



PERSONNEL SUPPORT OFFICE

The Personnel Support Office is a division within the administrative department. Its primary mission is to provide support for all military personnel regarding any and all military-related pay matters. It is the focal point for all incoming and outgoing military personnel assigned to Naval Air Station Pensacola. All military personnel assigned to Naval Air Station Pensacola will first report to the Personnel Support Office in Headquarters Building 1500, Room 250.

CONSOLIDATED MAIL FACILITY AND POST OFFICE

The Consolidated Mail Facility shares space with the U.S. Postal Service in Building 40. Personnel at the facility deliver, pick up, sort, consolidate and meter all official mail for the region. An inter-area mail system is provided for regional commands.

The second complex is the center for aviation technical training command complex and is across from Pensacola Bay Bridge, with great views of the water. This complex consists of nine buildings: 3901, 3902, 3903, 3904, 3905, 3906, 3907, 3908 and 3910.

Supporting facilities in the complex include picnic gazebos, vending machines, game rooms and laundry rooms. Space in the 13-building facility is limited, and most residents are student new accessions to the military service coming straight from basic training.

COMMUNITY HOUSING

Relocating to a new area is usually a family's primary concern upon receipt of transfer orders. It can be a stressful time as you want to find out all you can about your new home before reporting for duty. You are encouraged to make a house-hunting trip as Pensacola is a popular tourist area and has much to offer in year-round activities. Hotel reservations should be made in advance of your arrival.

Eligible officers and enlisted personnel who are assigned to a command in the Pensacola naval complex (NAS Pensacola, Corry Station, Naval Hospital and Saufley Field) are given equal opportunity to apply for privatized housing or choose to reside in the community.

Check with the housing office before signing a lease. Navy Family Housing relocation specialists are available to assist you to find lodging

in Escambia County and in Santa Rosa County to include all other surrounding communities.

Licensed professional real estate agents are available in the housing office and are eager to provide rental and sales data from their multiple listings service. You will discover a wide array of homes and price ranges from which to choose.


There are many properties in Navy Family Housing's Rental Partnership Program that offer special concessions when selected for residency. The program is designed to provide military personnel, enlisted and officers, with affordable off-base housing. The program was implemented to ease the transition of military personnel and to help defray some of the costs incurred with moving. Service members may be charged reduced rent, reduced security deposits and no application fee.

24-HOUR COMMUNITY HOUSING INFORMATION

The new automated website www.homes.mil is there to provide families with a home-finding tool. It is sponsored by the Department of Defense and all military branches. The site allows members to find suitable rental housing (both long-term and temporary) before they arrive at their new destination. Property managers and landlords list both long-term rentals (apartments, duplexes and single-family homes) and temporary housing units (corporate apartments and short-term units).

When you are ready to depart from NAS Pensacola, the housing office is there to assist you in locating suitable housing at your next duty station, with relocation and departure services.

ACCOMMODATIONS

Navy Lodge Pensacola is a beachside resort on Pensacola Bay. Adjacent is a white-sand beach with lifeguards (during season), a stateof-the-art children's playground and patios. The Lighthouse Point and National Museum of Naval Aviation is within walking distance of the facility. The nearly 100 recently renovated guest rooms include five new family suites, 31 guest rooms with one queen-size bed each, nine guest rooms with two queen-size beds each, 48 guest rooms with two queen-size beds each and full kitchenettes, and four guest rooms with full kitchenettes that comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Guests may use a coin laundry room, washer and dryer on the third floor between buildings 3875 and 3945. Ice machines in both buildings are available as well.

REGISTRATION

Register at the front desk in the lobby of Building 3875. Check-in is at 3 p.m. Checkout is at noon.

The front desk is open 24/7. Maps and directions are available, along with restaurant guides, complimentary continental breakfast and coffee, a complimentary USA Today newspaper, fax and copy service, roll-away beds and

cribs. There is free Wi-Fi in all guest rooms. A mini-mart is in the lobby for guest convenience.



FLEET AND FAMILY SUPPORT CENTER

MISSION

The mission of the FFSC is to improve fleet readiness by providing quality-of-life programs



that address and resolve the challenges inherent to the military lifestyle. FFSC provides services electronically, via telephone and in person in classroom settings or one-on-one consultations.

INFORMATION AND REFERRAL

FFSC provides basic information and referrals by telephone, face-to-face contact, printed media and electronic data transmission.

LIFE SKILLS EDUCATION

FFSC provides education, workshops, general military training and briefings on personal and family enrichment promoting effective and improved quality of life, both on the job and in personal life.



COUNSELING AND CRISIS RESPONSE

FFSC counselors are licensed clinicians who see individuals, including children, couples and families. During the initial interview the client and counselor determine if the situation requires short-term supportive counseling that can be provided at the FFSC. If the situation requires it, referrals to other military and community resources can be made.

NEW PARENT SUPPORT

The New Parent Home Visitation Program offers new and expectant military families support through home visits, prenatal and parenting classes, educational films and materials.

FAMILY ADVOCACY PROGRAM

FFSC addresses all issues related to family violence and maltreatment involving military families to include the identification, investigation, intervention, assessment and treatment for families involved in abusive relationships. Prevention and education are a primary part of this program. Victim advocacy services are available. Under certain circumstances, victims may have the option of making a restricted, confidential report.

SEXUAL ASSAULT PREVENTION AND RESPONSE PROGRAM

SAPR focuses on the prevention of sexual response and the sensitive support of sexual assault victims. Advocates are available 24/7 and provide support and assistance to sexual assault victims and their families during medical, investigative, legal and court procedures. Victims usually have the option of making a restricted, confidential report.

FFSC assists service members and their families in preparing for and adjusting to the relocation and deployment process. Typical relocation services include, but are not limited to, providing information pertaining to other military installations, financial planning, smooth move workshops, sponsor training and overseas cultural awareness training. Typical deployment services include, but are not limited to, readiness, pre-deployment, mid-deployment, return and reintegration, financial planning and emotional impact.

TRANSITION ASSISTANCE

FFSC assists personnel in making a smooth adjustment from the military to the civilian job market. This program is a cooperative effort between the departments of Labor, Defense and Veteran Affairs. Monthly workshops cover military-specific topics and all aspects of preparing for a second career. Computer-based job search programs are available for use by appointment. Spouses may attend.

FAMILY EMPLOYMENT READINESS PROGRAM

This program assists military family members in their career development and job search. Services include resume-writing fundamentals, interviewing techniques, federal employment procedures, job fairs and referrals to potential employers.

PERSONAL FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

This program is available to provide education, counseling, and information and referral to military personnel and commands to increase personal, family and operational readiness relating to finances. The staff provides command financial specialist quarterly training to qualified active-duty members.

EXCEPTIONAL FAMILY MEMBERS

FFSC provides nonmedical case management and referrals for Exceptional Family Members. Primary services involve information and assistance with obtaining resources and support.

VETERANS BENEFITS PROGRAM

An AMVETS representative is at the FFSC to assist all active-duty members, veterans and family members in developing and filing claims for benefits to the Department of Veteran Affairs.

OMBUDSMAN ASSISTANCE

FFSC provides support and coordination to local ombudsmen. Training workshops,

assemblies and the official ombudsman academy are offered to assist all ombudsmen.

RETIRED ACTIVITIES OFFICE

The Retired Activities Office is located within the FFSC. Volunteers provide assistance to retired members and their families in such areas as survivor benefit plans, retired benefits and widow assistance.

SECURITY POLICE DEPARTMENT

The NAS Pensacola Security Police Department is responsible for law and order across the NAS Pensacola complex, which includes: NAS Pensacola, Saufley Field, Corry Station, and the Navy Exchange and Corry Housing complex.

By direction of the commanding officer, the department is charged with the force protection mission for the installation. Additionally, the department is tasked to investigate, apprehend or detain individuals suspected or convicted of offenses; conduct searches and seize evidence; enforce the Uniform Code of Military Justice; conduct interviews and interrogations; control access; and perform other duties in accordance with Navy regulations and law.

The department provides 24-hour emergency service with a diverse team of Naval Security Force personnel.

Whether you are visiting the installation or assigned here, it is the department's goal to provide a safe and secure environment to live, work or train.

The Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society is a private, nonprofit, charitable organization that provides financial assistance to Navy and Marine Corps active-duty and retired service members and their eligible family members. In addition, widows of active or retired service members could also benefit from the programs that are offered by the organization. NMCRS also provides assistance to other branches of service thanks to partnerships with the Air Force Aid Society, Army Emergency Relief and Coast Guard Mutual Assistance.

NMCRS provides eligible clients with budget counseling and financial assistance in the form of interest-free loans or grants during emergency needs such as emergency transportation, funeral expenses, medical and dental bills (patient's share), basic living expenses (food, rent and utilities), disaster relief assistance, essential vehicle repairs and unforeseen family emergencies among other types of assistance.

Education programs, Budget for Baby workshops, a thrift shop and a visiting nurse program are also offered to eligible service members and their families in the Pensacola area.

Society thrift shops enable service members and their families to purchase gently used clothing, uniforms and household items at a low cost. The sales income realized from thrift shops is returned to the Sailors, Marines and their families in the form of relief services.

The visiting nurse program is staffed with registered nurses. The primary function of the visiting nurse is to provide health education and information about health-related resources. The visiting nurse is available to make hospital or home visits to eligible clients in the interest of improving their quality of life by promoting understanding of information about the individual's health issues. Visits are frequently made to new mothers and infants, to patients recovering from surgery and to patients with chronic health problems.

Service members or eligible family members who have an emergency should contact the NAS Pensacola office during normal working hours to schedule an appointment. For emergency assistance after working hours, contact the American Red Cross Armed Forces Emergency Service Center at 877-272-7337.





Marina berthing includes 206 floating wet slips with electricity and water, 30 covered dry storage spaces, 204 dry storage spaces and 12 beach storage spaces. Transient dockage is available, not to exceed 14 days, which includes restrooms, showers and laundry facilities.

The marina's rental fleet consists of a variety of boats: 14-foot Sunfish, 14-foot Lasers, 18-foot Hunters, 19-foot Flying Scot, 22-foot Catalinas and kayaks, paddleboards and canoes. The marina offers basic Mate A and intermediatelevel Skipper B sailing classes from April through September. A sailing qualification card is required to check out a boat from the rental fleet. The marina's topside rental room, "The Crow's Nest," overlooks the bayou and marina and is available for special events. The room has an inside seating capacity for 64 and a large outside covered deck with seating capacity for another 50 to 75.

Adjacent to the marina is the Serenity Point fishing area, which features a 16-by-30-foot fishing deck, 20-by-20-foot covered pavilion, barbecue grill and picnic tables. It is open daily for daytime use only at no charge on a first-come, first-served basis. The marina is open to all authorized military and DOD personnel only.

SHERMAN COVE MARINA

Building 4151 850-452-2212 The marina sports a large rental fleet, including 22- and 25-foot pontoon boats, 17-foot Whaler skiffs, and 17-foot Cape Horn and 21-foot Edge Water center console fishing boats. Other amenities include two boat ramps, 32 floating wet slips, 320 dry storage spaces for privately owned boats, four rinse and flush stations, and gas and diesel fuel. 

The Defense Service Office assists active-duty members facing adverse action, investigations, civilian arrest, security clearance revocation or denial, nonjudicial punishment (captain's mast and office hours), administrative separations and courts-martial. Defense counsel can also assist with the preparation of equal opportunity complaints, complaints of wrong within the command and rebuttal statements to adverse evaluation and fitness reports. Defense counsel will be assigned to service members facing administrative separation that have six or more years of service or facing an other-thanhonorable discharge. Also defense counsel is assigned to defend accused service members facing courts-martial.





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REGION LEGAL SERVICE OFFICE SOUTH-EAST, DETACHMENT PENSACOLA, LEGAL ASSISTANCE DEPARTMENT – B-680

Legal Assistance personnel provide general advice and assistance with a variety of personal legal matters to aid in service member readiness. Legal Assistance personnel can assist with the preparation of personal wills, living wills and other basic estate planning; landlordtenant disputes; general domestic relations issues including divorce, adoption and custody matters; debtor or creditor issues; home foreclosure; immigration and naturalization; private contract review; identity theft; Servicemembers Civil Relief Act rights; and basic personal income taxes. These services are available free to active-duty personnel, their military dependents and military retirees on an appointment basis, with general priority to active-duty personnel. Powers of attorney and notary services are available to all on a walk-in basis 8 to 11 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m. daily. FLEET WEATHER CENTER AVIATION COMPONENT

Fleet Weather Center Aviation Component Pensacola is in the Air Operations Terminal at Sherman Field. The command provides a variety of meteorological and oceanographic support products and services to local commands. These services include aviation weather forecasts for Training Air Wing 6 flight instructors and students (more than 46,000 briefs a year). The component is also responsible for weather safety of personnel and equipment for the Pensacola Area Complex, which includes Corry Station and Saufley Field.

High on a bluff overlooking the entrance to Pensacola Bay, Fort Barrancas stands as a monument to America's early efforts to defend its shores. Completed in 1844 and built with 6 million bricks, with walls 4-feet thick and 20-feet high, Fort Barrancas is an example of military engineering and a marvel of human ingenuity.

After the War of 1812, the United States planned and constructed the largest system of defensive structures in its history. These forts built of brick, stone and mortar near ports and shipyards along America's coastline were the first line of defense against the potential for foreign invasion. Fort Barrancas and the Advanced Redoubt specifically provided comprehensive defense for the navy yard and the entrance to the deep harbor of Pensacola Bay. The bluff (or barrancas) overlooking the entrance to the bay was so strategic, the Army Corps of Engineers built Fort Barrancas over the ruins of other forts built by the Spanish, French and British from as early as the 17th century.

