge Island

The affluent community of Bainbridge Island is appealing to families who desire a nurturing environment and great schools for their children, young professionals and active, retired people. They come for the rural solitude, the community feeling, the excellence in education and the parks and water views.

The population of the city is about 24,800. In 1990, the city of Winslow annexed the entire island into its city limits. By a vote of the residents, the city's name officially changed to the city of Bainbridge Island. Bainbridge Island is the newest city in the state and the only rural city with farms and two former state parks.

Pristine forests and parks abound on the island, and outdoor enthusiasts heavily use bicycle trails, picnic areas and boat launches.



Camping facilities are available. Eagle Harbor offers visitors a passing parade of world-cruising yachts.

Housing prices in the area are much higher than elsewhere in the nation. Median rent is \$1,313, and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$2,498. Mean travel time to work for those living in Bainbridge Island is 42 minutes.

Bremerton

Surrounded by water on three sides and with a view of the Olympic and Cascade mountain ranges, Bremerton, on one of Puget Sound's beautiful protected harbors, has one of the most picturesque settings of any city in the Pacific Northwest. A one-hour ferry ride gets you to Seattle, and Tacoma is only 32 miles south via the Tacoma Narrows Bridge.

With a population of 41,235, Bremerton is the largest city on the Kitsap Peninsula. Bremerton is a Navy town and has been ever since Puget Sound Naval Shipyard began its operations in the 1890s. Military installations play an important part in Bremerton's economy.

Outdoor activities abound in the city. Evergreen Park offers six acres of excellent picnicking and access to the waterfront. Bachman Park furnishes an excellent view of Port Orchard Bay and passing ferry boats. Stephenson Canyon is a heavily wooded natural park on 28 acres with a canyon and a small creek.

Housing options are more affordable in Bremerton as compared with other parts of the Kitsap Peninsula. The median monthly gross rent was \$918, and median selected monthly costs for homeowners with a mortgage were \$1,412, the U.S. Census says. Workers' average commute time was 26 minutes.

Kingston

Kingston is on a bay called Appletree Cove on the northeastern tip of the Kitsap Peninsula.

It's greatest asset is its proximity to the water. It is the western terminus for the ferry that makes a 35-minute crossing to Edmonds, a town on the east side of Puget Sound about 20 minutes north of Seattle.

This little town's population of around 2,100 swells for the Fourth of July celebration, which offers a parade, slug races, the Tiny Town Children's Fair and a spectacular fireworks display.

This residential community is 1.65 square miles with a commute time of around of 52 minutes. Median rent in the town is \$1,057, and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,927.

Port Orchard

Port Orchard, the county seat of Kitsap County with a population of about 14,400, is in the southern portion of Kitsap County on Sinclair Inlet, west of Seattle.

It is approximately 17 miles from Bangor's main gate and a 10-minute ferry ride from Bremerton on a historic passenger ferry. Port Orchard is directly south of the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard. State Highway 16 links Port Orchard to Tacoma on the south and Bremerton on the north.

Port Orchard is known for its popular marina, shops filled with antiques and crafts, art galleries, museums, golf courses (including McCormick Woods, rated "best course" and "most enjoyable course" by Golf Digest and Golf Week) and casual to fine dining restaurants.

Mean travel time to work for residents of Port Orchard is 28 minutes. Median rent is \$1,037, and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,735.

Poulsbo

Only poor handwriting and the interpretation of the postmaster general kept the spelling from actually being "Paulsbo." Originally called "Paul's Bo," meaning Paul's Place, the town of more than 10,900 residents retains a Norwegian flavor. "Velkommen til Poulsbo," the public greeting in Norwegian, is easily translated as a sincere "Welcome to Poulsbo."

Transportation in Poulsbo's early years was by boat, horseback and foot. Major buying and selling was done via boat to Seattle's Pike Place Market. Fishers from the Bering Sea brought their catch of codfish here to one of the largest processing plants in the Northwest for salting and preserving.

A "mosquito fleet" of steamers sailed from Seattle to Poulsbo for some 60 years, carrying passengers and freight. Poulsbo's strong ties to the water are still evident today, with the presence of three marinas on the shores of Liberty Bay.

The downtown waterfront area of Poulsbo was at one time part of Liberty Bay. In the 1950s, the community worked together to fill part of the bay to form Liberty Bay Waterfront Park and Anderson Parkway. Within a span of five generations, Poulsbo changed from a rowboat on an untouched shore to a thriving community with small-town charm.

