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WELCOME TO NEW ORLEANS



When transitioning into the New Orleans area, remember: The more you plan in advance, the easier the move. The next few pages of this publication offer suggestions and information geared to make the transition smoother. The Fleet and Family Support Center, 504-678-7569; the Navy Family Housing Office, 504-678-3280; and the Household Goods Office, 504-678-9820; are all available to assist you.

VEHICLE REGISTRATION

All vehicles on board Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base (NAS JRB) New Orleans must be properly registered with the security department in the Consolidated Law Enforcement Operations Center (CLEOC) database. All vehicles must have a valid state vehicle registration and proof of automobile insurance to access the installation. All drivers must have a valid driver's license in their possession while operating a motor vehicle on board the base.

BASE DRIVING REGULATIONS

The speed limit on board NAS JRB New Orleans is 25 mph; any exceptions are posted. The speed limit in all family housing is 10 mph, and the speed limit through alleyways between housing units and cul-de-sacs is 5 mph. All speed limits are strictly enforced. **Seat Belts/Child Restraints** — All Louisiana state traffic laws, Title 32, are enforced on board NAS JRB New Orleans. Louisiana state law and the Department of the Navy require the use of seat belts at all times while operating or riding in a vehicle. As of August 2019, state law mandates that children 12 and younger must be restrained in the back seat. Children younger than 2 years old must be in a rear-facing child safety seat; 2 through 4 years a forward-facing child safety seat with an internal harness if they have outgrown a rear-facing seat; and 4 through 9 years must ride in a booster seat secured with a lap/shoulder belt. Children 9 through 12 can ride without a booster seat if their knees bend over the front edge of the seat, their back is against the seat back and the seat belt crosses their chest and not their neck.

Traffic Violations — The base operates on a traffic points system for issuing Armed Forces Traffic Tickets 1408s and monetary fines for U.S. Magistrate Citations 1805s. Persons whose driving privileges are suspended or revoked (for one violation or an accumulation of 12 traffic points within 12 consecutive months or 18 traffic points within 24 consecutive months) will be notified in writing through official channels, as per OPNAVINST 11200.5D. Magistrate Tickets 1805s are also issued incorporating monetary

fines for traffic violations and mandatory appearances in Federal Magistrate Court in the city of New Orleans.


Motorcycle Operators - Motorcycle operators must have proof of completing a Motorcycle Safety Foundation-approved course within the past three years before being permitted to operate a motorcycle on base. Motorcycles and motorcycle operators must meet the requirements of OPNAVINST 5100.12J (JUNE 26, 2012) as it pertains to required safety equipment and attire. Proper attire includes the following: a helmet meeting Department of Transportation requirements, Snell Memorial Foundation certification, worn and properly fastened under the chin (fake or novelty helmets are prohibited); protective eye devices designed for motorcycle riders or a full-face shield covering the eyes; sturdy over-the-ankle footwear that affords protection for the feet and ankles; a long-sleeved shirt or jacket; long trousers; and full-fingered gloves or mittens designed for use on a motorcycle. Motorcycle jackets constructed of abrasion-resistant materials such as leather, Kevlar or Cordura and containing impact-absorbing padding are highly recommended. Outer garments constructed of brightly colored and reflective materials are highly recommended during daylight hours. Reflective outer garments or vests must be worn during hours of darkness.

FIREARMS REGISTRATION

All privately owned weapons introduced into the installation must be registered with the security department. Failure to register may result in the loss of the weapon. Base housing residents may keep their privately owned weapons in their quarters, but the weapons must first be registered with base security. Concealed weapon permits issued by civil authorities are not valid on NAS JRB New Orleans. Transportation of weapons and ammunition is not authorized on base unless the weapon is already registered and you are taking it to your residence. All weapons must be under the control of a person 21 or older and must not be left unattended at any time. For full guidance on firearms refer to OPNAVINST 5530.14E CH-1 (Sept. 23, 2014), paragraph 0306, Personal Firearm Safety, Control and Accountability.





NAVAL AIR STATION JOINT RESERVE BASE



Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base (NAS JRB) New Orleans is one of only two joint air Reserve military bases in the United States. It comprises about 5,200 acres in Plaquemines Parish and is composed of more than 7,000 personnel in 33 tenant commands. The installation's airfield supports local squadrons from the Navy Reserve, Coast Guard, Marine Corps Reserve and the Louisiana Air National Guard. Two operational runways are maintained, with the larger offering 10,000 feet of usable space as well as a full complement of approaches for both instrument and visual landings. Multiple training detachments from the Navy, Air Force, Air National Guard, state, federal and joint service organizations are frequently supported through base operations.

The base also serves as an interim support base for disaster relief operations and actively participated in operations from Hurricane Katrina through Hurricane Isaac as well as national-interest events.

Medical care, child care, a charter school, the Navy Exchange and commissary services complement the quality of life offered aboard NAS JRB New Orleans.

The primary mission of NAS JRB New Orleans is to provide superior operational and training environments for active-duty and Reserve components from all branches of the armed services while sustaining the full spectrum of combat, peacetime and humanitarian operations. The base also serves as a platform for assistance with Homeland Security air defense through the Louisiana Air National Guard as well as search-and-rescue efforts for much of the Gulf Coast by Coast Guard Air Station New Orleans. NAS JRB also provides aviation intermediate maintenance, supply, comptrollership and personnel support facilities for Navy and Naval Reserve personnel and has for more than 50 years.

The year 2002 was a banner one for the base as NAS JRB was recognized as the Navy's most outstanding military shore installation and received the Conway Trophy for Base Installation Excellence. Also in 2002, Belle Chasse Academy opened, making it the first charter school on a military installation, and the number of on-base houses tripled with the completion of a public-private housing project, one of the first in the country.

In 2003 and again in 2005, NAS JRB was nominated by Navy Region Southeast to be its representative for the Secretary of Defense Shore Installation Excellence Awards given to the best military base of all the branches of service.

After Hurricane Katrina devastated the central Gulf Coast on Aug. 29, 2005, NAS JRB became the center of DOD rescue-and-recovery efforts. During the first 10 days after the storm, more than 10,000 military personnel and relief workers were airlifted into NAS JRB, along with 18 million pounds of relief supplies. NAS JRB, with the only operating runways in New Orleans, became the primary search-and-rescue airfield for flights whose crews saved more than 10,000 lives in the New Orleans area.

While still recovering from Hurricane Katrina and preparing for the 2006 storm season, the first phases of the 2005 Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) Commission were set into motion, and NAS JRB bid farewell to Patrol Squadron (VP) 94 as the squadron decommissioned on March 31, 2006. This was followed by the decommissioning of the 926th Fighter Wing of the Air Force Reserve on Sept. 30, 2006.

In 2008, the base welcomed the Airborne Early Warning Squadron (VAW-77), the Night Wolves, flying the E-2C Hawkeye and celebrated its 50th anniversary at its current location.

During the next two years and in line with more BRAC moves, the base welcomed more new tenants: Navy Band New Orleans, Navy Air Logistics Office, Navy Reserve Professional Development Center and the Military Entrance Processing Station.

In 2011, a new Navy Exchange and Commissary occupying more than 100,000 square feet opened on base to serve the military and their families. A new Marine Barracks was also completed and opened, and construction began on a 400-seat auditorium at Belle Chasse Academy. The building is a joint usage facility, available for base functions during non-school hours.

In October 2011, construction began on a new base air traffic control tower. The tower now gives air traffic controllers a better view of the airfield, provides more room for the training of new air traffic controllers and is designed to facilitate installation of new electronics as they come into future use. Growth aboard NAS JRB New Orleans continued in 2012 as Aviation Arbor Recreational Vehicle Park and a base sports complex opened in the spring. The RV park has 45 spots, including two that are handicap-accessible, and the sports complex features a quarter-mile running track, softball field, football and soccer field, playground, tennis courts, pavilion and concession stand, with restrooms. In August 2012, Hurricane Isaac deluged the area with rain and wind, knocking power out on base for days, uprooting trees and damaging buildings. Recovery from this storm continued throughout 2013.

In early 2013, the base saw the decommissioning of VAW-77, the opening of the Belle Chasse Academy auditorium and the reopening of the Liberty Center, which was heavily damaged in 2012 during Hurricane Isaac.

The air station's new air traffic control tower became fully operational in 2014, and extensive construction began on upgrading the base's airfield, runway and taxiways. The Navy Band New Orleans was decommissioned in September 2014, moving its people and equipment to Jacksonville, Florida.

In 2015, despite the unavailability of the primary runway due to an extensive \$22 million airfield resurfacing project, the operations department executed 19,670 mishap-free flight operations and hosted 10 diverse detachments. These included the Canadian Navy, Canadian Chief of Naval Operations (CNO), POTUS, Arizona Air National Guard, U.S. Army Reserve paratroopers and a State of Louisiana/FEMA Medical Institute Evacuation exercise. The installation's MWR Program continues its five-star accredited program — the highest possible rating — while the Fleet and Family Support Center was recognized by Commander Navy Installations Command for numerous program strengths.

Activities aboard the air station continued during 2016 with several public works projects including a base-wide drainage improvement project and an extensive redesign and upgrade to the main gate from Highway 23. Also, running paths throughout the base were renovated and improved as were athletic fields and community recreational facilities. Mishap-free flight hours numbered more than 18,000 as the transient line recovered, fueled and launched 565 transient aircraft with zero mishaps, and handled 968,400 pounds of cargo.

In 2017, NAS JRB New Orleans hosted its first air show in six years, highlighted by the Navy's flight demonstration team, The Blue Angels. The three-day event drew more than 220,000 visitors to the base.

In May 2019 the air station held the inaugural Need for Speed Runway Run, opening the base to the running community. More than 500 runners of all ages completed the 5k run.

With the oldest and largest state charter school on board a DOD installation and an "A" school recipient, Belle Chasse Academy, NAS JRB New Orleans provides superior educational services to more than 900 K-8 students. Along with the more than 900 family units on board the installation, NAS JRB New Orleans is easily recognizable as a superb family environment.

As home to commands representing multiple government agencies, NAS JRB New Orleans supports a unique population who live, work or serve on board the installation. On a daily basis, NAS JRB New Orleans is a constant center of activity for air operations, ground operations and a variety of family support services. From major military construction projects to the replacement of the smallest segment of sidewalk, NAS JRB New Orleans consistently and aggressively implements improvements to operations support, quality of life and the safety of personnel.

AVIATION SUPPORT DIVISION

A division of Fleet Readiness Center Mid Atlantic Det. New Orleans

The Aviation Support Division (ASD) is the single point of contact for aviation maintenance activities requiring direct supply support. The specific mission of ASD New Orleans is to provide world-class supply support to Fleet Readiness Center Mid-Atlantic Det. New Orleans and the local Navy and Marine Corps squadrons stationed at NAS JRB New Orleans along with filling fleet requisition referrals from around the world.

ASD New Orleans processes more than 28,000 requisitions and issues more than 24,000 repair parts from stock each year. In addition, it maintains an inventory of more than 12,000 parts valued in excess of \$189 million. ASD New Orleans understands that "you can't fly without supply" and strives to provide the best supply support possible to allow Navy and Marine Corps air forces to meet their mission.



FLEET LOGISTICS CENTER JACKSONVILLE

The mission of Navy Supply Fleet Logistics Center Jacksonville (FLCJ) in New Orleans is to deliver sustained global logistics capabilities to the Navy and Joint Warfighter. FLCJ manages supply chains that provide material for Navy aircraft, surface ships, submarines and their associated weapons systems. The center also provides a wide range of base operating and waterfront logistics support services, coordinating material deliveries, micro-purchasing for supplies and services and furnishing material management, HAZMAT management, official mail services, fuel services and household goods/personal property shipping and warehousing services.



FLEET READINESS CENTER MID-ATLANTIC DET. NEW ORLEANS

The mission of the Fleet Readiness Center Mid-Atlantic (FRCMA) Det. New Orleans is to produce relevant quality airframes, engines, components and services to meet the Navy's aircraft-ready-for-training entitlements at improved efficiency and reduced costs.

Formerly known as the Aircraft Intermediate Maintenance Department (AIMD), the Navy transformed naval aviation maintenance in February 2006 by forming Fleet Readiness Centers, which integrated Naval Air Depots and the continental United States AIMDs into a consolidated organization for shore-based, off-flight-line maintenance.

On Aug. 1, 2006, the Office of the Secretary of Defense approved the FRC business plan, and AIMD New Orleans became Fleet Readiness Center Mid-Atlantic Site New Orleans. The implementation of FRCs is one of the Navy's strategies to support the warfighter and achieve cost-wise readiness in the 21st century.

Navy aircraft are designed to fly hard, fast and in the worst conditions. Squadron technicians work hard to ensure that they perform at 100 percent. When the components of those aircraft need repair or maintenance, FRC brings intermediate-level maintenance expertise to the flight line and directly supports one F/A-18 Hornet squadron, one C-130T Hercules squadron and one Marine Corps squadron composed of UH-1Y Hueys and AH-1W Cobras. The FRCMA Det. New Orleans is a large maintenance operation with more than 160 Sailors, Marines and civil service employees working to keep the aircraft it supports up and flying.