Walking through the brick archways and vaulted ceilings and staring down into the wide dry moat, one can feel the power of this imposing structure. Built in the shape of a kite or diamond, the fort could withstand possible attacks on four faces, two seaward and two landward. Assaulting infantry entering the dry moat would suffer heavy casualties from muskets and cannon fire through embrasures and rifle slits in the fort walls. Hot shot furnaces could heat cannonballs to be fired at wooden ships in an attempt to light them on fire.

Although Fort Barrancas was built to stop any foreign invasion, the only time the fort saw actual combat was during the Civil War. On Jan. 12, 1861, Alabama and Florida state militias occupied Fort Barrancas, Fort McRee, the Advanced Redoubt and the navy yard. Federal forces had moved to Fort Pickens two days earlier. This produced a tense stalemate at Pensacola similar to the one at Charleston and Fort Sumter in the weeks before the Civil War began.

Action came in September with a raid on the navy yard by about 100 federal Marines and Sailors from Fort Pickens. Gen. Braxton Bragg responded in October launching a night assault with about 1,000 men on Santa Rosa Island, burning the camp of the 6th New York Infantry. Federal forces answered with a massive bombardment Nov. 22 and 23, heavily damaging Fort McRee and the navy yard. Confederates abandoned Pensacola in May 1862, and Fort Barrancas saw no further combat.

Fort Barrancas was an integral part of the United States' coast defense system until 1947, when most coastal forts were declared surplus. In 1971, Fort Barrancas was added to Gulf

Islands National Seashore. Extensive restoration of the forts was completed by the National Park Service in 1980. Fort Barrancas has withstood not only the actions of war but also of time and the elements. It continues to stand as a monument to the country's early national defense, to the workers and engineers who constructed it and to the soldiers that served within its walls.

Fort Barrancas and the Advanced Redoubt are preserved by the National Park Service and are onboard NAS Pensacola, with entrance to both areas, off Taylor Road. Call or visit online for a listing of ranger-led programs.



MARINE AVIATION TRAINING SUPPORT GROUP 21

Marine Aviation Training Support Group 21 administratively controls and supports Marines assigned to the NAS Pensacola, other Gulf Coast bases, and Fort Gordon and Fort Benning, Georgia, in addition to performing other tasks as directed by the commandant of the Marine Corps. MATSG-21 provides support for Marine flight instructors and Marines under flight instruction in the naval aviation-training pipeline. The MATSG-21 staff supports Marines under its administrative cognizance spread throughout numerous Gulf Coast locations. Other functions performed by MATSG-21 include honor guards, ceremonial color guards within the local civilian and military communities.

The roots of MATSG-21 are among the oldest in the Marine Corps, dating to Nov. 6, 1825. The "Pensacola Marines," as the unit was called then, consisted of seven Marines who were transferred ashore from the frigate John Adams to guard the Pensacola Navy Yard. The unit's association with aviation was not established until Jan. 23, 1914, when a Marine section of the Naval Flying School was established. The school consisted of two Marine aviators and 10 enlisted mechanics. The unit subsequently became known as the Marine Aviation Detachment and in 1972 became the Marine Aviation Training Support Group. On April 1, 1996, the first Marine students reported to MATSG, beginning a new chapter in MATSG's history. On Oct. 1, 2000, MATSG was redesignated as MATSG-21.

While MATSG-21's mission is administrative, this command also monitors the flow of aviation Marines under instruction through NAS Pensacola and ensures the highest standards of Marine Corps associated training, discipline, fitness and performance are maintained. MATSG-21 was in Building 52, which was dedicated as "Carl Hall" in memory of World War II Marine fighter ace, Maj. Gen. Marion E. Carl. The headquarters also occupied Building 18, its original home in 1825, and Building 604. Unfortunately, in September 2004, Hurricane Ivan severely damaged all three buildings. Currently the MATSG-21 Headquarters is in Building 3450.

MARINE AVIATION TRAINING SUPPORT GROUP 23

Marine Aviation Training Support Group 23 serves as the functional training advocate for all U.S. Marine Corps aviation logistics entry-level training, to include initial accession, primary MOS, aircraft maintenance officer, aviation ordnance officer career progression and air traffic control officer schools. Additionally MATSG-23 provides administrative and logistical support to regionally located units in order to prepare Marines for service in the Fleet Marine Force. The MATSG-23 staff consist of 450 Marines and civilians and is responsible for an annual

throughput of more than 5,400 Marines under instruction at various schools.

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In addition to a headquarters element, MATSG-23 consists of two co-located subordinate units and two geographically separated subordinate units. Aviation Maintenance Squadron 1 and Aviation Maintenance Squadron 2, along with the group headquarters, are at NAS Pensacola, while a Marine Corps detachment is on Keesler Air Force Base in Biloxi, Mississippi, and Marine Aviation Training Support Squadron 1 is onboard NAS Meridian, Mississippi.



AVIATION MAINTENANCE SQUADRON 1

Aviation Maintenance Squadron 1 provides initial job skill training to entry-level Marines and introduces them to the aviation combat element. It also provides advanced specialized job skill training to enlisted Marines returning from the Corps' operating forces. The squadron is responsible for providing highly trained and proficient Marines to the Marine Corps' operating forces that are capable of supporting the flight and deployment needs required in today's demanding world scenarios.

AMS-1 is composed of a command element, a barracks division, eight aviation specialty schools, and five advanced and follow-on maintenance schools. These schools include the enlisted aircrew candidate school, expeditionary airfield, aviation ordnance, aviation structural mechanic, aviation support equipment, aviation machinist's mate, aircrew survival equipment and aviation structural mechanical safety equipment.

The advanced technical schools include the oxygen systems repair course, advanced sewing machine repair course, nondestructive inspection, defense joint oil analysis program and the naval aviation logistics command management information system. These schools provide noncommissioned officers and staff NCOs with more extensive training after serving in the operating forces.

The schools vary in length from four to 16 weeks. Many schools convene a new class every seven to 10 days, resulting in up to seven classes being run simultaneously. Despite the extreme turnover of Marines, the squadron maintains an average of 800 Marines under instruction and trains more than 2,900 annually, making AMS-1 one of the largest squadrons in the Marine Corps.



AVIATION MAINTENANCE SQUADRON 2

Aviation Maintenance Squadron 2 trains, educates and mentors Marines in the avionics and command and control systems military occupational specialty fields for future service in naval aviation. AMS-2 is responsible for providing highly trained and proficient Marines to the Marine Corps' operating forces that are capable of supporting the flight and deployment needs required in today's demanding world scenarios. Additionally, AMS-2 serves as a training advocate for the Marine Corps' naval aviation related operational issues and concerns.

AMS-2 is composed of a command element, a barracks division, two initial accession aviation specialty schools and one follow-on maintenance school. The initial accession schools include the air traffic control school and the aviation avionics school. The follow-on maintenance school is unique to the Marine Corps; it is the maintenance air traffic control school.

The schools vary in length from five to 24 weeks. Many schools convene a new class every three to 10 days, resulting in up to 35 classes being run simultaneously. Despite the extreme turnover of Marines, the squadron maintains an average of 800 Marines under instruction and trains more than 2,500 annually.



MARINE AVIATION TRAINING SUPPORT GROUP 42

Marine Aviation Training Support Group 42 is the reserve component onboard NAS Pensacola. MATSG-42 recruits Marine Corps reservists, which augment and reinforce Marine Corps fleet replacement squadrons and the Naval Aviation Training Command. These Marines provide a pool of experienced personnel with advanced qualifications used as individual augments in support of Marine Corps total force requirements or for transfer to 4th Marine Aircraft Wing deployable units.

One of Florida's most-visited museums, the National Naval Aviation Museum is among the largest aviation museums in the world. The 350,000-square-foot facility is home to more than 150 beautifully restored aircraft, numerous artifacts and extensive archives that chronicle the history of U.S. naval aviation.

Visitors enter the museum stepping onto a quarter-scale replica of the USS Nimitz (CVN 68) flight deck and can get a close-up view of a suspended flight of Blue Angel aircraft in their familiar diamond formation. A South Pacific airfield provides a picture of life among combat Marines, while "Homefront USA" recreates a typical American street scene during World War II. An eerie underwater display portrays the sites of crashed aircraft and describes

recovery efforts in Lake Michigan, where many World War II aircraft were lost during carrier qualifications.

The most recent addition to the museum is Hangar Bay One. The new hangar added 55,000 square feet of exhibit space to the museum complex. Its façade reminiscent of hangars of old, this structure displays aircraft of the post-World War II era, including a Marine One presidential helicopter from

the Nixon and Ford administrations and a full-scale replica of the Apollo 17 Lunar Excursion Module. It also contains exhibits devoted to women in naval aviation and Coast Guard aviation

Among the historic airplanes displayed in the museum is the original NC-4 seaplane, which became the first aircraft to cross the Atlantic in 1919. In addition, the chronological display of aircraft that outlines naval aviation in peace and war features an SBD Dauntless dive bomber that flew in the Battle of Midway and an N2S trainer flown by President George H.W. Bush during his World War II flight instruction.

The museum's Giant Screen Theater offers a premium laser-illuminated projection system boasting full 4K resolution - nearly 9 million pixels on-screen — the first of its kind installed in an institutional theater. Images of unsurpassed size, clarity and impact, enhanced by a superb sound system, are projected onto a giant screen nearly 3 1/2 times brighter and with more vibrant colors than normal theaters. Devices for the visually impaired and personalized closed captioning for the hearing impaired are also available. The museum's signature film, "The Magic of Flight," shows daily along with other feature films.

Visitors can also experience the thrill of flight in the 3D MaxFlight simulators that feature 360-degree, pitch-and-roll technology. Don't miss a ride with the U.S. Navy Blue Angels in the high-definition, motion-based flight simulator, and be sure to take home the spirit of naval aviation with a souvenir from the Flight Deck Store inside the museum.

In 2012, the Naval Aviation Museum Foundation opened the National Flight Academy, a world-class, STEM, aviation-based learning adventure for our nation's youth. Professional development and corporate programs are also available. For more information, visit www.nationalflightacademy.com.



NAVAL AVIATION SCHOOLS COMMAND

The Naval Aviation Schools Command instructor cadre includes Navy, Air Force and Marine enlisted and commissioned officers training more than 12,000 United States Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, Coast Guard and



international students annually. These students consist of enlisted and commissioned officers enrolled in aircrew, aviator, survival or prospective commanding officer training programs.

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The Naval Aviation Schools Command continuously identifies and implements improved education, teaching and personnel services in support of its mission. Using a well-rounded curriculum of academics and physical training, the command produces the highest quality enlisted and commissioned aviation personnel for the U.S. military. The command provides students with an essential and strong foundation of basic aviation skills and knowledge required to succeed in follow-on training and throughout their military careers.



NAVAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING COMMAND

Naval Education and Training Command's mission is to build character, instill citizenship and transform civilians into highly skilled, combat-ready warfighters, while enabling their career-long growth and development. The largest shore command in the Navy, NETC is comprised of more than 12,500 military, civilian and contractor team members at more than 236 subordinate activities and detachments in the United States and overseas, providing training and education to more than 31,000 students on any given day.

NETC remains the premier training leader for the Navy. Every Sailor is a NETC graduate. From initial accession training, individual technical training, team training, and supporting their personal and professional development through Voluntary Education, NETC is the core of the continuous learning lifecycle for Sailors.

NETC coordinates the following programs:

- Enlisted accession training (boot camp).
- Officer accession training (OCS, OSD, DCO).
- Rating-specific apprentice, journeyman and master level training (A and C schools).
- Voluntary College Education.
- International Military Student Training.
- Industry certifications (Navy COOL).
- Language, Regional Expertise and Culture (CLREC) and rate training manuals.
- Officer development.
- Personnel qualification standards.
- Interservice training (ITRO).
- Advancement in-rate online program.



NAVAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING COMMAND HUMAN RESOURCES OFFICE

The NETC Headquarters and subordinate units receive HR servicing from its own command HRO onboard NAS Pensacola in addition to three site offices strategically located to support its remote customers. The NETC leadership and workforce receive operational support and services from the Office of Civilian Human Resources Stennis Operations Center. NETC HRO employs approximately 4,000 NETC civilian employees. The HR director exercises administrative and technical authority over personnel assigned to provide guidance, advice and interpret HR policy for workforce shaping (recruitment and classification), labor and employee relations, training and employee career development, and equal employment opportunity program matters set forth by the director of Civilian Human Resources, dual-hatted reporting to the commander, NETC and the deputy assistant secretary of the Navy, Civilian Human Resources.



NAVAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING SECURITY ASSISTANCE FIELD ACTIVITY

Naval Education and Training Security Assistance Field Activity is responsible for all aspects of the planning, programming, financial management and execution of the Navy's international education and training accomplished under Security Cooperation Education and Training Programs. NETSAFA was established in 1986 under the NETC at NAS Pensacola.

Security cooperation is an important instrument of U.S. foreign policy and includes those DOD activities conducted with allies and friendly nations in order to:

- Build defense relationships that support U.S. security.
- Provide U.S. forces with needed military access.
- Develop military capabilities for selfdefense and coalition operations (including training).
- Improve information exchange and intelligence sharing.

Major activities under SCETP include:

- Foreign military sales and foreign military financing.
- U.S. grant programs, including International Military Education and Training, the Combating Terrorism Fellowship Program, Section 333 and Section 1263 train and equip programs, and others.

NETSAFA is the focal point for actions between the U.S. combatant commands, U.S. DOD security cooperation offices worldwide and various Department of the Navy training activities in the U.S., which educate and train more than 6,000 military and civilian personnel from 150 nations annually, as well as courses conducted for international students abroad.

NETC recruits and trains those who serve our nation, taking them from street-to-fleet by transforming civilians into highly skilled, operational, and combat ready warfighters, while providing the tools and opportunities for continuous learning and development.

NETSAFA's education and training offerings include professional military education, technical, maintenance, mission, operational and personnel development courses.

