Our Military

in Snohomish County

NAVAL STATION EVERETT IS on the northeast side of Puget Sound next to the marina area of Everett, Washington, 25 miles north of Seattle. The Smokey Point Navy Support Complex is between Marysville and Arlington, Washington, 11 miles north of the naval station.

Naval Station Everett is one of the Navy's newest and most modern facilities. Everett has one of only two Navy-owned West Coast deep-water ports; such ports require no dredging to maintain water depth at the piers and have no tidal or navigational restrictions on ship movement.

The station is home to Carrier Strike Group 11 and Destroyer Squadron 9, as well as Regional Support Organization Pacific Northwest. The station is homeport for six Navy ships and two Coast Guard ships: USS Shoup (DDG 86), USS Momsen (DDG 92), USS Kidd (DDG 100), USS Gridley (DDG 101), USS Sampson (DDG 102), USS Ralph Johnson (DDG 114), USCGC Henry Blake (WLM 563) and USCGC Blue Shark (WPB 87360). Military Sealift Command supply vessels and other visiting ships also use the port on a regular basis.

There are about 1,200 sailors and civil service personnel assigned to commands at Naval Station Everett. The station itself has about 450 sailors and civilians assigned.

Naval Station Everett supports mission-critical functions at Jim Creek Radio Station in Arlington and Naval Facility Pacific Beach on Washington's Pacific coast. The radio station maintains communication with submarines in the Pacific. It is surrounded by the 5,000-acre Jim Creek Wilderness Recreation Area that includes a Navy-protected old growth forest. Naval Facility Pacific Beach supports training for Navy pilots from Naval Air Station Whidbey Island.

Naval Station Everett's areas of responsibility within the Northwest Region encompass the Acoustic Research Detachment in Bayview, Idaho, and the Naval Radio Transmitter Facility in LaMoure, North Dakota. Navy Reserve activities include 16 Navy operational support centers.

While many support facilities are found on Naval Station Everett itself, the Smokey Point Navy Support Complex serves area sailors and families as well, with the commissary, lodging, transient quarters, fleet and family services, chapel and other facilities.

HISTORY

Naval Station Everett's history began in 1983 when the secretary of the Navy proposed a new Puget Sound-area naval base as part of the Strategic Homeport concept. On April 17, 1984, Everett was selected from among 13 ports as the ideal location for the new homeport. Congress approved the first funds for construction Oct. 2, 1986, and the official groundbreaking ceremony was Nov. 9, 1987. The Navy awarded the \$56 million carrier pier construction contract Sept. 9, 1988, and in June 1992, three Navy ships participated in the formal opening of the new pier.

A second groundbreaking ceremony took place Aug. 30, 1993, for the Naval Station Everett Navy Support Complex, off 136th Street in Smokey Point. The Navy acquired the 52-acre site to build facilities not available at

the waterfront location, among them a commissary, a large exchange, a family support service center, a thrift shop, education offices, bachelor and visitor quarters, a chapel and religious education center, an auto hobby shop, ball fields and courts, fleet parking for personnel assigned to deployed Everett-based ships and a 50-room Navy Lodge.

During the first week of 1994, Naval Station Puget Sound personnel moved to the recently completed fleet support and administration buildings, and on Jan. 4, 1994, officially began operating at Naval Station Everett. On April 8, 1994, the official dedication ceremony was conducted with more than 1,000 guests attending.

On Sept. 3, 1994, USS Ingraham (FFG 61) and USS Ford (FFG 54) arrived as the first of seven ships to be assigned here. On Nov. 22, 1995, USS Paul F. Foster (DD 964) arrived at the naval station. On that same date, the Navy officially announced the assignment of USS David R. Ray (DD 971), USS Callaghan (DDG 994) and USS Chandler (DDG 996) to Naval Station Everett. USS David R. Ray arrived July 29, 1996, and USS Callaghan and USS Chandler both arrived Sept. 27, 1996. To complete the complement of ships at Naval Station Everett, USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) made a change of homeport from Puget Sound Naval Shipyard at Bremerton to Everett Jan. 8, 1997.

In March 1998, USS Callaghan was decommissioned, and in May 1998, two ships based in Japan, USS Fife (DD 991) and USS Rodney M. Davis (FFG 60), made their official change of homeport to Everett.

The Housing Welcome Center at the Navy Support Complex opened in February 1999, and the third bachelor enlisted quarters was opened in May. In September 1999, USS Chandler was decommissioned.

The year 2000 found Naval Station Everett growing. The station added a Navy Federal Credit Union branch, two gas stations and minimarts and a small movie theater in The Commons and expanded the facilities for off-duty college courses. Also in this banner year, the naval station welcomed the Coast Guard buoy tender USCGC Henry Blake.

Today, the station is home to six Navy ships and two Coast Guard ships: USS Shoup, USS Momsen, USS Kidd, USS Gridley, USS Sampson, USS Ralph Johnson, USCGC Blue Shark and USCGC Henry Blake.

ORGANIZATIONS CARRIER STRIKE GROUP 11

Current ship and aircraft configuration, combined with the updated training and readiness schedule, ensure ready response for quick surge to any area of operations around the globe. Nimitz Strike Group, led by Commander, Carrier Strike Group 11, is made up of an aircraft carrier with its embarked air wing, a cruiser, two destroyers and an attack submarine, and constitutes the single most powerful mobile force in the world.

DESTROYER SQUADRON 9

Destroyer Squadron 9 is responsible for the crew, training and material readiness of six guided-missile destroyers and the tactical execution of Sea Combat Commander duties within the Nimitz Strike Group. Its parent command is Carrier Strike Group 11.

REGIONAL SUPPORT ORGANIZATION PACIFIC NORTHWEST

The mission of Regional Support Organization Pacific Northwest is to serve as the Naval Surface Forces Pacific regional executive agent for Naval Station Everett homeported surface combatants. The organization assists in managing the overall war-fighting capability of the surface combatant force and maintaining the highest level of engineering, combat systems, logistics, medical and personnel readiness.

NAVY SHIPS

USS Shoup

The USS Shoup is the 36th ship in the Arleigh Burke-class of Aegis guided-missile destroyers and the eighth Flight IIA Aegis destroyer, the most advanced variant of the class. USS Shoup was designed to conduct simultaneous operations in multithreat environments including air, surface and subsurface warfare. The ship is equally adept at operating as part of an aircraft carrier strike group in high-threat environments as in providing vital support and escort capabilities for naval amphibious forces and auxiliary ships.

USS Shoup was commissioned June 22, 2002, in Seattle and has been homeported in Everett since May 23, 2002. It was named in honor of Gen. David M. Shoup, the 22nd commandant of the Marine Corps and a recipient of the Medal of Honor and the British Distinguished Service Order for his actions during the Pacific Campaign in World War II while commanding the 2nd Marines at Betio, a bitterly contested island of Tarawa Atoll.

Built at Litton Industries' Ingalls Shipbuilding in Pascagoula, Mississippi, USS Shoup's cutting-edge designs for propulsion, tactical flexibility and survivability ensure it will hold a prominent place in our defense arsenal to carry out the Navy's mission well into the 21st century.

USS Momsen

The second of the new Arleigh Burke-class of Aegis guided-missile destroyers to be homeported at Naval Station Everett, USS Momsen was commissioned into active duty in Panama City, Florida, on Aug. 28, 2004. The ship is named after Vice Adm. Charles B. Momsen of Flushing, Long Island, New York, who honorably served in the U.S. Navy from 1919 to 1955.

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Momsen made many contributions to the Navy, most notably his invention of the Momsen Lung, his critical role in the salvage and rescue of 33 personnel from the sunken submarine USS Squalus (SS 192), and his command of the battleship USS South Dakota (BB 57) in the Pacific theater during World War II.

USS Momsen arrived in Everett on Oct. 15, 2004, after completing its maiden voyage around the United States, including a transit through the Panama Canal. The ship underwent its combat systems and final qualifications trials in early 2005 and had its maiden deployment to the 7th Fleet from April to September 2006, in support of Operation Enduring Freedom-Philippines. USS Momsen departed on her first USS Abraham Lincoln Strike Group deployment to the 5th Fleet from March to October 2008, which included its first transit through the Suez Canal, to support Operation Enduring Freedom and the global war on terror.

USS Kidd

The USS Kidd, formerly homeported at Naval Base San Diego, is the third destroyer that shifted its homeport to Naval Station Everett in 2016.

USS Kidd was built in Pascagoula, Mississippi, by Northrop Grumman Ship Systems. It is the 49th Arleigh Burke-class destroyer to be built. It is the third Navy ship named after Rear Adm. Isaac C. Kidd, who was on board USS Arizona during the attack on Pearl Harbor and was the first American flag officer to die in World War II.

In 2014, USS Kidd joined the search for Malaysia Airlines Flight 370 that went missing over the South China Sea. It was the second Navy ship to be deployed in the search.

