WELCOME

Welcome to Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, home of the 4th Fighter Wing and 916th Air Refueling Wing. The 4th Fighter Wing trains tomorrow's F-15E aircrew and maintains a readiness posture to employ combat airpower and its combat enablers anywhere in the world at a moment's notice. The 916th Air Refueling Wing provides air-to-air refueling, cargo and passenger hauling, and aeromedical evacuation on a global scale at a moment's notice.

Team Seymour, a total force of more than 6,500 Airmen and civilian personnel, serves more than 22,700 personnel, including the diverse population of dependents and retirees in the local community.

Each year, Team Seymour deploys an average of 750 Airmen in support of overseas contingency operations. As a member of Air Combat Command and 9th Air Force, the 4th Fighter Wing supplies on-call combat airpower to combatant commanders through two operational flying squadrons and thousands of support personnel. The base is also home to the only two F-15E Formal Training Units in the Air Force. Additionally, the 916th Air Refueling Wing, the Air Force Reserve Command's primary KC-135R location, acts as a centrally located unit charged with offering non-stop connectivity and joint service air refueling, enabling both training and overseas contingency operations.

Seymour Johnson Air Force Base is fortunate to have Wayne County and the City of Goldsboro as its partners. The surrounding community has been critical to the success of the 4th Fighter Wing mission since the base opened in 1942. Community is about respect, ambassadorship, and always being a superior teammate. We strive to maintain a healthy community with all of our mission partners on the installation, as well as being ambassadors to everyone off base.

To further our community, we have the Airman Sponsorship Program at Seymour Johnson. This is a collaboration between

Seymour Johnson AFB and our local community that connects community members and their families with young Airman to provide a home-away-from-home during their first enlistment in the military. It also offers individuals and families a unique opportunity to support and bond with our Air Force men and women.

Families are essential to the mission success of the 4th Fighter Wing. A balanced family life boosts morale and a sense of belonging. 4TH FIGHTER WING HISTORY

Spanning more than five decades and five wars, the 4th Fighter Wing is one of the most distinguished fighter units in the world. In addition, it has the distinction of being one of only two Air Force units that can trace its history to another country.

Before the United States' entry into World War II, American volunteers were already serving as combat veterans in Royal Air Force Eagle Squadrons (71st, 121st and 133rd). When the United States entered the war, these units, and the American pilots in them, were transferred to the U.S. Army Air Forces, 8th Air Force, forming the 4th Fighter Group Sept. 12, 1942.

The 4th Fighter Group (with squadrons now designated the 334th, 335th and 336th) was a record-setter throughout the air war over Europe, justly earning the motto "Fourth But First."

It was the first fighter group to use belly tanks, the first to penetrate Germany, the first to accompany bombers to Berlin, the first to accomplish the England-to-Russia shuttle and the first to down jet fighters. The group was credited with the destruction of 1,016 enemy aircraft, more than any other 8th Air Force unit, and produced 38 aces.

The 4th Fighter Group was inactivated at Camp Kilmer, New Jersey, Nov. 10, 1945. The unit was reactivated at Selfridge Field, Michigan, Sept. 9, 1946, as the United States began to rearm due to Cold War pressures.

Following a period of training with F-80 Shooting Star aircraft, the 4th Fighter Group transitioned to F-86 Sabre jets in March 1949, just in time for advanced training and entry into the Korean War.

In December 1950, the group (now designated the 4th Fighter-Interceptor Group) was the first unit to commit F-86 Sabre jets to that conflict. Lt. Col. Bruce H. Hinton shot down a MiG-15 on Dec. 17 during the first Sabre mission of the war. Four days later, Lt. Col. John C. Meyer, a World War II ace, led elements of the group into the first major all-jet fighter battle in history. The flight element downed six MiG-15s without sustaining any losses. Fourth airmen destroyed 502 enemy aircraft (54 percent of the total), becoming the top fighter unit of the Korean War. Twenty-four pilots achieved ace status.

Now associated with the 4th Fighter-Interceptor Wing, the group moved to Japan following the Korean armistice in 1953, continuing training and tours to Korea. The unit moved to Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, North Carolina, Dec. 8, 1957, picking up a fourth tactical fighter squadron (the 333rd "Lancers" remained with the 4th Wing until reassignment to Pacific Air Forces Dec. 4, 1965) and was redesignated as the 4th Tactical Fighter Wing in July 1958.

