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

Our Military

at Maxwell Air Force Base

WITHIN MONTGOMERY, THE ALABAMA

state capital, and Alabama's historic River Region, lies Maxwell Air Force Base and Gunter Annex. Known as the Capitol of Dreams, Montgomery's tri-county area is rich in history and combines a small-town atmosphere with big-city features. Montgomery is centrally located just over 80 miles south of Birmingham, the state's largest city, and 162 miles from Atlanta.

Maxwell Air Force Base and Gunter Annex encompass more than 4,100 acres with nearly 50 miles of road.

With its roots in Montgomery, Alabama, Maxwell Air Force Base's history dates to the Wright brothers' flying school of 1910. As the headquarters of Air University, a major component of the Air Education and Training Command, Maxwell Air Force Base is the U.S. Air Force's center for Joint Professional Military Education. The host wing for Maxwell Air Force Base is the 42nd Air Base Wing. The 42nd Air Base Wing, along with its mission partners, provides the foundation for success for Air University, the intellectual and

leadership-development center of the Air Force; the 908th Airlift Wing; Air Force Space Command units; and more than 40 other tenant units.

Gunter Annex is a separate installation under the 42nd Air Base Wing. It is the host of the Business and Enterprise Systems, which manages the operation of combat information systems for the USAF, the DoD and other Federal agencies.

Population

With a population of more than 17,000 activeduty, reserve, civilian and contracted personnel, the Maxwell-Gunter community has a significant economic and cultural impact on the River Region.

Economic Impact

Maxwell Air Force Base and Gunter Annex have a military economic impact of \$2.6 billion annually and interact with local officials across a three-county, 12-city region.

HISTORY

Orville and Wilbur Wright made the first sustained controlled powered airplane flight

Dec. 17, 1903, at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. Seven years after their historic endeavor, Wilbur Wright visited Southern cities for a place to open a temporary civilian flying school. Wilbur Wright eventually visited Montgomery, Alabama, where he met with a group of businessmen. In exchange for establishing a flying school in the Montgomery area, these businessmen offered Wright an old cotton plantation owned by Frank D. Kohn. In 1910, Wilbur Wright opened one of the world's earliest flying schools at the site that would later become Maxwell Air Force Base. The school lasted only a few months — training a handful of pilots — before this brief but significant chapter in aviation history came to an end; flying activities in Montgomery ceased for nearly eight years.

During World War I, the Army established aviation repair depots to ensure the flying fields were stocked with enough planes and engines for uninterrupted training. In April 1918, local

business leaders leased 302 acres of land and a portion of the Kohn plantation to the U.S. government for use as an aviation repair depot where military planes were maintained and overhauled. Known as Wright Field, this was the same site used by the Wrights in 1910.

On Nov. 8, 1922, the War Department redesignated the depot as Maxwell Field in honor of 2nd Lt. William C. Maxwell. Maxwell died Aug. 12, 1920, in the Philippines when his DH-4 aircraft struck a flagpole after he had swerved to avoid striking a group of children at play.

Construction began in 1918 when the James Alexander Construction Co. of Memphis, Tennessee, started to erect 52 temporary wooden buildings and lay down 3 miles of roads. Repair activity at the depot was sharply curtailed at the end of World War I, and the government purchased the depot site in 1920.

The 22nd Squadron (later Observation) moved to Montgomery in 1921. It was the first major operational unit stationed at the field and carried out the depot's first official flying mission. The squadron dominated flying activities at Maxwell Field for the next 10 years.

This was the first time that food and supplies had been airdropped by U.S. military forces during a major civilian emergency.

In 1928, the War Department announced that the Air Corps Tactical School would move from Langley Field to Maxwell, where the weather was more conducive to aerial demonstrations. Personnel strength at the field grew quickly from 210 in spring 1931 to nearly 2,000 by September. In 1940, Gen. Henry H. Arnold announced that the installation would be converted into a pilot training center. A few months later, the War Department created the Southeast Air Corps Training Center, based at Maxwell Field, to manage the growing number of flying schools in the eastern United States.

Three years later, on Aug. 23, 1943, the War Department redesignated the center as the Army Air Forces Eastern Flying Training Command. During the next five years, Maxwell was home to six schools that trained U.S. military aviators and their support teams for wartime service. These schools graduated more than 100,000 aviation cadets during World War II.