USS Gridley

The fourth USS Gridley is the 51st Arleigh Burke-class destroyer in the U.S. Navy. It is named after Capt. Charles Gridley, commander of Adm. George Dewey's flagship, Olympia, (Flag Captain) and recipient of Adm. Dewey's famous command, "You may fire when you are ready, Gridley" in the Battle of Manila Bay during the Spanish-American War.

In May 2004, the secretary of the Navy announced the names of five new Arleigh Burkeclass destroyers, including the Gridley. Its keel was laid July 30, 2004, at the Bath Iron Works in Bath, Maine. It was christened Feb. 11, 2006. The Gridley was commissioned at the Port of Miami on Feb. 10, 2007, and arrived in July 2016 at its new homeport in Everett.

USS Sampson

The USS Sampson is the U.S. Navy's 52nd Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer and is the fourth ship named in honor of Rear Adm. William Thomas Sampson, a naval hero in the Spanish-American War. It was authorized in 2002 and commissioned in 2007. The ship was assigned to Destroyer Squadron 9 in 2016 and arrived at its new homeport, Naval Station Everett, in September 2016.

In November 2016, the USS Sampson was the first U.S. warship to visit New Zealand in 33 years since the New Zealand nuclear-free zone came into effect. New Zealand Prime Minister John Key granted approval for the ship's visit under the New Zealand's anti-nuclear law, which requires that the prime minister has to be satisfied that any visiting ship is not nuclear armed or powered. That same month, the USS Sampson and other naval ships from Australia, Canada, Japan and Singapore provided humanitarian assistance after a magnitude 7.8 earthquake struck Kaikoura.

USS Ralph Johnson

The newly commissioned USS Ralph Johnson arrived at Naval Station Everett on April 27, 2018. USS Ralph Johnson is the 64th Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer and was built by Huntington Ingalls Industries in Pascagoula, Mississippi. It is the first warship named for Marine Pfc. Ralph Henry Johnson. Johnson was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for his heroic actions during the Vietnam War. Johnson used his body to shield two fellow Marines from a grenade, absorbing the blast and dying instantly in March 1968.

COAST GUARD SHIPS USCGC Henry Blake


The Coast Guard Cutter Henry Blake is one of the newest cutters to the Pacific Northwest. The Henry Blake was commissioned Oct. 27, 2000, at Naval Station Everett. The 175-foot buoy tender replaced the 180-foot Coast Guard Cutter Mariposa (WLB 397), which was decommissioned March 31, 2000. The Coast Guard Cutter Henry Blake was named for the New Dungeness Spit Lighthouse keeper, Henry Blake. The New Dungeness Spit Lighthouse, on Washington's Olympic Peninsula, was first lighted Dec. 14, 1857, and was the first active lighthouse in the Strait of Juan de Fuca.

The cutter's area of responsibility includes the Puget Sound, the Strait of Juan de Fuca and the northern coastal portion of the 13th Coast Guard District. Its primary mission is servicing navigations aids, but it also provides marine environmental protection and search and rescue.

USCGC Blue Shark

The USCGC Blue Shark is a newly designed 87-foot coastal patrol boat that arrived at Naval Station Everett on July 19, 2005, and was commissioned there Aug. 16, 2005. The boat has several enhancements over the older coastal patrol boats, including improved mission sea keeping abilities (up to sea state 5), significantly upgraded habitability, and compliance with all current and projected environmental protection laws. It also employs an innovative stern launch and recovery system using an aluminum-hulled





inboard diesel-powered water jet small boat. The vastly larger pilothouse is equipped with an integrated bridge system, including an electronic chart display system that interfaces with the Coast Guard's new surface search radar.

ARRIVAL

The closest commercial flights land at Seattle-Tacoma International Airport in Seattle, about 45 miles from the base. Transportation is not provided to the base.

SPONSORSHIP

Contact your sponsor with your estimated arrival time and flight information if applicable prior to your arrival at Naval Station Everett.

Sponsorship is vital to the relocation process. Don't PCS without talking to your sponsor before departing for Naval Station Everett. Your sponsor will answer any questions you have about the base and the local area, make lodging or dorm arrangements and meet you upon arrival. Your sponsor will be there to help you and your family until you are settled into your new community.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS

Cellphone use by the driver of a moving motor vehicle is prohibited on all Department of Defense installations unless the cellphone is used with a hands-free device.

From Seattle-Tacoma (Sea-Tac) International Airport

If you drive from the airport, take the Airport Expressway. Keep right at the fork and follow signs for state Route 518/Interstate 5/Interstate 405 and merge onto state Route 518 east. From Route 518 east use the left lane to take I-5 toward Seattle. From I-5, take Exit 192 and use the following Interstate 5 directions.

From Interstate 5

If you are driving north on Interstate 5, take Exit 192 and merge onto Broadway. Turn left on Everett Avenue then right on West Marine View Drive. Continue north over the viaduct. Naval Station Everett's main gate will be on the left.

If you are heading south on I-5, take Exit 198 (Highway 529). After crossing the Snohomish River Bridge, turn right on West Marine View Drive. Continue on until you see Naval Station Everett's main gate on the right.

CHECK-IN PROCEDURES

Base Quarterdeck

All personnel must check in at the quarterdeck. Quarterdeck staff endorse orders and provide basic station information such as billeting and galley location. Assistance is also provided for personnel from homeported ships and tenant commands.

Sailors attached to Naval Station Everett will have their orders stamped and be directed to the training office, which is on the third deck. Sailors attached to a ship will be sent directly to the ship for check-in. If the ship is not in port at the time of check-in you will be assigned to a temporary personnel unit until your ship arrives or until transportation to your ship has been arranged.

GETTING SETTLED HEALTH CARE

Naval Branch Health Clinic Everett 2000 W. Marine View Drive

Naval Branch Health Clinic Everett is a primary care clinic that provides routine, ambulatory health care services to active-duty personnel assigned to Naval Station Everett, any homeported and visiting ships, as well as commands in the surrounding areas and their TRICARE Prime family members. Clinic services include family medicine, immunizations, mental health, optometry, pharmacy and physical therapy.

Dental care is provided to all active-duty personnel, U.S. Coast Guard personnel, U.S. Public Health Service personnel, National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration personnel, Navy Reserve Officer Training Corps personnel and reservists who are activated for more than 30 days. The dental clinic is not staffed to treat family members or retirees. Family members of active-duty personnel are encouraged to use the TRICARE Dental Program. Program information is available by visiting www.tricare.mil/ CoveredServices/Dental/TDP.

TRICARE

TRICARE is the health care program for active-duty and retired service members, their families and survivors. TRICARE provides health plans, prescriptions, dental plans and other special health programs to its beneficiaries. TRICARE's mission is to enhance the Department of Defense and the nation's security by providing health support for the full range of military operations and sustaining the health of all those entrusted to their care.

TRICARE offers a range of health care plans. TRICARE Prime is the mandatory health care option for active-duty service members. Family members of active-duty service members, retired service members and their families may also use this option. If you use TRICARE Prime, you are assigned a primary care manager at a military or network provider who delivers most of your care. If you need care your PCM cannot provide, you are referred to a specialist. Active-duty service members and their families pay nothing out of pocket for this option; however, there is less freedom to choose your provider. On Jan. 1, 2018, TRICARE Standard and Extra were combined into a new plan, TRICARE Select. Select is a standardized feefor-service plan available to family members of active-duty service members, retired service

members and their families. After you enroll in TRICARE Select, you may schedule an appointment with any TRICARE-authorized provider. Referrals are not required, but you may need prior authorization from your regional contractor for some services. You will pay a copay or cost share based on the type of care and provider you see. Costs for Select vary, but you will pay an annual deductible as well as a percentage of covered services. Non-network providers may charge up to 15 percent more than the TRICARE allowable charge; you are responsible for these extra charges. TRICARE also offers plans for remote and overseas locations, reserve military members, young adults who are no longer covered under regular TRICARE coverage and other scenarios.

TRICARE coverage is completely portable, so it moves with you when you relocate. Follow these simple steps to ensure you have no break in coverage when you move:

- Do not cancel your TRICARE Prime enrollment option before you move.
- Update your personal information in DEERS immediately when you arrive at your new location.
- Select a new primary care manager.

If you are already using TRICARE Select, moving is easy. When you arrive at your new location, update your personal information in DEERS. Then find TRICARE-authorized

- Several copies of your orders.
- Certified copies of birth certificates, adoption papers, naturalization papers, marriage license, divorce papers, etc.
- Copy of advanced pay or allowance paperwork.
- All moving paperwork including TMO information, self-move paperwork and all receipts associated with moving.
- Employment records or resumes of civilian family members.
- Medical and dental records of your entire family from your previous duty station.
- Immunization records for all children, activeduty members and pets.
- School records and transcripts for students.
- Copies of all insurance policies.
- Copies of all occupational licenses and certifications.
- Purchase agreements for vehicles, showing state sales tax paid.
- Vehicle registrations and titles.
- Household goods inventory.
- Letters of credit from utility companies.
- Copies of federal income tax forms.
- Copies of recent leave and earnings statements.