FRCMA Det. New Orleans has 58 work centers in eight divisions: personnel, supply, avionics, power plants, airframes, life support equipment, armament and support equipment. On average, more than 876 aircraft parts per month run through FRCMA Det. New Orleans.

Responding to the unique challenges of supporting four types or models of aircraft that routinely operate in support of the global war on terrorism, no other ashore FRC Det. this size has responded as effectively to meet or exceed all Navy and Marine Corps mission and fleet support expectations. FRCMA Det. New Orleans has met 100 percent of its commitments with unmatched success, leading other FRCs in key metrics of maintenance and logistics support, planeside performance, production and production resources.

The unit processed 12,981 maintenance actions in fiscal year 2018, maintaining an average readyfor-issue rate of 92.25 percent, an impressive metric for any intermediate repair facility. Whether it is through outstanding maintenance support, stellar customer service, emergency response or Lean Six Sigma initiatives, FRCMA Det. New Orleans sets the standard for others to follow.



FLEET READINESS CENTER AVIATION SUPPORT EQUIPMENT (FRC ASE) SITE NEW ORLEANS

The Fleet Readiness Center Aviation Support Equipment (FRC ASE) Site is the only nonorganic (or contracted) depot-level rework facility





assigned under Commander Fleet Readiness Centers Command and FRC ASE.

This designated repair point provides incidental and emergent repair and rework, corrosion control, precision measurement equipment repair and field team support to DOD activities (Fleet, Reserve, and special projects) as required.

The FRC Aviation Support Equipment Site shares a facility with Navy Calibration Lab New Orleans.



JOINT RESERVE INTELLIGENCE CENTER

The Joint Reserve Intelligence Center New Orleans (JRIC NOLA) is an integral part of Commander, Naval Information Forces Reserve Command (NAVIFORES) and Director, Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) missions, vision and intent. JRIC NOLA provides reliable facilities and equipment for strategic, operational, and tactical intelligence training and production for all Intelligence Community (IC), and Active and Reserve Information Warfare (IW) personnel. JRIC NOLA also provides critical information systems for Navy Reserve Information Warfare and Joint Reserve intelligence personnel to prepare and train for mobilizations, while concurrently fulfilling real-world operational requirements in support of Navy, Joint, Unified and Geographic Commandant commands. JRIC NOLA provides administrative support to 11 Navy Reserve Information Warfare Community (IWC) units; comprising of more than 500 IWC personnel across Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina.

MILITARY SEALIFT COMMAND

The personnel assigned to Military Sealift Command (MSC) Ship Inspection Branch New Orleans perform ship material condition and operational readiness inspections for MSC vessels worldwide.

Formerly a MSC Office/Ship Surge Detachment, the MSC was previously located at the old Naval Support Activity (NSA) on the eastbank of New Orleans. In October 2007 the MSC Ship Surge Detachment was disestablished and personnel were absorbed by Military Sealift Command Ship Inspection Branch N752, headquartered in Norfolk, Virginia.

After the closure of NSA New Orleans, the MSC N752 ship inspection personnel were relocated to NAS JRB New Orleans.





NAVY AIR LOGISTICS OFFICE

The Navy Air Logistics Office (NALO) was established in 1980, and the chief of Naval Reserve was appointed Chief of Naval Operations (CNO) executive agent for airlift. NALO is an Echelon IV aviation major command with a staff of more than 50 personnel. NALO schedules airlifts and tasking for 11 squadrons and 41 aircraft and schedules an average of 1,000 missions carrying 87,000 passengers and 8.5 million pounds of cargo per year. NALO validates, prioritizes and schedules worldwide unique Navy fleet-essential airlift missions supporting combatant commander, fleet response and DOD requirements.

The command formulates worldwide airlift policy change recommendations and operates a data collection and analysis system for airlift asset management and aircraft acquisition justification for the CNO.



NAVY CALIBRATION LABORATORY NEW ORLEANS

The primary mission of Navy Calibration Laboratory New Orleans is to provide in-lab and on-site depot calibration services to Naval Air Systems Command customers worldwide. The lab is a government-owned contractor-operated facility that operates under the umbrella of the NAVAIR Metrology and Calibration Program headquartered at Naval Air Station Patuxent River, Maryland.

Two major parts of the mission are to provide aviator breathing oxygen servicing equipment cleaning and calibrations as well as calibration services for aviation support equipment reworked at the co-located Fleet Readiness Center Support Equipment Site, New Orleans. The lab has been in New Orleans for more than 19 years, providing regionalized and global calibration support to the naval aviation warfighter.



NAVY MUNITIONS COMMAND (NMCLANT) DET. NEW ORLEANS

Navy Munitions Command Atlantic, Det. New Orleans provides top notch ordnance support to Navy and joint customers onboard NAS JRB New Orleans. It is responsible for the safe and secure storage of ordnance in 12 weapons magazines. Services include ordnance issue, receipt and assembly for all Navy, Marine, Army and Coast Guard commands. The detachment also performs maintenance on and provides commands with needed armament weapons support equipment.



The Navy Operational Support Center (NOSC) New Orleans Headquarters is located on installation at Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base



New Orleans within the Frank J. Uddo Armed Forces Reserve Center (Building 492).

The command's primary mission is to generate mobilization readiness by providing administrative services, training support, and world-class customer service to Reserve personnel in support of surge and operational requirements for the Navy, Marine Corps, and Joint-Forces teams. NOSC New Orleans also serves as a Tier 1 EKMS program manager, generating and distributing electronic key material for communications security equipment at area tenant commands. The command staff is composed of full-time support personnel who serve and support more than 250 Reservists across 22 Reserve units.



NAVY RESERVE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The Navy Reserve Professional Development Center (NRPDC) is the sole training command that impacts the entire Navy Reserve. NRPDC is composed of a staff of 36 instructors, facilitators and support personnel and is committed to developing a smarter, better-educated Reserve Force through training available to anyone, anytime, anywhere. There are two civilians assigned to the staff serving as the director of training and learning management and quota control coordinator. The command has nine departments: administrative, personnel, training/operations, supply, automated information systems, quota control, learning standards office, computer-based training and medical. Courses offered at the center are designed to provide comprehensive instruction to activeduty, full-time support and Reserve Sailors and civilian personnel in areas critical to Navy Reserve activities, whether on-site or as mobile training teams. Some of the courses offered are Reserve Senior Enlisted Management, Reserve Career Information, Reserve Medical Administration, Reserve Supply and Fiscal Support, Reserve Pay and Personnel Management, and Navy Reserve Order Writing System/ Reserve Defense Travel System. NRPDC also manages a detachment in Little Creek, Virginia, that facilitates Navy Operational Support Center Commanding Officer, Navy Reserve Unit Management and Operational Support Officer courses. NAVY TALENT ACQUISITION GROUP NEW ORLEANS

SQUADRON (VFA) 204 Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 204, the

River Rattlers, was originally commissioned July 1, 1970, as Attack Squadron (VA) 204, flying A-4C Skyhawks at Naval Air Station Memphis, Tennessee. A transition to the A-4E Skyhawk took place in 1971, and shortly thereafter the squadron deployed for two weeks with Carrier Air Wing Reserve (CVWR) 29, embarked on USS John F. Kennedy (CV 67). That deployment marked a Naval Reserve first. VA-204 went on to win back-to-back CVWR-20 Bombing Derbies in 1971 and 1972, foreshadowing a long list of tactical accomplishments.

VA-204 received its first CNO Safety Award in 1973. The award represented more than 5,000 hours of accident-free flying that year. In 1975, the River Rattlers won the coveted F. Trubee Davison Award as the "Best Tailhook Squadron in the Naval Reserves."

In March 1978, the squadron moved from NAS Memphis to NAS New Orleans and simultaneously began transitioning to the A-7B aircraft. The operational tempo increased in 1980 with numerous detachments ranging from NAS Bermuda to NAS Fallon and nearly everywhere in between. VA-204's selection as the winner of the CNO Safety Award for 1980 was a proud end to a busy year.

The squadron also earned CNO Safety Awards in 1982 and 1983 and in 1984 won the CVWR-20 Golden Wrench Award and the Battle "E."

In 1986, VA-204 transitioned to the A-7E Corsair II, and in 1990 earned its fifth CNO Safety Award.

On Jan. 28, 1991, the squadron celebrated 10 years of operations with no foreign-object damage and was ordered to transition to the Navy's newest strike fighter, the F/A-18A Hornet. VA-204 officially redesignated to Strike Fighter Squadron 204 (VFA-204) on April 1, 1991, with the acceptance of its first Hornet. Just one year after the transition, VFA-204 received its sixth CNO Safety Award, marking a monumental 13 years and 50,000 Class "A" Mishap Free flight hours.


In 1994 and 1995, the River Rattlers received their second F. Trubee Davison Award and a meritorious unit commendation. The squadron again earned the F. Trubee Davison Award in 1998 and the next year earned the Battle "E" and Golden Wrench awards. By 2000, the squadron had racked up 20 years and nearly 70,000 flight hours of Class "A" mishap-free operation. In 2001, the squadron maintained adversary support with five detachments and a historic "Around the Horn" embarkation on board USS Nimitz (CVN 68). As the events of 9/11 rocked the world, the River Rattlers set sail to offer fleet protection and training as Nimitz transited around South America, changing its homeport from Norfolk, Virginia, to San Diego. In 2003, the squadron again earned the CNO Safety Award.

The A-plus upgrade to the Rattlers' Hornet aircraft arrived, providing "smart weapon" and "launch and leave" capabilities and putting VFA-204 back on the cutting edge of war-fighting capabilities. In 2004, the River Rattlers took 10 jets to Elmendorf Air Force Base, Alaska, for Exercise Cope Thunder, demonstrating versatility that greatly impressed local Air Force units; the Rattlers employed precision weapons, established air superiority and also provided professional adversary services in a complete warfare training environment.

Flying more than 193 sorties, the squadron delivered more than 174,000 pounds of live ordnance and provided counter-air protection and interdiction during a complete war scenario.

In August 2005, Hurricane Katrina presented unprecedented challenges for the River Rattlers. With less than 48 hours' notice, the squadron evacuated New Orleans to NAS JRB Fort Worth, Texas. The squadron was able to quickly reconstitute and return to NAS JRB New Orleans without any loss of life or damage to valuable Navy assets. The squadron was, once again, recognized with the CNO Safety Award for 2005.

The following year, the River Rattlers passed the 26-year mark and 87,000 hours of Class "A" mishap-free operations and received another CNO Safety Award. In 2007, they once more provided professional adversary support on a worldwide stage and were again awarded the Battle "E." The River Rattlers excelled as both an adversary and





strike fighter squadron in 2008. During a strike detachment supporting Exercise Northern Edge, the squadron completed 964.4 flight hours and 672 sorties with a 98 percent overall sortie completion rate in support of fleet requirements.

In 2009, VFA-204 surpassed 29 years and 95,363 Class "A" mishap-free flight hours while flying 2,016 sorties and 2,915 flight hours.

The Rattlers flew 264 sorties and 464 hours in support of the global war on terrorism, providing critical air-to-ground training sorties for students going through the Joint Terminal Air Controller course. The Rattlers conducted nine detachments in 2009, including four supporting fleet replacement squadrons, three composite training unit exercises, one Joint Task Force Exercise and a detachment supporting VFA-136's air-to-air training, earning them the Battle "E," Golden Wrench and Retention Excellence awards.

In 2010, the Rattlers completed eight detachments, executing 1,715 sorties and 2,532 flight hours without a single Class "A," "B" or "C" mishap. In doing so, the River Rattlers celebrated a 30-year, 97,895 Class "A" mishap-free milestone.

The highlight of 2011 was the N'Awlins Air Show, held May 7 and 8 at NAS JRB New Orleans. On May 8, River Rattler aircraft took to the skies over Southern Louisiana exactly 100 years from the day naval aviation was born. In addition to participating in the Centennial of Naval Aviation, the River Rattlers conducted eight detachments in support of fleet training. The year 2012 culminated in a highly successful detachment in which the squadron expended nearly 100,000 pounds of live air-to-ground ordnance and 10 air-to-air missiles. As a result of VFA-204's spectacular performance over the course of the year, the command was awarded the 2012 Battle "E," Golden Wrench and Commander, Naval Air Force Reserve Squadron of the Year honors. In 2013, the River Rattlers were able to refocus on the fundamentals of F/A-18 air-to-air and airto-ground employment in a way that had not been possible for several years. This "re-blue" culminated in an entire squadron carrier qualification detachment to Oceana, Virginia, in the late summer.

VFA-204 transitioned to the F/A-18C in 2018, further enhancing its warfighting capabilities with an advanced combat systems and avionics suite. The River Rattlers continue to set the bar high, proving that the experience and expertise in this Naval Reserve squadron rival those of any unit, anywhere, anytime.



FLEET LOGISTICS SUPPORT SQUADRON (VR) 54

Fleet Logistics Support Squadron (VR) 54 was commissioned as a Naval Reserve Force Squadron on June 1, 1991. Located at Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base New Orleans, VR-54 was the first Navy Reserve squadron to fly the Lockheed C-130T "Hercules." The squadron operates four C-130T aircraft with a normal maximum takeoff weight of 165,500 pounds, able to carry any combination of up to 92 passengers and 40,000 pounds of palletized cargo, heavy trucks



or light armored vehicles. Due to the diverse capabilities, VR-54's mission includes everything from transporting a deploying carrier air wing to flying supplies to remote corners of the world. Nicknamed The Revelers, the squadron bears the colors purple, green and gold, symbolic of the official colors of Mardi Gras.