In 1941, a new phase in military aviation training began at Maxwell when the Air Corps Replacement Center opened at the field. The center provided candidates for pilot, bombardier and navigator training with classification and preflight instruction. In mid-1942, the center became a preflight school for pilots. As World War II progressed, and the number of required pilot trainees declined, preflight training was centralized in San Antonio, Texas. The preflight school at Maxwell Field closed in December 1944.

In 1943, the Army Air Forces opened a specialized four-engine pilot school. The first B-24 Liberator landed at Maxwell Field that month, and training began. In 1945, Maxwell saw B-29 transition training at peak production, with a class graduating every two and a half weeks.

When the program ended in the fall, 728 B-29 crews had flown 46,550 hours and 112,809 sorties at Maxwell — all without a major accident.

Besides its flying training mission, Maxwell had been the home of the Air Corps Tactical School since 1931, but that changed in the early part of World War II when the wartime need for officers proved too great to permit the continuation of academic pursuits. The school closed June 30, 1940. Later, to fill the void left by the school, the War Department established the Army Air Forces School of Applied Tactics at Orlando, Florida.

In June 1945, the school was redesignated as the Army Air Forces School. It continued to operate in Orlando until November 1945, when it moved to Maxwell Field and became a major command. Then, on March 12, 1946, it was redesignated as Air University. Throughout its history, the Air University has developed future leaders of the U.S. Air Force. It continues that tradition today as a major component of Air Education and Training Command. In early 2018, Maxwell Air Force Base celebrated its 100 years of history.

ORGANIZATIONS 42ND AIR BASE WING

As the host unit for Maxwell Air Force Base and Gunter Annex, the 42nd Air Base Wing's mission is crucial to national security. The wing ensures that airmen are ready to deploy in support of U.S. military operations worldwide and takes a proactive approach to promoting their professional and personal growth. The wing is also responsible for the safety and security of the base, which it accomplishes through force protection, maintaining and modernizing facilities and infrastructure, and seeking efficient new ways of conducting operations.

908TH AIRLIFT WING

The 908th Airlift Wing is Alabama's only Air Force Reserve unit. The wing contributes to national defense by providing airlift and related services through the dedicated efforts of more than 1,200 reservists and eight C-130 Hercules aircraft. Unit reservists fly about 1 million miles annually, engaging in training operations and supporting real-world missions.

AIR UNIVERSITY

Air University, established in 1946, continues the proud tradition of educating tomorrow's planners and leaders in air, space, and cyber power for all branches of the U.S. armed forces, federal government civilians and international organizations. Today, Air University's reach spans not only the globe but the careers of every Air Force member.





The Air University is composed of several schools and organizations, including the Air Command and Staff College, the Air War College, the International Officer School and the Squadron Officer College.

Air Command and Staff College

ACSC traces its roots to the Air Corps Tactical School (ACTS) located at Maxwell Field from 1931 to 1942. In 1962, the school became known by its current name, Air Command and Staff College. The present 10-month curriculum focuses on expanding understanding of air and space power and on the growth of midcareer officers through seminar-centered, active environment with an integrated curriculum geared to problem solving across the continuum from peace to war. ACSC's curriculum now aligns under the Air University commander's Strategic Guidance for the Continuum of Education.

Air War College

The War Department established the Air War College (AWC) in 1946 at what was called Maxwell Field, Alabama - now it is Maxwell Air force Base. The AWC resident program class membership includes officers from every US military service, civilian employees of federal government agencies, and officers from the international community. As the senior Air force professional military education program, AWC educates about 245 students annually. The AWC online program is offered as part of the eGraduate School at Air University.

Curtis E. LeMay Center for Doctrine Development and Education

The Curtis E. LeMay Center is named in honor of the fifth chief of staff of the Air Force. The center is where Air Force doctrine is developed, advocated in exercises and wargames, represented in Joint and Multinational doctrine and deployed to Airmen through a multifaceted outreach program. Its aims to create and sustain an Air Force doctrine culture that best serves our nation.