Aircrews of the Fourth flew F-100 Super Sabre aircraft at the new location, and, within two years, the wing became the first Air Force unit to convert to F-105 Thunderchief aircraft. During the transitioning phase, a new world speed record was set for the 100-kilometer closed course at Edwards AFB, California. Brig. Gen. Joseph H. Moore, 4th wing commander, established the new record of 1,163.35 miles per hour.

Significant events of the 1960s include the deployment of the three tactical fighter squadrons to McCoy AFB, Florida, during the Cuban missile crisis in October 1962; rotational tours to Southeast Asia in 1965; and transition to F-4D Phantom II aircraft beginning in early 1967. The readiness posture of the wing was given a true test in early 1968 when the North Koreans seized the Pueblo, an American intelligence-gathering ship, just off the coast of North Korea. Elements of the Fourth moved to Korea within 72 hours.

The 4th Fighter Wing continued to sustain a highly visible mobility posture with development of the first operationally ready bare-base squadron in 1970, followed by multiple deployments to Southeast Asia beginning in April 1972. Operating from Ubon Royal Thai Air Base, Thailand, as the first F-4 wing to augment elements of Pacific Air Forces, aircrews of the Fourth flew more than 8,000 combat missions, many into the very heart of North Vietnam.

Following on the heels of Constant Guard operations in Southeast Asia, the Fourth executed Peace Echo operations in October 1973, an almost instantaneous response to critical events in the Middle East, which helped restore a balance of power in that troubled part of the world.

In 1974, the wing mission reverted back to training, with increased emphasis on short-term European contingency support. Elements of the wing deployed to Norway in June 1974. Two short-term deployments to Spangdahlem AB, Germany, were conducted in July and September 1975. The highlight of 1976 came in November when the wing took first place in the William Tell worldwide weapons competition at Tyndall AFB, Florida, becoming the first F-4 unit to win the Air Defense Command-sponsored event. The wing executed short-term deployments to Korea and Japan during 1977 and assumed a dual-based mission (with Ramstein AB, Germany) in October of that year. The overall mission commitment was restructured to reflect worldwide contingency emphasis in October 1986.

Beginning in late 1980, the wing began converting to ARN-101-equipped aircraft to enhance bombing and navigation capabilities. In September 1981 and in October 1983, the wing won the prestigious Gunsmoke meet

in the F-4 ARN-101 category. The meet was held at Nellis AFB, Nevada, where in January 1985 the “Fourth But First” became the first operational unit to conduct live drops of the GBU-15 guided bomb unit.

With assignment of a fourth tactical fighter squadron (the 337th “Falcons”) on April 1, 1982, the Fourth was recognized as one of the Air Force’s largest operational tactical fighter units. The 337th was inactivated July 1, 1985.

In 1988, the Fourth began transitioning to the F-15E Strike Eagle, the Air Force’s newest and most advanced tactical fighter aircraft. The first F-15E arrived Dec. 29, 1988, and the 336th Tactical Fighter Squadron became the first operational F-15E squadron in the Air Force Oct. 1, 1989. The transition from the F-4E to the F-15E was completed July 1, 1991, making the Fourth the first operational F-15E wing in the Air Force.

At the height of conversion training, the Fourth was one of the first units tasked to react to Iraq’s invasion of Kuwait Aug. 2, 1990. Two F-15E tactical fighter squadrons were deployed to Southwest Asia in August and December of that year. The unit earned another first by spearheading nighttime strikes against Iraqi forces Jan. 16, 1991, helping to bring the Persian Gulf War to a successful conclusion Feb. 28.

On April 22, 1991, the Fourth became the Air Force’s first composite wing. The 4th Tactical Fighter Wing was redesignated the 4th Wing and incorporated under it all the people, KC-10 aircraft and assets of the 68th Air Refueling Wing, a Strategic Air Command unit.

The Fourth began a force structure change in 1994. The KC-10s were reassigned to Air Mobility Command bases in 1994 and 1995 and the F-15E formal training unit moved to Seymour Johnson in 1994 and 1995. The 333rd Fighter Squadron returned to Seymour Johnson to accommodate the training mission. Following the departure of KC-10s, the 4th Wing was redesignated the 4th Fighter Wing Dec. 1, 1995. To accommodate the

need to train more F-15E aircrews, the 334th Fighter Squadron became a training squadron Jan. 1, 1996.