Some parents find that center-based child care is right for their children, but others may prefer a more home-like atmosphere for child care. To accommodate those individuals, Navy Region Northwest offers a Child Development Home program, in which caregivers provide child care services out of their homes.

The CDH program has more than 100 homes throughout the region certified by Navy Child Development Programs to provide child care to children up to age 12. They provide the same level of high-quality care found in on-base centers but are often able to offer more flexibility in services. Providers may offer part-time, hourly, evening, weekend and deployment care. Homes are required to meet Navy child care guidelines, and many are also licensed by the state of Washington. Child care providers offer developmental programs and receive training and home visits on a monthly basis.



A CDH subsidy is available for all eligible families seeking full-time care so that child care fees are comparable to those fees charged in on-base centers.



Welcome

to Snohomish County

WELCOME TO WASHINGTON! PART of the lush, green Puget Sound region, Snohomish County covers 2,090 square miles from Skagit County to the north and King County, with its star city Seattle, to the South.

Snohomish County has a population of 801,633, according to the 2017 census, making it the third most-populous county in the state. Its county seat and largest populated city is Everett, with about 110,000 residents. From saltwater beaches and rolling farmlands in the west to dense forest in the mountainous east, the county boasts a wide variety of topography. Sixty-eight percent of the county is forestland, 18 percent is rural, 9 percent is urban/city and 5 percent is agricultural. Most of the county's development and residents can be found along the narrow, westernmost Puget Sound lowlands.

The county offers many historical and cultural attractions, plus modern amenities. In addition to its peaceful natural settings, there are archeological sites, museums and parks. Outdoor activities abound, including fishing, golfing, mountain biking, hiking, camping and more. There are also shopping, dining and nightlife opportunities for residents to explore: Annual events and festivals celebrate everything from bluegrass and the arts to the area's agriculture and wild eagles.

HISTORY

For thousands of years the Snohomish and related Native American tribes inhabited the area that presently comprises Snohomish County and Hat, Whidbey and Camano islands. The Snohomish Tribe was the largest Native American population in the area. They lived along the shores of Puget Sound from Warm Beach to Richmond Beach and along the Snohomish River to Monroe. Tribes followed the traditional cycle of fishing, hunting and gathering along the two major river systems that flow through the land: the Stillaguamish River, with its north and south forks, and the Snohomish River, formed from the Skykomish and Snoqualmie rivers.

British Capt. George Vancouver landed on the beach south of Hebolb on June 4, 1792, claiming the Puget Sound region for England's King George III and naming nearby locations including Puget Sound, Port Gardner Bay and Port Susan Bay. However, American interests in the region grew over the years as part of the concept of manifest destiny. By the Treaty of 1818, Great Britain and the United States established the 49th parallel as the northern border between Canada and the U.S. as far west as the Continental Divide of the Rocky Mountains, but they agreed to joint control and occupancy of Oregon Country. On June 15, 1846, Britain ceded its claims to the lands south of the 49th parallel, and the U.S. ceded its claims to the north of the same line, the present-day Canada-U.S. border.

In 1848, the Oregon Territory, composed of present-day Washington, Oregon and Idaho as well as parts of Montana and Wyoming, was established. Washington Territory, which included Washington and parts of Idaho and Montana, was formed from the Oregon Territory in 1853. On Jan. 22, 1855, Washington territorial Gov. Isaac Stevens and 81 tribal leaders met at Point Elliott to sign a treaty between regional



tribes and the U.S. government. The Snohomish signed away their lands in exchange for cash, hunting and fishing rights and a reservation established at Tulalip.

During Washington's territorial years, the peninsula that would become Everett was mostly logged by companies drawn to its oldgrowth trees and proximity to mills at Port Gamble and Utsalady. About a dozen homesteaders and squatters chose this location as well. As the population grew, local settlers petitioned the territorial legislature to develop a separate county, and Snohomish County, originally part of Island County, was formed on Jan. 14, 1861.

Snohomish County grew, as did most the Pacific Northwest, with the arrival of the railroad. On July 4, 1889, Joseph Pearsall struck gold and staked a claim at Monte Cristo. This drew prospectors to the area and helped solidify plans for development.

By 1910, it was estimated that one-fifth of Everett's population was employed in the lumber mills, where hours were long and working conditions were dangerous. Railroading and logging held equal dangers. Trades unions gained an early, solid base in Everett, but union members often faced backlash and blacklisting from jobs. On Nov. 5, 1916, the Everett Massacre, a labor confrontation between the Industrial Workers of the World and county lawmen, left two deputies and at least five union members dead, with dozens more wounded.

World War I dashed the hopes of many reformists, and Snohomish County solidly backed the war effort. The predominant economy now was lumbering, and an earthquake in Japan in 1923 spurred a lumber boom in the Pacific Northwest, bringing the region out of recession and fueling development that lasted until the 1929 stock market crash. During the Great Depression, government reports listed Snohomish County as one of the state's neediest counties. Its lumbering economy tumbled. Mills closed and restarted, only to close again.

After the bombing of Pearl Harbor, wartime industries revitalized the county. The Everett Pacific Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company, operated by Pacific Car and Foundry of Seattle, began wartime production on the Everett waterfront in 1942. Everett Marine Ways, the Carl E. Edlund Shipyard and the Stanwood Shipyard contracted to build ships for the Navy as well. Boeing Aircraft Co. operated two airplane assembly plants in Everett, employing mostly women.

Post-World War II growth in the Pacific Northwest quickly connected rural areas and small towns. Highway construction linked

Stanwood, Snohomish and Monroe with Everett, Seattle, Tacoma and Bellingham. In 1967, Boeing began building the 747 plant near Everett's Paine Field, thus initiating rapid population growth in the county.

Growth issues have dominated the area's landscape since the 1970s. Much of the county's farmland has been sold for real estate development, and once-quaint roads have become highways with numbers instead of names. When

WEATHER AND CLIMATE

Snohomish County enjoys a moderate yearround climate with average temperatures ranging from about 75 degrees in July to about 33 degrees in January. The Olympic Mountains to the west, across Puget Sound, shelter the area from excessive precipitation coming off the Pacific Ocean. Annual precipitation in the western part of the county is 35 inches but increases sharply as the elevation climbs into the Cascades Mountains.

Local Hazards

Every second counts in a disaster so planning and preparation can be lifesavers.

The Emergency Management Division is part of the Washington State Military Department. The EMD is the official emergency preparedness department, combining state and federal resources for homeland defense, homeland security and emergency mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery activities. Its website provides information on creating an emergency plan and emergency kit, pet preparedness and disaster preparedness for schools. The following are considered significant hazards in Washington.

Earthquakes

Washington, especially the Puget Sound basin, has a history of frequent earthquakes. More than 1,000 earthquakes occur in the state each year, and a dozen or more are strong enough for people to feel the ground shaking. It is important to be prepared for earthquakes before they occur. Identify potential hazards in your home. Secure top-heavy furniture to a wall. Use earthquake putty on hanging pictures and mirrors. Secure objects on shelves that could become projectiles during an earthquake.

In case of an earthquake, remember: Drop, cover and hold on. If you are not near a table or desk, drop to the floor against an interior wall and protect your head and neck with your arms. Avoid exterior walls, windows, hanging objects, mirrors and other objects that could fall.

Floods

Floods are the most common natural disaster in the United States. Even beyond coastal regions, flash floods, inland flooding and seasonal storms affect every region of the country, damaging homes and businesses. It is dangerous to underestimate the force and power of water.

During a flood watch or warning, gather your emergency supplies and stay tuned to local radio or TV stations for further weather information. If you are outdoors during a rainstorm, seek higher ground. Avoid walking through any floodwaters — even water 6 inches deep can sweep you off your feet. If you are driving, avoid flooded areas. The majority of deaths in floods occur when people drive through flooded areas. Roads concealed by water may not be intact. Water only a foot deep can displace a vehicle. If your vehicle stalls, leave it immediately and seek higher ground. Rapidly rising water can engulf a vehicle and sweep it away.

Thunderstorms

Strong winds and large hail, thunderstorms, tornados, rain, snow or other mixed precipitation are not uncommon in Washington, with most moving in from the Pacific Ocean. Typically, a severe storm can snarl transportation and knock out utilities.