The squadron's mission is to operate Navy Unique Fleet Essential Airlift aircraft and to provide responsive, flexible and rapidly deployable air logistics support required to maintain combat operations at sea and meet combatant commanders' logistical requirements. Also the squadron provides peacetime air logistics support for all Navy commands and quality training for all fleet logistics support squadron personnel. Year-round, highly skilled and motivated aircrews, maintenance and support personnel provide worldwide logistics support to the fleet in a constantly changing arena of operations.

The Revelers are composed of both active-duty and Reserve personnel working together to meet the squadron's mission. There are more than 200 highly trained and motivated aircrew, maintenance and support personnel who make up the squadron. The majority of the skilled professionals are on active duty, while approximately 40 percent are drilling Reservists who commute from numerous states to New Orleans to meet a commitment to train and operate at least one weekend each month and for one two-week detachment per year. For aircrews, this commitment is often much more. These "Citizen Sailors" come from all walks of life including educators, attorneys, doctors, businessmen and businesswomen, airline pilots, engineers, police officers, college students, farmers and carpenters. All of these elements combine smoothly into a team with tremendous ability, experience and motivation.

History

Commissioned June 1, 1991, the squadron received its first aircraft "762" in August of that year and now operates four Lockheed C-130T Hercules aircraft.

VR-54 is actually the rebirth of a previous squadron of the same designation that was also stationed aboard NAS JRB New Orleans. The original VR-54 flew the C-118 Liftmaster transport aircraft and was decommissioned in the early 1980s when the Navy introduced the C-9 Skytrain. The members of VR-54 log upward of 2,000 flight hours annually supporting worldwide (hence "World Famous") logistics mission. Any given year VR-54 provides six to eight months of air logistics detachment support to the European Command, Pacific Command and Central Command.





LOUISIANA AIR NATIONAL GUARD



159TH FIGHTER WING

The present-day Louisiana Air National Guard (LA ANG) was originally formed in December 1940 as the 122nd Observation Squadron, a National Guard unit of the then-U.S. Army Air Corps. Since its inception, the LA ANG has participated in World War II; the Korean conflict; the Cold War; operations Enduring Freedom, Northern Watch and Southern Watch; the Kosovo War; Operation Noble Eagle; Air Expeditionary Force deployments; Operation Iraqi Freedom; the global war on terrorism; Task Force New Horizon; and Operation New Dawn.

The 159th Fighter Wing is an Air National Guard fighter unit of more than 1,400 men and women. It is operationally gained by Air Combat Command and nicknamed the "Bayou Militia." Assigned pilots fly the F-15C and F-15D Eagle aircraft.

The 159th Fighter Wing is composed of an Operations Group, Maintenance Group, Medical Group and Mission Support Group. Four geographically separated units are also attached to the 159th Fighter Wing: the 122nd Air Support Operations Squadron in Pineville, the 259th Air Traffic Control Squadron in Alexandria, the 236th Combat Communications Squadron in Hammond and the 214th Engineering Installation Squadron in Belle Chasse. Each of these geographically separated units has its own distinct mission.



The Louisiana Air Guard is unique compared with other Reserve Force components in that it is tasked with dual missions. The wing provides worldwide deployable aircraft and combat resources, operated, maintained and supported by professional Louisiana Airmen dedicated to supporting both federal and state missions.

The LA ANG provides its Airmen the opportunity to enjoy civilian life while contributing to the welfare of their country, state and community.

The 159th Fighter Wing was awarded the coveted "Outstanding Air National Guard Unit" honor in 2010. This prestigious award is given annually to the Air National Guard unit that meets or exceeds criteria from the National Guard Bureau. In addition, the wing received an "Excellent" rating during its Operational Readiness Inspection in both 2009 and 2010. These



Airmen have shown extreme professionalism and dedication to their mission of protecting the U.S. and its allies.

The wing's mission is to provide fully staffed units prepared to accomplish all federal, state and local missions; provide high-quality support to Airmen and their families; and to add value to our communities by involvement in state and local programs.

Four main functional groups comprise the Wing: operations, maintenance, mission support and medical, each with its own squadrons and the four geographically separated sites mentioned earlier.

The Operations Group

The Operations Group has two subordinate units: the 122nd Fighter Squadron and the 159th Operations Support Flight. The group trains and supports aviators to maintain regular flying schedules, to support the alert mission for immediate worldwide deployments and for employment in accordance with war plans.

122nd Fighter Squadron

The 122nd Fighter Squadron is a diverse and dynamic squadron that is combat-ready to deploy anywhere, anytime, employing the venerable air superiority of the F-15C/D Eagle Fighter. This worldwide commitment is the driving force behind a sharply honed team of professionals and has resulted in deployments around the world. Together with the 159th Fighter Wing, the 122nd Fighter Squadron is tasked to provide air superiority over Louisiana and the Gulf Coast while supporting the North American Aerospace Defense Command. Performing this vital role requires an active air defense alert 24/7 at NAS JRB.

Maintenance Group

To sustain the fast-paced tempo, the wing has a highly dedicated and well-trained cadre of maintenance and support personnel.

The maintainers are tasked with on- and off-equipment maintenance of the Eagles, including aircraft servicing, unscheduled maintenance, pre-flights, through flights, basic postflights and combat turns with live or training ammunition.

Mission Support Group

With more than 500 military and civilian personnel, the 159th Mission Support Group is responsible for all base support and customer service for the wing and the geographically separated units at their sites throughout the state. The group also maintains combat and contingency readiness forces that deploy worldwide. This group encompasses the communications flight, civil engineering squadron, logistics readiness squadron, security forces squadron, force support squadron and contracting.

Medical Group

The 159th Medical Group provides the following medical services: flight medicine, physical examinations, ophthalmology and optometry, public health and bioenvironmental engineering. This includes providing medical support services to the geographically separated units at their sites throughout the state.

159th Fighter Wing Staff

The wing staff consists of several offices that fall directly under the commander: command post, chaplain, equal opportunity, judge



advocate general, safety, financial management, visual information and public affairs. The director of the Air National Guard Psychological Health Program is also part of the wing staff.

Federal Mission

The 159th Fighter Wing supports national security objectives by being a part of the Air Expeditionary Force participating in real-world missions, supporting active-duty forces, honing combat skills and undertaking specific training to meet assigned tasks.

State Mission

The National Guard's purpose is to protect life and property and to preserve peace, order and public safety for its state. The mission also includes information-sharing with emerging countries on the importance of homeland defense.

Community Role

The 159th Fighter Wing participates year-round in local, state and national programs that add value to local towns, the state and nation. The men and women who make up the 159th Fighter Wing will continue to defend the nation while transforming into the necessary force for the future. The wing will do this in both expeditionary and homeland defense missions while continuing to uphold its military culture and connections to the community. The men and women of the 159th Fighter Wing serve proudly in the far reaches of the globe — and at home — and do so with distinction.





MARINE FORCES RESERVE





MARINE AIRCRAFT GROUP 49 DET C

Marine Aircraft Group 49 Detachment C (MAG-49 Det.C), originated in 1946 at the New Orleans Lakefront Airport under the name Marine Air Detachment (MAD) and actively supported Marine Fighter Squadron 143.

MAD was redesignated as Marine Air Reserve Training Detachment (MARTD) in September 1953; in November 1957, MARTD relocated from New Orleans Lakefront Airport to its present location at NAS JRB New Orleans. MARTD was awarded the 4th Marine Aircraft Wing (4th MAW) Commanding General's Proficiency Award in 1969, 1971 and 1974.

MARTD New Orleans was redesignated as MAG-46 Det. B in October 1979 and was awarded the 4th MAW Commanding General's Proficiency Award in 1989. MAG-46 Det. B provided detachment support for Marine Light Helicopter Squadron 767 (HML-767) from Jan. 1 to May 14, 1991. During this period, HML-767 deployed in support of Operation Desert Shield and Operation Desert Storm.

MAG-46 Det. B was redesignated as MAG-42 Det. C in June 1992 and was subsequently redesignated as MAG-49 Det. C on June 20, 2008, as a part of 4th MAW's force structure realignment. During this timeframe, the MAG Det. provided direct support for Marine Light Attack Helicopter Squadron 773 Detachment A (HMLA-773 Det. A), Fleet Readiness Center (FRC) Mid-Atlantic, and the 4th MAW Military Police Detachment (MP Det.). As a result, these component detachments were enabled to conduct operations at home and abroad, as is illustrated by the following:

- In 2003, the 4th MAW MP Det. was activated and deployed to Kuwait and Djibouti to support Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF) and Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF).
- From October 2003 to October 2005, HMLA-773 Det. A was activated in support

of OEF, resulting in three separate deployments to Afghanistan during this two-year activation period.

- Following Hurricane Katrina's devastation in September 2005, helicopters from HMLA-773 Det. A were employed throughout New Orleans and the Gulf Coast, where they participated in search, rescue and relief missions in support of Joint Task Force Katrina.
- In 2006, the 4th MAW MP Det. deployed to Pheodosia, Ukraine, to conduct annual training in support of Operation Sea Breeze.
- In 2007, HMLA-773 Det. A deployed to Al Asad, Iraq, for a seven-month deployment in support of OIE
- In the wake of Hurricane Harvey, helicopters and personnel from HMLA-773 Det.
 A were deployed in 2017 to Lake Charles, Louisiana, to support disaster relief operations in Port Arthur and Beaumont, Texas.

MAG-49 Det. C and its component detachments will continue to meet all assigned missions, embrace a training plan that prepares the Marines and Sailors for future endeavors, and improve the readiness posture for future deployments at home or overseas.



MARINE TRANSPORT SQUADRON (VMR) BELLE CHASSE

Marine Transport Squadron Belle Chasse, a Marine Corps reserve squadron, is composed

of active-duty, active Reserve and selected Marine Corps Reserve personnel. It was originally established in 1985 aboard NAS New Orleans, Louisiana, as Marine Aircraft Support Det. Belle Chasse, 4th Marine Aircraft Wing. The unit was redesignated as VMR Belle Chasse on Oct. 1, 2004. The mission of VMR Belle Chasse is to transport high-priority passengers and cargo to, within and between theaters of war.

To accomplish its assigned mission, the unit initially operated the UC-12B Huron light utility transport aircraft. In 1995, the CT-39G Sabreliner was added to the detachment until it was replaced by the UC-35C "Citation Ultra" aircraft in 1999. Most recently, the UC-12B was replaced in 2010 with the UC-12W, which brings enhanced capabilities in terms of range, payload, short field capability and aircraft survivability. VMR Belle Chasse was the first USMC/USN squadron to operate the UC-12W and serves as the NATOPS Model Manager for Fleet Marine Forces.

VMR Belle Chasse has deployed in support of multiple contingency, training exercise and Joint Task Force operations since it began operations in 1985. Additionally, since 2003, it has mobilized and deployed four different UC-35 detachments in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF), Operation New Dawn and Combined Joint Task Force Horn of Africa. Since receiving the UC-12W, it has deployed three times in support of OEF to Camp Bastion, Afghanistan.

The squadron currently deploys a UC-12W detachment in support of SPMAGTF-CR-AF every year. When not deployed, VMR Belle Chasse receives operational tasking from the 4th Marine Aircraft Wing as well as the Joint Operational Support Airlift Center, the airlift branch of the U.S. Transportation Command. This ensures the squadron is trained and ready to complete its wartime mission in support of the Marine Air Ground Task Force or Marine Corps Service Component Commander.



ARMY RESERVE





377TH THEATER SUSTAINMENT COMMAND

The 377th Theater Sustainment Command (TSC) is a multifunctional unit that performs a dual mission. The first is mission command of assigned forces in order to provide the U.S. Army Reserve with trained and ready individuals and units that support geographic combatant command requirements. The second mission is to deploy and operate as the senior Army logistics headquarters capable of planning, controlling and synchronizing operational-level Army deployment and sustainment. The 377th TSC has nearly 36,000 Soldiers and civilians in 35 states. The workforce is made up of approximately 80 percent citizen Soldiers, 10 percent represent the active component and about 10 percent are civilians. It is commanded by a major general (two-star) with six brigadier general (one-star) commanders in charge of subordinate commands across the country.

The unit was activated in July 1942 as Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 12 Port of Embarkation, at Fort Dix, New Jersey. It was then converted, reorganized and redesignated the 12th Port Headquarters and Headquarters Company and assigned to the Transportation Corps in November 1942. After an inactivation in 1946, the unit was redesignated Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 377th Transportation Major Port, and assigned to the Organized Reserve Corps in November 1948. Two weeks later, the 377th Transportation Major Port was activated in New Orleans. The unit has been a part of the New Orleans community since then.

In September 1950, the 377th was called to Fort Eustis, Virginia, and stayed on active federal service until Oct. 10, 1952. From 1953 to 1963, the 377th remained in a Reserve status and experienced extensive growth and several changes in unit designation.