Fewer resources and the need to use all Air Force assets to meet increased operational commitments called for yet another reorganization as the 20th century came to a close. The expeditionary aerospace force concept represents the Air Force vision to organize, train, equip, deploy and sustain itself in the 21st-century global security environment. Under the concept, the Fourth is one of two on-call rapid response aerospace expeditionary wings. The Fourth was the first to assume the on-call mission Oct. 1, 1999.

On June 20, 2000, the 23rd Fighter Group became a part of the 4th Fighter Wing, during a reassignment ceremony at Pope Air Force Base, North Carolina, and continues to operate from Fayetteville, North Carolina. The group flies and maintains A-10A Thunderbolt II aircraft. Its primary mission is forward air control, close-air support, interdiction and combat search and rescue operations. The ceremony brought together two organizations whose histories predate the United States involvement in WWII when both units served as American volunteer groups.

In January 2001, the 4th Fighter Wing became the proud recipient of the Commander-In-Chief’s Installation Excellence Award — receiving a \$1 million prize for quality of life and job enhancement. The honor proves the hard work and dedication of all members of the Fourth as the “best base in the Air Force.”

In October 2001, in response to the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on the United States, the 4th Fighter Wing began flying Operation Noble Eagle sorties, the first of its kind for the wing, providing coastal protection for Homeland Defense.

In January 2002, the 4th Fighter Wing arrived in Kuwait in support of Operations Southern Watch and Enduring Freedom, flying missions over Iraq and Afghanistan. On March 1, 2002, Operation Anaconda was launched, and the wing’s mission was to provide close air support into Afghanistan. Operation Anaconda ended March 21, 2002, with the 4th Fighter Wing’s

greatest highlight being its performance at Roberts Ridge. Members of the 335th Fighter Squadron successfully suppressed enemy fire from al-Qaida troops, as Army and Air Force personnel retrieved stranded and fallen comrades.

In March 2002, A-10s assigned to the 23rd Fighter Group from Pope AFB, North Carolina, arrived in Jacobabad, Pakistan, and later became the first fixed winged aircraft to enter Afghanistan to fight the war on terrorism.

On Sept. 1, 2002, the Fourth transitioned into its final on-call AEW. Though the 4th Fighter Wing will continue as a lead wing when deployed, it will now assimilate into the more predictable 90-day 10 AEF schedule, as opposed to waiting for the call from higher headquarters.

In January and February 2003, in response to the threat of Iraq’s ability to produce weapons of mass destruction and their elusiveness with United Nation weapon inspectors, the 4th Fighter Wing joined other operational units in Southeast Asia. Two F-15E fighter squadrons deployed to Southwest Asia in support of OSW, which would later transition into support for Operation Iraqi Freedom. On April 18, 2003, members of the 4th Fighter Wing returned heroically to Seymour Johnson AFB after contributing to the resounding U.S.-led coalition victory over Iraq.

During 2004, the 4 FW transitioned into the normal AEF deployment rotation cycle. During August and September 2004, the 4 FW deployed more than 1,300 wing personnel from various units across the base in support of Air Expeditionary Force 1/2. Team Seymour members were deployed to several locations around the world, primarily to Southwest Asia in support of Operation IRAQI FREEDOM and Operation ENDURING FREEDOM.

In September 2007, the 336th Fighter Squadron deployed to Bagram Air Base, Afghanistan, to provide the air power needed to fight Operation ENDURING FREEDOM. In January 2008, the 335th Fighter Squadron deployed to continue the OEF mission. Overcoming tremendous obstacles, including a determined enemy, harsh climate and mountainous terrain, both squadrons performed magnificently. The 336th FS flew more than 5,700 combat hours with more than 1,300 combat sorties that included 36 alert launches and 343 troops in contact missions. The 335th FS flew more than 4,300 combat hours with more than 1,200 combat sorties that included 24 alert launches and 187 troops in contact missions.