International Officer School

The International Officer School (IOS) is the lead-up course to prepare all international officers for attending Air War College (AWC), Air Command and Staff College (ACSC), and Squadron Officer College (SOS). Since 1954 over 11,000 international military students (IMS) from 143 countries have graduated from IOS preparatory courses. The courses are seven weeks in duration and predominately focus on refinement of communication skills by familiarizing participants with common terminology and stressing the military context the students require for success in their advanced coursework.

Ira C. Eaker Center for Professional Development

Named in honor of Gen. Ira C. Eaker to recognize his significant contributions to the Air Force and the continuing professional development of its members, the center supports the U.S. Air Force mission by providing world-class, multidiscipline technical training and professional continuing education to U.S. Air Force, international and other DOD personnel. The center is composed of four schools: the Commanders' Professional Development School, the Defense Financial Management and Comptroller School, the Air Force Personnel Professional Development School and the U.S. Air Force Chaplain Corps College.

Jeanne M. Holm Center for Officer Accessions and Citizen Development

The Jeanne M. Holm Center, named in honor of the first woman in the Air Force to be appointed to the grade of brigadier general, manages and provides coordinated leadership and policy direction for the Air Force's officer recruiting, training and commissioning programs at the Officer Training School and at Air

Force ROTC detachments. About 80 percent of the officers who enter the Air Force each year come through one of these two programs. The center's staff manages and develops curricula to train Air Force officers and directs the Air Force's high school citizenship training program and Air Force Junior ROTC.

Squadron Officer School

The Squadron Officer School (SOS) in-residence program is a 6.5 week educational experience for USAF captains. The purpose of the program is to help develop solution-minded, bold and courageous Airmen ready to overcome today's and tomorrow's challenges.

Thomas N. Barnes Center for Enlisted Education

Named in honor of the fourth chief master sergeant of the Air Force, the Thomas N. Barnes Center discharges Air University's responsibility for the education of enlisted leaders throughout the Air Force. Since its inception in 2008, the center has been refining, adapting and deploying professional military education curricula for enlisted education in the Air Force.

TENANT ORGANIZATIONS

Air Force Life Cycle Management Center

The Air Force Life Cycle Management Center is responsible for the life-cycle management of the Air Force's information technology systems.

Defense Information Systems Agency

The Defense Information Systems Agency is a combat support agency of the DOD. It supports the joint warfighter, national leaders and other mission partners by providing, operating and assuring command and control, information-sharing capabilities and a globally accessible enterprise information infrastructure.

Air Force Center for Unconventional Weapons Studies

The Air Force Center for Unconventional Weapons Studies seeks to integrate education, research and critical thinking on unconventional weapons policies and operational practices.

Air Force Culture and Language Center

The Air Force Culture and Language Center improves the Air Force's cross-cultural competence by creating and executing language, region and culture learning programs for airmen.

Air Force Historical Research Agency

The Air Force Historical Research Agency is the repository of Air Force historical documents. The agency has more than 70 million pages devoted to Air Force history, including the world's largest organized collection of U.S. military aviation documents.

Air Force Judge Advocate General's School

The Judge Advocate General's School provides the highest quality education and training to judge advocates, civilian attorneys and paralegals to meet Air Force and Department of Defense requirements.

Air Force Negotiation Center of Excellence

The Negotiation Center of Excellence provides education relating to adaptive conflict management, negotiation and mediation skills.

Air Force Center for Strategic Leadership Communication

The Public Affairs Center of Excellence provides public affairs-related education and training for officer and enlisted military personnel. The center teaches joint leaders how to craft and deliver effective messages in a global information environment.

ARRIVAL

SPONSORSHIP

Contact your sponsor with your estimated arrival time and flight information if applicable before your arrival at Maxwell Air Force Base.

Sponsorship is vital to the relocation process. Don't PCS without talking to your sponsor before departing for Maxwell Air Force Base. Your sponsor will answer any questions you have about the base and the local area, make lodging or dorm arrangements and meet you upon arrival. Your sponsor will be there to help you and your family until you are settled into your new community.

If you have not been in touch with a sponsor and your departure is nearing, contact your gaining unit, or call the Airman & Family Readiness Center at 334-953-2353. If you need immediate assistance and your unit is not reachable, call the command post at 334-953-7474.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS

Cellphone use by the driver of a moving motor vehicle is prohibited on all Department of Defense installations unless the cellphone is used with a hands-free device.