In December 1965, the unit was redesignated as the 377th Support Brigade under the Army Logistical Concept. On Oct. 16, 1979, it was renamed the 377th Corps Support Command and retained this designation until July 16, 1981, when it was designated as a Theater Army Area Command (TAACOM). On Oct. 1, 1998, the TAACOM wartime mission expanded and the unit designation was changed to the 377th Theater Support Command.

The 377th Theater Support Command was redesignated the 377th Theater Sustainment Command and regionally aligned to U.S. Southern Command in September 2007. Since then, the 377th TSC has generated and globally deployed sustainment forces for multiple missions in support of Operations Enduring Freedom, Iraqi Freedom and New Dawn. Additionally, the 377th TSC provided earthquake relief in Haiti as part of Operation Unified Response in 2010 and provided assistance to the East Coast in the wake of Hurricane Sandy in 2012. More recently, the 377th TSC has begun transitioning to work with U.S. Army North, strategic partners and subordinate units in support of homeland defense, Defense Support of Civil Authorities and

Security Cooperation Operations. As the Army transforms, the 377th TSC will continue to lead the way by integrating emerging technology with the best-trained and ready Soldiers to provide sustainment solutions to support any mission.



MILITARY ENTRANCE PROCESSING STATION

The New Orleans Military Entrance Processing Station (MEPS) is one station in a network of 65 MEPS throughout the U.S. and Puerto Rico. The New Orleans MEPS relocated from its previous home of more than 30 years at Naval Support Activity on the Eastbank of the Mississippi River to NAS JRB in January 2010. The New Orleans MEPS operates in Building 556 on Rinard Road.

The MEPS is assigned military and civilian personnel who process up to 150 applicants each day for the armed forces.

A separate DOD agency, the U.S. MEP Command (MEPCOM) comprises two geographical sectors and is staffed with personnel from all military services.

The mission of the MEPCOM and the New Orleans MEPS is to process individuals for enlistment or induction into the armed services, based on DOD-approved peacetime and mobilization standards. Three primary areas are considered in determining an applicant's qualifications for enlistment: aptitude for military service, physical qualifications and background evaluation screening.



COAST GUARD



COAST GUARD AIR STATION NEW ORLEANS

Originally commissioned in July 1955 and located on Lake Pontchartrain, Coast Guard Air Station New Orleans came to its present home at NAS JRB in December 1957.

Rededicated in September 1996, the Air Station's facilities provide maintenance for five MH-65D helicopters; supply and support spaces for 28 officers, 86 enlisted and three civilians; and quarters for two flight-ready crews 24/7. Airframes flown by the Coast Guard in New Orleans have included the HO-3S, HO-4S, HUS-1G, HH-52A and the HH-3F Pelican helicopter.

In September 1985, Air Station New Orleans became the first unit in the Coast Guard to fly the HH-65A Dolphin in operational missions and again led the fleet in being first among Coast Guard Air Stations to upgrade to the HH-65B. In 2006, those helicopters were upgraded to the more powerful HH-65C.

In summer 2013, Air Station New Orleans helicopters were upgraded to the MH-65D. Having a top speed of 175 knots, the MH-65D incorporates an upgraded avionics package and replacement of obsolete components.

The twin turbine helicopter has an operational radius of 150 nautical miles, with 30 minutes on-scene time. Flown by a crew of four, including two pilots, one flight mechanic and a rescue swimmer/EMT, the MH-65D has a total gross weight limitation of 9,480 pounds.

Today, Coast Guard Air Station New Orleans' responsibilities include an area from Apalachicola, Florida, to the Texas-Louisiana border, north to Memphis, Tennessee, and south to thousands of offshore oil platforms in the Gulf of Mexico.

Within this area, the air station's missions include homeland security, search and rescue, law enforcement, marine environmental protection and aids to navigation. To meet these demanding missions, the air station maintains two ready crews at all times and annually flies more than 3,200 hours.

Coast Guard Air Station New Orleans was the first air station to integrate into a Coast Guard Sector organization with the inception of Coast Guard Sector New Orleans, led by Marine Safety Office New Orleans and including Group New Orleans. With an emphasis on mission effectiveness, the sector concept is an integral component of the Coast Guard's future command and control organization.

Air Station New Orleans' personnel have developed strong relationships with multiple

government agencies including the FBI, Secret Service and state and local law enforcement. Coast Guard Air Station New Orleans has served as the Coast Guard's flagship unit, introducing new HLS operational capabilities such as joint USCG/FBI SWAT team interoperability and including the first FBI live fire sniper training from a USCG HH-65B helicopter.



In addition, Air Station New Orleans led the USCG in the development and implementation of vertical delivery (hoist delivery) of USCG boarding teams to vessels at sea, a capability now used frequently with other units throughout the Coast Guard.

Air Station New Orleans is one of only five Coast Guard Air Stations that maintains a proficiency in rotary wing air interception to support the National Capital Region (NCR) air defense. The Coast Guard, a member of the Department of Homeland Security since 2003, works directly under the direction of the North American Aerospace Defense Command and alongside other federal, state and local agencies to ensure the restricted airspace around the capital is secure.

Air Station New Orleans not only supports the NCR mission with pilots and aircrew but also supports other National Special Security Events throughout the country that require rapid response capabilities.

In 2005, following the passage of Hurricane Katrina, Air Station New Orleans briefly became Air Group New Orleans supporting fleetwide rotor and fixed-wing air operations. Coast Guard helicopters flew more than 500 flight hours and hoisted more than 7,100 people to safety during both hurricanes Katrina and Rita.

On April 21, 2010, Coast Guard Air Station New Orleans aircrews were the first to respond to the explosion of the oil rig Deepwater Horizon 50 miles south of Venice, Louisiana. The massive fire left 126 people in need of rescue. Leading the response, New Orleans aircrews worked throughout the night and, together with Coast Guard teams from Mobile, Alabama, and civilian response teams, rescued 115 people, including 17 who were critically injured.

In 2015, Coast Guard Air Station New Orleans flew 271 SAR operations, saving 51 people and assisting 78 others while saving \$863,175 in property. In 2016, Coast Guard Air Station New Orleans flew 286 SAR operations, saving or assisting 419 lives.

A majority of the lives saved or assisted during 2016 were a result of historic flooding in Baton Rouge, in which Coast Guard Air Station New Orleans supported search and rescue for an area covering more than 100 square miles over a seven-day period. Crews worked in partnership with numerous agencies through unusual conditions to overcome the disaster and evacuate those in need of assistance.

In 2017, Air Station New Orleans responded to Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria; in support of Harvey alone, the unit deployed three aircraft and 51 personnel to Houston and orchestrated rescue operations in Beaumont, Texas, as well as served as the logistics and maintenance hub for aircraft, personnel and supplies inbound for the operation area. These efforts directly saved 863 lives and assisted 366 others, contributing to the more than 11,000 lives saved by the United States Coast Guard in this natural disaster. Since its establishment in 1955, Air Station New Orleans has saved more than 13,000 lives and is considered to be the busiest all-helicopter SAR unit in the Coast Guard.

Coast Guard Air Station New Orleans has been awarded 12 Meritorious Unit Commendations for its superior performance during rescue operations as well as five Coast Guard Unit Commendations for exceptional operational performance.

The New Orleans Navy Family Housing Welcome Center is in Patrician Management's Community Center on board NAS JRB New Orleans, in Belle Chasse, and assists activeduty military members applying for housing on board the base. All active-duty military personnel requesting housing are required to submit a completed Housing Application Form, DD-1746, with a copy of their orders and dependency status. The housing application can be obtained at the welcome center. The housing staff qualifies all personnel for referral/ assignment to housing based on family composition. Once this information is received, the housing staff will process their application and forward their referral to Patrician Management for assignment to housing.



PERMANENT PARTY RESIDENTS

All service members with orders to the area should check in with the Navy Housing Office to see what the local housing market has to offer, check on special housing programs or apply for Public Private Venture (PPV) housing managed by Patrician Military Housing (on base).

The PPV housing has two sites to choose from: one at NAS JRB New Orleans in Belle Chasse and one in the Algiers area (New Orleans Westbank) near the Marine Corps Support Facility. Incoming residents should email neworleans_housing@ navy.mil to receive an electronic copy of the Housing Orientation and a housing application or to ask questions. Navy Housing is the official pointof-contact for all housing services and will ensure members are given all options before arrival.

Members need to complete a DD Form 1746 to convey housing interests and needs. This is critical when tailoring a specific search



and expediting a door-to-door move. Service members (single/married) should contact Navy Housing Service Center before signing a lease with any landlord. Members should read PCS orders in their entirety. Incoming military members may also request information by using the Housing Early Application Tool (HEAT). This tool allows the housing department to gather information that caters to an individual family's desires and needs, but it does not put anyone on a priority waitlist of any type. Call Navy Housing Service Center at 504-678-3280 for more information.

Single Service Members

Single service members who are on permanent change of station (PCS) orders will reside in UH/ barracks. Navy E-1/E-4 and Marine E-1/E-5 personnel are housed and are provided the following:

- A furnished bedroom with some units sharing common areas such as bathrooms, kitchens, mailboxes and laundry facilities
- Telephone, cable television and high-speed Internet services available for purchase.

Single BAH is not authorized (depending on years in service) unless approved by the installation commanding officer. Members who wish to reside off base should submit a special request chit to housing, via their command, for approval. Unaccompanied housing does not house married/ voluntary geo-bachelors. Those members will be provided other options upon initial check-in with the Navy Housing Service Center Office. UH does however have a robust resident advisor program that allows volunteer senior enlisted married or single (E7-E9) to reside in UH while serving as mentors to assigned junior enlisted and working as an after-hours staff member of UH. EDUCATION

Belle Chasse Academy

Located on NAS JRB New Orleans in Belle Chasse, Louisiana, Belle Chasse Academy (BCA) is the first public charter school on a military installation.

BCA opened its doors in September 2002 and has a current enrollment of about 950 students in grades K-8. Conceived by military personnel, educators and community leaders in 2000, BCA incorporated as a Louisiana nonprofit corporation in January 2001. The Louisiana Board of Elementary and Secondary Education has approved BCA as a Type II charter.

BCA serves children of active-duty, Reserve and retired military members and civilian employees, providing a challenging, research-proven core curriculum for all students. Complementing the school's rigorous academic program is a structured, orderly environment, shaped in large measure by a fully integrated character-education program.

The mission of BCA is to educate military-dependent children, no matter their background or previous school experience, to fully achieve their personal and academic potential. It has established and continues to sustain a quality community charter school that fosters an educational environment focused on academic excellence and tailored to the needs of the military-dependent child, specifically providing:



- Acknowledgement of the unique needs of the military child.
- Reduction of service-connected disruption and stress.
- Substantial, direct community and parental participation.

The following documentation must be presented at the time of enrollment:

- Child's Social Security card.
- Military ID (Sponsor/Parent).
- End-of-year report card from previous school year.
- Proof of residence (lease, if living on base).
- Copy of the current Individual Education Plan if the student has been receiving special education services.
- Standardized test scores if entering from home-school.
- Child's original birth certificate.
- Louisiana Education Assessment Program scores for fifth-graders if entering from a Louisiana school.
- Documentary proof of adequate immunizations: DTaP diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough); IPV (inactive polio virus); MMR measles, mumps, rubella (German measles); hepatitis B; and varicella (chicken pox). All students are required to present evidence of having the appropriate number of vaccine doses. Consult the school nurse for the appropriate number of doses. All students 11 and older must have proof of immunization for TDap (tetanus,

diphtheria and acellular pertussis) and meningococcal conjugate vaccine.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

The Emergency Management Department is designed to help protect life and property, mitigate the effects from man-made or natural hazardous incidents or emergencies, and achieve

rapid mission restoration through the use of comprehensive plans and procedures, using the Emergency Operations Center in Hangar 4. Emergency Management is the liaison for Defense Support of Civil Authorities, assisting civilian agencies and local parish governments coping with emergencies and disasters.

FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES

There are two fire stations located onboard NAS JRB New Orleans. One is next to the air traffic control tower for airfield coverage and one in family housing next to the base's auto hobby shop for base protection.

The Fire and Emergency Services department is staffed with 51 DOD civilian firefighters. Services provided are structural and aircraft fire response, advanced life support ambulance service, hazardous materials response, technical rescue, and, fire prevention and public education.

The department was first in the Southeast Region to gain accreditation by the Commission for Fire Accreditation International and routinely selected as the best department in the region. The department boasts has having some of the very best firefighters providing protection throughout the base.

NAVAL BRANCH HEALTH CLINIC BELLE CHASSE

Naval Branch Health Clinic (NBHC) Belle Chasse, in Building 41 at NAS JRB New Orleans, is one of 10 branch health clinics under the Naval Hospital Pensacola, Florida network.

Staff assigned to this clinic provide primary care (family practice), wellness, dental, and supporting health care services. The clinic is open for eligible beneficiaries from across the metropolitan New Orleans area. Emergency, surgical, and inpatient hospital care, and many specialty services are provided by civilian providers through a network that is maintained by Humana Military.

Hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. The clinic is closed on federal holidays.

Drilling Reservists may also have access on the day of their drill for physicals, dental, and acute health issues. The Navy Operational Support Center and the Louisiana Air National Guard are both responsible for staffing drill-weekend care services. Patients who are in a drill status Monday through Friday may bring a copy of their official muster sheet or letter from their Commanding Officer in order to be seen for illnesses or injuries that interfere with performance during the drill period. Similarly, medical and dental care required to enable performance on activation orders (less than 31 days) is authorized; member must bring a copy of the orders to be scanned into their record.