Median rent is \$1,085, and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,718. Mean travel time to work is 27 minutes.

Silverdale

Silverdale, once a small agricultural community on the muddy shores of Dyes Inlet, has blossomed and now boasts myriad shopping opportunities, recreation and leisure activities, an outstanding school district and residential

Silverdale, in the heart of Kitsap County, experienced its rapid growth partly due to the Navy's decision to build a base for Trident nuclear submarines at Bangor and subsequently by its own economic and geographic attractions. Silverdale's population is now more than 19.000.

The Silverdale/Central Kitsap housing market has seen an abundance of new construction and controlled residential development in recent years. Many homes have water frontage and mountain and marine views. Median rent in Silverdale is \$1,225 and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,659. Mean travel time to work 25 minutes.

PLANNING YOUR MOVE

Relocating to a new home can be one of the most stressful situations in life. Whether moving across town or the nation, preparation and organization make all the difference.

BUYING VERSUS RENTING

Advantages include the possibility of building equity and the freedom to design and decorate your property or landscape. Disadvantages include upkeep, property taxes and fluctuating property values.

Renting, on the other hand, makes moving easier and someone else maintains the property. Amenities such as laundry rooms, exercise rooms, swimming pools and tennis courts vary from one rental complex to another. The main disadvantage is a loss of control over the residence.

To determine your best choice, account for all your needs, review your financial situation and research your options thoroughly.

FINDING AN APARTMENT

Be prepared when you meet with the leasing agent, property manager or owner. Bring a list of what you are looking for in a rental; it is important to be clear about your needs and to get all your questions answered. You will also need to provide information and verification about your job, your income and your past rental history.

Use a written checklist with the landlord to document the condition of the rental before you move in, and keep a copy of the completed checklist to use when you move out.

SITTING IN CENTRAL PUGET Sound, Kitsap County offers all the benefits of the Seattle/ Tacoma market without the gridlock and high prices. After a decline in the job market and a downturn in the local economy from 2006 to 2012, Kitsap County is showing numbers that have rebounded and continue to climb. According to the Kitsap Economic Development Alliance, the county ranks high in essential economic development indicators: educational attainment and skilled workforce; development of intellectual property; per capita economic output; and, median household incomes.

Kitsap County is home to more than one-third of the region's defense workforce, and with a high concentration of skilled engineers and technicians experienced in defense, the county is a desirable location for many large, multi-national defense firms, according to Kitsap Economic Development Alliance's Snapshot of Kitsap Military & Defense Economy. Companies operating in Kitsap County include General Dynamics,

BAE, Lockheed Martin, Raytheon and Northrop

The median age in the county is about 39 years old. Median household income in Kitsap County is \$68,336, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. There is no state income tax in Washington, so the state relies heavily on its 6.5 percent sales tax, one of the highest in the nation.

Travel by Land, Sea and Air

Kitsap County is positioned for robust business growth and innovation.

Seattle-Tacoma International Airport is the primary airport serving the region; it offers commercial passenger and cargo service worldwide and is about 45 miles southeast of Naval Base Kitsap. The naval base is 40 miles west of Seattle and 45 miles northwest of Tacoma. Nearby Seattle is the western terminus of Interstate 90, the major east/west freeway for the northern U.S. that connects to Boston. The Washington State Ferry System is an extension of the state highway system and is the largest of its kind in the world. It transports thousands

of workers from residential communities across the water daily.

The region has multiple deep-water port facilities offering service to destinations worldwide. The ports of Seattle and Tacoma have numerous scheduled liner services. The Port of Tacoma is the sixth-busiest container port in North America and one of the 25 busiest in the world, and it plays an important part in the local economy.

Natural Resources

The development of Seattle and Washington is rooted in the logging industry. California's 1850 gold rush created a demand for lumber and spurred migration to the region. By the 1860s, timber was big business, and Kitsap County was the richest county per capita in the United States with five large sawmills in production. Puget Sound's busy ports shipped timber and lumber all over the world.

Today, economic activity in the county includes a gaming industry with large casinos

on tribal properties, a major medical center and a regional retail hub.

Naval Base Kitsap

Naval Base Kitsap employs more than 33,000 military and civilian personnel in addition to defense contractor operations, making it the largest employer in the county. Naval Base Kitsap and is estimated to have an annual economic impact of \$6.1 billion, according to its latest economic impact statement.

JOB-SEEKER TIPS

Always keep your resume up-to-date and have several versions that target specific industries and highlight your skills that fit their job descriptions.