On Oct. 2, 2009, Capt. Mike “Ox” Polidor and Capt. Aaron “Finch” Dove, of the 335th Fighter Squadron “Chiefs,” were in the right place at the right time to save the lives of American and coalition service members. Command Outpost Keating was in danger of being overrun by overwhelming Taliban forces. After expending their munitions, Polidor and Dove directed air support for the outpost. More than 80 coalition

troops' lives were saved by their actions and they were each awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

The heroes of the 4th Fighter Wing are not just pilots or weapons systems officers. On May 18, 2010, Master Sgt. Van Hood, from the 4th Civil Engineer Squadron Explosive Ordnance Disposal flight, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for his actions while deployed to Forward Operating Base Airborne in the Wardak province of Afghanistan. The greatest risk to American lives in Afghanistan are improvised explosive devices. Hood's main task was to locate and destroy these lethal weapons, a job that saves lives but is inherently dangerous. Joining the Air Force in 1996, Hood had deployed seven times. This was his third Bronze Star.

On June 2, 2011, The Air Force Historical Foundation awarded the first-ever General James H. "Jimmy" Doolittle Award to the 4th Fighter Wing. The award was given in recognition of its sustained, significant contribution to Air Force history. The citation on the award read, "For gallantry, determination, esprit de corps, and superior management of joint operations in accomplishing its mission under difficult and hazardous conditions in multiple conflicts." The men and women of the "Fourth But First" were honored to have their contributions to Air Force history acknowledged.

On June 14, 2012, the 4th Fighter Wing achieved another first when Col. Jeannie Leavitt took command of the wing and became the first female to command an active duty Air Force fighter wing. Leavitt is a command pilot with more than 3,000 hours, including over 300 combat hours. Her operational experiences include Operations SOUTHERN WATCH, NORTHERN WATCH, IRAQI FREEDOM and ENDURING FREEDOM. She served as the 4th Fighter Wing commander for two years.

Today, our Airmen support contingency operations all over the world. Strike Eagle firepower is available wherever and whenever it is needed. From the Eagle Squadron Spitfires through the mighty F-15Es of today, the 4th Fighter Wing has been the tip of the spear confronting America's enemies. The heart of the volunteer resides in today's Airmen of the 4th Fighter Wing. Escorting B-17s to Berlin or supporting our fellow service members in Southwest Asia, the "Fourth But First" has always led the way in the defense of our great nation.

THE 916TH AIR REFUELING WING

As North Carolina's first Air Force Reserve flying wing, the 916th Air Refueling Wing has a rich and growing history in the Goldsboro area; however, its real history started more than 70 years ago.

The 77th Air Refueling Squadron, the wing's reserve flying unit, dates back to World War II. The number 916 was first assigned to a Troop Carrier Group, deactivated at Carswell AFB, Texas, in 1972.

Reincarnated as a refueling group, the 916th was a reserve associate unit flying KC-10 Extenders with the 4th Fighter Wing. They were called to active-duty for Operations Desert Storm, Desert Shield and Proud Return, offloading more fuel than any other Air Force refueling unit.

On Oct. 1, 1995, the group, now a wing, officially gained an independent refueling and airlift mission with KC-135R Stratotankers. Concurrently, the tanker mission became part of the Air Mobility Command.

The conversion process was completed in April 1997 when the 916th Air Refueling Wing officially became mission-ready. The Air Force and Air Force Reserve tested the mettle of Reserve Airmen even before the unit was online.

The wing was tapped to refuel domestic and global exercise and operational flights; they flew cargo and passenger missions in support of Operation Joint Endeavor (Bosnia) and both Atlantic and Pacific supply missions. They were also alerted for short-notice missions; crews stood alert duty for several days, ready to support U.S. military response in Southwest Asia.

Early in the conversion process, the Reserve wing supported refueling and airlift for 4th Fighter Wing F-15E deployments, including hurricane evacuations and off-station exercises. During Operation Allied Force, volunteer aircrews and support personnel served for nearly four weeks, providing air refueling support for strike and surveillance aircraft. More than 3.5 million pounds of fuel were passed to a wide variety of allied aircraft.

The 916th's aircraft are the most recent version of the predecessor to Boeing's 707 airliner and sport new CFM-56 turbofan engines equivalent to the newest commercial power plants. New on-board auxiliary power units allow the Stratotankers to take off from remote airfields without ground support. The

latest modification to the KC-135R was completed in spring 2000. Called Pacer CRAG — for Compass, Radar and Global Positioning System — it adds flight control systems equal to modern commercial airliners. Pacer CRAG will extend the life of these vintage aircraft for many years to come.