Reservists on orders for 31 days or more must update their DEERS status to enroll for TRICARE Prime or Remote and to gain access for dependents. Those activated for fewer than 31 days must present a copy of their orders upon check-in.

Administrative Services

Internal administrative services support the requirements of the health care departments and their operations.

Behavioral Health

Behavioral health is a specialty department that requires a referral from a primary care provider for routine care. Anyone with urgent behavioral health concerns should call 911or go to the nearest hospital emergency room.

The staff provides evidenced based treatment within the clinic with the staff psychiatrist and licensed clinical social worker whenever possible. If necessary, the clinic will facilitate treatment modalities, higher levels of care, and continuation of care by consult entry and direct contact with TRICARE and civilian providers. The clinic also strives to provide mental health awareness education to the base in concert with local Fleet and Family Support Center counselors who can be reached at 504-678-7569.

Case Management

The Case Management office, available for active-duty service members, their spouses and children, provides assistance in coordinating care for complex and catastrophic mental health cases, including network utilization of addiction and inpatient services.

Dental

The Branch Dental Clinic is available for routine exams, comprehensive dentistry care and dental hygiene. Hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

NBHC dental serves all active-duty members and Reservists on active-duty orders for greater than 30 days. Care for other uniformed members is on a space available basis with the member's command authorization. To schedule a dental visit call 504-678-7965. Dental benefits information is available at https://tricare.mil.



After-hours emergencies should be seen at the nearest emergency room.

Health Benefits

The managed care department is ready to assist with enrollment, medical billing issues and referrals for all of its beneficiaries. The Health Benefit Advisers (HBAs) are focused on training everyone to take ownership of their health care benefits. The principal means for accessing these benefits is through Humana Military, 800-444-5445 or by visiting www. humana-military.com.

The HBAs can facilitate referrals, acting as a liaison obtaining referral approval and the civilian network partner (TRICARE/Humana), to obtain the referred service in the local healthcare network. Most non-urgent referral services can be accomplished at www.humanamilitary.com or by calling 800-444-5445.

Health Promotion Department

The department provides innovative and evidence-based health promotion programs and services that promote lifelong healthy behaviors and lifestyles. Services include counseling with smoking cessation, healthy nutrition, managing high blood pressure, managing blood sugar, lowering cholesterol and more. Classes include Tobacco Cessation, ShipShape (the Navy's official intervention program for weight management), Weight Management (includes exercise recommendations) and Sleep Management. Individual and group counseling at individual commands can be arranged on a wide variety of health-related subjects by appointment.

Laboratory

The laboratory provides services for the beneficiaries of NBHC Belle Chasse. The staff collects samples for routine and specialty testing and prepares them for transport to outside reference testing centers.

Medical Home Port

Medical Home Port Primary Care Managers (PCMs) provide comprehensive care and preventive medical services, with nearly 6,000 patients enrolled in the PCMs in Medical Home Port. PCMs are concerned with preventing illness, ensuring patients receive recommended health exams and taking care of patients when they are unwell. If patients require specialty care, the patient's PCM will generate a referral. Behavioral health specialists are also available through PCMs or by self-referral to evaluate and treat behavioral and emotional health concerns.

All medical care is scheduled by appointment. Use the Patient Portal to book all appointments at www.tricareonline.com. If an appropriate appointment is not available, please send a secure message to the PCM using the Patient Portal at www.tricareonline.com or call 504-678-3660, Option 1. Naval Hospital Pensacola Central Appointments assists with appointment booking when our staff are busy with other patients. They have full access to all available appointments.

Patients with emergency concerns should call 911 or go to the nearest emergency department.

Medical Readiness

The Medical Readiness team is the other primary access point for regular medical care. This team is principally concerned with Military Readiness exams including aviation medicine, audiology, overseas screening, flight physicals, PHAs, separation/retirement/commissioning screenings.

Service members stationed locally who desire an appointment for their PHA, suitability screening, flight physicals, overseas screenings or other

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similar evaluations should email the Readiness Center at usn.nolaepha@mail.mil with their DOD ID number and a phone number in which they can be reached. The phone number for this section is 504-678-3660, option 8.

Medical Records

All health care records for beneficiaries are maintained on-site by military instruction.

Navy medicine is hard at work digitizing every health care encounter into the electronic medical record. Hardcopy health records should be turned in during check-in to your new command and enrolling with the Branch Health Clinic. Beneficiaries may receive a courtesy copy of their electronic medical record; call ahead for notification and an appointment: 504-678-7905/7944.

When receiving any care from a non-military provider, please have all treatment notes faxed to 504-678-7974 for scanning into your electronic medical record.

Occupational Health

NBHC Belle Chasse provides Occupational Health (OH) services to more than 3,000 personnel. Exams are targeted to the population served based on potential or actual exposure of work performed. OH provides case management, return-to-work exams, medical



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surveillance/certification exams, worksite visits, work-related injury and illness management, counseling/training services while working closely with safety, industrial hygiene, human resources, supervisors, preventive medicine, and others to improve the health and safety of workers. To schedule an OH appointment call 504-678-3485.

Optometry

NBHC Belle Chasse offers full routine eye exams and contact prescription exams for active-duty members and eligible Reservists. Dependents are seen on a space-available basis. Active-duty, Reserve and retired members may order eyeglasses through our clinic.

Appointments may be made by speaking with an optometry technician at 504-678-7927. No emergency care is available. Hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Pharmacy

The pharmacy stocks medication via Navy Medicine formulary guidance with input from Naval Hospital Pensacola and based on local requirements — not all civilian prescription or other military prescription orders can be filled. To avoid inconvenience when attempting to fill a prescription, review the clinic's formulary in advance on the Express Scripts website at https://health.mil/formulary. Pharmacy hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. After 3:30 p.m. only emergency refills, antibiotic requests, drop off only (pick up next business day) and prescribed medications from NBHC Belle Chasse providers the same day.

For refills of previously filled medications call 888-513-4164 at least 10 days in advance. All refills arrive at NBHC Belle Chasse Pharmacy from Naval Hospital Pensacola. Patients should allow 10 days for medication to be refilled.

Home delivery is available! Go to https:// express-scripts.com/ for more information. Some co-pays may apply.

Physical Therapy

The NBHC Belle Chasse physical therapy department provides outpatient physical therapy services by referral only to active-duty personnel, Reservists on orders for more than 31 days, and their dependents with musculoskeletal and neuromuscular pathologies and Tricare Prime retirees ages 18 to 64. Services include examination, evaluation, diagnosis, treatment plans and prognosis. Treatment is administered through manual therapy, therapeutic exercise, modalities (moist hot packs, cryotherapy, ultrasound, electrical stimulation, iontophoresis,



kinesio taping and traction) to decrease pain, improve range of motion and strength and return the patient to the prior level or maximum level of function. Hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday to Friday. A referral from a Primary Care Manager (PCM) is required for all physical therapy (PT) services. For physical therapy inquiries dial 504-678-3660 and select option 3.

Radiology

Belle Chasse Radiology's mission is to care for all basic X-ray needs with state-of-the-art equipment and cutting-edge technology to better identify problems such as bone spurs, shin splints and fractures. The goal is to assist



patients along the road to recovery with greater speed and efficiency.

NAS JRB LEGAL SERVICES

Two separate and distinct legal commands provide services to Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard commands and personnel in Louisiana: Region Legal Service Office Southeast (RLSO SE) and Defense Service Office Southeast (DSO SE). The distinction is important. RLSO SE provides commands with legal advice relating to military justice and command services and also furnishes legal assistance to eligible individual service members and their families. DSO SE provides legal advice and personal representation for service members facing courts-martial and administrative separation boards.

Prosecution of Courts-Martial

The New Orleans branch office for RLSO SE provides preliminary processing including drafting of charges, review of preliminary inquiries and advice regarding the preferral and referral of court-martial charges. The staff conducts litigation of courts-martial trials, including the preparation and authentication of records of trial, and provides victim and witness assistance as required. The staff judge advocate (SJA) office is in Building 46, and the attorney assigned to this position serves as the SJA for the base's commanding officer. The SJA and the staff also provide command services and military justice advice and training to command leadership of tenant commands at NAS JRB New Orleans as well as Navy commands across the state of Louisiana.

Command Services

RLSO SE provides post-trial courts-martial assistance including timely review and advice regarding the convening authority's action, preparation of promulgating orders and forwarding of records of trial to appellate authority as appropriate.

Additionally, summary courts-martial (SCM) advice and assistance, including drafting of charges, review of preliminary inquiries and referral of charges, is available. Along these lines, RLSO SE can provide advice and training to potential SCM officers or provide an SCM officer in certain instances. RLSO SE provides advice and assistance for all aspects of non-judicial punishment including preliminary processing, conducting the NJP hearing, preparing letters of censure and forwarding appeals.

Moreover, RLSO SE conducts JAG manual investigations training, advice and assistance to investigating officers in preparation of reports and review by the convening authority. It provides administrative separation advice and assistance in all aspect of the administration separation process including providing Recorder in appropriate cases.

Miscellaneous command services (and training) in myriad administrative law matters includes, but is not limited, to the following topics: officer/enlisted performance, detachment for cause, government ethics, fraternization, sexual harassment, search and seizure, IG/congressional Inquiries, FOIA/privacy act, freedom of expression, mental health evaluations, indebtedness complaints, hate crimes issues and family advocacy issues including child abuse, paternity, family support and domestic violence.

Commands requiring services which fall within any of these categories can call the RLSO SE branch office New Orleans at 504-678-4664/9589.

Base Legal Assistance Office

The base legal assistance office is in Room 225A in Building 492. The attorney assigned to this position works directly for the RLSO SE legal assistance director in Pensacola, Florida. The legal assistance office enhances the readiness and welfare of active-duty and Reserve members of the armed forces by providing quality legal services regarding personal civil legal matters to eligible persons and by educating eligible persons regarding their personal legal rights and responsibilities.

Legal assistance staff accomplishes its mission by direct client assistance services and a vigorous preventive law program that educates and informs the military community through a variety of creative and stimulating outreach efforts. This office provides legal assistance services to clients eligible to receive services in accordance with federal law, applicable regulations and service policies. Legal assistance attorneys draft wills, living wills, medical powers of attorney, and other special and general powers of attorney. They also provide basic advice on diverse matters such as divorce and child support, landlord-tenant issues, consumer protection laws such as the Fair Debt Collection Act, the Unfair Deceptive Acts and Practices Act, and the Service Members Civil Relief Act, as well as mobilization/

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active duty recall-related laws including the Uniformed Services Employment and Re-employment Rights Act. Notary services are also available. To set up an appointment with the legal assistance attorney, call 504-678-4692/4694.

Services and advice to eligible individuals are related to a wide range of legal issues. Common issues include, but are not limited to:

- *Consumer law:* identity theft, general and automobile contracts, creditor/debtor and consumer fraud/abuse.
- *Family law:* divorce, child and spousal support, and paternity issues.
- *Estate planning:* wills, basic trusts, medical powers of attorney, springing powers of attorney and living wills.
- Landlord/tenant and property law: review and interpretation of leases, security deposits, evictions, housing codes and review of real estate purchase agreements.
- *Immigration law*: naturalization, immigration for dependents and other personal citizenship issues.
- Servicemembers Civil Relief Act (SCRA): advice on the protections and effects of the SCRA, including protections from default judgments while deployed, interest caps on pre-service debt obligations (e.g., student loans), and ability to break property and service leases in case of deployments or permanent change of station (PCS) moves.
- Uniformed Services Employment and Re-employment Rights Act (USERRA): advice on the protections and effects of USERRA as well as assistance in exercising rights under this law, for Reserve Component members.

Upon request by an active or Reserve command, RLSO SE legal assistance attorneys also can provide pre- and post-mobilization legal briefs, as well as briefs on any legal assistance subject referenced here.

Legal Assistance Hours

Notary and power of attorney services are provided free of charge by the NAS JRB legal staff for authorized individuals. The office hours are:

10 a.m. to noon and 1 to 3 p.m. Monday, 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 3 p.m. Tuesday through Friday.

Notary service is available (no appointment required) during office hours. For all other services appointments are required. Emergencies are dealt with on a case-by-case basis.

For appointments and other information, call the legal assistance office at 504-678-4692 or DSN 678-4692.

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Limitations on Legal Assistance

A legal assistance attorney cannot represent individuals in a civilian court but can give advice on civil matters and can provide assistance in finding civilian counsel where applicable. A legal assistance attorney may not advise or assist in, or become involved with, individual interests opposed to or in conflict with the interests of the United States.

Eligibility for Legal Assistance Services

Military personnel: Active-duty, retired, Reservists (pre- and post-mobilization and when on active duty for 30 days or more) and their eligible dependents are eligible for all services. Members of allied forces and their dependents may also be eligible for services.