Maxwell is in the northwest corner of Montgomery. Exits from Interstate 85 and Interstate 65 leading to the base are marked.

Driving from the East

If you are driving to Montgomery from the east, take Interstate 85 south; follow signs for and merge onto Day Street. This leads directly to the Day Street gate at Maxwell.

Driving from the North

Traveling from the north, take Interstate 65 South into Montgomery. Take the Day Street exit (Exit 171), which will lead to the front gate on the right.

Driving from the South

From the south, take Interstate 65 North to the Herron Street exit (Exit 172) and turn left at the third light onto Maxwell Boulevard. The gate will be on the right.

Driving to Gunter Annex

Gunter Annex is in the northeast corner of the city and can be reached from Interstate 65 South or North. Take the Northern Boulevard exit and then the Gunter exit to Congressman Dickenson Drive. Gunter Annex is on the left.

Driving from the Airport to Maxwell Air Force Base

If you are arriving from Montgomery Regional Airport, take a right onto Highway 80 and follow the signs to Interstate 65 North. Take the Herron Street exit and turn left at the third light onto Maxwell Boulevard. The gate will be on the right.

Driving from the Airport to Gunter Annex

To get to Gunter from Montgomery Regional Airport, take Interstate 65 North, then the Northern Boulevard exit. Take the



Gunter exit to Congressman Dickenson Drive. Gunter Annex is on the left.

CHECK-IN PROCEDURES

All incoming military members arriving during duty hours should report to their respective units or schools. If you arrive after hours, check in with lodging until your commander's support staff is available the next duty day. Directions can be obtained from security police on duty at the gates.

Inprocessing for Air University students is handled by the respective schools. Inprocessing for permanent party personnel reporting to both Maxwell and Gunter is conducted by the unit commander's support staff. Please bring all hand-carried documents given to you during your outprocessing briefing from your losing base (e.g., medical records, personnel records and finance records). Your commander's support staff will schedule your central inprocessing to complete Personnel Records screening, travel vouchers and military pay matters. Your commander's support staff will schedule your Right Start inprocessing during unit inprocessing.

ALABAMA'S STATE CAPITAL LIES in Montgomery County, which encompasses more than 780 square miles in the southeast portion of Central Alabama, about 100 miles south of Birmingham in the River Region. The capital city of Montgomery is second only to Birmingham in size, with a population of nearly 200,000, according to the U.S. Census. The county's population is approximately 226,000.

Montgomery County is known for its rich past. Civil rights movement sites such as the Dexter Avenue King Memorial Church and cultural landmarks like the Hank Williams Memorial are all within the historic county. Anyone interested in its history can visit the Montgomery Area Chamber of Commerce Convention and Visitor Bureau's website, which has information on the county's many historical markers.

The county has many attractions and cultural and fine arts opportunities. In addition to numerous recreational pursuits, there are museums, theaters and a zoo as well as

shopping, dining and nightlife opportunities to explore. Annual events and festivals celebrate everything from Alabama's wine and beer to its music and art.

HISTORY

Montgomery was originally the site of two Indian towns, Ikanatchati and Towasa, where the ancestors of the Alibamu Indians lived. Though Spanish explorers passed through the area in 1540, the first white settlement was by Scottish trader James McQueen in 1716.

A trading post was established in 1785, and Alabama Town was founded in the 1800s. That town was abandoned for a new town of East Alabama. Another group of settlers had built a settlement they dubbed Philadelphia, and a rivalry grew as both settlements worked to make their towns grow and flourish. In 1819, the towns merged to become Montgomery, named in honor of Gen. Richard Montgomery, a Revolutionary War hero. Alabama was admitted as a state in the Union just 11 days later.

In 1834 the Montgomery Railroad Co. was established and a rail route built through the town, linking it to New York City and New Orleans and bringing the population to more than 2,000. The state capital was moved to Montgomery from Tuscaloosa in 1846.

With the Civil War came strong anti-Northern sentiment and secession. Alabama was a slave-based economy, and white plantation owners did not want to lose this important part of their socioeconomic structure. Representatives of six states gathered in Montgomery and chose it as the capital of the Confederate States of America. The capital was eventually moved to Virginia, but dedication to the Confederate cause remained strong in Montgomery, even after Union Gen. James Wilson took it back in 1865.