While more likely at certain times of the year, thunderstorms can happen anytime. A severe thunderstorm can knock out power; bring high winds, lightning, flash floods and hail; and spin into a twister in seconds. Pay attention to storm warnings. Remember the rule: "When thunder roars, head indoors." The National Weather Service recommends following the 30/30 rule: People should seek shelter if the "flash-to-bang" delay — length of time in seconds from the sight of the lightning flash to the arrival of its subsequent thunder — is 30 seconds or less, and remain under cover for 30 minutes after the final thunderclap.

Wildfires

The wildfire season in Washington usually begins in early July and typically culminates in late September when regular rain returns to the Pacific Northwest. However, wildfires have occurred in every month of the year. The majority of wildfires are caused by humans. Causes include arson, recreational fires that get out of control, negligently discarded cigarettes and debris burning. Natural causes like lightning can also cause a wildfire.

If your home is in an area prone to wildfires, you can mitigate your risk. Have an evacuation plan and maintain a defensible area that is free of anything that will burn, such as wood piles, dried leaves, newspapers and other brush.

Even if your home is not in the vicinity of a wildfire, the smoke and ash produced by wildfires can create air quality issues for hundreds of miles. Pay attention to local air quality reports following a wildfire in your area.

Getting To & Around

Snohomish County

NESTLED AT PUGET SOUND'S emerald heart, Snohomish County links easily to other parts of Washington, Oregon and Canada via several major roadways and a ferry system. Most people traveling in the area choose to drive, either taking the direct path of the north-southrunning Interstate 5 or the smaller — but just as scenic — state highways.

For those flying, Seattle-Tacoma International Airport, or Sea-Tac, is the main commercial passenger airport for the region.

The county is served by several public transportation options including Washington State Ferries.

About 45 miles south of Naval Station Everett on I-5, Seattle-Tacoma International Airport is Washington's largest commercial airport, serving nearly 47 million total air travelers in 2017. Major carriers include Alaska Airlines, American Airlines, British Airways, Delta Air Lines, JetBlue Airways, Southwest Airlines, United Airlines and Virgin America.

Ground transportation includes bus, taxi, shuttle, light rail and rental car services as well as resources for bicycles and transportation network companies such as Lyft, Uber and Wingz. Shuttle buses provide 24/7 transportation to the rental car center, at 3150 S. 160th St., where there are 14 rental car companies to choose from.

10 STEPS TO RESPONSIBLE DRIVING

Since you cannnot control the actions of other drivers, you must rely on your skills and experience. Following these 10 rules will ensure a safe and courteous journey.

- 1. Be prepared: Know where you are going before you start. Be well-informed about weather and road conditions or traffic activity on your route. For longer trips, include a rest stop every two hours, sooner if you are tired. Pack an emergency rations kit of water and nonperishable food items such as energy bars.
- 2. Always wear your seat belt: Seat belts keep you in control and ready to react to a hazardous situation. Everyone should wear a seatbelt while in the vehicle.
- 3. Put the phone down: A mobile phone is great for roadside emergencies, but using a phone while you drive drastically reduces your reaction time to all situations. Minimize distractions by concentrating on the road, not objects, people or events inside your vehicle.
- 4. Know your surroundings: Scan the roadway continually for hazards. Keep your eyes moving, looking from one side to the other. Know what is happening well in front of you; watch for brake lights. Use the mirrors to keep an eye on traffic beside and behind you.
- 5. Share the road: Pedestrians, bicyclists, motorcyclists, vehicles of varying sizes, as well as drivers of various ages and skill levels, all have a right to use the road. Slow down and give others time and space to proceed safely. Treat them like dear friends — they are to someone.
- 6. Signal your intentions: Be predictable and courteous and signal your intentions so other road users know what you plan to do next. Use your horn or headlights, if necessary.

Washington State Ferries

This state-operated ferry system provides passenger and vehicle service throughout Puget Sound and the San Juan Islands and is part of the Washington State Department of Transportation. The distinctive green-and-white ships are legally part of the state highway system. Routes closest to NS Everett include Mukilteo to Clinton and Edmonds to Kingston.

DRIVING AND COMMUTING

Snohomish County has five major routes that connect the county to the rest of the state and points beyond. There are four north-south routes: Interstate 5, I-405, state Route 9 and SR 99. The only complete east-west route is U.S. Route 2, which ends just a few miles east of NS Everett.

- 7. Watch your speed: Posted maximum speeds are for ideal driving conditions. Adjust your speed for traffic, road and visibility conditions or when not operating at your best. Higher speeds magnify errors and decrease response times. It helps to maintain a large "safety cushion" around your vehicle to change lanes safely and to take evasive action in emergencies.
- 8. Maintain your vehicle: Read your owner's manual and follow the recommended schedule for maintenance service. Routinely check tires, brakes, lights, wipers and fluid levels. Pack a flashlight, blanket and first-aid kit. In cold climates, pack extra warm clothing. Carry a mobile phone for emergencies.
- 9. Move your disabled vehicle: If your car breaks down, move it off the road away from traffic, if possible. Warn other drivers by raising the vehicle's hood or using your hazard lights, then stay inside and ask passersby to call the police. If you are unable to move the car out of traffic, get all passengers to exit the vehicle and move to the side of the road when safe. If you must walk to a phone, keep your group together.
- 10. Don't drive while impaired: Never drive while under the influence of alcohol, prescription or street drugs, or over-the-counter medications that make you drowsy. Not only will you put yourself and your passengers in danger, but a traffic violation of this nature can seriously derail a military career. Don't be a driver if you think you are going to drink. Road rage and normal fatigue can also impair your response time. Be calm, well-rested, alert and attentive any time you get behind the wheel.

The Washington State Department of Licensing issues driver's licenses and instruction permits, renews licenses and ID cards, provides copies of your driving record, registers cars and boats, and offers other driving-related services. Find many of the required forms and general information at www.dol.wa.gov/forms.html?fldt.

Driver's Licenses

Military personnel and their spouses who are stationed in Washington are issued drivers with the word "military" in place of an expiration date. These individuals don't have to renew their driver licenses as long as they are:

- Members of the armed forces on active duty
- Members of the National Guard or reservists called to duty for 180 days or more
- Spouses, domestic partners and dependents of military personnel who occupy the same residence as the person on active duty

By law, you have 30 days to get a Washington driver's license after you've moved here. If you're registering vehicles, you need to obtain your driver's license first.

You are considered a Washington resident when you do any of the following:

- Register to vote
- · Receive state benefits
- Get any Washington state license at resident rates
- Receive in-state tuition fees

Washington spells out what is required for licensing and insurance under various scenarios in its Washington Driver Guide, which can be downloaded at *www.dol.wa.gov/driverslicense/guide*. *html*. Military members and veterans may be entitled to certain DMV exemptions and allowances. For more information on military and veteran exceptions and requirements, visit the website.

Vehicle Registration

Applications associated with driving and vehicle registration are available online at www. dol.wa.gov/vehicleregistration/military-inwa. html, including DMV forms, requests for driving records and more.

Distracted Driving

Washington prohibits drivers from making calls on handheld wireless telephones while operating a motor vehicle (a hands-free device is acceptable); novice drivers are barred from all cell phone use. Texting while driving is prohibited statewide for all drivers.

THE OVERALL COST OF living in Snohomish County in 2016 was about 8 percent higher than the national average due to the high cost of housing (about 27 percent more), according to PayScale.com, although wages across the county tended to be higher as well. Dwindling housing inventory has caused prices to skyrocket as people working in nearby Seattle have flocked to the area. In 2017, an estimated 801,633 people called Snohomish County home, an increase of a little over 12 percent since 2010, the U.S. Census Bureau says. With 2,087.27 square miles of land, that works out to a population density of 340 people per square mile.

Naval Station Everett, in Snohomish County, is more than 6,500 people strong, and approximately 84 percent of personnel live off base in surrounding communities. The county's communities give newcomers many choices when selecting a home, so enlist the help of a reputable real estate agent to help you sort through the options. The Washington Realtors group is a central source of local real estate information and services; those interested in purchasing a

SNOHOMISH COUNTY

Snohomish County, created out of Island County on Jan. 14, 1861, is named for the Snohomish tribe, spelled "Sdoh-doh-hohbsh" in the Lushootseed language and of disputed meaning with unclear origins. Chief William Shelton, the last hereditary tribal chief of the Snohomish tribe, insisted that it meant "lowland people," a name associated with the tribe's home along the waters of the Puget Sound; others have disputed this, saying the word means "a style of union among them," "the braves" or even "sleeping waters."

Snohomish County is in the western part of Washington, about halfway between the state's north and south borders. Possession Sound and Puget Sound define the county's western border, while the eastern border is bound by the summits of the Cascade Range. Four counties are adjacent to Snohomish County: Skagit County to the north, Chelan County to the east, King County to the south and Island County to the

west. The county's terrain flattens to plains in the west and rises to mountains in the east, the Cascade Range, which holds the highest point in Snohomish County, 10,541-foot Glacier Peak.