Today, more than 350 full-time civilians and Air Reserve technicians and 1,000 Reservists work diligently to continue the mission of the 916th Air Refueling Wing. Hundreds of Airmen of this Tar Heel state unit have deployed in support of Operations Noble Eagle, Enduring Freedom, New Dawn, Odyssey Dawn and Inherent Resolve.

With the Base Realignment and Closure Act, announced in 2005, the 916th gained eight additional tankers and more than 280 active-duty personnel as the first KC-135R Active Associate Wing in Air Force history.

As an Active Associate, the 916th earned four trophies in 2009 at Air Mobility Command's Rodeo competition, to include Best Tanker Wing. In early 2010, the 911th Air Refueling Squadron was named the Best Tanker Squadron in Air Mobility Command after only being established with the 916th for two years. In late 2010, the wing was named Best Air Force Reserve Unit by the Air Force Association. In 2013, the 916th Operations Group was awarded the Airlift/Tanker Association's Lt. Gen. James E. Sherrard III Award.

With reservists and active-duty Airmen coming from various counties across North Carolina and multiple states across the U.S., they dedicate their weekends and time off from civilian jobs in order to serve their country.

Working in the operations group, mission support group, maintenance group, aerospace medicine squadron and wing headquarters, our Airmen are able to deliver rapid, global mobility — on time, every time!

Seymour Johnson Air Force Base is in Goldsboro, North Carolina, on Highway 70, 50 miles east of Raleigh. Take Highway 70 bypass to the Berkeley Boulevard exit and follow Berkeley straight to the Berkeley gate. The visitor center is on the right, just prior to the Berkeley gate.

For those arriving by air, the nearest airport is in Kinston, 28 miles east of the base. Raleigh-Durham International Airport is about 70 miles west of the base. Commercial transportation from both terminals is available.

The center serves as the nucleus for the Key Spouse program, conducting Key Spouse initial training and ongoing quarterly training.
- **Transition Assistance Program (TAP):** The goal of the Transition program is to

prepare service members to have the tools necessary to pursue their post-service career goals. The program ensures all separating service members are informed of the transition services and benefits available to assist them and their spouses with the transition to civilian life. The program offers mandatory Pre-Separation briefings, a TAP Workshop to include the VA benefits information, and additional career tracks such as Boots to Business, Education, and Career Exploration Planning.

- **Employment Assistance:** The Employment Assistance Program supports military, civilians and their family members in achieving employment and career goals. The program provides one on one appointments/workshops for civilian and federal resume and job search, resume review, Career Readiness Certificate testing and assistance with obtaining license and re-licensure. Additionally, the A&FRC provides emergency financial assistance through the Air Force Aid Society and has the School Liaison Officer/EFMP-FS, who advocates for families in the school system and those with special needs. The A&FRC is staffed by 13 full-time civilians, two active-duty members and intermittent volunteers. A Military Family Life Counselor (adult) also works in the center. Community Readiness Consultants/Specialists (CRCs/CRSs) are assigned to units to ensure unit needs are identified and a plan developed to meet the needs of leadership and members. The North Carolina Division of Motor Vehicles oversees the issuance of driver's licenses and state identification cards, as well as vehicle registrations. You are required to obtain a North Carolina driver's license within 60 days of becoming a North Carolina resident. Members of the armed forces stationed in North Carolina, and any dependent of the member, are considered nonresidents if they intend to return to their home state.

To apply for a driver's license you must apply in person at one of the DMV offices and take the required tests. You must bring two documents that provide proof of your age and identity, your Social Security card, proof of residence and proof of liability. The minimum limits of liability required in North Carolina are: \$30,000 for each injured person, \$60,000 per accident and \$25,000 for property damage.