NETSAFA is also the principal management point of contact for the Navy's international military student offices. Such offices serve as host, administrator, counselor, expeditor, diplomat and primary point-of-contact for international military students undergoing courses of instruction at military installations in the U.S.

The command is led by a U.S. Navy captain (O-6), and has a staff of 18 military members and 82 civilian employees, plus support from various contractors. NETSAFA also supports the Navy International Program Office in the training components of major foreign military sales acquisition programs. The security cooperation objectives are also applicable to Navy material Systems Command (known as SYSCOM) programs with international military students. To ensure that the training is conducted effectively and security cooperation objectives are met, NETSAFA performs a variety of support responsibilities:

- Function as case administering office and case manager for DON foreign military sales training cases.
- Prepare and submit data required for preparation of LOAs for all DON-sponsored security cooperation training, to include supporting integration of training and

material in major weapons systems sales and transfers conducted by the SYSCOMs.

- Provide price and availability data.
- Develop training plans supporting U.S. Navy equipment sales in concert with Navy International Program Office and SYSCOMs.
- Ensure training plans are coordinated for disclosure prior to making commitments or programmed training.

- Ensure training is time-phased with equipment delivery schedules for the total package approach.
- Provide security assistance network access and support to view international military student projection data.
- Support issuance of international student invitation travel orders.
- Coordinate U.S. Navy Security Cooperation Education and Training Programs-sponsored orientation visits to continental U.S.
- Consolidate obsolete curriculum, training aids and equipment.

NETSAFA is in Building 628 with its parent command, the NETC.

NETSAFA International Training Center

Along with its other responsibilities, NETSAFA is the parent command for the NETSAFA International Training Center, an international-only school, which conducts preparatory, technical and specialized training courses for all military services.

NITC conducts preparatory, technical and specialized training courses and functions. A wide range of courses include aviation, technical, fundamental skills, specialized and leadership programs. Training is accomplished through group and individual tutoring, interactive multimedia and computer simulation. Course durations are tailored to student needs. Frequency and class convening dates are established based upon demand. Tailored courses can meet customer needs. The center is equipped with state-of-the-art

computer labs, classrooms, and study and work rooms, as well as specialized science laboratory classrooms.



CENTER FOR NAVAL AVIATION TECHNICAL TRAINING

Mission: To develop, deliver and support aviation training necessary to meet validated fleet requirements through a continuum of professional and personal growth for Sailors and Marines.

Vision: To provide a pathway of learning for development of the finest aviation professionals capable of an immediate and positive impact to the fleet.

Background: The center officially stood up Feb. 5, 2003. It is responsible for approximately 8,700 personnel (5,800 students and 2,900 staff) and manages a budget of more than \$47 million, overseeing 28 learning sites throughout the continental United States, Hawaii and Japan; 662 electronic classrooms; 38,520 technical training equipment items; 871 trainers; and 61 facilities. The two largest Center for Naval Aviation Technical Training Schools are the Naval Aviation Technical Training Command and Naval Aviation Schools Command in Pensacola, Florida.

CNATT is responsible for defining curriculum and educational tools, as well as developing training solutions and professional development for all technical aviation ratings (ABE, ABF, ABH, AC, AD, AE, AG, AM, AME, AO, AS, ATI, ATO, AWO, AWR, AWF, AWS, AWV, AZ, PR and APACT); Marine Corps aviation military occupational specialties; and aviation officer training.

The Pensacola headquarters is composed of seven directorates with a combined staff of 142 Navy, Marine Corps, civilian and contractor personnel. Each directorate is staffed with subject matter experts and specialists who work on various programs to enhance the overall quality of training within the aviation community. CNATT coordinates and manages 1,005 formal courses of instruction locations, ensures delivery of new training systems, and provides logistic support for simulators and training equipment. CNATT command has an average enrollment of 110,990 students for the past five years annually and is responsible for 137 Navy enlisted classifications, 93 U.S. Marine Corps military occupational specialties and 31 officer designators.



NAVAL AIR TECHNICAL TRAINING CENTER

Mission: To provide the highest quality and best trained aircraft technicians and maintainers to support fleet operations throughout the world while taking care of its people and its families and being good neighbors in the city of Pensacola and surrounding region.

The Naval Air Technical Training Center, commissioned originally as the Naval Training Station (Aviation Maintenance) on Sept. 23, 1942, has grown from three schools to the present 94 courses. The training command received its present name Feb. 6, 1943, as it continued to grow in size and importance. The training command today stands some 4,900 strong, including students, instructors and support personnel under the command of a Navy captain (limited duty officer).

NATTC graduates approximately 24,000 Navy and Marine students annually. The largest part of this student body is comprised of enlisted personnel attending A schools designed to provide them with the knowledge and skill levels required to perform as technicians at the third class petty officer level. Advanced schools provide higher level technical knowledge for senior petty officers, and specialty schools offer specific skills not particular to any one rating. NATTC also conducts technical training for officers.

Technical experts from all the U.S. armed services, DOD civilians and international military students from allied countries attend courses at this modern facility.

Additionally, more than 40 advanced technical courses are taught at this facility, including carrier air traffic control, advanced avionics and data analysis.

Ninety-one courses are taught on the 265-acre complex. While designed much like a modern college campus, NATTC is a regimented military command comprised of five departments that house the various schools and support elements. These include:

- The Avionics Training Department, which provides instruction in maintenance and operation of complex aviation electronic equipment, including communications, radar and weapons. This department also houses the Aviation Warfare System Operator School, which teaches Sailors how to hunt and track submarines. Additionally the apprentice technical training schoolhouse trains Sailors in basic aviation warfare and aviation skills that they will need aboard aircraft carriers and amphibious assault ships.
- The Mechanical Training Department, which provides basic skills for aviation structural mechanics, aviation ordnancemen, aviation machinist's mates, aviation support equipment technicians and aircrew survival equipmentmen.
- The Air Traffic Control Training Department, which is composed of operations and maintenance schools in basic and advanced operational control of aircraft at shore installations and aboard ships and the associated electronics equipment (radar and other tracking equipment). This department is also home to Marine Corps

training for air traffic controllers and electronic support technicians who work with expeditionary airfields.

- The Air Training Department, which trains Sailors in the aviation boatswain's mate subspecialties of aircraft handling, fuels and equipment. Fleet Sailors also return to NATTC's Air Training Department for aviation firefighting and crash and salvage training. The Air Training Department is also home to the Expeditionary Airfield Equipment Training Division, which trains Marines to build and maintain runways under extreme conditions, and the Aviation Professional Apprenticeship Career Track Division.
- The Training Support Department, which continues the general military training Sailors began in basic training. The LifeSkills course addresses the sailorization process and re-enforces everyday skills for Sailors. Topics include military pay and entitlements, banking and financial management, investment and savings, nutrition and physical readiness, healthy relationships, stress management, responsible alcohol and drug use, operational risk management, hazing and fraternization, sexual assault prevention and operational security. NATTC undergoes regular

evaluation and is accredited by the Council of Occupational Education. This accreditation continues and has been maintained since 1979.

NATTC is also home to the performing units, which consist of the Flying Rifles Drill Team

and Color Guard, Crackerjack Marching Unit and Aviation Vocal Team.

Performing unit team members are A school student volunteers who spend their free time rehearsing or performing. Participation in the team events, which include practices and performances, comes only after the member has completed their professional and military duties. The units perform at community events and official ceremonies throughout northwest Florida.




NAVAL CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIVE SERVICE RESIDENT AGENCY PENSACOLA

The Naval Criminal Investigative Service is a worldwide organization that reports directly to the secretary of the Navy and is responsible for conducting felony-level criminal, counterintelligence, counterterrorism and cyber investigation and operations, with a nexus to Department of Navy equities, which includes the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps.

NCIS serves to protect the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps by deploying a unique, highly trained and effective team to succeed in its core mission areas of criminal investigations, counterintelligence, counterterrorism and cyber.

Criminal investigations: NCIS is the investigative entity within the Department of the Navy responsible for major criminal investigations involving U.S. Navy and Marine Corps equities, service members and affiliated civilian personnel. NCIS civilian special agents have the authority to investigative criminal acts in accordance with the Uniform Code of Military Justice and established criminal laws under the United States Code.

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- Counterintelligence: NCIS is the coordinating authority for all Department of the Navy counterintelligence activities and is the only Department of the Navy component authorized to conduct investigations into actual, potential or suspected acts of espionage, sabotage and intelligence activities conducted on behalf of foreign powers. NCIS is also the Department of the Navy lead agency for the conduct of offensive counterintelligence operations, which seek to penetrate and neutralize adversary intelligence services.
- Counterterrorism: NCIS is responsible for detecting, deterring, and disrupting terrorism worldwide through a wide array of investigative and operational capabilities. Within the Department of the Navy, NCIS has exclusive investigative jurisdiction into actual, potential or suspected acts of terrorism.
- Cyber: NCIS provides full-spectrum investigative and operational activities in the cyber domain, coordinates with law enforcement and intelligence agencies in the U.S. and abroad, conducts electronic media forensics, and tracks developments related to trends in malware, phishing and other computer intrusions.

Over the years, NCIS special agents have served with distinction in areas of conflict wherever the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps have gone, to include Vietnam, Kosovo, the Persian Gulf, and most recently Afghanistan and Iraq.

NCIS special agents are college-educated and receive a multitude of training from the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center, Department of Justice and Department of Defense. Currently, there are more than 1,000 special agents on the job providing support to U.S. Navy and Marine Corps commands at more than 150 locations throughout the U.S. and overseas.

NCIS Resident Agency Pensacola has offices onboard NAS Pensacola and Corry Station and is a part of the NCIS Southeast Field Office. The NCIS Southeast Field Office's area of responsibility spans all of central and southeast U.S., in addition to the Caribbean and South America.

With traditional and sophisticated criminal activity, domestic and international terrorists, hostile foreign intelligence organizations and insider threats continuing to represent a persistent threat to the Department of the Navy, teamwork and vigilance from everyone is of the utmost importance. You can play an active role by being an extra pair of "eyes and ears" for law enforcement. Report any felony criminal or suspicious behavior immediately to your local NCIS office or base security. NAVAL HOSPITAL PENSACOLA

Older than 26 U.S. states, Naval Hospital Pensacola is in its second century of service and is one of the oldest and most respected military medical facilities in the country. It continues to provide health care to more than 150,000 beneficiaries in its main facility and 10 branch clinics that span five states.

NHP began its service in January 1826. President John Quincy Adams assigned the first surgeon and officer in charge, Navy surgeon Isaac Hulse, to establish a hospital at the Pensacola Navy Yard in support of the West Indies Squadron. Hulse established the naval hospital by renting a two-story house as a temporary medical facility for \$30 a month. Hulse would go on to spend 19 of his 33-year Navy career in Pensacola.



The staff at NHP fought yellow fever outbreaks in the early 19th century and endured to provide comfort during the Spanish flu pandemic of 1918. Seventy-four commanding officers and literally thousands of staff members have compassionately helped the ill and injured in all of America's struggles from the Civil War to the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. In 2003, the hospital manned and deployed Fleet Hospital 3 in


support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, the first fleet hospital to be deployed to a combat zone. NHP repeatedly deploys its military staff as individual augmentees in support of global operations.

Not only have command members supported America's warriors, but they have been key players in humanitarian assistance and disaster relief missions. They have supported the Gulf Coast region in responding to major hurricanes and have been crucial in support of USNS Comfort's reoccurring "continuing promise" missions to impoverished nations.

In 2018, NHP earned the Joint Commission's "Gold Seal of Approval" for ambulatory care and behavioral health care accreditation and primary care medical home certification. In addition to providing medical care at the main facility, the hospital is responsible for medical care at 10 naval branch health clinics in five states: Florida, Indiana, Louisiana, Mississippi and Tennessee. Outside of the local area, the clinics extend eastward from Naval Support Activity Panama City, Florida; north to Crane, Indiana, and Naval Support Activity Mid-South in Millington, Tennessee; and west to NAS Joint Reserve Base Belle Chasse, Louisiana, and NCBC Gulfport and NAS Meridian, Mississippi.

Locally, there are naval branch health clinics at NAS Pensacola, Naval Air Technical Training Center, Corry Station and Whiting Field. The Corry clinic is located within the Department of Veterans Affair's Joint Ambulatory Care Center.





VISITING THE HOSPITAL

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All visits require patients to prove eligibility for care. A military identification card must be presented at the time of care, and one must have a DEERS check performed. TRICARE cards are not identification cards for the purpose of verifying eligibility.

RECORDS

Medical records are the property of the U.S. government. Copies of medical records may be requested by submitting a HIPAA-compliant records request to the appropriate records office. Copies of adult dependents' records must be requested by them, or a power of attorney must be shown at the time of request. The most common form used by military facilities is the DD 2870, which can be picked up at any military medical facility or downloaded from the internet. The time to complete requests varies according to the amount of information being requested and the number of other requests being processed at the same time. Most, if not all, documentation is in the electronic medical record. If the paper record is needed by a clinic, the records office staff will deliver the record upon request by the clinic.

If you are a nonactive duty beneficiary moving to a new area and your primary care provider will be in a military medical facility, they will request the record upon your arrival there. If you will have a nonmilitary primary care manager, request copies of your medical record. If you have children who will be going to school or in day care, be sure to request copies of all immunizations before you leave.

If you are an active-duty beneficiary and have orders to a new duty station, hand carrying your medical record to the new duty station depends on its location. If it is a stateside duty station and not remote, your record will be mailed there when you present a copy of your orders. The records will be sent via certified mail and you will receive a tracking number before you leave. If your new duty station will be overseas, remote or a deployable unit, you may hand carry your medical record after you sign for custody.