Communities in Snohomish County near Naval Station Everett include Arlington, Edmonds, Everett, Lake Stevens, Lynnwood, Marysville, Mukilteo and the city of Snohomish.

Arlington

Arlington sits about 19 miles north of Everett, toward the northwestern side of the county. The city's 9.25 square miles are home to more than 19,000 residents. The city was mapped out by European Americans in 1900, named after Lord Henry Arlington and incorporated as a city on May 5, 1903.

From its beginning, Arlington depended on timber harvesting and products. It was once dubbed the "Shingle Capital of the World" because of all the shingle mills, sawmills and logging camps in the vicinity. Historically, Arlington was a railroad town: It was on the

Northern Pacific main line that stretched from the Canadian border to Snohomish and also had a branch line running east to Darrington that primarily carried timber products. As the timber industry declined in the 1800s, both these lines were abandoned by NP's successor, Burlington Northern Santa Fe, though Arlington still maintains a rail connection with BNSF.

Homes in the area range from well-established neighborhoods to brand-new housing developments, including one near the municipal airport and another in and around the Gleneagle Golf Course. Median rent is \$1,059 and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,745. Mean travel time to work for those living in Arlington is 30 minutes.

Edmonds

Edmonds is the oldest incorporated city in Snohomish County and the third mostpopulous, with a headcount estimated at 42,209 in 2017. Settler George Brackett's homestead and 1876 logging operation formed the foundation of Edmonds, which incorporated in 1890. There are at least two schools of thought as to how the city got its name: either from Vermont Sen. George Franklin Edmunds, whom George Brackett admired, or in association with nearby Point Edmund, named by explorer Charles Wilkes in 1841, but changed later to Point Edwards.

In 1891, the Great Northern Railway came through and early settlers and investors grew hopeful that Edmonds would prosper. Unfortunately, the city suffered a series of fires over the years, and many buildings were lost. Things began turning around after the first car arrived in Edmonds in 1911, and as more roads were constructed and ferry service began in 1923, the town experienced commercial and residential development and steady growth.

The community's location along the westfacing slopes of Puget Sound provides many amenities, including extensive views of the water and Olympic Mountains, access to four beaches and waterfront parks and to a compact, walkable downtown. Edmonds has a variety of parks, including a dog park, a small skate park, a salt marsh and the Edmonds Underwater Park, a local scuba diving site.

This residential community is roughly 9 square miles, and mean travel time to work for those who live in Edmonds is 32 minutes. Median rent in the city is \$1,208 and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$2,072.

Everett

Everett is the county seat and the largest city in Snohomish County, with more than 110,000 residents. It began as a planned industrial city, a lumber mill town, the 1892 economic offspring of John D. Rockefeller and other East Coast capitalists. The new city 25 miles north of Seattle was named for Everett Colby, Rockefeller college classmate and son of Wisconsin Central Railroad magnate Charles L. Colby.

In 1984, Everett was chosen as the site for a U.S. Navy Homeport, Naval Station Everett, which formally opened in 1992, and on Jan. 8, 1997, welcomed the aircraft carrier USS Abraham Lincoln.

Everett is famed as home of the largest public marina on the West Coast and of aviation giant Boeing's assembly plant for the 747, 767, 777 and 787. The Boeing facility is the largest building in the world by volume: 116.5 million cubic feet. Like Arlington's, Everett's early economy was tied to the lumber trade, but as lumber's star faded and Boeing opened in the mid-1960s, the area's focus shifted to manufacturing, and Boeing is now the top employer in the city and county.

The city is dotted with approximately 40 parks, including Walter E. Hall Park, which boasts a golf course and skate park, and Forest Park, a heavily wooded park with a swimming pool, miles of trails and an animal farm.

This residential community is 33.45 square miles and mean travel time to work for those who reside in Everett is 28 minutes. Median rent in the city was \$1,018 in 2017, the most recent census figures, and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage were \$1,684.

Everett is home to the AquaSox minor league baseball team and Everett Community College.

Lake Stevens

Lake Stevens was named after the lake at its heart and is southeast of Marysville, north of the city of Snohomish and 8 miles east of Everett.

From the 1920s to the 1950s, Lake Stevens was primarily a resort community, with many public and private beaches scattered along the shore. On Nov. 29, 1960, Lake Stevens incorporated as a city with an initial population of 900, but soon its popularity and natural beauty, combined with changing commuter habits, drew more and more residents, changing its character to that of a suburban community. Today Lake Stevens has approximately 32,000 residents living in its approximately 9 square miles.

Mean travel time to work for residents of Lake Stevens is 32 minutes. Median rent is \$1,354 and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,925.

Lynnwood

The name "Lynnwood" was the brainchild of Seattle developer Karl O'Beirn, who in 1937 platted some lots to sell along Highway 99 and Alderwood Road (now 196th Street Southwest). He named his project "Lynn" for his wife and "wood" for Alderwood, co-opting part of the name of the nearby Alderwood Manor community. Neighboring entrepreneurs piggybacked on O'Beirn's initiative and produced an actual community, the Lynnwood Business District. After a few false starts, Lynnwood incorporated in April 1959 with a mayor-council city government, which hired Lynnwood's first police officer. Chief Albert L. Glandt, formerly of the Chicago Police Department and semi-pro football, supplied his own car, supplementing it with a German shepherd.

Today, Lynnwood, with a population of 38,000, is a mix of urban, suburban, small city, crossroads and bedroom community to many professionals who work in Seattle. Shopping, though, is its mainstay. Its first big shopping mall opened in September 1979, and now it's considered the shopping hub of south Snohomish County.

At 7.84 square miles, Lynnwood is chock full of parks and trails: 230 acres of developed parks and facilities, 20 acres of undeveloped park land, more than 100 acres of natural open space and some 14 miles of trails.

Median rent is \$1,043 and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,835. Mean travel time to work in Lynnwood is nearly 30 minutes.

Marysville

Marysville's settlement and history began with the signing of the Point Elliott Treaty in 1855 between the United States and the Tulalip people to establish a reservation for them and allow newcomers to settle on the tribe's former territory. The timber industry quickly moved in, staking several claims during the 1860s in the area that would become Marysville. Loggers and the nearby Tulalip reservation provided ample customers for trade, and in 1872, the federal government authorized a small trading post with James P. Comeford, ultimate founder of Marysville, as its proprietor.

The post prospered, and when timber traders wanted to sell 1,280 acres of nearby land in 1878, Comeford was in a position to buy and build, and his new combined store, home, small dock and plank road became Marysville. By 1879, his wife, Maria, had opened the first school for children; by 1880, Comeford was postmaster.

The first saw mill opened in 1887 with three more mills on its heels, and the coming of the railroad in 1889 linked the timber industry and the area to other markets. More and more settlers arrived by rail and steamboat, and in 1891 Marysville incorporated.

Since 2000, residential, commercial and industrial growth and land annexations have transformed the city. The population has more than doubled from just over 29,000 in 2000 to nearly 69,000 in 2017, making it the secondlargest city in Snohomish County.

The strawberry farms that once ringed Marysville gave it the nickname of "Strawberry City," and the sweet berries are still celebrated — and eaten — in June at the annual Strawberry Festival. Residents and visitors alike can enjoy Ebey Waterfront Park on the Snohomish River Delta

and Port Gardner Bay, one of the area's best-kept secrets, or shopping in downtown Marysville.

MOVING CHECKLIST

Six weeks prior to move

- Contact a real estate agent in the local area. Start by looking in the Military Buyer's Guide of this publication.
- Obtain quotes from moving and self-service companies and gather DIY estimates. Decide on the type of move best for your circumstances.
- Determine employer-covered expenses.

Four weeks prior to move

- Check the preregistration procedures to enroll children in school. Get children's transcripts, textbook list and a copy of their current school's grading system. Ask teachers to write descriptions of each student's achievement level, interests and any unusual courses taken.
- Request that copies of all family members' medical and dental records and birth certificates be sent to your new home. Don't forget your pets' veterinary records.
- Notify the post office of your new address and obtain a change-of-address kit. Send change-ofaddress cards to friends, subscription services, creditors, alumni associations, the Department of Motor Vehicles and insurance companies.
- Begin packing seldom-used items and dispose of unwanted items through charities — get receipts for tax purposes.
- Contact the IRS for forms and regulations regarding tax-deductible moving expenses.
- Transfer or arrange for insurance to cover your home, furnishings and automobile.

Three weeks prior to move

- Arrange to have appliances, utilities, newspapers, laundry, phone and cable television disconnected.
 Check on deposits. Set up connections at your new home.
- Make travel arrangements.

Two weeks prior to move

- Handle bills, stocks, investments and banking transfers.
- Arrange to transport pets and plants. Some states prohibit certain plants, so research before you move.
- Clean cupboards and plan remaining meals so you can pack what you don't need.