Despite a slow recovery after the Civil War, the town stood at more than 16,000 people by 1880, due in part to continued railroad expansion. Industrialists began to make their way there, further increasing commerce and the

population. By the 1940s, Montgomery had almost 78,000 residents.

Montgomery was the site of landmark civil rights events such as the Montgomery Bus Boycott, the Freedom Ride of 1961 and the Selmato-Montgomery marches. Rosa Parks' famous refusal to give up her seat on a public bus occurred in Montgomery, and the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. founded the Montgomery Improvement Association there, organizing the Montgomery Bus Boycott. This led to a court ruling that Montgomery's racial segregation on buses was unconstitutional, and the system was abolished. In 1965, King led 25,000 demonstrators on a march from Selma to Montgomery, seeking voting rights for African-Americans and leading to the signing of the Voting Rights Act, a major accomplishment for civil rights advocates.

By the late 1990s new construction and changes at Maxwell Air Force Base brought even more economic progress. Modern Montgomery enjoys continued growth and development with a rebuilding of its downtown and a new influx of tourists exploring the area's rich history.

WEATHER AND CLIMATE

The climate in Alabama tends to be warm and humid. This, with its proximity to the Gulf of Mexico, can mean weather patterns that include heavy rains, tornadoes and hurricanes. Alabama has both spring and fall tornado seasons, with the two most common areas of activity being Birmingham and Mobile. Hurricanes striking the coast commonly produce tornadoes, which make their way across the state. Montgomery sits more inland, reducing the danger somewhat, but it can still have turbulent weather.

Montgomery winters are brief and mild, spring is warm and summers are long, hot and humid. The average low in January is 36 degrees, and the average high is 59, with rare freezing temperatures or snow. The average low in July is 71 degrees, and the average high is 93 degrees. January through March are the wettest months.

Montgomery County

LOCATED IN CENTRAL ALABAMA at the intersection of interstate highways 85 and 65, Montgomery County is about 150 miles southwest of Atlanta, 90 miles south of Birmingham and 155 miles north of Mobile and the Gulf of Mexico.

Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport, 150 miles northeast, and Birmingham-Shuttlesworth International Airport, 100 miles northwest, are the largest airports in the region. Montgomery Regional Airport, 8 miles from Maxwell Air Force Base, also serves the local area with three airlines.

Ground transportation is provided by a public transit bus service and several other options. If you're looking to explore the city in a memorable way, take a Segway tour or ride in a horse-drawn carriage.

DRIVING AND COMMUTING

Montgomery County is traversed by two interstate highways, five U.S. highways and several state routes.

Interstate 85, which begins in Virginia, ends in Montgomery at an interchange with Interstate 65. Though Interstate 85 typically runs northsouth in other states, it runs east-west as it terminates in Montgomery.

Interstate 65 is a north-south freeway through the city of Montgomery. It leads to Mobile in the south, and to Birmingham and Huntsville in the north.

U.S. Route 31, which connects northern Michigan to southern Alabama, is a north-south route in the western portion of Montgomery County. U.S. Route 231 runs parallel to U.S. Route 31 on the eastern side of the county. In between them, U.S. Route 331 runs north through the county, ending in the city of Montgomery.

U.S. Route 80 is an east-west route that crosses the south part of the city. U.S. Route 82 runs diagonally southeast to northwest, leading to Prattville in the north.

State Route 94 is an east-west route that connects the towns of Ada and Orion in southern Montgomery County. State Route 110 connects the county with the town of Union Springs in the east. State Route 126 runs alongside U.S. Route 80 and Interstate 85 for 11 miles in the northeastern part of the county. State Route 152, a 6-mile route in the northeastern part of the city, connects to Interstate 65/U.S. Route 82 and U.S. Route 231. State Route 271 is a north-south route that connects U.S. Route 82/231 and Interstate 85.

Texting while driving is prohibited in Alabama with exceptions allowed for the use of a wireless device to obtain emergency services or using a navigation system to receive preprogrammed driving directions.

FROM CHARMING BUNGALOWS AND midcentury modern ranch houses near the historic and bustling city of Montgomery to modern apartment complexes with abundant amenities — Montgomery County's communities offer a diverse selection of housing.