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Use of the Military System

- A. To call a base number: Dial the 7-digit number.
- B. To call the local area and base housing: Dial 99 followed by the 7-digit number. The following exchanges are in the local dialing area:
 Goldsboro 221, 222, 223, 242, 252, 261, 271, 273, 283, 284, 288, 289, 299, 330, 344, 394, 396, 429, 432, 440, 488, 566, 569, 580, 581, 583, 584, 585, 587, 588, 617, 624, 635, 638, 648, 658, 689, 705, 709, 710, 722, 731, 734, 736, 738, 739, 747, 750, 751, 759, 766, 778, 780, 803, 826, 919, 922, 936 and 965.
- C. Information calls: To obtain base numbers dial 113 when on base and dial 722-1110 when off base.
- D. Conference Calls: Conference call service, local or long distance, is available by dialing the base operator.
- E. Call Transfer and Three-way Conference: While on an active call, flash the hook switch (you get a unique tone). Dial the 5-digit number the call is to be transferred to. Upon hearing the ring back, the transferring station can either: Hang up to complete the transfer, or, wait for an answer, and flash the hook switch once to establish a three-way conference.
- F. Call Forward: Pick up the handset, dial feature code *72. Dial the 7-digit number you wish to forward your calls to. Hang up when you hear confirmation tone.
- G. Remove Call Forward: Pick up handset. Dial feature code desired, #72 – Call Forward All Calls – Cancel. Hang up when you hear a confirmation tone.
- H. Last Number Redial: Pick up handset. Press the number sign # key twice. The last number you dialed will be automatically dialed by the system.
- I. Call Pick Up: Pick up the handset. Dial the Call Pickup feature code – 111, you are connected to the call.
- J. Ring Again: After encountering a busy signal, flash the hook switch (you get a unique tone). Dial the Ring Again feature code – *74. Hang up after hearing a confirmation tone. When the busy station becomes idle, you will receive a special ring. When you lift the handset, the system will automatically dial the extension.
- K. Call Hold: While on an active call, flash the hook switch (you get a unique tone). Dial the Call Hold feature code – *80.
- L. Classification of Telephones
- M. Care of Telephone Equipment: Telephone users are responsible for the proper use, care and safekeeping of telephone instruments and are liable for any loss or damage thereto. Under no circumstances will the subscriber move, alter or make additions to the equipment. Any telephone equipment that if found to have been tampered with by any unauthorized personnel will be disconnected and withdrawn from the using agency.

2. Instructions for Placing Long-distance Calls and Limiting Calls

- A. Official long-distance calls should not be made when time permits the use of other means of communications, i.e., letter or electrical message. DSN or FTS may be used to call long distance when matters require immediate attention.

 Defense Switched Network (DSN) provides direct dial access into the CONUS DOD DSN system, which is available only to certain class of service by dialing "94." Request for operator assistance for CONUS DSN will be denied, except for key officials designated by the installation commander.
- B. Federal Telephone System (FTS) provides the base operator with the complete access to the nationwide dialing network and permits intrastate and interstate calling. It is available for official outgoing calls only on a station-to-station basis to all cities in the 48 contiguous states and the District of Columbia. See item 15-B-4 for FTS calling procedures.
- C. It is incumbent upon each individual making long-distance calls to limit the length of such calls to the minimum time required to conduct one's business. Calls should not exceed 5 minutes.

3. Reporting Service Complaints

- A. Telephone operators are instructed to be uniformly courteous and not to enter into controversy with callers.
- B. Individual operators are forbidden to receive service complaints and are instructed to refer all calls to the chief operator.
- C. Telephone operators are not permitted to give their names when requested by callers. They are instructed to give their operator numbers only.
- D. Telephone operators are not allowed to enter into personal conversation with callers. Users should limit conversation to requesting information and placing calls. Requests for unauthorized information will be referred to the supervisor.

4. Reporting Nuisance and Bomb Threat Calls

- A. Malicious, threatening, abusive, indecent, annoying or harassing telephone calls, including those in which obscene or profane language is used, are prohibited by state and federal laws.

The following action should be taken:

- 1. Request the caller's name. When a voice asks: "Who is this?" ask instead: "What number did you dial?" or "Who do you want?"
- 2. If the caller remains silent after you answer, or makes any obscene or suggestive remarks, HANG UP! If the calls persist, notify Security Police at 2-1211. Furnish as much information as possible about the call and the caller.