Civilian personnel: DOD civilians deploying for at least 30 days to a combat zone, in support of a contingency operation or aboard a naval vessel are eligible for all services. Legal assistance may also be provided to dependents of these civilians, both before and during deployment, on deployment-related matters. All services are to be provided within current means and capabilities of the legal assistance office. Additionally, legal assistance may be provided to civilian employees and their dependents for a reasonable period, but not to exceed 30 days, after the civilian returns from deployment to close out ongoing legal assistance matters related to deployment that arose before or during deployment.

Counseling

The FFSC offers consultations, assessments and counseling services to help with stress, anxiety, anger, deployment, communication, relationship conflicts, work issues, grief and loss, personal concerns, parenting questions and more. Our caring counselors can meet with you individually, as a couple or as a family.

Crisis Response

Child Development Center

The Child Development Center (CDC) is located in Building 528 and is open 6 a.m. until 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. The CDC provides

full-time and drop-in care for ages 6 weeks to 5 years. The CDC is a full-time care facility, offering outstanding care and meals (breakfast, lunch and an afternoon snack) as part of the program. This program is based on the National Association for the Education of Young Children's guidelines on Developmentally Appropriate Practice in Early Childhood Programs, and strives to promote the physical, social, emotional, and cognitive development of children, while responding to the needs of the family. Some of the activities children have the opportunity to participate in include: creative art; music; fine and gross motor skills development; sand and water play; songs and finger play; story times; readiness skills for math, reading and writing; dramatic play; and activities to promote positive social skills and self-image. Children have free choice in selecting activities. Children will also be involved in "play" and will learn the following: selecting, experimenting, classifying, measuring, discussing, validating, enjoying, participating, testing, questioning, organizing, observing, improving, discovering and constructing.

The fee structure for full-time care is based on total family income as regulated by DOD instructions. Hourly or drop-in care is limited due to space availability. Reservations are required and can be made up to 30 days in advance. Hourly care is offered based on availability.

Child Development Homes

The CDH program has an open door policy and allows young children to receive the same early start in learning just as the CDC provides, but in a home-like environment, while providing continued support to parents and military readiness. Providers may live either on or off base and may care for up to six children (including their own) under the age of 8. Providers must maintain current CPR and First Aid certification maintain current liability insurance and pass monthly inspections by the CDH Program Director/Monitor. They also prepare meals in accordance with the USDA Food Program guidelines. Providers receive continuous monthly trainings on age appropriate activities for young children and professional ethics.

A subsidy program is available to provide weekly rates that are similar to those of the CDC for children 6 weeks to 12 years of age. The CDH program offers full day, hourly, drop-in, before and after school, special needs, weekend and night care.

EIGHTH COAST GUARD DISTRICT

The Eighth Coast Guard District, headquartered in New Orleans, covers all or part of 26 states throughout the Gulf Coast and heartland of America. It stretches from the Appalachian Mountains and Chattahoochee River in the east to the Rocky Mountains in the west, and from the border between the U.S. and Mexico and the Gulf of Mexico to the Canadian border in North Dakota. Part of the Department of Homeland Security, the men and women of the Eighth District are vital in protecting the 1,200 miles of coastline and 10,300 miles of inland navigable waterways in their area of responsibility.

The Eighth District is home to two of the nation's busiest ports: New Orleans and Houston. More than 2 million barrels of oil and 1 million tons of cargo are imported daily. Seventeen of the 40 busiest ports by tonnage are in the Eighth District. Additionally, more than 65 percent of the nation's liquefied natural gas activity and 11 percent of crude oil refining capacity are in the Port Arthur/Lake Charles region alone.

There are more than 6,500 oil- and gas-producing wells and 130 mobile offshore drilling units in the Gulf of Mexico that keep the district's Marine Safety program gainfully employed. Five of the top seven fishing ports in

the country are in the district. They account for nearly 40 percent of the catch of U.S. commercial fishers. Protecting the U.S. borders is the key to ensuring the free flow of commerce and the safety of our citizens.

There are approximately 4,400 active-duty and Reserve billets, 4,300 auxiliarists and 350 civilian positions assigned to the Eighth District. The Eighth District is also home to four air stations, 15 search and rescue stations, 14 aids-to-navigation teams, three Bessel traffic services and five Long Range to Navigation (LORAN) stations. Surface assets include two 210-foot medium endurance cutters, 17 87-foot patrol boats, 19 river tenders, one 225-foot buoy tender, two 175-foot coastal buoy tenders and three 64-foot self-propelled barges. There are also three Coast Guard Auxiliary regions in the Eighth District's area of responsibility: New Orleans, St. Louis and Louisville, Kentucky.

COAST GUARD SECTOR NEW ORLEANS

The headquarters of Sector New Orleans is in the newly constructed Federal City on the Westbank of New Orleans in Algiers, a state-of-the-art complex that will attract thousands of federal and private-sector workers during the next 10 years.

The area of responsibility (AOR) for Sector New Orleans encompasses three search-and-rescue stations, four 87-foot patrol boats, three marine safety units, two buoy tenders and four aids to navigation teams. The Port



of Greater Baton Rouge, Port of South Louisiana, Port of New Orleans, Saint Bernard Port, Port of Plaquemines, Port Fourchon and the Louisiana Offshore Oil Port (LOOP) are all part of Sector New Orleans. South Louisiana is home to the busiest port complex in the Western Hemisphere, with approximately 6,000 vessel arrivals annually. The Intracoastal Waterway also cuts through Sector New Orleans' AOR. Originally envisioned to carry 8 million tons of cargo when it was built in the 1920s, the Intracoastal Waterway now carries 120 million tons of freight per year.



COAST GUARD BASE NEW ORLEANS

The history of Base New Orleans begins with the establishment of the Lighthouse Service's New Orleans Depot in 1934 next to what was to become the present-day Industrial Canal lock. In 1939, the Lighthouse Service was integrated into the Coast Guard, and in 1949 that facility was officially designated a Coast Guard Base. In 1966, a base machine shop was built, and construction of the administrative building and barracks began the following year. On July 1, 1987, the base was designated as Support Center New Orleans under the Maintenance & Logistics Command Atlantic.

On May 29, 1996, Support Center New Orleans became Integrated Support Command New Orleans (ISC). In 2003, the Naval Engineering Support Unit and Electronics Engineering Support Unit (ESU) were placed under the authority of the ISC. In August 2005, Hurricane Katrina severely damaged the site and forced the ISC and its tenants to relocate. Two of the original buildings from the 1934 New Orleans Depot remain on the site in what was the ISC's Industrial Division portion of the base. The ISC temporarily relocated to the Louisiana Convention Center in Alexandria, Louisiana, immediately after Katrina struck, then moved back to New Orleans in December 2005, using vacant spaces at the east bank of the (then) Naval Support Activity on Poland Avenue.

In September 2006, the ISC moved to its new base as a tenant of NASA's Michoud Assembly Facility (MAF) in New Orleans East. This modular building facility was intended to be

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temporary in anticipation of a permanent one being built on adjacent property within the NASA MAF.

On May 12, 2010, the new complex ribbon-cutting ceremony opened the permanent facility now known as Base New Orleans. This \$89 million facility sits on 26 acres. Base New Orleans is responsible for financial, personnel, work-life, housing, industrial, facilities engineering and medical and dental support to the more than 900 personnel assigned to the region's various units.

The nearly 86,000-square-foot administrative building houses offices, a medical unit, dental facilities, a galley and classrooms for the Gulf Regional Fisheries Training Center (GRFTC). The GRFTC trains law enforcement agents from the Coast Guard, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and state and federal fish and wildlife agencies from Brownsville, Texas, to Key West, Florida. There are also berthing space, a gym and a Coast Guard exchange.

The 57,000-square-foot industrial building is home to an engine and electric shop, an air conditioning and refrigeration shop, a carpentry shop and a welding shop. The industrial building also has an additional 7,200 square feet of covered storage. Waterfront facilities consist of a pier, a wharf and a floodwall gate, which is used to transport vessels and buoys to the industrial building.

JACKSON BARRACKS LOUISIANA NATIONAL GUARD 6400 St. Claude Ave.

New Orleans, LA 70117

The mission of Jackson Barracks is to serve as a power projection platform and command and control center for emergency operations, as well as improve the readiness posture of units, other tenant organizations and state and local partners. Jackson Barracks provides an excellent quality of life for Soldiers, Airmen, employees and their families through outstanding support of all training and operations.

The historical Jackson Barracks Complex, including additional acreage added since its original construction in 1834-35, occupies 100 acres of land in Orleans Parish, extending from the Mississippi River to a mile north of St. Claude Avenue, and from the St. Bernard Parish line on the east to Delery Street on the west. Jackson Barracks is the home of the Louisiana Military Department and headquarters for the Louisiana National Guard. Prior to Hurricane Katrina in 2005, it also provided armories for 14 Army and Air National Guard units.

Early Years, 1834-1900

Jackson Barracks was built under the administration of President Andrew Jackson (1829-1837) to house the federal military garrison defending the city of New Orleans and the Lower Mississippi Valley. The barracks was originally named the New Orleans Barracks or simply the United States Barracks. The name was changed to Jackson Barracks in 1866 in honor of Gen. Jackson, hero of the 1815 Battle of New Orleans and the seventh president of the United States. The need for a "Garrison of Troops" in the event of an insurrection and a training post for U.S. troops stationed at Mississippi River forts prompted the U.S. government to make plans for the barracks as early as 1823.

After the War of 1812, the U.S. established a policy of national power that was well accepted. It was resolved that never again would the navy of an enemy be able to land raiding parties in U.S. ports and harbors to loot and plunder, burning towns and cities as the British did in the War of 1812. All ports and harbors were to be protected by a system of fortifications. In this area Fort McComb and Fort Pike were constructed below the city of New Orleans. Fort Jackson on the west bank of the Mississippi River below the city was also completed, and Fort St. Phillip on the east bank was improved. In addition to Jackson Barracks being constructed as a training post for the troops of these forts, it served as a supply base and rotated troops to and from the isolated locations. The Post Magazine at the barracks was also built in early 1837 to store reserves of ammunition for the four forts' heavy artillery.

In 1833, a 67-acre strip of land to build the barracks was purchased by the U.S. government for \$31,500. This land fronted the Mississippi River and was 3 miles below the city of New Orleans.

Congress appropriated \$180,000 for the new barracks, and after much debate, chose a site along the Mississippi River about 4 miles downriver from the city and only a mile from the site of the Battle of New Orleans. Lt. Frederick Wilkinson, a 23-year-old West Point graduate, designed and supervised construction of the barracks beginning in February 1834 until completion in December 1835. Built on a 300-by-900foot track fronting the river, the barracks were designed to house four companies of infantry plus hospital and support facilities. The buildings were surrounded by a 12-foot-high brick wall reinforced with round flank towers at each



corner. Two of the original towers remain and are used as distinguished visitor quarters. Total construction cost was \$182,999 for a complex that was one of the finest of its kind in the U.S.

20th Century

World War I changed the barracks from a tranquil and picturesque old post into an active processing and training center. In 1918, new wooden buildings were erected, including one for use by the YMCA, as well as mess halls, horse stables, additional hospital wards and troop quarters at a cost of \$60,000.

Following World War I, Jackson Barracks was rescued from extinction when the state requested that the post be turned over to the Louisiana National Guard. On Feb. 1, 1922, the state assumed control of the installation, with Jackson Barracks becoming the home of the famous Washington Artillery (141st Field Artillery Battalion) and the 108th Cavalry with its many horses.

In 1936, Jackson Barracks was the recipient of a major restoration and new construction project that built a modern three-story headquarters building (Fleming Hall), restored and updated the historic buildings, built new homes for the staff, constructed new cavalry facilities and refurbished support facilities.


Jackson Barracks also played a prominent role in New Orleans' Mardi Gras tradition. Rex, the acknowledged King of Carnival, would send an order to the commandant to receive him. King Rex would then arrive at the barracks by boat to be welcomed on the parade ground by a battalion of infantry and the regimental band. In keeping with Mardi Gras tradition, the post commander would formally hand over control of the city to King Rex and then escort him into the city to begin his reign of frivolity and merriment.

During World War II, New Orleans became a major port supporting the war effort throughout the Americas and in both theaters of war. In accordance with the lease agreement, most of the post facilities and grounds were used by the U.S. War Department to operate a port of embarkation. However, the headquarters building, residence structures, a warehouse and a few garages were retained for use by the Louisiana National Guard. After the war, Jackson Barracks reverted to state control and once again became the home of the Louisiana National Guard.

Jackson Barracks Today

In 1976, the architectural and historic significance of Jackson Barracks was recognized and it was listed on the National Register of Historic Places as a historic district of national significance. With the exception of only one building

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and two corner towers that were lost in 1912 when the Mississippi River levee was constructed in its current location, the post retains its original antebellum layout and architectural integrity. Jackson Barracks is arguably the finest complex of antebellum architecture remaining in the U.S. In the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, the historic buildings were carefully restored and returned to their original function for military use.

In 2005, Hurricane Katrina brought severe flooding throughout New Orleans, with St. Bernard Parish and the Lower Ninth Ward, including Jackson Barracks, particularly hard-hit. All buildings at Jackson Barracks were destroyed or damaged by storm flooding with water depths ranging from 3 feet at the levee to almost 18 feet at the northernmost part of the barracks. The Louisiana National Guard headquarters was temporarily relocated to Camp Beauregard while a herculean effort to rebuild Jackson Barracks was underway.