If you are an active-duty beneficiary and separating or retiring, you should request a copy of your record. The original must be turned into the records office along with your dental record before you separate or retire. All of the paper documents from the records will be scanned into the electronic record along with a certification document and this becomes your **NAVAL AIR STATION PENSACOLA**

official service treatment record and will have a retention period of 100 years. It will then be available to Veterans Affairs for viewing in their electronic medical record (VISTA) using an application called HAIMS. If the medical and dental records are not turned in to the records office it may adversely impact any disability claims made with Veterans Affairs.

TRICARE

TRICARE is an integrated health care delivery system utilizing military treatment facilities and civilian health care facilities to serve millions of beneficiaries across the world. It is designed to expand access to health care, control costs and improve medical readiness. It provides affordable program options (i.e., Prime and Select) and comprehensive coverage



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and is available worldwide. Beneficiary categories are active duty, National Guard, reserve or retired service member sponsors, their family members (spouses and unmarried children), young adult (ages 23 through 26) and survivors (certain former spouses). Requirements to enroll in TRICARE are: registration in DEERS, a valid uniformed services ID card and Medicare Part B (if dual-eligible, except for activeduty family members).

TRICARE can be reached toll free at 800-444-5445. The hospital's health benefits office is also available to assist at 850-505-6709.

CUSTOMER RELATIONS

Each clinical department has been assigned a customer relations representative whose name and photograph appears at the entrance to the department. If you have questions or suggestions, please ask to speak to the representative. A hospital customer relations representative is also available and can be reached by calling 850-505-6785/6434.

NAVAL HOSPITAL MINOR CHILDREN

With few exceptions, present laws do not permit medical personnel to treat minor children (under 18 years old) without the on-site, informed consent of a parent or legal guardian.

If the parent or legal guardian is away, a notarized medical power of attorney is required for treatment. Medical power of attorney forms are available from outpatient records.

URGENT CARE CENTER

Hours: 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily (including holidays).

The Urgent Care Center provides services for acute injuries and other nonemergency problems. All TRICARE beneficiaries can use the UCC for symptoms such as minor lacerations and injuries, sore throats, fevers and colds.

Beneficiaries in need of emergency services should call 911 or visit an emergency room. The Nurse Advice Line is also available 24/7 at 800-TRICARE (874-2273), option 1. The Nurse Advice Line offers professional health care advice and can assist beneficiaries with deciding if they should visit an ER or the UCC or schedule an appointment with their provider.

PHARMACY

- Main pharmacy hours: 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday for routine prescriptions. Closed federal holidays.
- Satellite pharmacy hours: 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday (drive-thru 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.), 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday (drive-thru 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.).

The main pharmacy is on the first floor of the outpatient clinic. The satellite pharmacy is next to the NASP commissary. There are several options available for prescription refills. You can call the automated line at 850-505-6459, or if you're outside Pensacola, call the toll-free number 888-513-4164. You can check the hospital website at www.med.navy.mil/sites/pcola for online pharmacy refills and a list of medications carried. Refill prescriptions may be picked up at the satellite pharmacy at the NEX shopping mall or the automated refill machines. The patient's ID card (or photocopy) is required to pick up prescriptions for patients over age 16 regardless of relationship status to the sponsor. Prescriptions are also available through the TRICARE mail order pharmacy program. For more information, visit its website at www.express-scripts.com/TRICARE. IMMUNIZATION CLINIC

Hours: 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE REHABILITATION PROGRAM

The Navy's early intervention and treatment of addictions and dependency is at NBHC NAS Pensacola. The plan of treatment is a



streamlined concept where a licensed independent practitioner and staff medically diagnose a client after an initial screening. This eliminates the need for commands to wait for a medical diagnosis prior to a determination of a treatment level. The process also allows for facilitation of IMPACT, a 20-hour early intervention course, a family information program and a structured continuing care program.

HEALTH BENEFITS OFFICE

Health benefit advisers are available to provide sound, professional advice and recommendations regarding health care benefits. The office is on the first floor, near the radiology clinic. For information on TRICARE, Medicare and other supplemental programs or a list of area providers, call 850-505-6709.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

Ambulance service to NHP is not available. All beneficiaries being transported by ambulance will be taken to the nearest emergency room.



NAVY FLIGHT DEMONSTRATION SQUADRON (BLUE ANGELS)

The Navy Flight Demonstration Squadron, the Blue Angels, is based at NAS Pensacola. Each year, from January to mid-March, the team deploys to Naval Air Facility El Centro, California, to train pilots and new team members. From March to November, the



squadron performs approximately 70 air shows at 35 locations across North America.

During the air show season, the Blue Angels fly practice demonstrations over the NAS Pensacola airfield twice per week. Practices can be viewed from behind the National Naval Aviation Museum. The squadron ends the show season with their annual homecoming performance at NAS Pensacola in early November.

The Blue Angels is composed of 16 officers and approximately 115 enlisted Navy and Marine Corps personnel. Seven of the officers are tactical jet pilots, four of whom fly in the squadron's renowned diamond formation; two are solo demonstrators; and one is the narrator for the aerial demonstrations. The narrator also provides orientation flights for select individuals at each show



site. The Blue Angels jet pilots currently fly the F/A-18 Hornet, built by the Boeing Corp. A naval flight officer fills the role of executive officer and an additional naval flight officer is responsible for air show coordination. Three officers are tactical transport aircraft pilots. The remaining officers include a maintenance officer, flight surgeon, public affairs officer and supply officer.

Alternating crews of about 45 enlisted maintenance and support personnel travel to each show site. Although each individual is highly skilled in a distinct job specialty, they work well beyond their specialties.

The Blue Angels Maintenance and Support Team travels aboard a Marine Corps C-130 aircraft, affectionately known as "Fat Albert." The C-130 is a tactical transport aircraft built by Lockheed Martin and is flown by an all-Marine crew consisting of three pilots and five enlisted aircrew. First integrated into the team in 1970, Fat Albert now flies more than 100,000 miles each season, carrying 45 maintenance and support personnel along with the specialized equipment needed to complete a successful air show.

The mission of the U.S. Navy Flight Demonstration Squadron is to showcase the pride and professionalism of the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps by inspiring a culture of excellence and service to country through flight demonstrations and community outreach. They have performed precision flight demonstrations for more than 500 million spectators since their organization began in 1946.

The Navy Medicine Operational Training Center is an echelon 4 shore activity in an active status under a commanding officer reporting to Commander, Navy Medicine Education and Training Command. NMOTC provides professional and consultative services and conducts education and training programs to support operationally related fleet and Fleet Marine Force medical matters worldwide. NMOTC manages, coordinates and provides selected operational programs (e.g., aviation physicals and survival training) and services in direct support of the operating forces as directed by higher authority. NMOTC has six detachments and 60 facilities at 15 locations across the country.

Naval Survival Training Institute: Assists the joint warfighter in winning the fight by providing safe, effective and relevant human performance and survival training for all DOD personnel. NSTI HQ is in Pensacola with aviation survival training centers in Pensacola; Cherry Point, North Carolina; Jacksonville, Florida; Lemoore, California; Miramar, California; Norfolk, Virginia; Patuxent River, Maryland; and Whidbey Island, Washington.

Naval Aerospace Medical Institute: Supports Navy and Marine Corps aviation units through expert aeromedical consultation, training of aeromedical personnel for operational assignments and continual process improvement to provide statistically based aviation applicant screening tests. NAMI is in Pensacola.

Naval Undersea Medical Institute: Provides expert consultation and training in undersea medicine and radiation health to officers and enlisted Sailors who will support warfighters in the Submarine Force, Naval Special Warfare, Naval Expeditionary Combat Command, U.S. Marine Corps, and U.S. Navy Bureau of Medicine and Surgery. NUMI is in Groton, Connecticut.

Surface Warfare Medical Institute: Provides global medical support, training and consultation for surface forces on issues regarding afloat operations. Coordinates and performs operational readiness training, LCAC medical screening, reference publication, course execution and curriculum revision. SWMI is in San Diego.

Naval Expeditionary Medical Training Institute: Provides training on the operations of an expeditionary medical facility, ready for worldwide deployment. NEMTI is the BUMEDdesignated "program management officer" for tactical combat casualty care instruction and the location of expeditionary medical unit training for personnel deploying to Role II and Role III assignments in support of operational requirements. NEMTI provides administrative oversight to the Navy Trauma Training Center, which provides an intense 21-day clinical experience in trauma management to Navy medical teams that will be deploying in support of Navy and Marine forces. NEMTI is at Camp Pendleton, California, and NTTC is at the Los Angeles County and University of Southern California Medical Center in Los Angeles.

Naval Special Operations Medical Institute: The naval component of Joint Special Operations Medical Training Center conducts combat medical training for special operations forces to include recon corpsmen, SEAL and surface warfare combat-craft crewman medics under U.S. Special Operations Command. NSOMI is at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

The key factor to NORU's high success rate is its instructors, who are hand-picked from the top tier of the Career Recruiting Force. Students consistently cite these instructors as the best they've had in their career.

Students leaving NORU go on to support Navy Recruiting Command Headquarters, two Navy recruiting regions and 26 Navy recruiting districts nationwide, with the basic knowledge and skills necessary to succeed. New recruiters are enthusiastic, motivated and ready for the hands-on training that will fine-tune skills developed at NORU and help them recruit the Navy of the 21st century.

NORU was established in Orlando, Florida, in 1978. In June 1990, NORU moved to NAS Pensacola. It has a staff of 35 military, 10 civilian and one contractor personnel.



Commander, Training Air Wing 6 is headquartered in the "cradle of naval aviation" onboard NAS Pensacola. Responsible for all Chief of Naval Air Training naval flight officer training and production, CTW-6 graduates about 300 U.S. Navy, Marine Corps and international students annually. Its mission is to safely train the world's finest combat quality naval flight officers, committed to global security and prosperity, and projecting naval air power worldwide.

Primary, intermediate and advanced naval flight officer training is conducted in three training squadrons: Training Squadron 10, Training Squadron 4 and Training Squadron 86. Additionally, the 2nd German Air Force Training Squadron is an integral part of the CTW-6 international military training program. The entire CTW-6 team works daily to instill and re-enforce the heroic legacy and attributes of past naval aviation heroes, as well as the core values and qualities our Navy and country demand of today's naval officers and future naval leaders.

UNDERGRADUATE MILITARY FLIGHT OFFICER TRAINING

The undergraduate military flight officer training program supports chief of naval operations guidance to increase efficiency through the reduction of aircraft type model series while simultaneously taking advantage of new training technology and simulation capabilities. The UMFO curriculum provides the knowledge, skills and experience required to operate a new generation of tactical aircraft and reduce total training costs by leveraging emerging technology.

The training program consists of the T-6A Texan II, the T-45C Goshawk and high-fidelity ground-based training systems. The T-45C, upgraded with the Virtual Mission Training System embedding a synthetic radar system in the aircraft, provides focused strike fighter training to student naval flight officers selected for duty in the FA-18D/F, EA-18G and EA-6B.

In conjunction with T-6A and T-45C simulators and high-quality part-task trainers, the new multi-crew simulator was procured to conduct all maritime patrol, airborne early warning, electronic warfare, and take charge and move out undergraduate naval flight officer training. The multi-crew simulator provides focused training on crew resource management, communications and sensor integration to student naval flight officers selected for duty in the P-3, P-8, EP-3, E-6 and E-2C/D.



TRAINING SQUADRON 4

Training Squadron 4 is the oldest squadron in Training Air Wing 6, commissioned May 1, 1960. Its original mission was providing flight instruction for U.S. Navy and Marine Corps student naval aviators in the basic jet training syllabus utilizing the T-2A version of the T-2 Buckeye aircraft.

In 1965, VT-4 transitioned to the T-2B aircraft and its mission was modified to become the Naval Air Training Command's sole site for providing student pilots with basic jet flight instruction in aerial gunnery and carrier qualification. In 1971, VT-4 transitioned to the T-2C aircraft. The squadron mission was changed once again, to provide flight training in all phases of the basic jet syllabus.

In September 1972, VT-4 acquired the TF-9J, providing flight instruction in both basic and advanced jet training. This mission was unique



in the Naval Air Training Command in that student pilots experienced their first flight in a jet aircraft in VT-4 and remained aboard to be subsequently designated naval aviators. November 1973 saw the introduction of the TA-4J to replace the aging TF-9J for advanced flight training. Beginning in December 1975, VT-4 had the added mission of providing flight instruction for allied foreign military pilots. Flight training has been given to student pilots from Kuwait, Spain, Singapore and Indonesia.

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In addition to pilot training, VT-4 has had two other significant missions. From 1973 to 1978, VT-4 provided summer jet orientation flights for midshipmen of the U.S. Naval Academy and the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps. From 1975 to 1979, VT-4 was also responsible for the training of naval flight surgeons.

In December 1985, VT-4's mission was changed from strike training to the sole site of E-2 and C-2 intermediate training in CNATRA. In this role, the squadron carrier qualified student naval aviators from the multiengine training pipeline, informally called the "prop pipeline," who we selected to eventually fly the E-2 Hawkeye and C-2 Greyhound aircraft in the fleet. Graduates of VT-4 would receive their wings and designations as naval aviators and proceed to the Fleet Replacement Squadron.

In January 1992, VT-4's mission became the E-2 and C-2 advanced training site. To accomplish this mission, VT-4 flew the T-2C.

During 1996, VT-4 underwent significant change. From a small all Navy advanced E-2/ C-2 pilot training squadron with a student throughput of 36 per year, it became a joint primary and intermediate naval flight officer and navigator training squadron with an annual student throughput of 450. Instructor ranks grew from 14 Navy pilots to 71 Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force pilots and naval flight officers and navigators. The squadron transitioned from flying the T-2C to flying the T-34C Turbo Mentor and T-1A Jayhawk.

VT-4 also instructs student navigators from Germany, Italy, Saudi Arabia, Norway and Denmark. From April to September 1996 the squadron had primary naval flight officer and navigator and advanced pilot training being conducted simultaneously. Following the final CQ detachment in September, the mission converted entirely to naval flight officer and navigator training. On Sept. 30, 1996, the last VT-4 naval aviators earned their wings.