5. Reporting Telephone Troubles and Other Emergency-type Calls

- A. **Reporting Telephone Outages:** Report base telephone outages to telephone repair at extension 119. It is the responsibility of each individual utilizing the base telephone system to protect instruments and associated equipment from malicious damage. Installation, removal, relocation, or modification of all base telephone equipment wiring and associated wiring will be accomplished only by authorized telephone maintenance personnel.
- B. **Emergency Calls:**
 - 1. Emergency numbers are listed on the page 1 of this directory. However, subscribers may dial "0" for assistance with any emergency call. Emergency calls are placed ahead of all other calls, and monitored by the base operator.
 - 2. Stickers with the SJA/AFB emergency numbers are available from the SJA/AFB Fire Department through your telephone control officer. Attached to your telephone, these provide quick reference during emergencies.
 - 3. DD Form 2056 should be placed on each telephone at the time of installation. These stickers should not be removed. Replacement stickers are available through the Publications and Distribution Office.

6. Security Instructions

- A. The fact that any number of people can listen to your conversation is a security weakness of the telephone system. Do not talk around classified information, paraphrase or use code words or nicknames. Any person monitoring probably knows enough to "read through" your attempts to disguise information. Military owned or leased telephone systems are subject to monitoring.

The telephone terminals serve both as a standard telephone and as a secure communications terminal. In addition to securing voice calls, the STU-III terminals may be used to secure data traffic. The terminals operate over existing U.S. commercial, DSN and overseas telephone networks. Personnel having the need to use the STU-III system should contact their Unit Security manager.

7. Telephone Precedence System

- A. **Defense Switched Network (DSN) Precedence System:** Seymour Johnson AFB have very limited capabilities to provide the following precedence calls.

B. **To make sure high-precedence users have quick access to DSN Line:** The National Communications System (NCS) voice precedence system establishes a FLASH OVERRIDE capability and the precedence designators of FLASH, IMMEDIATE, PRIORITY and ROUTINE. DSN users must always use the lowest precedence consistent with the operational mission or necessity for each call placed. Assignment or use of a precedence designator based solely on rank or duty position is strictly prohibited.

1. **Precedence:** The Joint Uniform Telephone Communications Precedence System is directed for use by all authorized users of voice communication facilities of the Department of Defense. Since the effectiveness of the system depends upon the cooperation on the part of persons authorized to employ it, users must be familiar with the purpose to be served by each level of precedence category, and the type of calls which may be assigned each precedence.
2. Policy on the use of the DSN Telephone Precedence System:
 - (a) **FLASH** – Reserved for alerts, warnings or other emergency actions having immediate bearing on national, command or area security.
 - (b) **IMMEDIATE** – Reserved for vital communications:
 - (1) Having an immediate operational effect on tactical operations.
 - (2) Directly concerning safety or rescue operations.
 - (3) Affecting the intelligence community operational role.
 - (c) **PRIORITY** – Reserved for calls requiring prompt completion for national defense and security, successful conduct of war, or safeguarding life or property, but do not require higher precedence.
 - (d) **ROUTINE** – Reserved for all other official communications.

8. General Description of Defense Switched Network (DSN)

A. The Defense switched network (DSN) is the principal, long-haul, unsecure voice communications network within the Defense Communications System (DCS). The continental United States (CONUS) portion consists of commercially owned, operated and maintained switching centers interconnecting trunks. Military departments own, operate and maintain the overseas DSN switching centers (except for Alaska and Hawaii). Overseas interconnecting trunks use commercial and military communications paths. Access lines extend from the switching centers to PBX or individual users. The Defense Information Systems Agency (DISA) is responsible for overall management of DSN.

B. DSN dialing instructions from a class AXa military telephone are as follows:

1. Dial 94, the DSN access number.
2. Dial the 7-digit DSN number.

9. Frequently Called DSN Numbers

DSN numbers include most Air Force activities and frequently called installations of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and other DOD activities that may be reached via DSN. See Page 7 for listings.

10. Requesting New Telephone Service

Official requests for installations, moves, or relocations for class A or C service will be submitted electronically to 4CS/SCX. Request will be submitted via Work Order Management System. An individual who thoroughly understands the request should be the requesting official. The unit telephone control officer must sign as the authorizing official.

11. Toll-free Numbers

Many companies provide toll-free "800" numbers that may be used to place long-distance calls at no cost. This service should be considered before placing commercial long-distance calls. For OFFICIAL USE ONLY.