In 2018, nearly 226,000 people lived in the county, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. The county is home to the state capital of Montgomery, the town of Pike Road and unincorporated areas, as well as Maxwell Air Force Base and Gunter Annex. The base employs more than 17,000 active-duty, reserve, civilian and contracted personnel, many of whom live off the base in surrounding communities. Additionally, nearly 17,000 veterans live in the area.

MONTGOMERY COUNTY

Montgomery County is 784 square miles of gently rolling terrain with fertile soil. Its central location in Alabama's Black Belt makes it a processing hub for crops such as cotton, peanuts and soybeans. Elmore County lies to the north, Autauga County to the northwest, Lowndes

Millbrook

Millbrook, the largest city in nearby Elmore County, is about 10 miles north of Montgomery and is one of the fastest-growing cities in the state. The city sits near the Coosa and Alabama rivers, with two lakes just minutes away, and Mill Creek makes its way through the center of a downtown park, which all contribute to a peaceful quality of life in a natural setting.

Millbrook's 13 square miles are home to approximately 15,500 people. Mean travel time to work is 23.9 minutes. Median rent is \$883, and median selected monthly owner costs for housing units with a mortgage are \$1,118.

The city's parks and recreation department maintains seven parks, a state-of-the-art base-ball facility, a civic center and walking trails. The city is also home to the Alabama Wildlife Federation and the Alabama Nature Center.

The city of Montgomery, in the southeast portion of the state, is nationally known for its historic and cultural landmarks such as the Alabama State Capitol, Dexter Avenue King Memorial Baptist Church, First White House of the Confederacy, Hank Williams Memorial, Alabama Veterans Memorial, Rosa Parks Museum and Alabama Shakespeare Festival. Once the capital of the Confederacy, Montgomery eventually became the hub of the civil rights movement. Montgomery, the home of Maxwell AFB and Gunter Annex, is known for the renaissance of its historic downtown and redevelopment of its riverfront along the Alabama River.

Montgomery's land area is 160 square miles and its population is nearly 199,000. Mean travel



time to work is about 19 minutes. Median rent is \$845, and selected monthly owner costs for housing units with a mortgage are \$1,089.

The city maintains more than 60 parks, trails and natural areas, including Blount Cultural Park, Riverfront Park, a dog park, an amphitheater and a therapeutic recreation center.

Pike Road

Pike Road lies 14 miles east of Montgomery and 20 miles east of Maxwell AFB. The town's nearly 32 square miles are home to more than 9,800 residents. Previously an unincorporated area, the farming community of Pike Road voted to incorporate in 1997 and has become one of the fastest-growing towns in Alabama.

People began settling and farming the area in the mid-19th century. As more families moved in, more services were needed. By the early

20th century a booming small town had grown up at the intersection of Pike Road and Meriwether Road. (Pike Road got its name from the toll, or pike, one had to pay to travel on it.)

The town is working on a trail system that will connect many of its neighborhoods and parks. The Pike Road Natural Trail system accommodates walkers, runners and off-road bicyclists. At its completion, the trail will be 30 miles long and will have trailheads that provide parking, restrooms, picnic tables and other amenities. Visit the town's website for updates on the trail's progress.

Median rent in Pike Road is \$1,139, and selected monthly owner costs for housing units with a mortgage are \$1,557. Mean travel time to work is about 26 minutes.

Prattville

Prattville is a New England-style village about 14 miles northwest of Montgomery. Known as the "birthplace of industry," Prattville was founded by Daniel Pratt, who built manufacturing plants in an area surrounded by plantations and farms. Prattville offers multiple recreational and cultural activities, among them the Autauga Creek Canoe Trail and the historic downtown district.

Prattville's 33 square miles support a population of approximately 35,500. Mean travel time to work is 22 minutes. Median rent is \$991, and selected monthly owner costs for housing units with a mortgage are \$1,154.

The city boasts more than 20 parks and recreational facilities, including a dog park, a sports

complex, and the See, Pick and Eat Nut Grove, where families can learn about nut-producing trees and sample their offerings.

Wetumpka

Wetumpka, on the banks of the Coosa River, is also known as "The City of Natural Beauty." Nestled in the southern foothills of the Appalachian Mountains about 17 miles northeast of Montgomery County, it combines a scenic location and a storied past, beginning with its founding around A.D. 1,000 as a palisade Indian village.