- One week prior to move
- Discontinue delivery services such as the newspapers.
- Clean and sort items in the garage and attic.
- Clean out your safety deposit box and place all valuables and documents together. If the items can't be replaced, carry them with you.

Two days prior to move

- Defrost and dry refrigerators and freezers.
- Arrange for cash or traveler's checks for trip expenses and payment to the mover upon delivery.
- Reconcile and close checking account. Withdraw savings.
- Conclude any financial matters relating to the lease or sale of your home.
- Pack luggage. Set aside items you will need immediately upon arrival — a few dishes, pots and pans, towels, soap, bedding, light bulbs, flashlights and toilet paper.
- Leave a forwarding address with new tenant or neighbor.

Moving day

- Confirm your delivery date with your mover and provide directions to your new residence as well as primary and secondary contact numbers or email addresses.
- Pay close attention to the mover's paperwork. You will need to sign it upon completion of loading and then unloading at your new residence.
- Supervise the movers to make sure your instructions are understood. Review any damage to your belongings noted by the moving foreman or supervisor.
- Double-check your residence for forgotten items before leaving.

- Clear and mark paths to all rooms to help the movers place the boxes.
- · Supervise unloading.
- Note any damage to your boxes or furniture.
- Review paperwork carefully to make sure all your belongings arrived.

to build a light and fog signal at the point in Mukilteo. The lighthouse, still standing, was completed in 1906, but even at incorporation in 1947, Mukilteo's population was only 775, though with hints of growth to come: By then there was ferry service to Whidbey Island, a fuel storage facility for the Air Force on the waterfront and a major rail line for the Great Northern Railway along the city's entire waterfront. Mukilteo's first growth spurt came with the 1980 annexation of an additional 1.2 square miles, which increased the population to 4,130 people. In 1991, the Harbour Pointe area was annexed, doubling the size of the city to 6.25 square miles.

In 2009 and 2011, Mukilteo was ranked in the No. 10 on Money Magazine's list of Top 100 Small Towns of America to Live In. In 2015, Time named it in a list of the Top 50 Best Places to Live.

Snohomish

Snohomish, proud of a historic downtown on the National Register of Historic Places, is known for its many antique shops, so many, in fact, that it's called the Antique Capital of the Northwest.

Snohomish, founded around 1858 on the Snohomish River, was originally named Cadyville after one of its first three settlers. Snohomish County was carved out of Island County on Jan. 14, 1861 (another early settler, Emory C. Ferguson, recalled in 1889 that Snohomish County was created "because there were more politicians than there were counties and the matter was adjusted by making another county instead of killing some of the politicians"). The name was changed from Cadyville to Snohomish

City in 1871 (Edson Cady had moved); logging and farming were its lifeblood, and the river, its transportation lifeline to the world outside.

Thanks to its farming industry, the community prospered even during the Great Depression but saw declines in the 1960s when hard times hit one of the area's biggest employers, aircraft manufacturer Boeing. Through revitalization efforts in the 1990s the city bounced back, and today Snohomish is a model of how cities can reinvigorate their business districts by preserving their old-fashioned charm.

The city has continued to grow, with much of its development spread out along Bickford Avenue, the former Route 2. Snohomish has conscientiously maintained a balance between its regular businesses in modern facilities, serving the local community, and the specialty shops in the town's historic areas, serving visitors.

Median rent in the city of about 10,000 people is \$937 and selected monthly owner costs of housing units with a mortgage are \$1,862. Mean travel time to work is 29 minutes.

PLANNING YOUR MOVE

Relocating to a new home can be one of the most stressful situations in life. Whether moving across town or the nation, preparation and organization make all the difference.

Decide whether or not to make your move a do-it-yourself operation.

For a DIY move, consider distance, labor help and the costs to rent the moving van, gas, lodging during the move and insurance. A transportable storage unit can bridge a professional and DIY move. When the unit is delivered to your residence, you load and secure it for transport and then unload it at your new residence.

Whatever the method, be sure to obtain as many quotes as possible from professional movers, as well as cost estimates for a DIY move. Next, compare the costs for each type of move, factoring in the stress and physical exertion involved. Ask any company you are interested in for references and use them to inquire about reliability and customer service.

Regardless of which method you choose, the first step should be to inventory your personal belongings. The list, with photographs of any valuables, will be important for both insurance purposes and to help keep you organized during transit.

Plan for one full day to pack each room though the kitchen and garage may take longer. Make a rough estimate of your packing schedule and then add 50 percent more time. It always takes longer than predicted to pack. Toss or donate unused items to lighten your load. Visit www.goodwill.org, www.salvationarmyusa.org or www.clothingdonations.org for locations near you or to arrange a pickup.

Pack for success:

- Consider what you are packing and control box weight. Books should go in small boxes while bedding can easily fill a larger box.
- Wrap fragile items with cardboard dividers, tissue paper or air bubble wrapping.
- Use bright colors when wrapping small items so they don't get thrown out accidentally.
- Use crumpled paper or newspaper to line the top and bottom of boxes.
- Tape a copy of your inventory list to boxes to identify what's inside and where it should go.

BUYING VERSUS RENTING

The decision to buy or rent is the most important step in your relocation process. Purchasing a home entails a long-term financial and emotional commitment with various pluses and minuses. Advantages include the possibility of building equity and the freedom to design and decorate your property or landscape. And don't forget the tax benefits. Disadvantages include upkeep, property taxes and fluctuating property values.

Renting, on the other hand, makes moving easier and someone else maintains the property. Amenities such as laundry rooms, exercise rooms, swimming pools and tennis courts vary from one rental complex to another. The main disadvantage is a loss of control over the residence. Some complexes, for example, restrict or



prohibit pets and personal touches such as painting. And the landlord or property managers can also raise the rent with proper notice.

To determine your best choice, account for all of your needs, review your financial situation and research your options thoroughly.

FINDING AN APARTMENT

Be prepared when you meet with the leasing agent, property manager or owner. Bring a list of what you are looking for in a rental; it is important to be clear about your needs and to get all of your questions answered. You will also need to provide information and verification about your job, your income and your past rental history. Dress to make a good impression and treat the meeting like a job interview — be polite and arrive on time.

Before you sign a lease, inspect the apartment with the landlord. Look for the following problems:

- Cracks, holes or damage in the floor, walls or ceiling.
- Signs of leaking water, leaky fixtures or water damage.
- Any signs of mold or pests.
- · Lack of hot water.
- Inadequate heating or air conditioning.

Use a written checklist with the landlord to document the condition of the rental before you move in, and keep a copy of the completed checklist to use when you move out.

BUYING A HOME

Buying a home is a complex process and, as the recent housing crisis demonstrated, requires a thorough education on the part of the buyer. First, fully understand your financial position credit score, available savings, monthly income and expenditures. Subtracting your expenditures from your income, for instance, will yield the amount you can afford for housing.

Cost Analysis

Be sure to account for all insurance costs associated with owning a home, possible homeowner association fees and property taxes in your monthly expenditures. Overall, loan rules changed in 2015, but according to *www. ginniemae.gov* (Government National Mortgage Association) and *www.homebuyinginstitute.com* (the Home Buying Institute) loan programs continue to vary on the percentage of your income that can be used for housing-related expenses. Lenders balance debt against income to decide if an applicant will be able to repay a loan. Most conventional loans require borrowers to have no more than 43 percent total monthly debt versus their total monthly income, though there are exceptions, such as for those with significant savings. The Federal Housing Administration has a two-tier qualifying system: FHA sets its top thresholds at 31 percent front-end debt (housing expenses as a percentage of income) and 43 percent back-end debt (all debt as a percentage of income) for a 31/43 qualifying ratio. Like commercial lenders, Veterans Affairs combines front-end and back-end debt for a 41 percent limit against income.

Next, research the different types of home loans to determine the right fit for your financial situation and discuss your options with a lending professional. Lenders are diverse today, and not all homebuyers obtain their mortgage loans through their banks and credit unions. For example, you may choose to work with an internet lender, a mortgage broker, a homebuilder or a real estate agency lender. To determine which lender is best for you, get recommendations from friends and family members and check credentials as well as Better Business Bureau ratings.

Credit Report

A preapproved loan before starting your search for a home can determine your spending limits and signal any potential issues in the way of receiving a loan. For any home loan application, the mortgage company will order a credit report, so it would be good to get a free report in advance to determine your credit status and make sure the report contains no erroneous information.

To order your free annual report from one or all of the national consumer reporting companies: Visit *www.annualcreditreport.com* and complete and submit the request form online.