- A. Toll-free numbers: From Class AXa and AXb, dial 99+1+800+7-digit number.

12. Need, Meaning and Effect of Implementing MINIMIZE for Telephone Service Users

A. MINIMIZE is a condition imposed by commanders to control and reduce electrical communications, both message and telephone traffic, during exercises or periods of emergency. During such periods, all except vital message traffic must be drastically reduced.

B. MINIMIZE may be imposed DOD-wide, Air Force-wide, commandwide, or for given countries, states or areas as conditions warrant.

1. Upon notification that MINIMIZE has been put into effect, commanders must inform all subordinate personnel of the existence of MINIMIZE conditions. During periods when it is deemed necessary, commanders may impose a time limit on outgoing calls within their areas of responsibility.
2. When MINIMIZE is in effect, telephone operators must inform all subscribers of this condition.
- C. Officials designated to authorize voice traffic under MINIMIZE conditions will approve only those calls which:
 1. Adversely affect immediate operations if not placed.
 2. Are of vital importance or within a category specifically exempted from MINIMIZE. Calls exempted from MINIMIZE would be calls related to:
 - (a) Movement of aircraft, fleet units or troops.
 - (b) Weather information or critical intelligence.
 - (c) Serious illness, accident, or death involving military personnel or members of their immediate families.

D. Assure assignment of the lowest priority that will provide necessary speed of service.

E. Refuse all calls that do not meet the above criteria.

13. Procedures for Requesting or Terminating Residential Telephone Service

A. This service is not available at this base through the Base Communications Office. Telephone service is available direct from Bell South Telephone Company. For installation or termination of commercial telephone, call the business office, toll-free as follows:

1. New services, moves or changes: 780-2355.
2. Termination of service: 780-2355.

14. Promoting Good Telephone Service

A. To obtain the most efficient and effective service from the telephone facilities, telephone users should be thoroughly familiar with the operating instructions in the General Information section of this telephone directory.

B. Good telephone service is based on the courtesy, accuracy, and speed of subscriber and operating personnel.

15. Procedures for Making Long-distance Calls

All official long-distance calls will be placed through the base operator and must be properly authorized. Callers must contact their telephone control officer for authorization. If approved, the telephone control officer will furnish the caller with a control number to be used when making the call. To minimize long-distance costs, all calls should be station to station and terminated as quickly as possible. All personnel are reminded that offenders will be subject to disciplinary action.

A. Instruction for placing official long-distance calls:

1. Obtain correct number, area code and city being called.
2. Obtain control number from unit telephone control officer.
3. Dial "0" for base operator and give the following information:
 - (a) Control number.
 - (b) Area code and telephone number being called.

B. Types of long-distance calls.

1. Collect Calls: If the called party is to be charged for the call.
2. Calling Card: Persons placing calls with a

3. Bill to a Third Number or Third-party Call: Persons wishing to place this type of call may do so from a coin telephone.
4. Toll-free Calls: Toll-free calls (800) can be dialed by base subscribers from class A telephone. Dial 99-1-800 and the 7-digit number. When available, toll-free numbers should be used instead of base FTS to prevent incurring a charge to the government.
5. Overseas: Calls overseas may be placed by the base operator over DSN. Permission to use DSN service to overseas points will be restricted. Only those essential personnel who must make time-sensitive calls to ensure the performance of the command mission will be authorized.
6. FTS Calls: you may call long distance over the FTS lines when urgency dictates the need and the call cannot be completed via DSN or time lines. This service is available on official out-going station-to-station calls within the CONUS area. A control number is required and may be obtained from the Unit Telephone Control Officer (TCO). Calls will be

documented on AF Form 1072. FTS calls must be placed with the base operator or by using a personal identification number. For user dialed FTS, dial 98+area code+7-digit number. You will be prompted to input your PIN. Then, the call will be completed. PIN authorization is through your unit commander via the unit telephone control officer. FTS calls are for official use only. If you don't have a PIN, after you have obtained a control number, dial "0" for the base operator. Calls should be limited to 5 minutes.

distance collect calls without authorization from your supervisor. Notify the TCO so the call can be logged in the 1072 for audit. Violators of this procedure obligate government funds without authorization and will be liable for all charges for the call. Collect calls are highly discouraged.