Using construction money provided by Congress and administered through the National Guard Bureau as well as funds provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the Construction Facilities Management Office designed a new master plan for the redevelopment of the barracks. New Readiness Centers for the Joint Force Headquarters, the 141st Field Artillery (Washington Artillery) and the 139th Regional Support Group were reconstructed as well as the Adjutant General's Headquarters. In addition to these facilities, reconstruction continued on other support facilities, temporary lodging and the historical housing on Jackson Barracks. The Louisiana Cottages were built to provide additional housing on the barracks for Guard personnel, in particular those affected by the storm. At the same time, funding was obtained to renovate the historic garrison buildings. The new construction continues the architectural design and ambience of the historic garrison buildings, resulting in one of the most attractive National Guard installations in the country.

For almost 175 years, Jackson Barracks have survived war, the ravages of time, flooding and numerous hurricanes. With the completion of the construction of the Jackson Barracks Military Museum Complex, the post's unique and distinguished history will be showcased for future generations to view and enjoy. Today, the Jackson Barracks restoration reflects the original design and heritage envisioned for the installation. As the headquarters for the Louisiana National Guard, it serves as an enduring monument to the citizen Soldier, the military and the nation.

Today, Jackson Barracks boasts a 110-acre complex, troop facilities, two Readiness Centers — the 139th Regional Support Group and the 1/141st Field Artillery Battalion — a joint forces headquarters building, the Adjutant General's building, multiple billeting and residential facilities, a post exchange and more.

The Marine Forces Reserve augments and reinforces active Marine forces in time of war, national emergency or contingency operations, provides personnel and operational tempo relief for the active forces in peacetime and provides service to the community. It remains an integral part of the Total Force Marine Corps and continues to maintain a high level of operational experience as it serves side-by-side with its active component counterparts. MARFORRES staff will be trained and educated to the highest levels, provide rapid response when called upon and be ever-ready to alleviate the intense personnel and operational tempo of active forces in peacetime.

MARFORRES has four major subordinate commands:

- 4th Marine Division prepares and provides capable ground combat element units as a sustainable and ready operational Reserve to augment and reinforce the active component with force for employment across the full range of military operations.
- *4th Marine Aircraft Wing* provides the immediate and sustained augmentation and reinforcement of the active component with an operational Reserve wing under a total force construct.
- 4th Marine Logistics Group serves as the intermediate logistics provider to MARFORRES to field and provide ready augmentation and reinforcement capabilities to gaining forces, and support other missions as directed.
- Force Headquarters Group provides command and control of force-level Selected Marine Corps Reserve units and the Marine Corps Individual Reserve Support Activity, in delegated support of

Commander, MARFORRES's mission to provide Reserve component units and individuals to augment and reinforce active forces for employment across the full spectrum of crises and global engagement.

MARFORNORTH

Marine Forces North executes antiterrorism program and force protection responsibilities, plans for the use of USMC Forces and advises on the proper employment of USMC Forces, and coordinates with and supports USMC Forces when attached to USNORTHCOM within USNORTHCOM'S area of responsibility in order to conduct homeland defense operations and provide defense support to civil authorities.



MARINE FORCES RESERVE BAND

Since Nov. 10, 1775, precision and adaptability have been the hallmarks of all Marine Corps units. The Marine Forces Reserve Band in New Orleans is no different. The band is dedicated to excellence and committed to providing America with a glimpse of the Marine Corps' proficiency and versatility.

Marine Forces Reserve Band was established Oct. 1, 1978. Under the operational control of the commanding general, Marine Forces Reserve and Marine Forces North, the unit has an authorized strength of 50 active-duty Marines stationed aboard the Marine Corps Support Facility in New Orleans. The band supports all units of the 4th Marine Logistics Group, 4th Marine Aircraft Wing, 4th Marine Division and Force Headquarters Group. Additionally, these Marines are often called upon to perform in support of Marine Corps Recruiting Command initiatives and community relations programs. The band is composed of a ceremonial and concert band, jazz combo, and brass and woodwind quintets. Each year, the musicians of the band travel throughout the United States entertaining more than 6 million people as they perform in more than 280 concerts, parades and ceremonies. The members of the band are basically trained riflemen, fulfill all annual Marine Corps physical and combat fitness requirements, participate in the Marine Corps Martial Arts Program and, when directed by the commanding general, serve as part of a security element in conflicts and exercises around the globe. There are several members of the current ensemble who have served in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The band is proud to be located in the historically and culturally significant city of New Orleans. It frequently performs in a variety of local events and, when they travel throughout the country, they take every opportunity to share the spirit of the Big Easy with its audiences.

The mission of the New Orleans Military and Maritime Academy (NOMMA) is to educate high school students, regardless of background or previous school experience, to fully achieve their personal and academic potential through the acquisition of core knowledge and the skills



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of analysis, problem-solving, communication and global responsibility.

The Military and Maritime Academy provides an educational environment based on a model of self-discipline that fosters positive behavior, builds self-esteem, instills personal responsibility, creates accountability and teaches ethical decision-making. The academy provides a safe and effective learning institution with a learning environment that is conducive to the educational and overall well-being of students.

The academy engages student cadets in learning experiences and activities that will enable them to exceed Louisiana state academic goals and tests and to prepare them for postsecondary education. The academy develops and improves student cadet skills in the areas of leadership, citizenship, character development, self-discipline, communication, group dynamics, team building and related areas. The academy structures the educational experience so that that student cadets gain the ability to think logically and to communicate effectively.

Academic Philosophy

The New Orleans Military and Maritime Academy believes that the purpose of education is the development of skills, concepts, knowledge, processes and attitudes necessary for students to become responsible, productive citizens. The academy also recognizes the characteristics that are unique to each individual and will provide a process for development and expression of each student's innate potential and talents.

A standards-based managed curriculum model ensures that graduates receive the learning experiences necessary to develop those skills and qualities essential to success in higher education and in the workplace. NOMMA provides a college preparatory curriculum. The curriculum is focused on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics), and NOMMA offers four Jump Start graduation pathways in the fields of cyber engineering, maritime, business management and digital media. Jump Start is Louisiana's program for career and technical education designed to allow students to attain industry-valued credentials in order to graduate with a career diploma; the program prepares students to continue their education after high school while earning certifications in high-demand industry sectors.

The model is based on the following beliefs:

- All students are capable of achieving at higher levels in learning core academic knowledge provided by formal schooling.
- Schools, in partnership with parents and the community, have the responsibility of controlling the conditions of success.

- Schools can maximize the learning environment for all students through explicit and clear objectives, high expectations for all students and a continuous, balanced assessment of student learning.
- The instructional process can be adapted to improve learning.
- Successful student learning must be based on providing meaningful experiences to ensure maximum student achievement.

Established by the National Defense Act of 1916 and expanded by Congress in 1964, the JROTC program operates within a disciplined military framework to train student cadets in leadership and motivational skills that will serve them during their school years and throughout their lives.

NEW ORLEANS LOCAL COLOR



New Orleans is a city that wraps its arms around newcomers in an embrace of classic Louisiana cuisine, rousing night life, jazz, European and Afro-Caribbean influences, centuries-old architecture and a touch of voodoo.

The French Quarter, the oldest neighborhood in New Orleans, captures the melting-pot atmosphere of a city smoldering in a mélange of French, Spanish, African, Sicilian and Irish influences. Its stunning architecture, decorative wrought- and cast-iron balconies, antique shops, artists and art galleries and the sense of history in every handmade brick add to the overall spell.

HISTORY

New Orleans was founded by the French in 1718 for its strategic position along the Mississippi River near the Gulf of Mexico. In 1762,

Louis XV gave Louisiana to his Spanish cousin, King Charles III. Although Spanish rule was brief — lasting only until 1801 — Spain left a lasting imprint, rebuilding much of the city after devastating fires in 1788 and 1794.

Spain ceded Louisiana back to France in 1801, but two years later Napoleon sold the territory to the U.S., effectively doubling the size of the U.S. This opened the floodgates to immigration from Germany, Ireland, Sicily and other European countries. Thousands of Haitians fleeing a revolution in 1804 also settled in New Orleans, infusing the culture with their ©ISTOCKPHOTO.COM/DAVEL5957

Afro-Caribbean food, music, language and customs. All this gives New Orleans its foreign, beguiling flavor, unlike that of any other American city.

NEW ORLEANS TODAY

New Orleans is a city of about 393,000 people, nicknamed the Crescent City because it was built — 5 feet below sea level — on a graceful bend along the Mississippi River. The city's architectural treasures create a backdrop for a pulsating music, arts, dining and entertainment scene packed with opportunities for visitors. Historic streetcars will carry you to restaurants serving classic Louisiana cuisine, on a tour of the mansions and live oaks of St. Charles Avenue or to a bistro for beignets, boudin balls or bread pudding.

More than 10 years after Hurricane Katrina struck New Orleans a devastating blow, the city has rebuilt itself. While effects linger in the Lower Ninth Ward and parts of New Orleans East near Lake Pontchartrain, the city is rebounding. Today, there are almost 600 more restaurants than existed before Katrina in this food-obsessed city, and the music, night life and city pride have returned.

WHERE TO BEGIN

Start with what you love. Whether your goal is to wander antebellum plantations or taste the foods that New Orleans is famous for, there's a tour to suit you. History-lovers can explore battlegrounds, the city's European origins and jazz landmarks while soaking up lore from local historians. Looking to delve into the world of the supernatural? Take a nighttime tour of a cavernous haunted mansion or learn about voodoo practices as you walk through maze-like cemeteries. There are excursions for the daring who want to spot alligators in the Louisiana bayous, or you can sit back and relax in a mule-drawn carriage, hop on a paddlewheel riverboat or set out on foot.

CITIES OF THE DEAD

European influence is evident in the city's famous above-ground cemeteries. Most of the deceased in New Orleans are interred above ground because of the city's high water table and below-sea-level elevation. There are 42 cemeteries in the metropolitan New Orleans area, and all have family-built, richly adorned tombs that can inter as many as a dozen deceased. The "cities of the dead" continue to be an item of great interest to newcomers and visitors, and cemetery tours are conducted daily by a number of tour companies.

The largest cemetery — Lake Lawn Metairie Cemetery — is worth a visit to view its astonishingly beautiful tombs set in lovely garden areas and topped with handsome sculptures.

In the mid-1800s, this was the site of the Metairie Racetrack and Jockey Club. Legend has it that an American millionaire, Charles Howard, was denied admission to the clubhouse because he was not a Creole. The miffed millionaire vowed to buy and bury the track and the club. In 1872, the site became a cemetery, and in 1885, when Howard died, his eternal resting place was on the grounds of the former Jockey Club. His ornate mausoleum features a statue of a man with his finger to his lips, a request for respectful silence for those at rest.

St. Louis Cemetery No. 1 is another gem. This cemetery was the fourth in New Orleans and was laid out in two squares, with a third square set aside for the burial of African-American Catholics, notably voodoo queen Marie Laveau.

VOODOO AND MARIE LAVEAU

Mention "voodoo" and you're likely to draw cautious stares. Many equate voodoo with devil worship or human sacrifice, but nothing could be further from the truth. Voodoo is an amalgam of religion and spiritualism with roots in ancient Africa. Its followers believe in one god and the search for a better understanding of the spiritual aspects of life.

With its blended French, Spanish and Indian traditions, New Orleans was the perfect setting for a practice that had made its way through Martinique, Haiti and the French West Indies to the feet of the woman who became its queen, Marie Laveau.

Laveau was a voodoo practitioner with the gift of showmanship. She borrowed heavily from Catholic traditions including incense, holy water and prayer, then stirred in her own mysticism, sensuality and snakes. A hairdresser, Laveau knew when to talk and when to listen as she entered homes of the wealthy and powerful women of New Orleans. They told her family secrets, of their husbands' dalliances and of deleting references to questionable ancestry in their own family histories. If knowledge is power, Laveau was handed all the power she needed. By 1830, she was New Orleans' undisputed Queen of Voodoo.

New Orleanians honor Laveau every June 23 — the eve of St. John the Baptist's Feast Day the night believers say the spirit of the voodoo queen rises. Laveau's grave in St. Louis Cemetery No. 1 on Basin Street is meticulously maintained

by legions of followers who still place offerings there, including food or various voodoo symbols.

A good place to peer into the world of voodoo is the New Orleans Historic Voodoo Museum on Dumaine Street in the heart of the French Quarter. Blue candles burn continually in honor of Laveau in halls surrounded by pictures of ancient and modern voodoo rituals and magical drawings used to summon the spirits.

NOTEWORTHY NEIGHBORHOODS

New Orleans neighborhoods are where the city's culture and creativity come to life. From the historic French Quarter to the elegant Garden District to the music-filled Marigny, there is great food, music and delight to be found across the city. Here is just a handful of New Orleans' most popular neighborhoods.

French Quarter

The original settlement, the French Quarter district as a whole — bounded by Canal Street, Decatur Street, Esplanade Avenue and Rampart Street — is a National Historic Landmark. So much of what makes New Orleans unique is captured in miniature in the melting-pot atmosphere of the Quarter, from raucous Bourbon Street to the bohemian elegance of Royal Street. It's a neighborhood packed with surprises and magic.