Wetumpka's 10 square miles has a population of about 8,300. Mean travel time to work is about 26 minutes. Median rent is \$780, and selected monthly owner costs for housing units with a mortgage are \$985.

The city is home to a sports complex, the Fort Toulouse-Fort Jackson Park and the Jasmine Hill Gardens and Outdoor Museum, and hosts the annual Coosa River Whitewater Festival.

PLANNING YOUR MOVE

Relocating to a new home can be one of the most stressful situations in life. Whether moving across town or the nation, preparation and organization make all the difference.

For military moves, visit www.move.mil for information about moving resources and to learn about the allowances and responsibilities of a military-sponsored move.

Regardless of which method you choose, the first step should be to inventory your personal belongings. The list, with photographs of any valuables, will be important for both insurance purposes and to help keep you organized during transit.

Plan for one full day to pack each room—though the kitchen and garage may take longer. Make a rough estimate of your packing schedule and then add 50 percent more time. It always takes longer than predicted to pack. Toss or donate unused items to lighten your load. Visit www.goodwill.org, www.salvationarmyusa.org or www.clothingdonations.org for locations near you or to arrange a pickup.

BUYING VERSUS RENTING

The decision to buy or rent is the most important step in your relocation process. Purchasing a home entails a long-term financial and emotional commitment with various pluses and minuses. Advantages include the possibility of building equity and the freedom to design and decorate your property or landscape. And don't forget the tax benefits. Disadvantages include upkeep, property taxes and fluctuating property values.



Renting, on the other hand, makes moving easier and someone else maintains the property. Amenities such as laundry rooms, exercise rooms, swimming pools and tennis courts vary from one rental complex to another. The main disadvantage is a loss of control over the residence. Some complexes, for example, restrict or prohibit pets and personal touches such as painting. And the landlord or property managers can also raise the rent with proper notice.

To determine your best choice, account for all of your needs, review your financial situation and research your options thoroughly.

FINDING AN APARTMENT

Be prepared when you meet with the leasing agent, property manager or owner. Bring a list of what you are looking for in a rental; it is important to be clear about your needs and to get all of your questions answered. You will also need to provide information and verification about your job, your income and your past rental history. Dress to make a good impression and treat the meeting like a job interview — be polite and arrive on time.

Use a written checklist with the landlord to document the condition of the rental before you move in, and keep a copy of the completed checklist to use when you move out.

BUYING A HOME

Buying a home is a complex process and, as the recent housing crisis demonstrated, requires a thorough education on the part of the buyer. First, fully understand your financial position — credit score, available savings, monthly income and expenditures. Subtracting your expenditures from your income, for instance, will yield the amount you can afford for housing.

Employment & Economy

in Montgomery County

A REGION OF ECONOMIC diversity, Montgomery County is home to state and regional governments, Maxwell Air Force Base and Gunter Annex, universities, an extensive service industry, high-tech manufacturing, wholesale and retail trade, tourism and an industrial base that includes Hyundai Motor Manufacturing Alabama — Hyundai's first manufacturing plant in the United States. Due to its location along the Alabama River and extensive rail connections, Montgomery is a regional distribution hub for a wide range of industries, serving as a wholesaling and distribution gateway to the Southeast as well as the 22-county central Alabama area.

Montgomery is the capital of Alabama and the second-largest city in the state. The metropolitan area, composed of Autauga, Elmore, Lowndes and Montgomery counties, has a population of approximately 374,000. Montgomery County has nearly 226,000 residents, including approximately 17,000 veterans, according to the U.S. Census. The unemployment rate

for Montgomery County was 2.9 percent in May 2019, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The median age in Montgomery County is 36 years. Median household income was \$46,545 in 2017, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. Alabama has a state income tax with a sliding scale up to 5 percent. Sales taxes in the city of Montgomery are 10 percent.

The county has a relatively well-educated population compared with the state overall. Of those over the age of 25, nearly 86 percent have a high school diploma or higher and approximately 32 percent have a bachelor's degree or higher — both figures above the state average.