Home Loan Application

To complete a home loan application you'll need: photo IDs (such as a driver's license); Social Security numbers; residence addresses for the past two years with landlord contact information if you rented; names and addresses of your employers for the past two years; your current gross monthly income; recent financial institution statements with names, addresses, account numbers and balances on all checking, savings, CDs, money market, bonds and mutual funds accounts; recent financial institution statements with names, addresses, account numbers, balances and monthly payments on all open loans (including student loans) and credit cards; addresses and loan information of all other real estate owned; estimated value of furniture and

personal property; W2s for the past two years and current paycheck stubs; copies of all divorce decrees, child support documents or any other court proceedings that affect your financial status; verification of any child support payments; and evidence of any retirement or pension benefits. VA or military forms include: DD 214 (veteran), Form 22 (National Guard), DD 1747, Off-base Housing Authority (active duty) and Certificate of Eligibility (active duty).

Knowing your monthly budget and the amount of your loan is invaluable during the next phase, especially finding the answers to questions before the hunt for a home begins.

Housing Hunting

First, determine your home preferences. Does a single-family house, condo, town house or duplex best fit your needs and budget? Do you prefer a new home, an existing home or to build one? Though new homes generally cost more, existing homes may come with maintenance issues and renovation costs. How many bedrooms and bathrooms would you like? Do you want an attached garage? Will you live in the city, a suburb or in the country? How close to work, school, shopping or public transportation do you want to be? Answers to these questions will greatly assist your search and the next stage — hiring a real estate agent.

The ideal agent will help find your ideal home and guide you through the purchase process. First, interview potential candidates to ensure they understand your needs, know your homebuying and neighborhood preferences, and are readily accessible.

Employment & Economy

in Snohomish County

THE 50 LARGEST EMPLOYERS in Snohomish County account for nearly 100,000 jobs, or about 34 percent of the county's total employment. The county's 20,500 businesses range from small family farms specializing in organic foods to the world's largest advanced manufacturing facility producing state-of-the-art aerospace equipment. The manufacturing base, coupled with proximity to a major urban center, provides the foundation for a diverse local economy.

Northern Snohomish County is the manufacturing center of Washington state. Twenty-five percent of the workforce is associated with manufacturing, more than twice the state average. The assembly of commercial aircraft is significant in the local economy, including The Boeing Company and the associated supply chain. Southern Snohomish County, with its nearness to Seattle, has a concentration of knowledgeable workers and life sciences companies. T-Mobile has an engineering technology center with a staff of 600, and Google has a facility in Bothell (18 miles south of Everett) employing roughly 800 workers. On the life sciences side, the southern portion of the county has a cluster of medical device companies with a specific focus on ultrasound diagnostics. Philips Healthcare and Sonosite have a combined workforce of 3,000. On the pharmaceutical side and smaller in scale, CMC Biologics has 200 scientists researching and producing pharmaceuticals on a contract basis.

The median age in Snohomish County is about 37 years old, meaning the workforce skews younger. Median household income in the county is \$70,528, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. Although the state has no income tax, it relies heavily on its sales tax of 6.5 percent, one of the nation's highest rates, and some cities and local governments in the county add additional local sales taxes.

Access by Air, Land and Sea

Few places are as strongly positioned for robust business growth and innovation as Snohomish County, with its relatively easy access from waterways, major interstates and a sprawling commercial airport. Seattle-Tacoma International Airport (Sea-Tac), about 40 miles south of Everett, is the primary airport serving the region with commercial, passenger and cargo services worldwide. Snohomish County Airport Paine Field is a full-service general aviation airport next to Boeing's Everett plant; Paine Field can accommodate the largest aircraft.

Interstate 5 runs from the Canadian border to Mexico. It traverses Snohomish County, providing direct trucking links throughout the West Coast. Seattle is the western terminus for I-90, the major east/west freeway for the northern U.S. that runs all the way east to Boston.

The Burlington Northern/Santa Fe Railroad owns the freight rail network in Snohomish County; Union Pacific brings freight as far as the Seattle yard; and Sound Transit's commuter rail service connects Everett in the north through Seattle south to the city of Tacoma.

The region has multiple deep-water port facilities with service to destinations worldwide. The Port of Everett, in the center of Snohomish County, has container, break-bulk and

barge facilities for cargo movement. The port is also the largest recreational marina on the West Coast. The ports of Seattle and Tacoma (25 and 55 miles south, respectively) have numerous scheduled liner services. The Washington State Ferries system is an extension of the state highway system and is the largest of its kind in the world. Daily, it transports thousands of workers in and out of Snohomish County from residential communities across the water.

Natural Resources

Snohomish County has been and continues to be home to a number of Native American tribes; the county's early economic history is characterized by an abundance of natural resources in a diverse ecological region.

European settlement of Puget Sound, including what is now Snohomish County, followed Capt. George Vancouver's claim of much of western Washington for Great Britain in 1792. Snohomish County was carved out of Island County in 1861, and the late 19th century saw several settlements established in western Snohomish County. When the Great Northern Railway reached the infant city of Everett in 1893, it brought an economic boom with it; Snohomish County's early industrial economy continued to be based on abundant natural resources — primarily timber and agriculture — and the railroad carried those resources to new, far-flung markets.

After World War II, Snohomish County's economic growth was fueled largely by thousands of commuters who worked in Seattle but wanted to live in the suburban bedroom communities in the county's picturesque southwest portions.

The home-grown multinational corporation, Boeing, traces its roots to Seattle and continues to play a prominent role in Snohomish County's economy. In the late 1960s, Boeing established its 747 manufacturing plant at Paine Field near Everett. The later development of other hightechnology industries in Snohomish County brought more population increases and a shift from an economy based on logging and agriculture to one rooted in manufacturing and an expanding service sector.

Naval Station Everett

Puget Sound is the U.S. Navy's third-largest fleet concentration area. The Department of the Navy spends about \$2.8 billion annually in the region, which is home to approximately 31,000 active-duty members, 16,000 civilian employees, 2,400 drilling reservists, 11,000 contractors, 42,000 family members and 55,000 Navy retirees. Naval Station Everett is one of the largest employers in Snohomish County and is estimated to have an annual economic impact of \$360 million, according to the most recent economic impact statement.

An employment agency can offer posts ranging from high-level administration to warehouse work. Many employers use agencies as their human resources department. Agencies advertise, interview, test and manage payroll. A temp-to-perm arrangement allows the employer and prospective employee to evaluate each other before committing to permanent employment.

JOB-SEEKER TIPS

Always keep your resume up-to-date and have several versions that target specific industries

and highlight your skills that fit their job descriptions.

Compile several reference lists with a good variety of people and former business associates. Be sure to first ask each if you can use them as references.

Compose a comprehensive, catchy and succinct cover letter of no more than a page (this is no place to ramble). It will introduce you and your desire to work for the company. Have a knowledgeable friend check it for errors; misspelled words and bad grammar hint at carelessness and indifference. Know what the company does, and highlight skills, work experience and education that apply to the position. Be aware that many employers now accept only online applications so get comfortable with computers.

Maintain a positive, professional and broadbased presence on social media such as Facebook and LinkedIn; almost all employers search social media sites to vet job candidates, and your absence there will raise red flags. Also be aware that images and comments posted spur-of-themoment can be searched out forever and come back to haunt you.

Be prepared for an interview at any time. When you submit your application, a supervisor may want to talk immediately, or the phone may ring with a call from a hiring director. Compose and rehearse - your one-minute self-promotional speech on who you are, an achievement or two and your strengths. It's not vanity to make a good first impression. If a supervisor wants to know why she should hire you, be ready.

Always follow up with thank-you letters and calls. Even today, a letter as well as the quickresponse email will separate you from a surprising number of the other applicants - to your advantage - and keep your name fresh in the interviewer's mind. Judicious calls display your continued interest. Writing out beforehand what you want to say helps. So does rehearsal.

Be aware that due to the usually huge numbers of applicants, most companies are able to follow up only with candidates in whom they are

FINDING A LOCAL DOCTOR

It is important to find a health care provider before an urgent medical need arises. Building trust with a health care provider takes time, so don't wait until a family member is ill to find a doctor, nurse practitioner or other health care provider.

Before you arrive at your new assignment, you can check the Washington State Department of Labor and Industries' online website at *https://secure.lni.wa.gov/provdir*. This should give you

a preview of the local medical practitioners as well as where you might need to go for specialized care.

Personal referrals from friends or other medical personnel can add to your options.

You can check a doctor's certification at the American Board of Medical Specialties at www.abms.org. To see if anyone has registered a complaint or taken disciplinary action against the doctor, visit the Washington State Department of Health's provider credential search at https://fortress.wa.gov/doh/ providercredentialsearch or call 360-236-4700. When you have selected a health care provider, consider the following.

- When you scheduled your appointment, was the receptionist friendly, prompt and professional? Did he or she take time to answer your questions? Were you left on hold too long?
- When you arrived for your appointment, were you greeted promptly? Was the reception area clean and comfortable? Was the staff friendly and willing to answer your questions?
- Did you have to wait long in the exam room before the doctor arrived? Was the exam room orderly and clean, with a chair for a family member?
- When the doctor arrived and introduced himself or herself, did he or she seem rushed or tired? Did you get a good first impression?
- During the consultation, did nurses or assistants pop in and out? Did the doctor seem caring, compassionate and sympathetic to your concerns? Did you feel comfortable revealing personal information? Did the doctor rush through the meeting?