Its stunning architecture is likely to catch your eye first. Balconies of intricate ironwork and courtyards filled with lush greenery and fountains hark back to the French Quarter's European roots. Many buildings bear ceramic plaques informing visitors of the street names during Spanish rule, such as Calle de Borbon.

Jackson Square: Life in the Quarter centers on New Orleans' most famous landmark, Jackson Square. Originally called the Place d'Armes, the square was renamed to honor Andrew Jackson, hero of the Battle of New Orleans. The square is flanked by historic structures such as St. Louis Cathedral and the Presbytere; the Cabildo, which houses the Louisiana State Museums; and the Pontalba Buildings, the oldest apartment buildings in the U.S.

Bourbon Street: Over the years Bourbon Street has been home to vaudeville, burlesque and jazz joints, all contributing to the rowdy atmosphere the street is known for today. But newcomers may be surprised to find that Bourbon offers more than obvious night-life options. The street is also home to traditional jazz clubs, upscale lounges and historic restaurants.

Brass bands gather almost every night, filling the street with rousing music and dance, at the intersection of Canal Street and Bourbon. Canal Street continues for 13 blocks beneath elegant iron balconies and a seemingly endless row of piano bars, restaurants and music clubs. Carnival season draws thousands of Mardi Gras revelers to Bourbon Street in early spring, but catching strings of beads thrown from balconies is a year-round pastime.

Canal Street: Canal Street is a major hub. Bright red streetcars trundle down its center, luxurious hotels tower overhead and throngs of visitors and locals congregate for meals, attractions and shopping, or in transit to and from New Orleans neighborhoods. The adventurous can explore the Audubon Insectarium (423 Canal St.), an interactive museum in the old U.S. Customs House dedicated to insects. Treat yourself to first-class shopping at The Shops at Canal Place (333 Canal St.), home to retailers such as Anthropologie, renowned local jewelry designer Mignon Faget, Armani Collezioni, White House | Black Market and Saks Fifth Avenue. You can catch a movie at the luxury Theaters at Canal Place, with their leather seats, beverages and gourmet dining.

Visitors can hop on the St. Charles Avenue streetcar line Uptown to the Garden District, the Canal line to City Park and the New Orleans Museum of Art or the Riverfront line that runs along the Mississippi. You can also ask one of the ever-helpful bellmen at one of the many hotels along Canal to hail a taxi for you. At the foot of Canal at the river, you can catch a ferry to historic Algiers Point. Whether you want to explore the French Quarter, the Garden District, Uptown or Faubourg St. John, Canal is the gateway for your travels.

Faubourg Marigny & Bywater

Nestled just downriver (east) from the French Quarter are a pair of New Orleans' distinctive and well-kept secrets: the Faubourg Marigny and Bywater neighborhoods. Both are just minutes away from the French Quarter yet are embedded in communities that blend old-time New Orleans culture with hip, contemporary bohemianism.



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Nothing encapsulates this mix more than the vibrant architecture lining the streets. From quaint shotgun houses and colorful Creole cottages to Italianate mansions, American townhomes and storefront renovations, the Marigny and Bywater exemplify how history and urban renewal can merge to create a funky harmony found only in New Orleans. A commitment to preservation and diversity along with heavy influence from the arts make for beautiful and vibrant neighborhoods.

A trip into the Marigny is not complete without a visit to famed Frenchmen Street. The locals' version of Bourbon Street and a mustvisit destination for night life, Frenchmen is a compact entertainment district whose clubs feature musical styles from traditional jazz to blues to reggae to rock. Frenchmen offers lively street culture of sketch artists, poets, bluegrass and gypsy jazz pickup bands. Brass bands are common on the corner of Chartres and Frenchmen.

During the day, the Marigny's funky vibe persists. You can cruise antique shops and bookstores, opt for food from Creole to vegetarian or visit the gardens of Washington Square Park, all perfect places for meeting local artists, performers and neighborhood characters. Get their suggestions on restaurants to visit and acts to catch. Across Press Street into the Bywater, the mood and pace shifts as you enter the heart of the edgier-yet-welcoming St. Claude Arts District, home to more than 30 venues for visual and performance art along with artisan crafts. Even the homes, cafes and restaurants capture Bywater's eclectic appreciation for the arts.

Above all, these neighborhoods illustrate the relationship between the New Orleans arts scene and local life, so whether you're looking for the New Orleans of old or want to see where New Orleans culture is headed, the Faubourg Marigny and Bywater will offer you glimpses in either direction.

Garden District

Tradition, opulence and beauty are all words that describe New Orleans' historic Garden District. With its well-preserved antebellum mansions, pristine gardens and Southern charm, the Garden District stands out as one of the country's loveliest neighborhoods, stretching from St. Charles Avenue to Magazine Street and from Jackson Avenue to Louisiana Avenue.

The Garden District was created after the Louisiana Purchase as a settlement for new American residents of New Orleans unwilling to mingle with the earlier occupants, who were concentrated in the French Quarter. Americans made wealthy by cotton, sugar, insurance and shipping commissioned leading architects to create classic homes in Italianate, Greek Revival and Victorian styles. The homes were built on

generous plots with room for the cultivation of the magnificent gardens for which the area is named. The result is a breathtaking neighborhood filled with picturesque homes and enchanting surroundings.

Over the years, the Garden District has been featured in countless movies and film projects and has attracted celebrity residents. Anne Rice, Nicolas Cage and Sandra Bullock are just a few who have chosen to call the Garden District home. And no wonder. The elegance of the neighborhood is second to none.

A common destination for those visiting the Garden District is the intersection of Prytania Street and Washington Avenue. Here, in the heart of the neighborhood, you will find a commercial pocket with shopping, cafes and the historic Lafayette Cemetery No. 1. As one of the best-maintained city cemeteries, Lafayette No. 1 has been immortalized in film, literature and photography and is a popular tourist attraction. Guided tours are available. Directly across the street, you won't be able to overlook the colorful Commander's Palace Restaurant. In operation since 1880, Commander's is a New Orleans culinary institution, and its brunches are the stuff of legend.

The Garden District is easily accessible via the St. Charles Avenue streetcar, Magazine Street bus or even by carriage ride. Most travel to the Garden District to enjoy its pristine architecture, but the area also has shopping and delicious restaurants.



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St. Charles Avenue

Experiencing the grandeur of St. Charles Avenue is something you can't miss. Stretching downtown to uptown, St. Charles is a great way to see many sides of the city all along one gorgeous avenue. You can explore St. Charles on foot or by car, or for \$1.25 you can hop on the historic green St. Charles streetcar — the oldest continuously running streetcar in the world ---and you're off on an old-fashioned adventure along New Orleans' most famous avenue.

MUSIC

New Orleans has a full calendar of music festivals and is a stop on the A-list concert circuit. Festivals such as the Voodoo Music + Arts Experience, Jazz Fest and the Essence Music Festival are just a few signature events that draw dozens of top acts to the city for days and nights filled with your favorite performers. Free festivals such as the French Quarter Festival, Satchmo SummerFest that honors legendary jazz trumpeter Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong, and a local favorite, Wednesday at the Square, showcase amazing local talent and the national and international acts that can't resist sitting in.

The city is the birthplace of jazz and a mecca for gospel, R&B and, ultimately, the rock and pop we love today. A wholly original spirit of creativity and musical magic is alive on the streets and in the clubs. Experience unbelievable live musical performances in venues from swank lounges to tiny honky-tonks to mega concerts in

places like the New Orleans Arena, renamed the Smoothie King Center in 2014.

Most notable is the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival in the last weekend of April to first weekend of May each year. For more than 40 years, music lovers around the globe have made the pilgrimage to the historic Fair Grounds Race Course for a lineup that reads more like a who's who of music legends than an event flier. The music is phenomenal, the food inspirational. It is an event worthy of the birthplace of jazz.

FOOD

No place loves its food quite as devotedly --- or as indulgently — as New Orleans. Some people eat to live, but New Orleanians live to eat. As a result, the city offers one of the most incredible - and incredibly diverse - concentrations of exceptional dining and unforgettable cuisine in the world. The menu ranges through classic Louisiana cuisine such as roast duck to the celebrated Cajun specialties of crawfish etouffee, jambalaya, muffulettas, beignets, gumbo, po'boys and that humble staple, red beans and rice. For an overview, check out the new home of the Southern Food and Beverage Museum (SoFAB) in the old Dryades Street Market in uptown New Orleans' Central City Historic District. There you'll find the Museum of the American Cocktail, the Galerie d'Absinthe, cooking demonstrations by famed chefs and special exhibits: www.southernfood.org.

MARDI GRAS

In New Orleans, a town famous for its French Quarter and Bourbon Street, for hot Cajun and Creole cuisine and hotter jazz, one event surpasses them all as the city's signature piece: Mardi Gras. It's a season of revelry and romance, madness and music, parades and parties, comic costuming in the streets and grandiose private masquerade balls, even a Mystic Krewe of Barkus dog parade. Mardi Gras is a time when the gaudy



and the gorgeous come together for one gigantic blowout. Perhaps the most surprising aspect of Mardi Gras, however, is its connection to religion.

Carnival, loosely translated from Latin as "farewell to flesh," is the season of merriment that starts in New Orleans each year on Jan. 6, the Twelfth Night feast of the Epiphany, the day the three kings visited the Christ child. Mardi Gras, French for "Fat Tuesday," is the climax of the season before the penitential season of Lent. The date of Mardi Gras occurs 46 days before Easter and can fall as early as Feb. 3 or as late as March 9.

During the 12 days preceding Mardi Gras, more than 60 parades and hundreds of private parties, dances and masked balls are scheduled in the metro area. Fat Tuesday is a legal holiday in New Orleans, a day when half the town turns out in costume to watch the other half parade. Then, promptly at midnight, the party is over as Ash Wednesday ushers in the austerities of Lent.

Mardi Gras for Families: What kid wouldn't love Mardi Gras? Much of the festival seems made for children, with its floats derived from the depths of the imagination, costumes and masks, colors and joyous music abounding throughout the city. And, most important, the beads, doubloons and other treats thrown to the crowds from the floats are a child's delight.


Uptown is the best location for families to use as their base during Mardi Gras. While there is no lack of excitement, the location is calmer than the celebrations in the downtown area. St. Charles Avenue, a great spot for families to settle before the parades begin, becomes one long block party as families set up elaborate camps with picnics and barbecues.


NEW ORLEANS CITY PARK AND BOTANICAL GARDEN

New Orleans City Park is a sprawling 1,300 acres of moss-draped oak trees, lagoons and walking trails through Couturie Forest. The park has the largest grove of mature live oaks in the world, some 600 to 800 years old. The Carousel Gardens Amusement Park in New Orleans City Park has one of the oldest antique wooden carousels in the country, a Ferris wheel, a miniature train, Musik Express and bumper cars, and has extended hours in the summer.

Museum of Art and Sculpture Garden: The New Orleans Museum of Art is tucked inside City Park and contains a permanent collection of more than 40,000 objects. It is noted for its extraordinary French and American art, as well as photography, glass and Japanese works. The five-acre Sydney and Walda Besthoff Sculpture Garden holds more than 60 sculptures,

collectively valued at \$25 million and nestled along meandering footpaths, reflecting lagoons and towering oaks.

Botanical Garden: The New Orleans Botanical Garden in the southern part of the park can be reached from the Central Business District near the French Quarter by using the Canal Street streetcar. The lush urban sanctuary showcases more than 2,000 varieties of native and exotic plants. The garden was created in the 1930s as part of the New Deal to generate jobs and opened in 1936 as a rose garden.

Themed gardens: The Botanical Garden is divided into a number of smaller themed gardens. The Lord and Taylor Rose Garden is still one of the most important but there are plenty of others with local and exotic plants. Visitors can walk through the authentic Japanese Garden, an aromatic garden with scented flowers or the Palm Garden, with its palm trees and bamboo. There's also a medicinal herb garden, azaleas, camellias and magnolias, a demonstration garden with vegetables and fruit, and a butterfly walk. The Botanical Garden is adorned with more than 10 statues, mostly from the Mexican-born Louisiana artist Enrique Alferez.

Conservatory: A couple of small greenhouses hold the garden's succulents and cacti. One of the highlights of the Botanical Garden is the rose-pink Conservatory of the Two Sisters, home to a tropical rain forest and an exhibit on living fossils: plants that existed before there were flowering plants on Earth.

Train Garden: An unusual attraction is the Historic New Orleans Train Garden, which has models of New Orleans landmarks made from natural materials such as twigs and bark. Miniature streetcars and trains travel through this scenery on a 1,400-foot-long railway track.

AUDUBON ZOO

The top-rated Audubon Zoo replicates some of the world's most diverse habitats - from the swamps of Louisiana to the grasslands of Africa — and the creatures that dwell in them, among them Komodo dragons and two rare white tigers. The zoo is part of the Audubon Nature Institute that also manages the Audubon Aquarium of the Americas. At the aquarium on Canal Street, you can walk through an underwater reef tunnel, twinge with fear at the tropical sharks, watch penguins play and go hands-on with exotic birds. Don't forget the Audubon Butterfly Garden and Insectarium, also on Canal, for an up-close glimpse of creepy crawlers, butterflies and edible insects. Go to www. auduboninstitute.org.