Compile several reference lists with a good variety of people and former business associates.

Be sure to first ask each if you can use them as references.

Compose a comprehensive, catchy and succinct cover letter of no more than a page (this is no place to ramble). It will introduce you and your desire to work for the company. Have a knowledgeable friend check it for errors; misspelled words and bad grammar hint at carelessness and indifference. Know what the company does, and highlight skills, work experience and education that apply to the position.

Be prepared for an interview at any time. Compose — and rehearse — your one-minute self-promotional speech on who you are, an achievement or two and your strengths. It's not vanity to make a good first impression.

Always follow up with thank-you letters and calls. Even today, a letter, as well as the quickresponse email, will separate you from a surprising number of the other applicants.

Be aware that due to the usually huge numbers of applicants, most companies follow up only with candidates in whom they are interested. Don't take it personally if you are not notified that you did not get the job.

Treat finding a doctor as seriously as looking for a new job or a new home. You want to be comfortable with the person who will see you while you are most vulnerable.

FOR VETERANS

Veterans in Kitsap County are served within Veterans Integrated Service Network 20 — the Northwest Network, with the nearest major medical center in Seattle, about 30 miles from Naval Base Kitsap. VISN 20 serves the states of Alaska, Washington, Oregon, Idaho and one county each in California and Montana. VISN 20's network of health care facilities is composed of eight parent facilities that include two tertiary care hospitals and three other acute care inpatient facilities, 51 additional outpatient clinics and three mobile medical units. Other services include community living centers, domiciliaries and 17 readjustment counseling centers. The closest community outpatient clinic is in Bremerton, Washington.



PETS

Moves are stressful for everyone — including the family pet. Pets can sense stress and a change in routine can be difficult for them. If possible, keep your pets in a quiet, secure area while movers pack up or unload your belongings. Make sure you keep a collar with an ID tag on your pet at all times. Ensure the tag has your current phone number on it. It is also a good idea to microchip your pets. Depending on where you live, your pet may face new outside dangers as human activity increasingly encroaches on wildlife habitat. Wildlife that your pet may encounter include

beavers, coyotes, gophers, raccoons, rodents, skunks, even deer, bears and moose. The best way to avoid wildlife around your home is to limit any behavior that might attract it. Do not leave animal kibble unattended outdoors; raccoons, coyotes and even squirrels that eat pet and people food can lose their fear of humans and may become aggressive. Keep trash in containers with lids that are animal-resistant. In addition to larger animals, smaller pests such as fleas, ticks and spiders can be extremely dangerous as they carry disease to pets and humans. Keep your dog on a short leash in wooded areas, and check for ticks and bites on your animal when you get home.

Education & Academics

in Kitsap County

FINDING THE RIGHT SCHOOLS and educational opportunities for each family member is an important part of any move. This chapter outlines Kitsap County's public schools system, private schools, charter schools and home schooling criteria, as well as local libraries and higher education institutions. To be enrolled in a Washington school, a child must be at least 5 years old by Aug. 1 of the school year. To register your child, bring the following to the school office: a birth certificate or other proof of the child's age, and the child's previous school records and immunization records. For more details on Washington's minimum vaccine requirements for students in grades K-12, visit the Washington State Board of Education's website at www.sbe.wa.gov. Check with the school for additional requirements.

In 2010, Washington, along with the majority of other states, the District of Columbia, Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, the U.S. Virgin Islands and the Department of Defense Education Activity, adopted Common

Core State Standards that provide a consistent set of educational expectations for students regardless of ZIP code. When a family moves, it disrupts a student's education because the student may be forced to repeat material or learn at a different level at the new school. With common standards across states, this disruption will be reduced — of particular interest to military families. At present, national Common Core State Standards exist only for English language arts and mathematics though Washington has state standards across the full curriculum. Choosing a School

Choosing the right school is very important, so be sure to research each one before deciding. Contact the school by phone or by visiting its website, which is a valuable source to learn about a school district's statistics and curriculum. Talk to people in the area, especially friends and colleagues who already live there.

If the school shows promise, schedule a visit and bring a list of written questions about

student-teacher ratios, computer availability, extracurricular activities, sports programs, music programs, gifted programs and grading standards.

Discuss the potential school with your child: what they liked and what they didn't like. Your family's ability to readily adapt to a move and to find happiness in your new home may depend, in part, on how happy your children are in their new school.

CHARTER SCHOOLS