In January 2003, VT-4 initiated instructor orientation flights in the T-6A Texan II, the

joint Air Force-Navy platform slated to replace the T-34C as the primary phase syllabus trainer. The T-6A is a single engine, two-seat trainer that is fully aerobatic. It features a pressurized cockpit, a G-tolerance enhancement system and dual zero-zero ejection seats. The T-6A utilizes a state-of-the-art digital cockpit to help familiarize students with what they will encounter in their fleet tours.

In August 2003, VT-4 marked its first training flight in the T-6A. In April 2005, VT-4 completed the transition to the T-6A and flew its last T-34C Turbomentor student sortie.

In December 2010, VT-4 temporarily went into cadre status. In June 2013, Cmdr. Samuel White reactivated and later re-commissioned VT-4, flying the T-39 Sabreliner and conducting intermediate jet training for strike and E-2 student naval flight officers. White and Pieter VandenBergh (chief Vertex pilot) flew the last T-39 on Aug. 27, 2014. VT-4 was the last Navy squadron to fly the T-39 Sabreliner.

In November 2014, VT-4 transitioned to become the Navy's only simulator-only based squadron, training student naval flight officers to be integral assets in their respective E-2, E-6, EP-3, P-3 and P-8 communities. Student naval flight officers are placed through the Advanced Maritime Command and Control Course with topics such as international and military flight planning, sensor employment and tactical communications. They put these lessons to use in the multi-crew simulator, combining the multitude of sensors with a significant emphasis on crew resource management. After completing this complex syllabus, the students earn their "wings of gold" alongside their VT-86 brethren. The first class winged in April 2015 and since that date VT-4 has winged more than 450 naval flight officers.

Since commissioning in 1965, VT-4 has amassed more than 600,000 flight hours and logged 42,000 carrier landings and more than 30,000 simulator hours.



TRAINING SQUADRON 10

In 1960, Training Squadron 10 was established as a division of the training department of NAS Pensacola and was known as the Basic Naval Aviation Officers School. It was strictly a ground training operation until the school was assigned nine UC-45J Navigators and six T-2A Buckeyes in February 1962. The T-2As were soon replaced with nine T-1A Sea Star aircraft. In 1965, naval aviation observers were redesignated as naval flight officers and on Jan. 15, 1968, the Basic Naval Aviation Officers School was officially commissioned as VT-10.

By November 1970, VT-10 had trained more than 6,000 student naval flight officers. In 1971, VT-10 transitioned to the T-39D Sabreliner jet trainer and the TF-9J Cougar, which was replaced two years later by the newer T-2C Buckeye.

The squadron doubled in size between 1972 and 1974 to accommodate an increased training requirement, maintaining 40 aircraft: 10 T-39Ds and 30 T-2Cs. During the 1970s, several flight ground trainers were introduced to the syllabus, including the 1D23 navigation and communication trainer, the 2F90 instrument trainer and the 2F101 flight simulator. In 1981, a reassignment of aircraft within NATRACOM replaced VT-10's T-2C aircraft with T-2Bs. The squadron revised its training in 1984 and acquired 20 T-34C Turbo Mentors. Cessna T-47As replaced the T-39Ds in 1985.

During 1991, revolutionary changes were made to the naval flight officer syllabus. To improve naval flight officers' air sense and situational awareness, 40 additional flight hours were placed in the curriculum allowing instruction in basic piloting skills including aerobatics, takeoffs and landings. The same





year, the squadron replaced the T-47A with the T-39N Sabreliner, which had upgraded avionics and radar. The T-2Bs and the air combat maneuvering syllabus were transferred to Training Squadron 86. At the same time, VT-10 acquired 20 additional T-34Cs and two new 2B37 instrument trainers for primary and intermediate training.

In 1994, the first U.S. Air Force instructors and student navigators reported to VT-10 under a joint memorandum of agreement between the services. The agreement included the 1996 transition from the T-39N to the Air Force T-1A Jayhawk as the training platform for the intermediate syllabus events. In April 1996, VT-10 split instructor and student assets to assist in the establishment of Training Squadron 4 as a second naval flight officer and navigator primary and intermediate training squadron. VT-10 consisted of Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps staff, which trained more than 400 Navy and Air Force student navigators annually. From 1997 until 2009, command of VT-10 alternated between the Navy and Air Force.

In fall 2002, VT-10 received the first T-6A Texan, which replaced the aging T-34C, and began upgrading instructors for the new aircraft. This more capable aircraft was a significant upgrade from the T-34 and brought training into the 21st century. By June 2003, VT-10 had flown its first student in the T-6A and began instruction in the new curriculum. The squadron flew its last T-34C sortie in June 2005.

In 2009, the Air Force established the Combat Systems Officer School in Pensacola, which took over the Air Force navigator training, and VT-10 returned to an all Navy-Marine Corps squadron. In 2010, VT-4 was incorporated into VT-10 in a "cadre" status wherein VT-4's squadron personnel and equipment were integrated into VT-10. This change was put in place to facilitate the new undergraduate military flight officer syllabus' transition.

In 2012, VT-10's Undergraduate Military Flight Officer Department began an incredibly robust endeavor in the complete rewrite of the ground syllabus for the advanced multi-crew simulator. In June 2013, the VT-4 Warbucks emerged from cadre status to establish the new multi-crew simulator training device, becoming fully operational in November 2014. They are the Navy's first simulator-only training squadron, providing advanced training and winging U.S. Navy P-3, P-8, E-6, and E-2 aircraft.

In 2016, VT-10 incorporated the naval flight officer training syllabus curriculum, streamlining primary and intermediate flight training to U.S. Navy and Marine Corps, German, Norwegian, Saudi Arabian and Singaporean students.

VT-10 has been awarded six meritorious unit commendations and five chief of naval education and training "shore and technical training excellence awards," the most recent in 2008. Wildcat safety initiatives have earned the squadron 30 chief of naval operations safety awards, most recently in 2016. Additionally, due to the squadron's incredible safety record, it has received the Adm. John H. Towers award for safety in 1978, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012 and 2013. VT-10's training and production is also well recognized. The squadron received the Cmdr. Theodore G. Ellyson Aviation production excellence award in 2004, 2006 and 2010 and the Vice Adm. Robert Goldthwaite award for training excellence six times. The squadron's safety publication "The Scratching Post" garnered VT-10 the Grampaw Pettibone Media award in 2011 and 2016.

VT-10 was awarded the secretary of the Navy safety excellence, chief of naval operations safety "S" and CNATRA training excellence awards for 2014 and 2016. VT-10 has and will continue to aggressively meet the challenges of a changing training environment and continues to proudly serve as the "naval flight officer gateway to the fleet."



TRAINING SQUADRON 86

Training Squadron 86 is known by several names: Traron 86, VT-86 or simply the Sabrehawks, a name derived from the T-39 Sabreliner and the TA-4J Skyhawk. The squadron was commissioned in June 1972, under the operational control of Commander Training Air Wing 8, Naval Air Station, Glynco, Georgia. The training of naval flight officers was conducted in four original disciplines: radar intercept operation, basic jet navigation, airborne electronic warfare and airborne tactical data systems. Training was conducted in aircraft assigned to and supported by NATTC, until February 1973, when the squadron accepted 24 T-39, 20 TA-4C, two E-121K and 12 TS-2A aircraft and about 350 enlisted personnel from Naval Air Station Glynco. After receiving the aircraft and personnel, the squadron's mission was expanded to include flight support for air intercept control and ground controlled approach training functions.

In March 1974, a Sabrehawk detachment was established at NAS Pensacola and on June 1, 1974, the squadron shifted flight operations to NAS Pensacola under operational command of Commander, Training Air Wing 6. In 1994, VT-86's mission expanded to include the training of U.S. Air Force weapons systems officers. In 1995, the squadron began training international military flight officers from Saudi Arabia, Italy, Singapore and Germany. In 2008, the T-2C Buckeye completed 51 years of service in training naval aviators and flight officers with its last training flight being conducted by VT-86 personnel. The T-45C Goshawk replaced the T-2C as the premier advanced naval flight officer training aircraft. 2010 marked the final year of Air Force weapons systems officer training by VT-86. Today, the squadron trains more than 110 students annually.

Upon completion of the program, students will undergo further training at their respective fleet replacement squadrons. Naval flight officers will go on to fly FA-18F Super Hornets

and EA-18G Growlers; Marine weapons systems officers will fly F/A-18D Hornets; German weapons systems officers will fly Tornados; Saudi Arabian navigators will fly F-15E Strike Eagles; and Singaporean navigators will fly F-16 Fighting Falcons or F-15E Strike Eagles. VT-86 is staffed by 44 Navy, Marine Corps and international officers, 11 civilians and 15 reservists.

2ND GERMAN AIR FORCE TRAINING SQUADRON

The German air force and navy have had a continuous joint training presence in the U.S. since 1981. First-class American aviation experience, outstanding facilities and superb weather conditions are among the reasons that make the U.S. the ideal country from which to purchase aviation training. The German squadron's first operation was at Mather Air Force Base, Sacramento, California, and was subsequently transferred to Randolph Air Force Base, Texas. In conjunction with the establishment of a joint program, the training of the "backseaters" and navigators was moved to NAS Pensacola.

On June 5, 1996, the squadron was officially installed at Training Air Wing 6. The German staff handles all student administrative affairs and helps them, as well as their families, adjust to life in Florida, more than 5,000 miles away from home. The three flying officers of the squadron participate as associate instructors in Wing 6 training activities and instruct not only German students but also American and other international students.

The squadron is responsible for the basic training of the Luftwaffe's future Tornado weapons systems officers. In addition, since 2005 the squadron has been responsible for administrative support of German navy students under conversion training as pilots, in-flight technicians and flight engineers and since 2017 naval flight officers for the P-3 Orion in NAS Jacksonville.

U.S. AIR FORCE



479TH FLYING TRAINING GROUP

The 479th Flying Training Group is an Air Force tenant unit headquartered at NAS Pensacola and is the sole unit charged with training Air Force combat systems officers. The group is geographically separated from their host wing, the 12th Flying Training Wing, Randolph Air Force



Base, Texas. A combat systems officer is an aeronautically rated officer within the U.S. Air Force trained in the employment of weapons, electronic warfare, sensor operation and navigation.

The unit has a long and distinguished history beginning as the 479th Fighter Group, which was activated in 1943 to provide high-altitude, long-range escort for the 8th Air Force's bombers during World War II. The unit flew P-38 Lightnings to escort heavy bombers during operations against targets and flew counter-air and patrol sorties. During the Normandy invasion on June 6, 1944, the 479th patrolled the beachhead from dawn until well after dark, ensuring that soldiers safely reached the shore. Beginning in August 1944, the group began trading in its P-38 aircraft for the North American P-51 Mustang, which they flew for just 15 months before the unit was inactivated in fall 1945.

Seven years later, the group was reactivated with the F-51 Mustang and redesignated the 479th Fighter-Bomber Group at George Air Force Base, California. It flew the F-51 aircraft until June 1953 when it phased into the North American F-86F Sabre. After only a year, the group made another switch to the F-100A Super Sabre, becoming the first unit qualified in a century series fighter. Unfortunately, the group was again deactivated in 1957. After 43 years, the 479th was reactivated and redesignated as the 479th Flying Training Group at Moody Air Force Base, Georgia. The unit provided joint specialized undergraduate pilot training and introduction to fighter fundamentals to pilot students. After a few years, the Department of Defense 2005 Base Realignment Commission ordered the Air Force's navigator training from Randolph Air Force Base in Texas to NAS Pensacola. The 479th was moved from Moody Air Force Base to NAS Pensacola in October 2009 to create a new training program, which combined the navigator, the electronic warfare officer, the weapon system officer and the sensor operator to produce a new rated career field now commonly known as a combat systems officer.

Undergraduate Combat Systems Officer Training

Undergraduate combat systems officer training, or UCT, is a formal flight training program belonging to the Air Force's Air Education and Training Command headquartered at Randolph AFB, Texas. After receiving a commission into the Air Force, students are sent to NAS Pensacola to begin training. Upon arrival, students are assigned to the 479th Student Squadron, which maintains administrative control of the students throughout their duration of training. Prior to beginning UCT, UCSOs attend initial flight training in Pueblo, Colorado, where they fly 10 sorties in a DA-20. During this training, students are introduced to the basics of flight training and begin to develop their aviation skills. After Pueblo, the students attend water and land survival training at Fairchild Air Force Base, Washington. Upon completion of survival training, students return to NAS Pensacola where they are assigned to an undergraduate combat systems officer training class and begin UCT.

UCSOs commence the primary phase of training in the 455th Flying Training Squadron. During the primary phase of training, UCSOs become competent in the core skills of mission planning, briefing, basic navigation and crew coordination while flying the T-6A II Texan. Following the primary phase, UCSOs transition to the advanced phase of training with the 451st Flying Training Squadron. During the advanced phase, UCSOs are taught complex radar operations, weapons employment and electronic defense procedures in the T-25 and T-96 simulators and the T-1A Jayhawk. Towards the end of the advanced phase of training, UCSOs receive their follow-on aircraft assignment. After selection, UCSOs track into one of five top-off programs where they receive specialized training tailored to their future aircraft. After completing





top-off, UCSOs receive basic navigator and combat systems officer wings during a graduation ceremony with their UCT classmates.



479TH STUDENT SQUADRON

The 479th Student Squadron was activated March 1, 2016, after receiving authorization from Congress to establish a new U.S. Air Force squadron. The creation of the squadron enabled the 479th Flying Training Group to have a dedicated squadron for the administrative control of more than 400 UCSOs throughout their training. In addition to administrative oversight of all students, the squadron ensures UCSOs receive world-class academic and simulator instruction with a dedicated team of DOD civilian academic and simulator training instructors.