Leading industries include agricultural support; finance and insurance; health care; manufacturing, warehouses and distribution; professional, scientific and technical fields; tourism; transportation; and retail trade. The largest employer in the region is the Maxwell-Gunter complex, followed by the state

of Alabama, Montgomery Public Schools and Baptist Health.

Maxwell Air Force Base and Gunter Annex

The more than 17,000 people who work at Maxwell Air Force Base and Gunter Annex — including active-duty, reserve, civilian and contracted personnel — make the installation the largest employer in Montgomery County. Maxwell Air Force Base and Gunter Annex are estimated to have an economic impact of \$2.6 billion annually across a three-county region, according to Maxwell Air Force Base.

Air University, based at Maxwell Air Force Base and Gunter Annex, is a key component of the Air Education and Training Command and is the Air Force's center for professional military education. Air University's primary operating locations are concentrated on three main installations. Most programs are at Maxwell, some are across town at Maxwell's Gunter Annex and one is located at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Ohio.

PETS

Moves are stressful for everyone — including the family pet. Pets can sense stress and a change in routine can be difficult for them. If possible, keep your pets in a quiet, secure area while movers pack up or unload your belongings. Movers will have your door open while they move boxes and furniture, and a pet may slip out the door undetected. Make sure you keep a collar with an ID tag on your pet at all times. Ensure the tag has your current phone number on it. It is also a good idea to microchip your pets. Remember to keep the microchip's contact information up-to-date. If your pet escapes during any part of your move, you want the animal shelter that scans the chip to be able to contact you.

Your pet faces new outside dangers in Alabama, such as alligators and snakes. Six species of venomous snakes, including rattle-snakes, cottonmouths, coral snakes and copperheads, pose a danger for a dog in wooded and watery areas. Keep your dog on a short leash

in wooded areas, especially if it starts sniffing or pawing the ground. Alligators pose another threat. They live wherever there is water, so avoid allowing your dog to walk around or swim in unknown waters.

Education & Academics

in Montgomery County

FINDING THE RIGHT SCHOOLS and educational opportunities for each family member is an important part of any move. This chapter outlines Montgomery County's public schools system, private schools, charter schools and home schooling criteria, as well as local libraries and higher education institutions. To be enrolled in an Alabama school, a child must be at least 5 years old by Sept. 1 of the school year. Those wishing to register their child in school should bring the following to the school office: a birth certificate or other proof of the child's age, and the child's previous school records and immunization records. For more details on Alabama's minimum vaccine requirements for students in grades K-12, please visit the Alabama State Department of Education's website at www. alsde.edu. Check with the school for additional requirements.

In 2010, Alabama, along with the majority of other states, the District of Columbia, Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, the U.S. Virgin Islands and the Department of Defense Education Activity,

adopted Common Core State Standards that provide a consistent set of educational expectations for students regardless of ZIP code. When a family moves, a student's education is often disrupted because the student may be forced to repeat material or learn at a different level at the new school. With common standards across states, this disruption will be reduced — of particular interest to military families. At present, national Common Core State Standards exist only for English language arts and mathematics though Alabama has state standards across the full curriculum. Choosing a School

Choosing the right school is very important, so be sure to research each one before deciding. Contact the school by phone or by visiting its website, which is a valuable source to learn about a school district's statistics and curriculum. Talk to people in the area, especially friends and colleagues who already live there.

If the school shows promise, schedule a visit and bring a list of written questions about student-teacher ratios, computer availability, extracurricular activities, sports programs, music programs, gifted programs and grading standards.

Discuss the potential school with your child: what they liked and what they didn't like. Your family's ability to readily adapt to a move and to find happiness in your new home may depend, in part, on how happy your children are in their new school.

CHARTER SCHOOLS



Civil Rights Memorial

The Civil Rights Memorial Center adjacent to the memorial houses exhibits, a theater and educational activities, as well as the Wall of Tolerance, which displays the names of more than a half-million people who have pledged to take a stand against hate and work for justice and tolerance in their daily lives.

It has been restored to its appearance during King's residence. At the Interpretive Center next to the parsonage, guests can view videos and photos of King's life. The center includes a gift shop.

The King-Johns Garden for Reflection is at the rear of the parsonage. A circular walkway in the magnolia tree-lined garden symbolizes unity and is a quiet place for thought.