Treat finding a doctor as seriously as looking for a new job or a new home. You want to be comfortable with the person who will see you while you are most vulnerable.

FOR VETERANS

Veterans in Snohomish County are served within Veterans Integrated Service Network 20 — the Northwest VA Health Care Network, with the nearest major medical center in Seattle, about 30 minutes from Naval Station Everett. VISN 20 serves the entire Pacific Northwest, including Alaska, a region with 1.1 million veterans, 24 percent of whom received VA services in fiscal year 2014. VISN 20 facilities recorded 3.4 million outpatient visits throughout Alaska, Washington, Oregon, Idaho and one county each in California and Montana. The closest community outpatient clinic to NS Everett also is in Seattle.



PETS

Moves are stressful for everyone — including the family pet. Pets can sense stress and a change in routine can be difficult for them. If possible, keep your pets in a quiet, secure area while movers pack up or unload your belongings. Movers will have your door open while they move boxes and furniture, and a pet may slip out the door undetected. Make sure you keep a collar with an ID tag on your pet at all times. Ensure the tag has your current phone number on it. It is also a good idea to microchip your pets. Remember to keep the microchip's contact information up-todate. If your pet escapes during any part of your move, you want the animal shelter that scans the chip to be able to contact you.

Depending on where you live, your pet may face new outside dangers as human activity increasingly encroaches on wildlife habitat. Wildlife that your pet may encounter include beavers, coyotes, gophers, raccoons, rodents, skunks, even deer, bears and moose. The best way to avoid wildlife around your home is to limit any behavior that might attract it. Do not leave animal kibble unattended outdoors; raccoons, coyotes and even squirrels that eat pet and people food can lose their fear of humans and may become aggressive. Keep trash in containers with lids that are animal-resistant. In addition to larger animals, smaller pests such as fleas, ticks and spiders can be extremely dangerous as they carry disease to pets and humans, Keep your dog on a short leash in wooded areas, and check for ticks and bites on your animal when you get home. If a tick is found, use finetipped tweezers to grasp it as close to the skin as possible and pull it straight out, gently; if the mouthparts break off and remain in the skin, use the tweezers to remove them as well. After removing the tick, use antiseptic on the bite site and wash your hands thoroughly.



Education & Academics

in Snohomish County

FINDING THE RIGHT SCHOOLS and educational opportunities for each family member is an important part of any move. This chapter outlines Snohomish County public schools system, private schools, charter schools and home schooling criteria, as well as local libraries and higher education institutions. To be enrolled in Washington school, a child must be at least 5 years old by Aug. 31 of the school year. Those wishing to register their child in school should bring the following to the school office: a birth certificate or other proof of the child's age, the child's previous school records and immunizations records. For more details on Washington's minimum vaccine requirements for students in grades K-12, visit the Washington State Department of Health's website at www.doh.wa.gov or the State of Washington Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction website at www.k12.wa.us.

In 2010, Washington, along with the majority of other states, the District of Columbia, Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, the U.S. Virgin Islands and the Department of Defense Education Activity, adopted Common Core State Standards that provide a consistent set of educational expectations for students, regardless of ZIP code. When a family moves, a student's education is often disrupted because the student may be forced to repeat material or learn at a different level at the new school. With common standards across states, this disruption will be reduced — of particular interest to military families. At present, national Common Core State Standards exist only for English language arts and mathematics, with science and social studies in development, though Washington has state standards across the full curriculum. Choosing a School

Choosing the right school is very important, so be sure to research each one before deciding. Contact the school by phone or by visiting its website, which is a valuable source to learn about school district statistics and curriculum. Talk to people in the area, especially friends and colleagues who already live there. If the school shows promise, schedule a visit and bring a list of written questions about studentteacher ratios, computer availability, extracurricular activities, sports programs, music programs, gifted programs and grading standards.

Discuss the potential school with your child: what they liked and what they didn't like. Your family's ability to readily adapt to a move and to find happiness in your new home may depend, in part, on how happy your children are in their new school.

CHARTER SCHOOLS

Charter schools are public schools of choice that are tuition-free, serve all students and have open enrollment; Washington voters approved the state's first charter school initiative in 2012, and by 2018, 12 have opened, though none in Snohomish County — the closest are in Seattle. Located at the base of Queen Anne Hill, the Seattle Center developed from the site of the 1962 World's Fair into a 74-acre, year-round convention and family entertainment hub for the city, with the Space Needle its most famous landmark. The observation tower stands 605 feet high and offers visitors 360-degree views from the observation deck 520 feet aloft. From the rotating restaurant, diners can enjoy the panoramic Seattle skyline, the Olympic and Cascade mountain ranges, Mount Rainier, Mount Baker, Elliott Bay and the surrounding islands. The Fremont Troll came to be after the local Fremont Arts Council was approached in 1990 about doing something imaginative with the spooky space under the Aurora Bridge. After a national competition, the troll created by a team calling itself the Jersey Devils was voted the overwhelming favorite out of five finalists. The iconic troll is 18 feet high, weighs more than 2 tons, is made of steel rebar, wire and concrete, and is crushing an actual Volkswagen Beetle one-handed. Seattle's annual Troll-oween party on Oct. 31 begins at the Troll and continues on to other Fremont art spots and happenings.

Mukilteo Lighthouse Park

One of the community's highlights, Mukilteo Lighthouse Park neighbors the Whidbey Island ferry terminal and contains the Mukilteo Lighthouse, a landmark since it was built in 1905. The lighthouse still functions and is open for free tours on weekends and holidays, April through September.

The park also holds a large picnic area, a beach, a boat launch and prime fishing spots along Possession Sound.

Point Defiance Park

Point Defiance Park, one of Tacoma's bestknown treasures, is recognized as among the premier urban parks in the United States. The 760-acre park includes Point Defiance Zoo & Aquarium, beaches, trails, a boardwalk, a boathouse, Fort Nisqually and a stand of old-growth forest. At the Point Defiance Zoo & Aquarium, the only such combination in the Pacific Northwest, visitors can view everything from sharks and stingrays to wolves and walruses. Ground was broken in 2016 for the new Pacific Seas Aquarium, scheduled to open in summer 2018; it will replace and expand the existing North Pacific Aquarium. Fort Nisqually, never a military outpost, was the first European trading post on Puget Sound. Established in 1833, the fort, now a living history museum, is a model of historic restoration and preservation. Point Defiance Park attracts more than 3.1 million visitors annually.

SPORTS AND RECREATION

Whether you're looking to take in a game or cool off with a trip down a waterslide, you'll find what you're after in Snohomish County. The region's dynamic landscape makes the lure of the great outdoors impossible to ignore.

Everett AquaSox

The Everett AquaSox, a minor league baseball team in the short-season Class A Northwest League, began play in 1984 as the Everett Giants, an affiliate of the San Francisco Giants. Just over a decade later, the Everett Giants and Bellingham Mariners switched cities for the 1995 season, and the Seattle Mariners' affiliate was renamed the Everett AquaSox. In 2010, Everett won its first Northwest League championship as the AquaSox, although they had also won the league championship in 1985 as the Giants. Catch one of their games at Everett Memorial Stadium.

Golf

This region - previously known as the birthplace of grunge rock, Starbucks and wet weather — has built up quite the golf empire over the past decade, blossoming into a destination worthy of players around the globe. When the U.S. Open chose Chambers Bay Golf Course southwest of Tacoma as its 2015 host, it hung a proverbial "open for business" sign for previously nonexistent golf tourism in the Pacific Northwest. Snohomish County has several public and country club courses, among them the 18-hole Snohomish, Flowing Lake and Kenwanda public courses. Everett has two 18-hole public courses managed by the city, Legion Memorial and Walter Hall. From Thanksgiving to Easter, the steep slopes of the Cascades carry the high hopes of skiers. There's lots of dry powder and lots of challenges for every skill level. The closest downhill skiing can be found just 50 miles east of Everett at Stevens Pass: It has a vertical rise of about 2,000 feet with a dozen lifts and runs suited to downhill skiers of all abilities, and is open for both day and night skiing. The area includes day lodges and offers ski lessons as well as rentals. In warmer months, Stevens Pass is full of mountain bikers, hikers and people who just want to enjoy a scenic ride in a chairlift.

Snohomish Aquatic Center

The Snohomish Aquatic Center is a 52,000-square-foot state-of-the-art facility that includes a competition pool with a dive area, recreation pool, warm-water pool, spray-play area, zero-entry area, surf-simulation machine, lazy river and water slide.