A squadron cadre member will maintain administrative oversight of all students from the moment they arrive on station to the time they depart for their next duty station as rated crewmembers. Upon arrival, the squadron oversees all in-processing and schedules all prerequisite training that includes the introduction to flying training and U.S. Air Force water survival and survival-evasion-resistanceescape courses. After the prerequisite training is accomplished, students are assigned a class and begin the UCT syllabus. The squadron works closely with group, wing and MAJCOM staff to ensure higher headquarters production goals are met through its registrar functions. After graduation, the squadron ensures all post-syllabus training such as the introduction to fighter fundamentals or U.S. Air Force centrifuge courses are accomplished and coordinates travel orders for each student to their newly assigned duty stations.

With an active-duty staff with more than 150 years of combined service and a civilian team with more than 500 years of combined service in the Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard, and almost 200,000 flying hours in every conflict since Vietnam, the squadron is instrumental in producing the best combat systems officers in the world.



479TH OPERATIONAL SUPPORT SQUADRON

The 479th School Squadron was constituted and activated Aug. 1, 1941, as part of the Air Corps Advanced Flying School and Army Air Forces Flexible Gunnery School, tasked with training aerial gunners in support of World War II. Postwar, the unit was disbanded. Redesignated as the 479th Operations Support Squadron, the unit was activated in 2009. Since the most recent 479th Flying Training Group reorganization in 2015, the operations support squadron mission is to provide exceptional instructor combat systems officer upgrade training; unrivaled electronic warfare education to undergraduate, joint and multinational military partners; and multifaceted operations support to the 479th Flying Training Group; enabling the production of nearly 300 combat systems officers annually.

The Instructor Training School is responsible for training all new and upgrading instructor combat systems officers in both instructor positions of the modified T-1A Jayhawk, which is the aircraft flown during the advanced portion of undergraduate combat systems officer training.

Special Courses and Training Flight (known as SPECTRA) is responsible for teaching electronic warfare courses to select Department of Defense and international officers. SPECTRA's vision is to prepare joint and coalition electronic warfare leaders to decisively and appropriately engage in today's and tomorrow's wars. SPECTRA courses include Introduction to Electronic Warfare, the Electronic Warfare Coordinators Course, two separate international officers courses and an inactive non-traditional electronic warfare applications course.

The squadron has a unique and robust role supporting flight operations. This includes ensuring the flying hour program is enacted, providing medical care, and properly maintaining and recording flight records for every flying member of the 479th Flying Training Group. Additionally, an intelligence flight and aerospace physiology flight instruct UCSOs during the primary and advanced portions of training. Lastly, Aircrew Flight Equipment maintains life support equipment for both the T-1A and T-6, and teaches UCSOs about the equipment and how to properly egress an aircraft in case of an emergency.



455TH FLYING TRAINING SQUADRON

The 455th Flying Training Squadron was initially activated during World War II as the 455th Bombardment Squadron on Aug. 4, 1942, at Columbia Army Air Base, South Carolina. It deployed to the European theater and flew B-26 bombers until its deactivation in 1945. On April 1, 1973, the 455th Flying Training Squadron was reactivated at Mather Air Force Base, California, where it conducted undergraduate navigator training until deactivation in the early 1990s. The squadron was reactivated Oct. 2, 2009, and is now charged with ensuring the primary phase of UCT is implemented.

UCSOs begin primary training in the classroom where they spend nearly a month learning



about the basics of flying, weather and aircraft systems. Students then move to the 455th FTS flight line where they fly two acrobatic, nine instrument and four low-level flights in the T-6A Texan II. The T-6A is a single-engine, two-seat primary trainer designed to train students in basic flying skills across the Department of Defense. During their training, UCSOs become competent in mission planning, basic airmanship, task and mission management, flight discipline and crew coordination.

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In addition to instructing the primary phase, the 455th FTS instructs combat systems officer students who select the F-15E Strike Eagle in the formation phase. Students learn communication brevity, hand signals and basic formation flight principles during five flights in a T-6A after completing the advanced portion of training. The Formation Top-Off focuses on preparing UCSOs for Introduction to Fighter Fundamentals, a screening program post-UCT meant to prepare students for the F-15E schoolhouse.



451ST FLYING TRAINING SQUADRON

The 451st Flying Training Squadron was initially activated as the 451st Bombardment Squadron (Medium) on July 17, 1942. It conducted B-26 Marauder combat operations from July 1943 to April 1945. While in combat, the squadron's primary targets included enemy airfields, power stations, shipyards, construction works and marshalling yards. The squadron's focus switched in early 1944 to prepare for the Normandy invasion where they focused on railroad and highway bridges, oil tanks and missile sites. Following the Normandy invasion, the 451st was responsible for targeting coastal defenses and gun batteries, fuel and ammunition dumps, traffic-ways and communication hubs. During the Battle of the Bulge, the squadron worked to defend villages and ordnance depots. In June 1945, the squadron moved to Germany to inventory and disassemble the German air force's equipment and facilities, completing the task by late September 1945 then relocating to France, and returning to the U.S. that winter.

Between 1945 and 2009, the squadron would be reactivated and inactivated several times, with multiple redesignations. During its history, the squadron served as a bombardment squadron, light; a fighter-day squadron; and finally a flying training squadron. On Oct. 2, 2009, the 451st FTS was reactivated at NAS Pensacola within the 479th Flying Training Group.

The 451st FTS is the largest flying squadron in Air Education and Training Command and is responsible for training UCSOs during the advanced phase of UCT. It is home to the only combat systems officer-modified T-1A's in the Air Force. The modified T-1A allows for two students to be trained simultaneously in advanced low-level flight and to be engaged by simulated electronic threats while simultaneously coordinating a weapons strike. After finishing the UCSO advanced phase, students select their follow-on aircraft, which include RC-135, B-52, B-1, E-3, E-8, F-15E, HC-130, MC-130, AC-130, EC-130 and U-28. Once all UCSOs complete their training, they receive their combat systems officer wings at a formal graduation with their entire class.

The U.S. Coast Guard has been a prominent part of Pensacola since 1885. The original U.S. Lifesaving Station, manned by a crew of seven, was on Santa Rosa Island from 1885 to 1979. After twice being nearly destroyed by hurricanes, the station was forced to move after Hurricane Frederick devastated the island in 1979. Coast Guard Station Pensacola temporarily relocated to Big Lagoon, west of Pensacola Pass. The present site of Station Pensacola was dedicated on July 18, 1987.

The U.S. Coast Guard's early beginnings began in 1790 with Congress' creation of the Revenue Cutter Service, the nation's oldest continuous sea-going service. In 1915, the Revenue Cutter Service was combined with the U.S. Lifesaving Service to form the modern day U.S. Coast Guard.

The United States Coast Guard is a maritime, military and multi-mission service, unique among the five branches, for having a maritime law enforcement mission with jurisdiction in both domestic and international waters, to include federal regulatory authority as part of its 11 official missions. The Coast Guard operates under the U.S. Department of Homeland Security during peacetime and can be transferred to the U.S. Department of the Navy during times of war. The multi-mission station brings enhanced search and rescue, law enforcement, aids to navigation, and ports and waterways security coverage to the Emerald Coast. The station executes nearly 500 searchand-rescue and law enforcement cases each year and now provides improved response time to most incidents because of its accessible location onboard NAS Pensacola.

The station is home to 45 personnel and two Coast Guard units: Station Pensacola and Aids to Navigation Team Pensacola. The new facility has approximately 12,000 square feet of living and working areas, complete with an operations center, administrative offices, crew's quarters, recreation decks, and machine repair and electrical workshops. The moorings accommodate two 45-foot, multi-mission response boats, one 29-foot fast response boat, a 49-foot aids to navigation boat and a 26-foot aid to navigation boat and provides a pier for visiting Coast Guard cutters. The station is commanded by a senior chief boatswain's mate, who is the officer in charge.





The Naval Branch Health Clinic at CID Corry Station is an open access clinic for active-duty personnel only. The clinic is in the Department of Veterans Affairs Joint Ambulatory Care Center on the south side of Corry Station. All medical care will be conducted at the clinic during normal hours. Any after-hours urgent care needs will be available at Naval Hospital Pensacola's Urgent Care Center, open 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily. Call the clinic if you have questions concerning your medical needs. Uniform of the day is required when visiting the clinic.

Medical Services Provided

NBHC Corry provides nonemergency medical care in a patient-centered primary care clinic. Most medical issues are managed first by the clinic's providers and corpsmen, and if patients





cannot be treated within the clinic, they will be referred to a specialist. Some of the services performed are immunizations, STD exams, Pap smears, Depo-Provera shots, overseas and sea duty screening, laboratory procedures, audiology testing and preventive health assessments. NBHC Corry generally has same-day appointments, and urgent walk-ins are accepted during weekday clinic hours. Special scheduling is done for physicals Wednesday afternoons, and there is walk-in scheduling for the following:

Wart Clinic

No Shave Clinic

Hours: 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. Wednesday.

There are no routine scheduled appointments Friday afternoon. Only urgent walk-ins will be seen.

The NAS Pensacola Child Development Home program provides quality child care in safe and healthy environments for children 6 weeks to 12 years old. The CDH program is designed to meet the unique needs of military and DOD schedules. CDH providers may offer care for days, nights, evenings and weekends when authorized to do so. CDH providers offer safe environments designed to meet the developmental needs of children enrolled and include nutritious meals and snacks. Escambia and Santa Rosa county residents may apply for certification; applicants are not required to be military-affiliated. Those who live off base must also obtain either a state license or state registration prior to becoming Navy certified.

CDH applicants and all family members must complete a rigorous background screening to include a CNACI clearance, fingerprinting and all local background checks. In addition, they are required to attend a 40-hour orientation training class. This class is offered quarterly at no cost. Once the file is complete and approved and a state license or registration is provided, CDH applicants are required to obtain general liability insurance. All files are reviewed by a quality review board, which provides recommendations to the commanding officer prior to certification being authorized. Becoming a certified Navy CDH provider is a privilege authorized by the commanding officer.

Parents in need of a CDH provider should visit http://militarychildcare.com, build a profile and review providers in the area who meet their child care needs criteria. Parents are encouraged to schedule an appointment with the potential provider, meet them and tour the home before making an informed decision of where to place their child.

The clinic offers limited routine surgical care (including spay, neuter and minor surgery) as mission, equipment and personnel allow. In case of an emergency, call a local veterinarian or the local emergency clinic for support.

The clinic also visits Whiting Field on a monthly basis to provide routine preventive medicine products and services to include heartworm prevention, flea prevention, vaccinations, heartworm testing, feline leukemia and FIV testing, deworming and health certificates for travel. COMMANDS CENTER FOR INFORMATION WARFARE TRAINING

The Center for Information Warfare Training is one of the largest of the learning centers of the Naval Education and Training Command. Charged with developing the future technical cadre of the Navy's information warfare community, CIWT leads, manages and delivers Navy and joint force training to 22,000 students annually. With 1,200 military, civilian and contracted staff members, CIWT oversees about 200 courses at four information warfare training commands, two detachments and additional learning sites throughout the United States and Japan.

CIWT officially stood up in 2005 as the Center for Information Dominance following the merger between cryptology and information technology centers. In 2011, CID merged with the Center for Naval Intelligence and in 2016 was renamed CIWT, as part of a Navy shift in emphasis for "information IN warfare" and "information AS warfare," which demands the delivery of information warfare as a critical capability of the Navy's mission sets.

Today, CIWT has a daily student enrollment average of 3,800 students. It delivers courses for 10 Navy enlisted ratings and four officer designators. CIWT teaches cryptologic technicians, information systems technicians, intelligence specialists and electronics technicians. The training pipeline includes apprentice training, initial skills training (A schools), specialized skills training (C schools) and associated pipeline schools (F, D and T schools). For officers, CIWT provides training to cryptologic warfare, information professional, intelligence and foreign area officers.

CIWT's largest training locations at Corry Station, Virginia Beach, San Diego and Monterey are full commands in their own right, now called information warfare training commands. Focused on producing the Navy's linguists, IWTC Monterey in California remains the Navy component at the Defense Language Institute Foreign Language School. IWTC San Diego and IWTC Virginia Beach both originated as intelligence training centers, and IWTC Corry Station has most often been thought of by the cryptologic community as the

"cradle of cryptology." These three locations have broadened the scope of what they offer to the information warfare community, branching out beyond their original charters and making the training for all of the information warfare community more accessible when and where our Sailors and joint service customers need it.

CIWT is also responsible for the Navy Credentialing Opportunities Online (COOL) program and the Center for Language, Regional Expertise, and Culture, both located at Corry Station.

Navy COOL helps Navy service members find information on certifications and licenses related to enlisted ratings, designators, collateral duties and out-of-rate assignments, and officer designators. More information is available at www.cool.navy.mil/usn.

CLREC manages and delivers training to develop foreign language proficiency and competence in intercultural communication among Department of the Navy personnel. CLREC prepares the entire Navy workforce — active, reserve and civil service — for the diverse, global cultures they will encounter while conducting worldwide military operations.



NAVY INFORMATION OPERATIONS COMMAND PENSACOLA

The origin of Navy Information Operations Command Pensacola dates back to spring 1986, when a detachment was established to lay the foundation for what was to be an extensive undertaking for Naval Security Group Command. The rapid development of technology required a commitment to keeping the Fleet and Shore Cryptologic Automated Information System capabilities technologically current.

Naval Security Group Activity Pensacola was thus commissioned in July 1993.

Housed in a 67,000-square-foot facility onboard Corry Station Naval Complex, NSGA Pensacola would soon serve as the center of excellence for automated information systems for Navy cryptologic systems. On Sept. 30, 2005, after the formal disestablishment of Naval Security Group Command, NSGA Pensacola was realigned under the newly formed Naval Network Warfare Command and changed its name to Navy Information Operations Command Pensacola. On Jan. 29, 2010, U.S. Fleet Cyber Command was established and U.S. 10th



Fleet was recommissioned to align the various staffs with the operations and type commander model used throughout the Navy.

Under the Fleet Cyber Command and U.S. 10th Fleet, NIOC Pensacola has maintained key mission areas as a member of the Service Cryptologic Element, as well as pioneering the development, expansion and capabilities of fleet and national cyberspace operations. Since 2005, NIOC Pensacola has been part of the National Security Agency's extended enterprise, producing digital network intelligence reports; conducting technical threat analysis with cyber intrusion tactics, techniques and procedures; and conducting in-depth malicious software research and discovery activities.

In 2013, NIOC Pensacola demonstrated it was the Navy's combat support team center of excellence, building and establishing all five Navy combat support teams in support of U.S. Cyber Command's Cyber Mission Force. The Combat Support Team is a first-of-its-kind force presentation model for cyber in the Department of Defense.

Currently, combat support teams perform target development, target discovery and analysis, planning and synchronization, and intelligence and malware analysis. Combat support teams support combatant command operations and war plans that enable delivery of cyber

effects against adversaries in cyberspace. Additionally, NIOC Pensacola is home to three cyber protection teams, which support real-time defensive cyber operations. Cyber protection teams are the maneuver element of USCYBER-COM's defensive cyberspace efforts, supporting national, DOD information networks, combatant command and U.S. Navy networks. They consist of deployable teams to accomplish cyberspace missions worldwide.

COMMANDS DEFENSE ACTIVITY FOR NON-TRADITIONAL EDUCATION SUPPORT

The Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support, a DOD activity at Saufley

Field, provides education programs and services, which enable service members to achieve their military and civilian career goals. By using DANTES programs and services, service members can prepare for college entrance, earn college credit or complete their college degree wherever they are stationed.

DANTES college preparation services include Kuder Journey, which assesses a service member's interests and skills to recommend appropriate education and career paths. The Distance Learning Readiness Self-Assessment assists service members with self-assessment and improves their readiness for learning outside of the traditional classroom setting. Academic skill improvement (via the online academic skills course and college placement skills training) offers assistance with building math, reading and writing skills. Tuition Assistance DECIDE provides the ability to compare educational programs to assist with choosing the right academic institution.

DANTES-sponsored examinations provide several programs through which an individual may earn high school credentials; satisfy undergraduate- and graduate-level college admission requirements; earn college credit; and gain professional teaching certification.



DANTES also provides a military evaluations program, which gives an evaluation of military training and education that translates courses and occupations held by service members into recommended college credit.

DANTES' academic institution partnerships maximize postsecondary educational opportunities for service members. The DOD Voluntary Education Partnership Memorandum of Understanding between DOD and academic institutions provide service members access to quality institutions approved to participate in the tuition assistance program. Servicemembers Opportunity Colleges support the military services by working with accredited academic institutions to maximize education opportunities for service members at the postsecondary level. The Troops to Teachers program provides counseling, employment and financial assistance to eligible service members and helps veterans transition to careers as certified K-12 public school teachers.

FEDERAL PRISON CAMP PENSACOLA

Federal Prison Camp Pensacola, on Saufley Field, was established in April 1988 to provide inmate manpower to various components of the Pensacola naval complex. The agreement between the Bureau of Prisons and the Navy is similar to the existing one with the U.S. Air Force in the establishment of the Federal Prison Camp at Maxwell Air Force Base. Saufley Field's prison camp has a fluctuating population but can house up to 820 inmates, with

more than 260 inmates providing manpower to the Navy. The work these inmates perform is predominately grounds maintenance and common-labor type work. An additional 110 inmates are assigned to Eglin Air Force Base details performing roads and grounds maintenance. The prison camp has a staff complement of 106.

NAVAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CENTER SAUFLEY FIELD

Naval Education and Training Professional Development Center Saufley Field's mission is "to design, develop and administer voluntary education programs; to administer the Navy's enlisted advancement program; to provide resources management services to assigned activities; and to perform such other functions and tasks as may be assigned by higher authority.


NAVY OPERATIONAL SUPPORT CENTER PENSACOLA

Navy Operational Support Center Pensacola serves 29 Navy Reserve units with approximately 550 SELRES assigned. A majority of these reservists reside in the west Florida and Alabama area. The full-time support staff consists of two officers, 26 enlisted personnel and one civilian who provide administrative support for the reservists. The staff coordinates administrative and training requirements based on individual and unit requirements. The primary mission is to administratively prepare reservists for mobilization. NOSC Pensacola usually drills on the first weekend of the month. The Navy Reserve Recruiting Office is also located here with two enlisted recruiters. Hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday and 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on drill weekends. Lunch is 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. daily. In case of emergency, contact the CDO at 850-384-4023.

HISTORY



NAS PENSACOLA

The site now occupied by Naval Air Station Pensacola has a colorful history dating to the 16th century when Spanish explorer Don Tristan de Luna founded a colony on the bluff where Fort Barrancas is now. In the ensuing years, the flags of Spain, France, Great Britain, the Confederacy and the United States have flown over the strategic port of Pensacola.

The U.S. purchase of the Floridas from Spain in 1821 spawned government realization of strategic importance of Pensacola Bay as a site for a support facility for naval squadrons operating in the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean.

Realizing the advantages of the Pensacola harbor and the large timber reserves nearby for shipbuilding, President John Quincy Adams and Secretary of the Navy Samuel Southard made arrangements in 1825 to build a navy yard on the southern tip of Escambia County, where the air station is today. Navy Captains William Bainbridge, Lewis Warrington and James Biddle selected the site on Pensacola Bay. Construction began in April 1826, and the Pensacola Navy Yard became one of the bestequipped naval stations in the country. In its early years, the base dealt mainly with the suppression of slave trade and piracy in the Gulf and Caribbean.

With a large, wet basin, a floating dry dock and other facilities for building, docking and repairing the largest warships of the time, the yard turned out such masterpieces as the steam frigate USS Pensacola, which saw Civil War action at both the Battle of Mobile Bay and the Battle of New Orleans.

Eighty acres in the southeast corner of the yard, around which a brick wall was built, was set aside for use as an arsenal. Portions of the wall are still standing.

When the Union forces captured New Orleans in 1862, Confederate troops, fearing attack from the west, retreated from the navy yard and reduced most of the facilities to rubble. After the war, the ruins at the yard were cleared away and work was begun to rebuild the base. Many of the present structures on the air station were built during this period, including the stately two- and three-story houses on North Avenue.

In 1906, however, a great hurricane and tidal wave destroyed many of the newly rebuilt structures, and less than two years later, an epidemic of yellow fever brought reconstruction to a standstill. In October 1911, the yard was decommissioned.

Meanwhile, great strides were being made in aviation. The Wright brothers, and especially Glenn Curtiss, were trying to prove to the Navy that the airplane had a place in the fleet. Curtiss began construction of a seaplane design, and in January 1911, civilian pilot Eugene Ely landed a frail Curtiss Pusher airplane on a makeshift wooden flight deck onboard the USS Pennsylvania in San Francisco Bay, demonstrating the value of the airplane to the Navy.

The Navy Department, now awakened to the possibilities of naval aviation through the efforts of Capt. W.I. Chambers, urged Congress to include a provision for aeronautical development in the Naval Appropriation Act, enacted in 1911 to 1912. Chambers was ordered to devote all of his time to naval aviation.



He contracted for three planes, one from the Wright brothers and two from Curtiss, with the provision that the builders train a pilot for each plane. Navy Lt. Theodore G. Ellyson was given instruction by Curtiss and became the first naval aviator. Lt. John Rodgers and Lt. John Towers, former chief of the Bureau of Aeronautics, became the second and third naval aviators, respectively. A camp was established at Greenbury Point near Annapolis, Maryland, and the first naval flight organization began operations.

The first successful catapult launching made by Ellyson in 1912 suggested even broader applications, and in 1913, extensive experiments involving fleet and aerial scouting planes were conducted with astounding and gratifying results. The Navy was convinced.

In October 1913, Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels appointed a board, with Chambers as chairman, to make a survey of aeronautical needs and to establish a policy to guide future development. One of the board's most important recommendations was the establishment of an aviation training station in Pensacola. The recommendation was approved, and the first U.S. naval air station was created in 1914 on the site of the abandoned navy yard.

Cmdr. Henry C. Mustin became the first base commander, and all pilots and planes were ordered for duty. A row of 10 tent hangars was set up along the sandy beach, with wooden ramps running from each tent to the water. Naval aviation consisted of nine officers, 23 mechanics and eight airplanes.

Upon entry into World War I, Pensacola, still the only naval air station, had 38 naval aviators, 163 enlisted men trained in aviation and 54 airplanes. Two years later, by the signing of the armistice in November 1918, the air station, with 438 officers and 5,538 enlisted men, had trained 1,000 naval aviators. At the war's end, seaplanes, dirigibles and free kite balloons were housed in steel and wooden hangars stretching a mile down the air station beach.

In the years following World War I, aviation training slowed. From the 12-month flight course, an average of 100 pilots were graduating yearly. This was before the day of aviation cadets, and the majority of the students included in the flight training program were Annapolis graduates. Thus, Naval Air Station Pensacola became known as the "Annapolis of the air."

In 1928, envisioning great expansion at Pensacola, the Navy Department ordered the construction of an auxiliary field 5 miles northwest of NAS Pensacola in honor of Lt. Cmdr. William M. Corry Jr., Pensacola's 23rd flight student, who served with distinction in World War I.

With the inauguration in 1935 of the cadet training program, activity at Pensacola again expanded. When Pensacola's training

facilities could no longer accommodate the everincreasing number of cadets accepted by the Navy, two more naval air stations were created, one in Jacksonville, Florida, and the other in Corpus Christi, Texas. In August 1940, a larger auxiliary base, Saufley Field, named for Lt. j.g. Richard C. Saufley, naval aviator No. 14, was added to Pensacola's activities. In October 1941, a third field, named after Lt. Ellyson, was commissioned.

As the nations of the world moved toward World War II, NAS Pensacola once again became the hub of air training activities. After the fall of France in 1939, President Franklin D. Roosevelt called for 126,000 planes. Under the administration of its commandant, Capt. A.C. Read, naval aviator No. 24, the air station expanded again, training 1,100 cadets a month, 11 times the amount trained annually in the 1920s.

To help produce the quota of men for the emergency, the air station added three more auxiliary fields, Bronson, Barin and Whiting, all named for early naval aviators. During World War II, the number of pilots trained by the air station reached an all-time high in 1944, when 12,010 men completed training and flew a combined total of almost 2 million hours. The growth of the air station from 10 tents to the world's greatest naval aviation center was emphasized by then-Sen. Owen Brewster's statement: "The growth of naval aviation during World War II is one of the wonders of the modern world."

The record achieved by naval pilots during World War II pays tribute to the excellence of their training. Navy carrier planes shot down 6,444 Japanese planes, losing fewer than 450 of their own, a 14-to-1 superiority in aerial combat. The total number of enemy aircraft destroyed by the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps was 15,401.

In 1948, the Naval Air Basic Training Command headquarters moved from Corpus Christi, Texas, to Pensacola. Working with the Naval Air Training Command, which also was located there, NABTC was instrumental in expanding naval air training and coordinating all basic flight, ground and specialized training. New aircraft designed strictly for training appeared, and jets became part of the training syllabus. Helicopters, having proven their value in the Korean War, increased in importance.

The war in Korea presented problems, as the military was caught in the midst of transitioning from propellers to jets, and the air station revised its courses and training techniques.



Nonetheless, NAS Pensacola produced an impressive 6,000 aviators from 1950 to 1953.

Pilot training requirements shifted upward to meet the demands for the Vietnam War, which occupied much of the 1960s and 1970s. Pilot production was as high as 2,552 (1968) and as low as 1,413 (1962).

In 1971, NAS Pensacola was picked as the headquarters site for CNET, a new command that combined direction and control of all Navy education and training. The NABTC was absorbed by the Naval Air Training Command, which moved to Corpus Christi.

NAS Pensacola today has myriad activities, including the headquarters and staff of the chief of naval education and training; Training Air Wing 6 and subordinate squadrons; the Naval Aviation Schools Command; the Center for Naval Technical Training; the Center for Information Dominance; the Marine Aviation Training Support Group; the Naval Air Technical Training Center; the Naval Operational Medicine Institute; the Naval Recruiting Orientation Unit; and the world-renowned Blue Angels Flight Demonstration Squadron. A continuing attraction for visitors to the Southeast is the National Museum of Naval Aviation.

The Pensacola naval complex in Escambia and Santa Rosa counties employs more than 16,000 military and 7,000 civilian personnel and contributes approximately \$1.2 billion to the local economy annually.

A HAUNTING HISTORY


An aura of mystery and splendor pervades "Admiral's Row." Significant on Johnson Street is Quarters A, a stately home where the air station's most senior officer, the chief of naval education and training, and family reside. When this area was built in 1874, the commandant of the old navy yard lived there.

Now, for a haunting good yarn to spellbind you, and former Quarters A residents say it is true:

Commodore Melanchton B. Woolsey was the first commandant to live here. He was terrified of contracting yellow fever, since an epidemic had already claimed thousands of lives and he didn't want to be the disease's next victim.

He erroneously believed, as others did, that disease-carrying mosquitoes could only fly a few feet high. So, Woolsey moved into the thirdstory cupola. He got his meals, rum (which he claimed was a "tonic" against the fever) and tobacco for his pipe by lowering a basket on a rope from one of the cupola's windows.

One day, his servant forgot the rum. Woolsey died soon thereafter. Yet, as residents believe,



his spirit stayed on in the house. Perhaps to stay with a lovely lady, transparent and clad in white, who also resides in Quarters A, forever.

BUILDING 16

Building 16 is another certified haunted place. This octagonal-shaped building was the officers' quarters during the 1920s, and today some say the building is haunted by a patron from that decade.

In 1924, Marine Capt. Guy Hall, a flight instructor, enjoyed playing poker when he wasn't flying. While playing, he had a habit of picking up his poker chips, then letting them fall to the table.

Hall died during a training mission in the 1920s, and on more than one occasion since that fateful day, people in Building 16 have heard what sounds like poker chips hitting the table.

BARRANCAS LIGHTHOUSE

This classic ghost story begins in 1857 with the construction of the Pensacola Lighthouse and two of its early keepers, a husband and wife.

For some reason, the wife murdered her husband while he slept in their quarters adjacent to the lighthouse. The violent stabbing left a large pool of blood on the floor.

A psychologist who stayed there several years ago alleged there are actually three lighthouse ghosts. Two, he said, are probably keepers who died there of natural causes. The third is either the murdered keeper or his mistress. Take a walk up the lighthouse's 178 steps, late at night, and perhaps you'll be "greeted" by its "keeper."

CORRY STATION

Corry Station is one of the Navy's technical training showplaces. The base is about 5 miles north of NAS Pensacola.

The original Corry Field had its beginnings in 1923, in a remote area north of Pensacola. By 1926, it became apparent that the meager facilities of this site would no longer suffice. The number of pilots being trained was on the increase, and a growing city of Pensacola began to encircle the flying field. In 1927, a 530-acre tract of land was acquired by the government, the gift of Escambia County, for relocation of the landing field. The present site was dedicated Corry Field on Nov. 1, 1928. Construction of permanent buildings began in 1933, and on Dec. 8, 1934, the field was commissioned as an auxiliary base field under the Naval Air Training Center.

The station's name honors the memory of Medal of Honor recipient Lt. Cmdr. William M. Corry Jr., who died as a result of burns received while attempting to rescue a fellow officer from a crashed and burning aircraft. Corry was one of naval aviation's pioneers, having been among the first aviators to receive the Navy's wings of gold.

In its early years, Corry Field was an active Navy aviation training command used for





advanced fighter plane training. Redesignated as a naval auxiliary air station in 1943, the field continued to serve as a training center for naval aviators throughout World War II and the Korean hostilities until its decommissioning in 1958.

The site, once dedicated to flight training, shifted gears in 1960 with the arrival of the first class of communications technicians — later called cryptologic technicians. Hangars were converted to classrooms, and laboratories were stocked with sophisticated communications training equipment. Corry was commissioned the Naval Communications Training Center, Corry Station as the facility's mission became more diversified with the addition of the Naval Schools of Photography and the Consolidated Navy Electronics Warfare School.

The command was among the first Navy technical schools to achieve accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Since 1975, this accreditation has assured that instruction is of the same quality as that offered in the best civilian vocational institutions and that students may receive college-level credit for completed courses.

In January 1990, the center's training capability expanded even further as the first classes convened at the Optics, Instrumentation, Instructor and Information Systems School. From 1995 to 1999, Corry Station served as host of multiservice electronic warfare training with the addition of the Joint Aviation Electronic Warfare School.

The primary mission of the commands at Corry Station today is to provide technical and military training in information operations, cryptology, information technology, information warfare and instructor training to produce well-trained, motivated and disciplined personnel in support of U.S. and allied operational forces.


The Center for Information Dominance is the most senior staff on Corry Station. The CID headquarters' offices and largest learning site are onboard Corry Station, with other detachments throughout the continental U.S., Hawaii and Japan. CID graduates approximately 16,000 students annually.

Corry Station also hosts the Navy Information Operations Command Pensacola and various other staff.

Its role has changed over the years, but traditional pride still dwells within the Corry Station education complex as it continues to







provide the finest and best-trained personnel in the military.

SAUFLEY FIELD

The field was named in honor of Lt. j.g. Richard Caswell Saufley, designated naval aviator No. 14. Saufley was instrumental in setting up the rudiments of naval flight training at its inception in Pensacola around 1914. He set an altitude record of 16,072 feet in early 1916, flying an open-air seaplane. Saufley also set an endurance record of 8 hours, 43 minutes of continuous flight.

Saufley was killed in a crash off Santa Rosa Island in June 1916 while attempting to break his own endurance record. He had been flying for 8 hours, 51 minutes at the time of his crash. Saufley is enshrined in the National Museum of Naval Aviation's Hall of Honor.

One month after the base opened in August 1940, an instrument flying school was transferred

to Saufley Field bringing with it 50 SNJ Texans and 35 "Link" trainers. Two months later, the first primary training squadron was based there.

The outbreak of war in December 1941 brought increased numbers of student naval aviators. Soon the base was swarming with Sailors, and flying went on 24/7.

Saufley's stature grew as the tempo of flying increased. On March 1, 1943, the base was commissioned Naval Auxiliary Air Station Saufley Field and provided every phase of flight training except preflight.

Following World War II, the Navy began closing numerous naval auxiliary air stations, but Saufley remained open, and full operations continued for tactical and carrier qualification training.

In 1959, flight instructors were assigned to, and flying for, VT-1 and VT-5. These aviationtraining squadrons were commissioned in May 1960 and designated tenant commands at Saufley Field. Saufley's mission was revised to provide support for the training squadrons. VT-1 instructors, flying T-34Bs, provided flight indoctrination for Navy ROTC and United States Naval Academy midshipmen. VT-5 provided primary flight training for pilots, flight officers and flight surgeons.

During the height of the Vietnam War, Saufley Field became a full-fledged naval air station July 31, 1968. The training squadrons and NAS Saufley Field were decommissioned by late 1976. Saufley became an outlying landing field. Saufley Field was reactivated in 1979 when the Naval Education Training Program Development Center moved from Ellyson Field.

Saufley Field celebrated its 75th anniversary in 2015. Today, there are about 900 acres and 60 buildings and structures at Saufley Field. There are approximately 1,400 military and civilian personnel assigned to NETPDC and tenant commands.

LOCAL COMMUNITY



The city of Pensacola has a rich history full of everything from archeological sites to significant historical events. In 1559, the area was the site of the first multiyear European settlement in what is now the continental United States. The first commercial export cargo left the Port of Pensacola in 1743 and consisted of pine, pitch products and the wooden masts and spars for sailing ships. In 1825, then-Secretary of State John Quincy Adams ordered the establishment of forts as well as the navy yard at Pensacola, which signaled the beginning of the Navy's long association with the city and its people. Visit Historic Pensacola downtown for an in-depth look into Pensacola's history to include recreated homes, kitchens and shops full of re-enactors giving demonstrations. Some of the stops on these guided tours include the 1805 French Creole Lavalle House and the 1832 Old Christ Church, which is one of the oldest masonry church structures in Florida. Some museums in the area include the T.T. Wentworth Jr. Museum at 330 S. Jefferson St. and the Pensacola Children's Museum at 115 E. Zaragoza St.

For more military history, you might try the site of Fort George, which is also part of the historic district downtown. You can tour Fort Barrancas on the mainland and Fort Pickens on Santa Rosa Island. In the late 1800s, Fort Pickens was also used to house the Apache chief Geronimo and some of his warriors; it is the largest of four forts that were built to defend Pensacola Bay.

Located a short distance from downtown and onboard NAS Pensacola, you can experience the National Naval Aviation Museum, the largest naval aviation museum in the world. The museum provides more than 150 beautifully restored aircraft representing Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard aviation. These historic and one-of-a-kind aircraft are displayed both inside the museum's nearly 350,000 square feet of exhibit space and outside on its 37-acre grounds. The museum also features the Giant Screen Theater.

Don't forget to visit the Pensacola Lighthouse, established in 1859, just down the street from the aviation museum. The Pensacola Lighthouse is the oldest and tallest light station on the U.S. Gulf Coast. You can climb the lighthouse's 177 cast iron steps and visit its museum. The fully restored keepers' quarters — built in 1869 — are home to the Richard C. Callaway Museum, which houses numerous exhibits on local history and the lighthouse itself. CLIMATE

The Florida Panhandle offers mild winters and warm summers tempered by the prevailing winds off the Gulf of Mexico. Peak tourist season is from May through September, so you may wish to time your visits to the most popular local attractions accordingly. Average temperatures from November through February are usually in the low to high 50s, while the water temperatures range from the mid-60s to

low 70s. From March through September, you can look forward to a gentle curve of warmth and sunshine that peaks in June, July and August, when the air temperature is in the 80s and 90s and water temperature is in the 80s.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

The city of Pensacola has a population of nearly 53,000 people. The city council is the legislative body of Pensacola government and has seven members elected by their respective district. The mayor is elected by a popular vote of the residents.

The Escambia County government is governed by a board consisting of five district commissioners elected to four-year terms. The county administrator is an appointed position.

RECREATION

No description of the area can begin without first mentioning Pensacola's two most obvious and notable features — its emerald-green waters and its miles and miles of white-sand beaches that resemble pure cane sugar. Best of all, both are free. Santa Rosa Island is one long, spectacular beach the whole family will love and want to return to again and again.

For those who enjoy being out on the water, Pensacola offers the ability to participate in a wide range of water-based activities, including surfing, paddleboarding, fishing, diving, snorkeling and swimming.

For those who prefer their sports on land, Pensacola has plenty to offer. For the hunter, there are woods galore in the immediate area alive with deer, quail, squirrel, dove and wild pigs. For runners, there are the 15k Double Bridge Run in February and the Blue Angel halfmarathon in March. For those who like to chase the little white ball, the Pensacola area offers several golf courses in addition to those on base.

Pensacola also has something for those who would rather watch than participate. The Pensacola Bay Center hosts a professional ice hockey team, the Pensacola Ice Flyers. In the heart of downtown Pensacola, the Blue Wahoos play Minor League Baseball. Soccer fans will get a kick out of Ashton Brosnaham Park, Pensacola's soccer complex. The 103-acre park features more than a dozen soccer and softball fields. Auto racing fans will love Five Flags Speedway. Whatever your interest, Pensacola has something for you.

EDUCATION AND THE ARTS

In addition to all the museums mentioned earlier, Pensacola is also a thriving setting for the performing arts. You'll find outstanding theater, ballet, opera, symphony or any number of cultural performances at the Saenger Theatre or the Pensacola Little Theatre downtown, at Pensacola State College or at the University of West Florida. If you need information on current activities, go to www.visitpensacola.com.

If your interest is higher education, you will find the University of West Florida right in Pensacola as well as a satellite location at Fort Walton Beach. Further options include Pensacola State College, Pensacola Christian College, Troy University and George Stone Technical Center.

For information about childhood education, contact the Escambia County School District. The district administers schools for grades K-12 and educates approximately 40,000 students each year. Alternatively, there are many private schools throughout the area to choose from. All in all, Pensacola truly does have something for everyone.

GULF ISLANDS NATIONAL SEASHORE

Pensacola Beach and Perdido Key both are home to Florida's Gulf Islands National Seashore, the longest stretch of federally protected seashore in the United States. Island beaches, sparkling waters, bayous, historic forts and recreational opportunities are plentiful at the Gulf Islands National Seashore. Open year-round, the seashore is in Mississippi and Florida. Gentle breezes, tides and hurricanes have constantly reshaped this dynamic landscape.

Salt marshes, dunes covered with sea oats, and maritime forests of live oaks and pines

are part of the national seashore. Animal life includes sea turtles, alligators, a wide variety of birds (such as plovers, terns, sanderlings and pelicans), and abundant fish, shellfish and other sea life.

For history buffs, the forts of Gulf Islands National Seashore span almost 150 years, from the Spanish colonial Bateria De San Antonio (1797) to the WWII-era Battery 234. This reflects the historic value of the anchorages at Pensacola Bay, Florida, and Ship Island, Mississippi. Most striking among these are the American Third System forts: Fort Pickens, Fort Massachusetts, Fort Barrancas and the







Advanced Redoubt, all which saw action during the Civil War.

The Fort Barrancas area is on Taylor Road, approximately a half-mile east of the National Naval Aviation Museum. The area includes the historic Water Battery, Fort Barrancas, trails, a visitor center, picnic areas and the Advanced Redoubt. Fort Barrancas sits on a bluff overlooking the entrance to Pensacola Bay; the natural advantages of this location have inspired engineers of three nations to build forts. The British built the Royal Navy Redoubt there in 1763 of earth and logs. The Spanish built two forts there around 1797. Bateria de San Antonio was a masonry water battery at the foot of the bluff. Above it was earth and log Fort San Carlos Barrancas. American engineers remodeled the Water Battery in 1840 and built a masonry fort on the bluff between 1839 and 1844, connected by a tunnel to the water battery. This is the current Fort Barrancas. A 1.2 million, 18-month restoration project led to its reopening in 1980. Scheduled tours of Fort Barrancas are offered throughout the vear. Call 850-934-2600 for more information.

The Advanced Redoubt of Fort Barrancas was built between 1845 and 1870 as a part of a defensive network for the Pensacola Navy Yard. Fort Pickens, McRee and Barrancas protected the entrance to the harbor; the Advanced Redoubt was constructed to defend the northern side of the peninsula on which the navy yard was located. The redoubt is unique among the early American forts at Pensacola in being designed solely for resisting a landbased assault. Scheduled tours of the Advanced Redoubt are also available.

Fort Pickens is the largest of four forts built to defend Pensacola Bay, Florida, and its navy yard. The construction of fort began in 1829, was completed in 1834 and was used until the 1940s. Built in the age of wooden warships and cannons firing round balls, the fort underwent changes in response to advances in weapon technology following the Civil War.

Ten concrete gun batteries including one in the middle of the historic fort were built from the 1890s through the 1940s, each a response to a particular threat. Atomic bombs, guided missiles and long-range bombers made such forts obsolete by the end of World War II, and the Army abandoned the forts. Following extensive repairs by the National Park Service, the fort was reopened in 1976.
